




GENERAL VIEW OF G. T. P. DOCAS IN VICTORIA HARBOR



WATER SUPPLY AND WATER WASTE

To the Editor:—I have been much interested reading the reports published daily in the Times on the reservoir seepage. Now, sir, it seems to me there is something radically wrong with the system of water supply to the people of Victoria. If we use more than two thousand gallons per month we have to pay extra for this water, but if we happen to be small consumers and don't use more than five hundred gallons we have to pay for two thousand. Surely, sir, this is not justice. The so-called seepage, 200,000 gallons daily, from this big mistake would supply three thousand families per day at the frate we are supposed to consume water. These figures may seem rather large, but anyone can, find the results for them-solves in a few minutes. This is something that the citizens should take into consideration, for if Elk lake can keep this stream of water running to waste we will not need to look for any new supply for a long time, as three thousand families would be a large addition to Victoria at the present rate of growth, and surely with so much water running away a person should not be charged for two thousand gallons when he don't use more than five or six hundred gallons.







TELEGRAPHING **PHOTOGRAPHS** 

CAN BE TRANSMITTED BY WIRE OR WIRELESS

Machine Works Much Like Phonograph—Is Small, Compact and Easily Portable

A new era has dawned for picture legraphy, says T. T. Baker, in the London Daily Mail. Like its predecessor, the early telegraph; the instrument for sending a photograph "by wire" has been large, cumbersome, and complicated, and the cost of operating It out of proportion to the value of its capabilities. With the advent of a portable machine it has become available for general use.





Such a farm was fnaugurated a few years ago at Bexley, Kent, Eng., by L. W. Newman, F. E. S., and the ven ture has proved a great success. The farm consists of three-quarters of an acre of garden and allotment round his house and half an acre in a secluded corner of a wood, enclosed with wire netting. It was in the wood I found him, blusily engaged with one of his fiwo assistants in the task of spring cleaning, says a London Daily Mail re-


