IS 14 cts THE DIVISION OF THE CITY.-It must be a source of regre to engender sectional feelings necessarily producing personal ammosities. We shall not now question the motives which have induced the discussion of this subject; still we cannot refrain from designating the object as improper, injudicious and unjust.

If for no other reason, it is improper on account of the an tipathies and animosities engendered and enibittered among residents of the same place, whose transactions should never come in collision but by generalis emulation in competitive efforts. It is injudicious do account of rendering locality the test of acceptance or choice; and by divisions of place producing not only diversities of pursuits but differences of obnects and means-thereby destroying the harmony of ' way and means' which should exist in a well regulated commumity. It is a expedient from the same reasons; and from preventing the greatest good being done to the greatest number by the same or similar means : besides that a division in the municipal government would eventually procure collision and contrariety of regulations, inevitably oppressive to those citizens whose business would require them to act in either or both of the divided and differing portions of the city :-For if the city were separated into two districts having each a municipal government-can it be supposed by any experienced person that the legislators of each government would whole city ? Or can it be believed that invidious ordinances, would not be passed by either government against the citizens of the other? Would not the dissension be like the ignoble strife between the big endians and little endians of Gulliver? Would not the sources of vexation be aggravated worth twenty of such travels as those by Hall, Hamilton a into acknowledged and dominant opposition of views, Trollope. means and ends? And would this be expedient?

The injustice of the measure we have hitherto specified .-Adding then the impolicy and impropriety of a division, to its ministice, can any reasonable and impartial man advocate an object so fraught with manifest evil; to the interests of the majority of our citizens?

It should not be sufficient for the residents of the uprar faubourg to believe themselves neglected in the distribution of the city funds; and therefore alone seek a division of interests by contrariety of means. Many who in their haste seek to avoid Savila, rashiv fall into Charybdia.

We are inteed persunded that a radical change in the municipal government is necessary or would be useful to the better promotion of the prosperity of the city; but that change should not be the result of divided interests nor of sectional feelings. If our fellow citizens of the upper faubourg would endeavour to place the government of the city on a basis by the British periodicals. resembling that of the eastern cities-where the general welfare is promoted by united means, then the evil+ of which they complain would be obvated. We have before unsaccessfully advocated the plan of a municipal govern-

Let this project be dispassionately considered; and as we confident that it would obviate the evils alleged, and promote the general interests much better than any sectional plan of ision, we trust that it will be adopted by those who really desire to see peace and prosperity prevail.
