

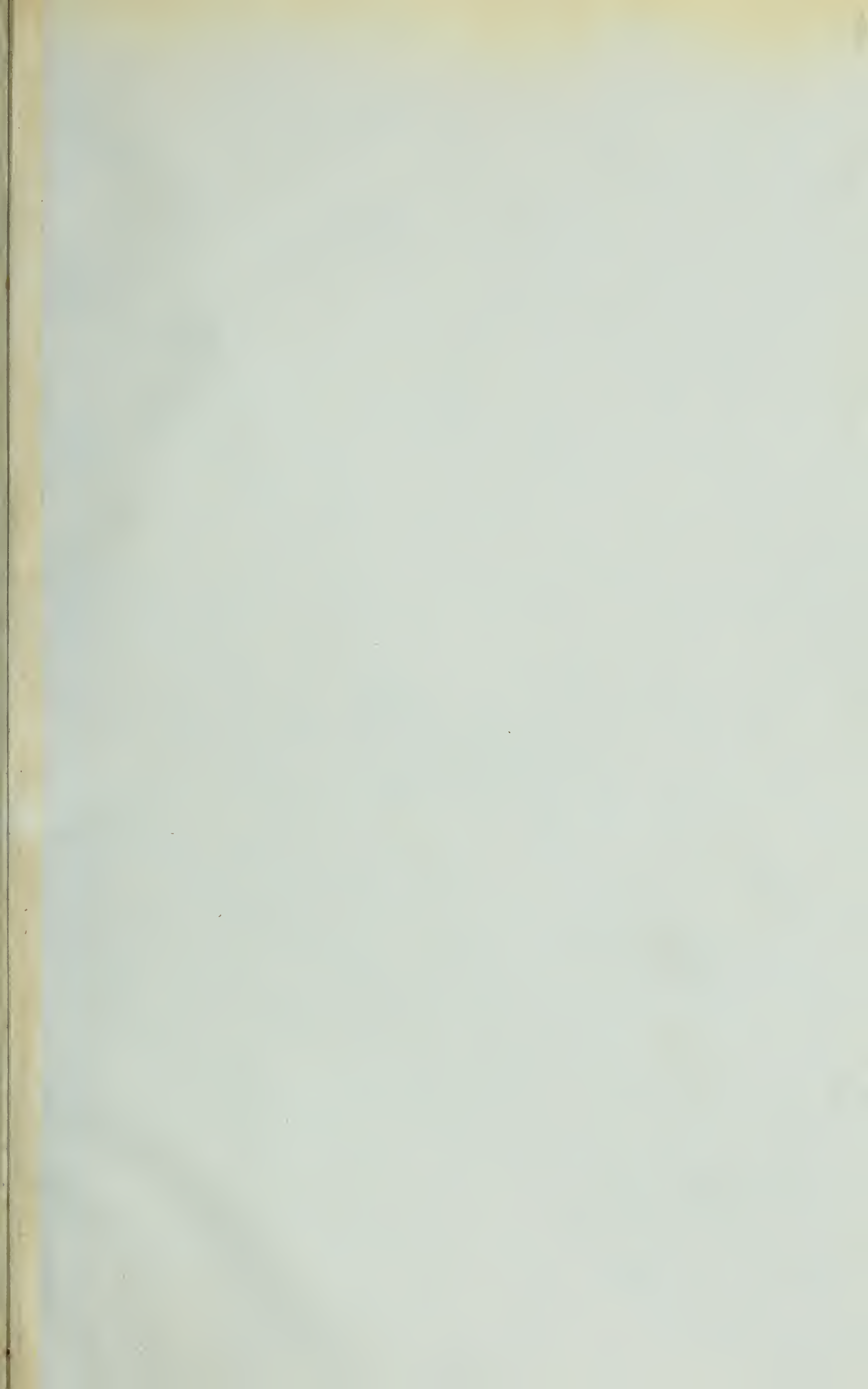

City of Boston.

Monday January 6. 1840.

This being the day appointed by law for the organization of the City government. The following Gentlemen appeared and took their seats, viz.

Jonathan Chapman, Mayor.

Aldermen.

Nathaniel P. Russell.

Mr. Blake came up with a message, stating, that a quorum of the Common Council had assembled, & were now ready to form a Convention of the two Branches of the City Council, for the purpose of their being organized.

The two Branches met in Convention, in the Common Council Chamber. The meeting was opened with prayer, by the Wm. Frederick T. Gray.

The Honorable Samuel May Jr. Chief Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court, administered the several oaths required by law, to the Mayor. The Mayor afterwards administered the like oaths to the Aldermen; & then to the members of the Common Council. After which he addressed the City Council. The two Branches then separated.

A message was received from the Common Council, that they had made choice of Philip M. West, Esq. for President; & Richard J. Wail, Esq. Clerk.

Ordered; that a message be sent to the Common Council, proposing a Convention for the City Council, in the Common Council Chamber, for the purpose of electing a City Clerk.

A message was received from the Common Council signifying their concurrence with the Board of Aldermen, to form a Convention of the City Council, at the time, & for the purpose above mentioned.

In Conventions.

City Clerk.

Accordingly to a signment the two branches of the City Council met in Convention, in the Common Council room, for the purpose of electing a City Clerk. Alderman Gurney, Messrs. Stevens & Blake were appointed a committee to receive, sort & count the votes; who reported that the whole number was fifty six; necessary for a choice twenty nine; Samuel J. McCleary had fifty four & he was chosen. The oath of office was administered to the City Clerk, by the Mayor.

The business of the Convention being accomplished, the two branches separated.

Resolved, That an order introduced into the last council, & referred to the present, instructing the Mayor to make application to the Legislature, in behalf of the City, for such an alteration of the City Charter as to provide "That no new street, shall be laid out, or any street be discontinued, or any land taken for extending or widening any street, lane or alley, involving any expense to the City, but by vote of the City Council," be taken from the files & committed to a joint special committee to consider & report, and if the committee approve the measure to report a bill thereon to be presented to the Legislature for that purpose. Also an order which passed the Common Council & by the late board of Aldermen was referred to the present City Council directing the City Clerk in making record of any land

taken for any new street, or for extending or widening any street, J. lane or alley to file with the Auditor of Accounts a concise account of the same with the agreed or estimated damages thereon, to be by him recorded" be also taken from the files & committed to the same committee to consider & report by ordinance or otherwise. Thereupon Messrs. Parker, Stevens & Phillips were appointed a Committee on the part of this Board. Came up for concurrence. Read & concurred, and Aldermen Huntington & Amory were joined.

Correction

The joint committee on finance to whom was referred the application of the Overseers of the House of Correction, that the City Council would furnish on behalf of the County, the sum of four thousand dollars, to enable them to pay the claims now existing against said Institution. Reported as follows, viz. That it appears from the petition, that by the change of system, adopted by the last Legislature of the Commonwealth, by which no allowance is now made by the State for the maintenance & support of any prisoner in any jail or House of Correction, the income of the House of Correction in the County will be diminished to the amount of between eight thousand & ten thousand dollars per annum, & that accordingly the Overseers have been deprived of the receipt, in the present month, of the sum of four thousand dollars, which has heretofore been paid by the Commonwealth in the month of January. That notwithstanding this result they would still have been able to meet the expenses of the Institution, for the residue of the present financial year, from claims to the amount of about four thousand dollars or five thousand dollars, against individuals for labor done in the Institution, were it not that from the unfortunates



state of the business of the community, these claims are 19.  
not at present available: - that these claims, however,  
can be collected & applied to the current expenses of the  
Institution, during the next financial year, - but that, in  
the meantime the amount of four thousand dollars must  
be anticipated. They therefore pray that the City Council  
would not furnish that amount. Under these circumstances,  
it is the opinion of the Committee, that the petition should  
be granted. It will be necessary, however, in the present con-  
dition of the funds of the city, to procure the amount by means  
of a loan; - but from the fact of the outstanding claims in favor  
of the Institution before referred to, your Committee are of  
opinion, that provision should be made to repay this loan, in  
the appropriations for the next financial year. They accordingly  
recommend the passage of the subjoined order. As to the in-  
structions accompanying the reference, - to consider the expedi-  
ency of an application to the Legislature for a repeal or  
modification of the law, by which the expense of maintaining  
inmates of the Houses of Correction was put exclusively upon  
the counties. The Committee are of opinion that it will be impor-  
tant to consult with the government of other cities, & procure  
their cooperation, before taking any steps. They therefore  
ask time for further consideration of this matter. For the  
Committee, Jon<sup>s</sup>. Chapman, Chairman. Ordered, That  
the Treasurer be & he hereby is authorized to borrow, under di-  
rection of the Committee on Finance a sum not exceeding  
Four thousand dollars, to be applied to the use of the Houses of  
Correction, - and that the payment of the same be provided  
for in the appropriation for the next financial year. In

The amount of the salary of the Steward & Matron has not yet been fixed by the Council. By the Ordinance in relation to the government of the Institution, it is for the City Council to fix this salary. As some inconvenience exists in consequence of this matter remaining unsettled, the Board of Visitors respectfully request the City Council now to pass upon this matter. The sum of six hundred Dollars per annum was originally contemplated as the amount of this salary, & the Board are of opinion that this is the proper amount. The money has already been provided, in the general appropriation for the Hospital, so that no more will be needed. They therefore respectfully submit for the consideration of the Council, the following order. For the Board of visitors. J<sup>o</sup>. Chipman, Chairman. Ordered, That the salary of the Steward of the Boston Lunatic Hospital, shall be at the rate of six hundred dollars per annum including the compensation of the Matron, which salary shall be paid quarterly, the same to be charged to the appropriation for the Boston Lunatic Hospital. In Common Council the order passed. Came up for concurrence. Read & concurred.

The joint-committee to whom Streets & Sewers, was referred an order of the twenty third of January last, to consider the expediency of uniting the two offices of Superintendent of streets, & the Superintendent of Sewers, or of dispensing with one of these officers, & adding the duties to those of some other City officer, submit the following report. That on examination they

find the duties of the Superintendent of streets to be numerous & requiring a large amount of time, probably no officer in the City government, requires more or needs more constant attention. The committee do not deem it necessary, to go into detail of the various duties he has to perform. It may not however, be improper to state, that he employs, & has the oversight, of a large number of men. The care & superintendance of the City stables with the various mechanical employments attached to them, a large number of Horses, Carts, & implements of various kinds, the men requiring his direction at sun rise, & attention through the City, scattered as they may be, to various parts of the City. The performance of these would seem to afford him but little time for the other duties of his office, which are many, & must be attended to. & indeed, your Committee have been informed, that the present incumbent has been so much engaged, in the necessary out door duties of his office that he has not had time to do his own writing, but has employed a person at his own expense for that purpose. On a deliberate consideration of this part of the subject submitted to them, the committee are unanimous in the opinion that it is inexpedient at present to make any alteration in the duties of Superintendent of streets. In regard to the other branch of the enquiry submitted to them viz, dispensing with the office of Superintendent of sewers or adding to its duties, the committee report that they have made some progress therein & respectfully ask for further time. The Joint Committee on Finance, to whom was referred the communication of the Auditor, relative to the state of certain appropriations, with instructions to enquire into the circumstances of the expenditures under each appropriation, the causes why such appropriations have been exceeded or will require additions, & by what authority or under what officer, Committee or Board, such expend-

plans were made, - & particularly, whether any plans laid 31  
before the City Council have been changed, increasing the  
expense thereby, - & whether any buildings have been cre-  
ated: not authorized. - & that said Committee report, in  
detail, the circumstances, & an Order making provision  
for paying all demands, & defraying all expenses of the  
present financial year, - having attended to the subject  
committed to them, ask leave to report. - For greater con-  
venience, the Committee in their report, would follow the or-  
der of items, observed in the Auditor's communication. 1<sup>st</sup>.  
As to the sum of five thousand dollars, required to be added  
to the appropriation for salaries of the Instructors of all the  
Schools, except the Primary Schools, It is well known to the  
Council, that provision has already been made for the erection  
of a new School House in the Third Ward. This was made  
necessary by the overflowing state of the schools already exist-  
ing in that vicinity. This evil, however, became so pressing,  
that the School Committee deemed it proper not to wait for  
the completion of that building, before gathering the new sch-  
ool, - but have since the commencement of the present finan-  
cial year, hired apartments temporarily, & employed the  
requisite number of Instructors. This school which is to be cal-  
led the Endicot School, is therefore, so far as the salaries of In-  
structors are concerned, already in full operation. The an-  
nual salaries of the same Instructors in other schools, as are now  
employed in this, amount to about forty five hundred dollars.  
And the School Committee, in two cases (during the past year,  
where instructors have died, and two were females) have been dis-  
missed to make room for ushers, have caused their salaries

32. to be paid in full for the quarter upon which they had entered. It is for these reasons, that the additional appropriation of five thousand dollars, has been made necessary in this item. 2<sup>d</sup> as to the sum of two thousand dollars required to be added to the appropriation for the usual annual expenses of the Primary Schools. The Primary School Committee have deemed it necessary, during the last year, to increase the number of Primary Schools by six. The average annual cost of each Primary School, for salaries of Instructors, &c. is a little over three hundred dollars. Accordingly the addition of two thousand dollars, to this appropriation has been made necessary. 3<sup>d</sup> As to the sum of three thousand dollars required to be added to the appropriation for repairs, fuel & other supplies of all the schools, except the Primary Schools. An unusual draft & unexpected in amount, has been made upon this appropriation for the present financial year, by the fitting up for occupation, under the direction of the Building Committee of the building erected by the City at East Boston, for the Lyman School there established, for building fences & grading the lands around the same. The expense of this amounted to one thousand nine hundred forty three dollars & twenty two cents. The cost of teaching Music in the schools has also exceeded what was anticipated at the time of making the appropriations, amounting now to the sum of one thousand five hundred & sixty eight dollars. The increased number of Schools, together with the unusual severity of the winter has caused a more than ordinary consumption of fuel. These appear to be the reasons why this appropriation

requires the proposed addition of the sum of Three Thousand D.  
dollars. 4<sup>th</sup> As to the sum of Three Thousand dollars req-  
uired to be added to the appropriation for the erection of a  
new School House in the Third Ward. Your Committee learn  
from the Committee on Public Buildings, the following facts.  
The original appropriation for this School House was  
Sixteen Thousand dollars to which has subsequently been add-  
ed Four Thousand dollars, making in the whole Twenty  
Thousand dollars. The original contract made by the Com-  
mittee on Public Buildings of the last year with Mr. Small-  
low for the mason work was Nine Thousand six hundred  
dollars & with Smith & Stetson for the Carpenters work was six  
Thousand eight hundred dollars, making upon these two contracts  
only sixteen Thousand four hundred dollars or four hundred dol-  
lars more than the first appropriation. In addition to this,  
the Committee of the last year, allowed the following extra bills  
viz. To Mr. Smallow, for Piles, Driving, Copper Funnel, founda-  
tion stone & various other items, all found endorsed upon his con-  
tract as agreed to by that Committee, one Thousand four hund-  
red & ninety two dollars. To Messrs. Smith & Stetson for various  
alterations, also agreed upon by former Committee one hund-  
red & fifty three dollars. To Mr. Savage, for alterations in the  
floor timbers &c. caused as the Committee learn by certain truss-  
es for support proving inadequate & requiring new ones, and  
which was paid to Mr. Savage during the last year. Two thou-  
sands nine hundred forty five dollars & eighty three cents. To  
various other persons for various purposes Three hundred  
ninety four dollars & seventy eight cents, making the whole  
of this extra work over & above the original contracts ~~is~~

34 Four thousand, nine hundred eighty five (dollars) & sixty one cents. Adding to this extra work, the amount of the original contract as before stated, viz. sixteen thousand, four hundred dollars. The total amount agreed to by former Committee is Twenty one thousand, three hundred eighty five dollars & sixty one cents, or one thousand, three hundred eighty five (dollars) & sixty one cents more than the amount of both the appropriations. In addition to this the following items do not appear to have been in any way provided for.

- 1<sup>st</sup>. The City is bound by a contract made by the former Committee in Public Buildings, with the Artillery Company (who had a lease for several years of a Gun House which was taken down to make room for this School House) to fit the lower room of the School House, in a suitable manner for their use, with partitions, among rooms &c. all the necessary fixtures, & also to erect a Flag Staff. - The whole cost of which has been estimated by Mr. Stetson at Three hundred & fifty (dollars). 2. The City is also bound by the same contract to pay said Company Fifty (dollars) per month from the tenth of July last, to the time the new room shall be ready for their use. Two hundred dollars of which to Nov. tenth last has already been paid, & as the room will not probably be ready for their use before March tenth next, there will then be due in addition the sum of Two hundred dollars. 3. It is understood that this room is intended also for a Ward Room, to fit it for which, it is estimated there will be required the sum of eighty (dollars) amounting to Six hundred & thirty (dollars). 4<sup>th</sup> Teacher's



Desks, Blank Boards, Hat Pins &c. for the School 35.  
Room must be provided. estimate one hundred &  
twenty five dollars. 5<sup>th</sup> The attempt to procure good wa-  
ter for the school has failed. That obtained is limited  
in quantity & bad in quality & is unfit to drink. It is be-  
lieved that good water may be obtained by digging a well  
in Cooper Street about Three hundred & fifty feet from  
the House, or by purchasing a privilege in some well near  
the premises, & conducting the water by suction. The estima-  
ted cost is Five hundred dollars. 6<sup>th</sup> Add as a reserved  
fund for stones & incidental expenses Three hundred fifty  
nine dollars & thirty nine cents. Making the whole deemed  
necessary by present Committee on Public Buildings to com-  
plete. One thousand six hundred fourteen dollars & thirty nine  
cents. And adding amount before stated as agreed upon by  
prior Committee over & above both previous appropriations  
One thousand three hundred eighty five dollars & sixty one  
cents. There will be shown the sum of Three thousand dollars  
necessary, as stated by the auditor, to be added to this appro-  
priation. These are the facts, so far as your Committee have  
been able to learn them, in regard to this item. 5<sup>th</sup> as to the  
sum of Three thousand one hundred dollars required to be  
added to the appropriation for the erection of Primary Sch-  
ools. The Committee can only state, that they find that  
the Committee on Public Buildings for the last year deem-  
ed it proper, in addition to the three Primary School Houses  
contemplated at the commencement of the financial year  
to erect a fourth upon the land owned by the City on First  
Hills, as they unquestionably deemed the public necessity to

36. require them all, or they would not have caused them to be built, it may have been supposed, from the fact of the land for one of them costing nothing, that the whole might be executed within the original appropriation. Your Committee do not find that any instructions were given by the Council, as to the number that should be erected, except so far as the amount of the appropriation may be considered as a limit. In the exercise of their discretion, the Committee thought best to undertake four. They have been completed, & the result as stated by the Auditor, is that the cost exceeds the appropriation by the sum of Three thousand one hundred dollars. 6<sup>th</sup> As to the sum of Three thousand dollars required to be added to the appropriation for Repairs of Public Buildings. Your Committee learn from the Committee on Public Buildings, the following facts. As to the ordinary repairs of the public property, nothing special seems to have occurred. It has only happened, as in such a matter it sometimes will, that the amount required to be done this year has exceeded the average and therefore a somewhat increased expenditure has unavoidably occurred. The principal matter however, which requires an addition to be made to this appropriation, is the alteration now being made in the City Hall. The present Committee on Public Buildings, upon entering on their duties, found that an order had been passed by the former City Council authorizing the City Hall to be altered, so as to allow the whole of the first story for the Post Office, & to furnish a new room in the basement, provided that the cost of the same should

not exceed the sum of Five Hundred dollars, & also author- 37.  
izing a lease to be made to the Postmaster of the whole of the  
first-story. It appears from the report of the Committee up-  
on which the order was passed to have been estimated, that  
the cost would not exceed the sum of Five Hundred doll-  
ars. Under this order, a plan had been made by an archi-  
tect of the proposed alterations & signed by the former May-  
or & by the Postmaster, a lease had been executed by the  
City to the Postmaster, in which the plan was referred to, as  
a part of the contract, - & an individual had been employ-  
ed to do the work, which was in progress, at the time of the  
appointment of the present Committee on Public Buildings.  
No special contract appears to have been made with the  
mechanic. Some alterations in the original plan, have  
been made both by the former & present Committee on  
Public Buildings, which have somewhat increased the  
expense, & some repairs have been required which were not  
anticipated. The work is now nearly completed, and the  
mechanic employed estimates that the whole cost will  
be about one thousand six hundred & ten dollars. 7<sup>th</sup>. As  
to the sum of Two thousand dollars, required to be add-  
ed to the appropriation for Pavings & Repairs of Streets,  
the Committee can only state, that it appears that the  
necessary repairs in this department in the ordinary course  
of its business, have caused this appropriation to be exceeded  
to the amount called for by the Auditor. An amount of work  
has also been done by the City, of between One thousand &  
Two thousand dollars, which will eventually be refunded  
by individuals. 8<sup>th</sup>. As to the sum of Eight hundred doll-

are required to be added to the appropriation for Salaries of City & County Officers. Nothing, of course, can be added to the statement of the Auditor, that since the annual appropriations were made, the salary of the Physician at the Lunatic Hospital, has been made chargeable to this appropriation. 9<sup>th</sup> As to the sum of Three thousand dollars required to be added to the appropriation for Sumps, Oil, Gas &c. The Committee learn that during the past years, the Gas Company has very considerably extended its pipes through the streets, in consequence of which the Committee on Sumps &c. deemed it proper to increase the gas fixtures in the street in a corresponding degree. The contract for Oil the present season has also necessarily been at a high rate than heretofore, being now at one dollar, nine & a half cents per gallon instead of ninety eight cents. 10<sup>th</sup> As to the sum of Two thousand five hundred dollars required to be added to the appropriation for the Fire Department. The Committee can only learn that although no new Companies have been formed, & no increased salaries paid, yet the repairs of engines & of hose have been unusually large, & also that a very considerable supply of new hose has been made necessary. 11<sup>th</sup> As to the sum of Two thousand dollars to be added to the appropriation for Police. The Committee find that the day Police during the past year has consisted of seven persons, for six days, & of fourteen persons on Sundays, each paid one dollar & seventy five cents per day. And that by the payments to these & for special police duties &c. this appropriation has been exhausted. As the subject of the City Police is now under

consideration by a special joint Committee. Your Com- 39.  
mittee refrain from adding any thing excepting the  
remarks of the Auditor in his communication. That "if  
the present system of maintaining a Day Police is adhe-  
red to, a further sum of at least Five Thousand dollars will  
be required in that Department; if that system is aban-  
doned, a smaller sum will suffice." 12<sup>th</sup> As to the sum  
of Four Thousand dollars required to be added to the  
appropriation for the Internal Health Department, in-  
cluding the expense of removing the Horse Office and  
sweeping & cleansing the streets. The Committee find  
that in addition to the ordinary expenses of this Dep-  
artment, an unusual demand has been made upon the  
City for the abatement of nuisances, by filling up lanes,  
laying private drains, & making vaults, a single  
item of the first kind, near the Worcester Railroad, was  
attended with an expense of nearly Fifteen Hundred dol-  
lars. Other calls in regard to drains were made in Me-  
chanic Street, Belknap Street & other places, a large  
portion of these expenditures will eventually be recover-  
ed back from individuals liable. But these have been  
the causes of the present deficiency of this appropriation.  
13<sup>th</sup> As to the appropriation for Accidental Expenses and  
Miscellaneous claims, Your Committee can add nothing  
to the statement of the auditor, that unusual & unexpected  
drafts have been made upon this fund, for the refunding  
of taxes, to the amount of Three Thousand five hundred & nine-  
teen dollars & one cent, & for the support of Lunatics in the  
Hospital at Worcester, which latter amount however will

40. be reduced in future by the erection of the Hospital at South Boston, 14<sup>th</sup>.  
As to the additional appropriation required for the Small-Pox Hospital,  
the communication of the Overseers of the Poor has furnished all explai-  
nations upon that subject, & as the deficiency in this Department has  
already been supplied in another way no further appropriation will  
be required. 15.<sup>th</sup> As to the sum of nine thousand dollars required to be  
added to the appropriation for the appropriation for the erec-  
tion of a Fire Proof Building for the Registry of Probates &  
Ords. The Committee learn from the Committee on Public  
Buildings the following facts. The original appropriation  
for this building was Twenty-two thousand dollars. The orig-  
inal estimate for the cost of the building was Twenty-  
two thousand, eight hundred thirty one dollars & seventy  
seven cents. The excess of the contracts made, over the  
estimates, & of the actual cost over the Estimate, is shown  
by a statement made by the Architect, to the Committee  
on Public Buildings & by them furnished to this Committee,  
the substance of which is herewith furnished, under the  
respective heads. 1<sup>st</sup>. Masonry including Copper. Actual  
cost is Eleven thousand, eight hundred eighty nine doll-  
ars & forty one cents. Original estimate was Ten thousand  
six hundred fourteen dollars & eighty cents. Excess over or-  
iginal Estimate, caused by Extra labor on Wooden dress-  
ings, Superintendents services & labor setting, & in a stone  
floor. Twelve hundred seventy four dollars & sixty one cents. 2<sup>d</sup>  
The Stone. Actual cost is Three thousand eight hundred  
thirty two dollars & twelve cents. Original estimate was  
Two thousand three hundred thirty seven dollars & thirty six  
cents. Excess over original estimate caused by interior finish

of Windows & Doors One thousand four hundred ninety four, dol 11.  
Cents & seventy six cents. 3. Cast & Wrought Iron. Actual cost

hundred & four dollars. Excess over original estimate caused

by committee determining to have the building with wood,

Painting & Glazing. Omitted in original estimate One  
thousand six hundred sixty dollars, making total of excess  
over original estimate, Nine thousand two hundred sev-  
enty one dollars & thirty cents. Under this state of facts, it has  
been suggested to your Committee by the Chairman of the Com-  
mittee on Public Buildings, that Ten thousand dollars would  
be a safer sum to be added to this appropriation than  
Nine thousand dollars, if it be the object of the Council now  
to meet the whole expense. Upon this subject it has been fur-  
ther suggested to your Committee that this building, for the  
sake of safety, should be lighted with gas. Should the Coun-  
cil determine that this should be done, it is stated that now  
is the best time to do it, in reference to the present state of the  
work upon the building, & a special appropriation will be  
necessary therefore. No provision has yet been made for furn-  
ishing this building with cases for books & papers or furn-  
iture of any kind. But as it is not probable that these will  
be required before the next financial year, this is hardly with-

42. in the limits of the duties assigned to the Committee. 16<sup>th</sup> as to the sum of Two Thousand four hundred dollars, required to be added to the appropriation for the erection of the Lunatic Hospital at South Boston. The Committee learn that the original plan was altered by the Building Committee by the addition of one story to the centre building, by a change in the basement story, & by the making of water closets. The reasons for these alterations your Committee have no means of learning. They are informed that the cost of these alterations was greater than the sum now required to be added to the appropriation. 17<sup>th</sup> As to the application of the Overseers of the House of Correction that Four Thousand dollars, may be appropriated for the use of that Institution which was recommended to your Committee, they have nothing to add to their former report. They then reported an order to borrow that amount for that Institution. They now recommend that instead of that special order, the sum necessary for that Institution should be added to those to be provided under the general order, appended to the present report. Your Committee have thus gone through with all the items of appropriations which were specially committed to them, & in regard to each, have answered the questions proposed by the Council, so far as their information extends. From all the evidence which the Committee have been able to obtain, they think that the proposed additions to the several appropriations named, will defray all the expenses of the present financial year, under these several heads. The Committee learn, that in addition to the



deficiencies specified in the communication of the Auditor, 43.

upon, in any way, to make any expenditure. 3. Not to raise 47.  
The windows upon the north & south sides of the building,  
above the bottom of the bell. 4<sup>th</sup> To indemnify & save  
harmless the City against all claim or damage, or  
loss of rent under their lease with the Post Master  
or any other of their tenants, against all damage  
to the building, & in general against all loss or injury  
of any kind. And with such other conditions as the said  
Committee may deem necessary to secure the City against  
all expense, loss or injury of any kind, caused by such alter-  
ation. Accepted in Common Council, & the order passed.

A meeting of the board of Aldermen of the City of Boston, held at City Hall, on Monday

The Joint Committee who were Police.  
instructed "to inquire into the present condition & expense of  
the City Police, & to report whether any (and if any) what alteration  
ought to be made in its organization." Having attended to the sub-  
ject ask leave to Report: The City Police has heretofore, consisted,  
in the first place, of a City Marshal, annually appointed by the  
Mayor & Aldermen, & with a salary of one thousand dollars

48 per annum. and of two Deputy Marshals, nominated by the City Marshal, & approved by the Mayor & Aldermen, annually, & receiving an annual salary of Seven Hundred dollars each. At the present time, there is but one Deputy Marshal, the vacancy caused by the promotion of the present City Marshal not having been yet filled. This has been delayed, to await the action of the City Council upon the subject of the Police generally, as committed to this Committee. As to this part of the City police, your Committee are not prepared to recommend any alterations. It is stated by the City Marshal, & indeed must be apparent, to any one who considers the numerous & varied duties of this Department, embracing, as they do, the reception of complaints & the enforcement of all the laws & ordinances relating not only to the peace, but to the health, cleanliness and convenience of the City. That three individuals are as few as can undertake the performance of these duties, with any chance of success. One must be in constant attendance at the office, that every citizen who has any complaint to make, or assistance to demand, may be sure of finding a public officer. And the circuit of the City required by law, cannot be accomplished, unless it be divided into at least two divisions. It may be, that the in-door duties of this Department might be united with those of some other. But as your Committee are about to recommend a considerable change in another part of the police of the City, where they think it can be better made, and as they deem it well, that all changes should be gradual, they are of opinion, that the present arrangement of a City Marshal with two Deputies should not be altered. In addition to these officers, thus annually appointed, & receiving

an annual salary, there is now in existence, & has been for 19,  
a considerable period of time, what is called a Day Police.  
It consists at the present time of seven officers on six  
days of the week, & of fourteen on Sundays. They are app-  
ointed by the Mayor & Aldermen, under the authority given  
them by an Act of the Legislature passed in the year, 1838,  
by which they are empowered to appoint "Special Police  
Officers." The duties of these officers consist of patrolling the  
City, within certain limits marked out for each by the  
City Marshal, of preserving the peace, suppressing disorde-  
rs, observing all violations of law, & arresting offenders of  
every description. As to the expense of this Day Police, each  
officer receives One dollar & seventy five cents per day, ac-  
cordingly. The seven who are on duty every day in the  
year, receive Six hundred thirty eight dollars & seventy five  
cents each per annum, making for the whole Four thous-  
and two hundred seventy one dollars & twenty five cents. And  
the seven who are on duty the fifty two Sundays, receive nin-  
ety one dollars each per annum, making for the whole Six  
hundred thirty seven dollars. Total of the regular pay of  
the Day Police per annum, Five thousand, one hundred  
eight dollars & twenty five cents. In addition to this, howe-  
ver, these police officers receive the regular fees as witnesses  
in the cases in which they make complaints. These fees,  
when not paid by the parties complained of, are paid  
from the City & County Treasury. And it appears from  
the Treasurer's book, that there was paid by him, during the  
year 1839, to the seven regular Day Police officers, the sum  
of Four hundred fifty one dollars & fifty nine cents. In

50. order that the Council may be apprized of all the police force paid for by the City. The Committee would add, that by the 18<sup>th</sup> section of the Ordinance regulating the Fire Department, certain Constables are required to be selected by the Engineer, to attend all fires, "for the preservation of the public peace, the prevention of theft, & destruction of property, & the removal of all suspected persons." Under this authority, few Constables are now selected by the Engineer, & they are paid one dollar each for every fire they actually attend. This amount however, is drawn from the appropriation for the Fire Department. In the Department of the City Watch, in addition to the regular watchmen, one hundred in number, who are paid ninety cents each per night, there are ten persons distributed amongst the six regular watch divisions, who hold warrants from the Mayor, as Constables of the Watch, & are paid one dollar each per night. The Constables have the immediate care & superintendance of their respective divisions, take charge of all persons arrested in the night, report every morning the proceedings of the night, to the Captain of the Watch, who reports the whole to the Mayor, every morning. The amount paid these officers is drawn from the appropriation for the City Watch. On public & special occasions an extra number of police officers is employed. They are paid five dollars each per day, when so employed, & three dollars when employed for the day & evening. Your Committee suggest no change in regard to the three kinds of police last named. They have referred to them only to give the Council a view of the entire police force, in the pay of the City. In regard to the regular Day Police, the numbers & expense



of which have already been stated. it originated at a period of  
of unusual disorder & disturbance in the City, & it has undou-  
btedly been productive of very considerable good. It is,  
however, the opinion of your Committee, that in the  
present apparent condition of the City, the number of  
its officers may with safety be reduced. At any rate,  
they think the experiment of its reduction to be worth  
trying. No practical harm can result, as by the Act  
of the Legislature before referred to, the Mayor and  
Aldermen may at any time, when in their opinion,  
the public interest requires it, appoint any number of  
special police officers. There are some sections of the City  
in which they think it should still be continued. Upon  
the best consideration they have been able to give the  
matter, your Committee are of opinion, that the number  
of this Day Police should be reduced to four for six  
days in the week & eight on Sundays. The expense of  
this police, if the present rate of per diem pay of the off-  
icers is continued, will thus be reduced to Two Thousand &  
nine hundred & nineteen dollars per annum, being a re-  
duction from the present amount paid of Two Thousand  
one hundred & eighty nine dollars. As to the per diem pay  
of these Police Officers, your Committee are of opinion that  
the sum of one dollar & seventy five cents is a fair amount  
provided the entire services of the individuals are sec-  
ured to the City, - that they engage in no other employ-  
ment, & that all fees which they receive as witnesses, in  
the discharge of their official duties, should be account-  
ed for to the City & paid into the City Treasury. To

No. This and your Committee are of opinion, that the individuals employed upon the Day Police, should not be regular Constables, authorized to serve or execute civil process, nor attached to the Fire Department or Watch Department, but should be exclusively devoted to the business of a special Day Police. And that they should be required to account to the City for all fees received by them as witnesses in the discharge of their official duties. It however the power and discretion of appointing these officers is by the law of the Commonwealth before referred to, vested solely in the Mayor & Aldermen, - it is for the City Council only to express their views upon the subject. And as expressive of their views, the Committee recommend the passage of the following resolutions.

For the Committee. J. C. Chapman, Chairman. Resolved, That it is not expedient at the present time, to alter that part of the Police organization of the City, which consists of a City Marshal & two Deputy Marshals. Resolved, That it is expedient to reduce the number of Day Police Officers to four for six days in the week & eight on Sundays. That the compensation of each Officer employed should be one dollar & seventy five cents per day, the same to be in full for all services. - That the individuals so employed should not be Constables, authorized to serve or execute civil process, nor attached to the Fire Department or Watch Department, but be required to devote their whole time to the duties of their office, & that they should account to the City & pay into the City Treasury all fees received by them in the discharge of their official duties. Read, accepted, & the resolutions passed. Aye seven for concurrence. Came up concurred.

The Committee on Street & Water *23*

was read the petition of Robert W. Howe and others in relation to the widening of Mulberry Street, have attended to that duty by giving the Report, and the interest and convenience of many of the persons who would be promoted and other States in the neighborhood would be greatly enhanced in value, by making Mulberry Street thirty feet wide at least; but that neither the finances of the City, nor the public convenience as present admit of an increase of frontage at the immediate benefit of those who have been inclined to add to the value of their own property, for the same reason. It was read and accepted.

The Committee on Public Works *24*

was read the petition of the British Light Guard praying that the said Corp. may be allowed to occupy a portion of the Queen's Hall for the purpose of holding Company debts, until such time as the same shall be wanted by the City Authorities for other purposes, having attended to the subject, and made a Report: The Queen's Hall Market, the use of which is used for in the present petition, has hitherto been a source of considerable income to the City, and it is important that it should continue so. To this end, it is essential that it should be kept as free as possible, from incumbrances of any kind, and although its use is now asked for until such time as the same shall be wanted by the City Authorities for other purposes, - but as similar applications may be made by other Companies, and as a commencement may have been made it is impossible to foresee what might be the end, the Committee deem it most prudent in all respects, that the City should not rely upon a system of loaning the Hall for such purposes. In addition

54. to this same reason. Your Committee in pursuance of the authority given to them by the city council, have advertised for proposals in buying the land in question, & some applications have already been received, & it is not possible therefore, that the city authorities can ever have wanted it for other purposes, so that the petitioners would receive very little benefit, if their application was granted. Your Committee are therefore of opinion that it is not expedient to grant the prayer of the petition, and ask to be discharged from its further consideration. Weston naming the same coin as a balance of his manufactures by leave to Report that by Chap. 30. tit. 2. of the Revised Statutes it is provided that the Treasurer of each County shall keep at the expense of the County a complete set of weights and measures conforming to the authorized metric standard in the State & every year to be used for the purpose of standards may and not in every ten years from the first day of January 1830 the respective County Treasurers for the time being shall cause their said standards to be tried, provided that said trial of the said standards under the direction of the Treasurer of the Commonwealth. The Treasurer shall in his possession a balance made by the said Mr. Thayer & cause for a standard of weight to be kept at the County Hall Boston & also one such a standard with him at the office of weights and measures in the City. fully examined the several provisions of the Ordinance and have  
also called to mind the views of some other gentlemen in  
relation to the same in whose opinions they entertain a high  
respect and they are unanimously of the opinion that the enforce-  
ment of the above named Ordinance, with some slight amendments,  
relating to its execution at the present time, and requiring that the  
public Surveyors and Assessors shall be under oath for the faithful  
performance of their duty, would be satisfactory to a large proportion  
of the people in general and productive of much good to all classes  
of our citizens, especially to the poor, upon whom a deficiency in  
the measure of gold has most heavily fallen. The Committee are un-  
able to understand why the Ordinance, which is, in part, the  
subject of this report, has been suffered to remain so long in-  
operative. They can see nothing impracticable or difficult in  
the execution of its several Sections and if the officers who  
shall be charged with the execution of its provisions will once commence a  
faithful performance of duty, they feel a strong assurance  
that the difficulties and fears in relation to this subject, which  
have hitherto appeared so formidable, will be found compar-  
atively trifling, or not altogether unfounded. The Committee  
find that an Ordinance, essentially the same in many of its  
provisions with the one before referred to was passed by the  
New York City Board in November 1833, and they have  
reason to believe that it has since been strictly enforced; and  
that it has, in that City, been productive of much good. The  
Committee have also considered that part of the order which  
relates to the weighing and measurement of gold. They be-  
lieve no local weight has been established in the United States

of the various kinds of soft or Bituminous Coals, and they sup- 97  
-pose the government of this City have no power to determine  
-establish such Standard; and, further, as they believe the weight  
of soft coal is by no means a proper criterion of its quantity,  
when estimated by measure, on account of its great capacity  
to absorb moisture, they can offer no suggestion for the better reg-

learn, on inquiry, that about fifty thousand tons of hard, or  
Anthracite coal are annually sold and delivered from the

-tween the old South Boston bridge, and Howes wharf: that  
upwards of fifteen thousand are delivered from wharves lying  
between Howes wharf, and Warren bridge; leaving a balance  
of something less than fifteen thousand tons sold in the City  
proper, which are sold and delivered from other places within  
the city. By the first section of an Ordinance for regulating  
the weighing of Hay and other articles; passed Dec. 15<sup>th</sup> 1833,  
page 150 of the City Ordinances, the Committee find that "it  
shall be the duty of the Mayor and Aldermen from time to  
time as the public good may require to establish a sufficient  
number of public scales for the weighing of Hay and other  
articles;" and they believe if a suitable scale be placed at, or

In regard to both Companies, the Committee learn, that upon reaching Craigie's Bridge, and seeing a great smoke at East Cambridge, they thought their services would be needed and accordingly took the responsibility of violating the rules of the Department. But whatever may have been the motive, your Committee cannot recognize the right of any Company to disregard the rules of the Department. These rules must be observed at all hazards. Otherwise all discipline in the Department will soon be at an end. They are accordingly of opinion that this Board should express their disapprobation of the act complained of in the present case - their determination to dissolve the contract between the City and any Company, that in any respect violates the Rules of the Department in future, and that these views of the Board be communicated to all the Engine Companies in the City.

The Committee accordingly recommend the passage of the following Resolutions, For the Committee, Jon<sup>a</sup> Chapman Chairman.

 ascertain their depth breadth &c, take a plan of the same  
 with the inlets thereto and incur them with all the particu-  
 lars, in books kept for that purpose, he is also required to  
 keep an accurate account of the expense of each drain, as-  
 certain the valuation of all estates benefited thereby, and  
 make up the assessment and bills on each, he is also fur-  
 ther required to make all assessments for Common Sewers  
 constructed previous to the passing of the Ordinance and  
 to proceed in the same manner, as he is required to do  
 with those that are constructed after his appointment. The  
 books and plans of the Superintendent, have been examined  
 by your Committee and they take pleasure in stating that

they are neatly and accurately kept, describing minutely, the  
commencement and termination of each drain laid by him, with  
all the inlets marked thereon, and the whole cost in detail  
of the same, together with such particulars noted down as  
are deemed useful for future reference, and they appear in all  
respects conformable to the provision of the City Ordinance.  
Your Committee learn from Mr Wells, the present Superin-  
tendent, that he had much trouble and perplexity in making  
up the assessments and accounts of drains made before his  
appointment, he stated, that no assessments had been made  
for eighteen years previous, that the former loose manner  
in which the records were kept, the difficulty of ascertaining  
the inlets, and the changes that had taken place in the  
ownership of estates, were sources of great trouble & vexation,  
he has however, after much labour been enabled to make up  
the old accounts, many of which have been collected and  
the residue are in a train for settlement. The subject of Com-  
mon Sewers is one of great importance, involving the health,  
comfort and convenience of the community. The present sys-  
tem, perhaps not perfect in all its details, has nevertheless proved  
very beneficial, and, had it been adopted at an earlier day,  
greater advantages would have been derived and a large  
amount saved to the City. After a careful view of the whole  
subject your Committee have not been able to find any good  
reason for dispensing with the office of Superintendent of Sewers,  
but on the contrary they have been strengthened in the belief

After the great excitement which has prevailed not only in this City but in the whole Commonwealth upon the subject, when a law of the State has been passed, amounting virtually to a prohibition and the entire power of the same has been assumed, no individual or Board can be called in manner the subject, without

The committee have also to be understood as expressing their  
opinion that the proposed measure is a necessary and a wise one  
which is a public good and may be said to be understood as a di-  
rection to be given to the public mind in the future and

formed by the habits which are to be sustained by that  
public sentiment which is so essentially essential to any legal  
action being effectual. It is therefore necessary to ascertain what

reimbursement from the City for the loss of a horse, killed while

drawing Engine No 13. to a fire on the night of December 16th 1821. last, having attended to the subject, we leave to Report: That upon notice from the Committee, one of the petitioners, the foreman, assistant foreman and clerk of Engine Co. No. 13 and also the individual in the employ of the petitioners, who was with the horse at the time referred to, appeared and made their statements. From these statements, the following appeared to be the fact in the case. An arrangement had been previously made between the foreman of this Engine Company and the petitioners or some one who acted for them, that in case of an alarm of fire, they should send a horse to the Engine House. For this purpose the harness belonging to the Company, being a common breast plate was kept at the stable of the petitioners, and the same harness which was used on the occasion in question, had been frequently used before. On the night of the fire, the driver in the employ of the petitioners, brought the horse to the Engine House, and hitched him to the pole of the Engine. The assistant foreman, who was the only officer present at the time, directed that he should be hitched to the end of the rope, which was done - the driver as he himself stated, making no objection. This though a more difficult position for the horse, was stated by the assistant foreman, to be the usual method of drawing that engine, when a horse was used. The Engine thus proceeded from the house in Gerritt Street and the clerk joined it near Bowdoin Square. The going was very bad, a fall of snow having been succeeded by. The Clerk took hold of the trace of the horse, and this was very near him all the time from his joining the engine till it reached Union Street.

The driver stated that the driver beat the horse severely and was constantly pressing him on, that he too would have went forward and that the driver set to whip the horse and set to urge him on, as it was impossible to go fast.

Several witnesses from the back of the house all the way. The horse was then driven by the driver, none of the company interfering with him or touching him, except so far as by the driver following him may have excited him till he reached the end of the street. - A witness stated that he then observed him waving his legs, one side and then the other, till he fell dead. It was the opinion of the block and of all the witnesses, excepting the driver, that by the hard driving and great exertions of the horse, the breastplate positively pressing upon the windpipe, as there was no under strap to keep it down - the breath was driven from the horse, and that he was thus suffocated and not by the fall. The driver, however, said the horse balled and so was thrown down against the edge of the stone, and either his brains were beaten out or his neck broken. - But one of the owners of the horse and who carried him away and threw him overboard before night in the morning, stated that he saw no wound upon the horse, and that there were no marks of blood, either upon the horse, or the sidewalk or the sled upon which he carried him off. Upon the evidence, your committee are of opinion that the horse was not killed by falling, but by immediate suffocation and certainly he would be the fault of the driver, who had the entire charge of him.  I should be able to call to my recollection of a kind but I have seen  
 none. Yours respectfully, William Whitwell." "Judging from  
 this act in view, there would seem to be little question that  
 the Captain of the Watch would be fully justified in discharg-  
 ing an individual who thus abandoned his duty, and cer-  
 tainly after a discharge had been made by him under  
 these circumstances the Council would not interfere. The ap-  
 plicant, however, states in his petition that he was discharg-  
 ed by Capt. Lewis Barry without sufficient cause as he  
 "thinks he is able to prove" and "that he expects to prove  
 that his discharge was the result of personal feeling and  
 prejudice and not demanded by the public interest." The  
 whole inquiry however made by the applicant of his wit-  
 nesses respecting that which related to his general character  
 which, however was not called in question, was directed  
 toward showing that Mr. Whitwell the Captain of the  
 Watch changed the route of the applicant from personal  
 feeling against him, in consequence of the applicant having

taken a part in a remonstrance against the reappointment of the 13<sup>th</sup> recent Captain of the Watch. Upon this point Mr Whitwell testified that he had had the change in contemplation for some time, and that he made it for several reasons; that he thought it proper to remove Mr Spaul from a station which was a most inefficient route, in consequence of his being in such a state of mind, and that Mr Dickson was much more able to discharge his duties, and that he also deemed it important to separate Mr Dickson from another member of the Watch, in consequence of his Liabilities in the Department connected with the subject of appointing the former Captain of the Watch. The witnesses called by the appellant stated, that they had never known any expression of Mr Dickson to Mr Whitwell but on the contrary, they thought he had always rather favored him. Mr Whitwell expressly disclaimed any feeling of prejudice or hostility against Mr Dickson. It appeared that Mr Dickson had once before been changed to his route, at his own request, and in general, that the routes are established by the Constables of the Watch and they consider themselves authorized to change them when they see fit. From the whole evidence your Committee is of opinion, that the charge of prejudice or improper motive on the part of Mr Whitwell in changing the route of Mr Dickson was not substantiated. It should be stated that the Coroner & other Constables on the same Station testified that he was not consulted as to the proposed change and that he would have disapproved it. But your Committee is of opinion that the Constable for the night, ought to have the right to change the route of any Watchman, if he thinks proper, subject of

(3) I have to report by the Captains of the Watch in this matter in all respects, and stating that a want of previous consultation with a change of route is no justification for a direct violation of orders and an abandonment of duty. It is the duty of the Watch to make such orders the action of the Committee, or no other, proper. But when a violation of the orders takes a change of route, it is in the Watchman's hands, and he is, seeking afterwards, if he please, in a proper manner a restoration to his former route. It cannot be the duty of the Committee to state his reasons for the change at the time, as it may be very important not to give them. And as you seem putting a restraint upon the changing of the route of the Watchman, your Committee is of opinion that while a general rule of discipline should be continued upon the ground with which they are best acquainted yet that occasional changes would be very useful, as insuring greater waterquickness and fidelity to duty. Upon a view of the whole matter, it appears to your Committee that Mr. Dickson, the Constable of the Watch, gave to Mr. Dickson a perfectly legal order, and that he had no improper motive, that Mr. Dickson disobeyed the order and abandoned his duty in the night that upon this being made known in the legal and official manner, to the Captain of the Watch he discharged him from the service of the City and the question is whether the Board should ever interfere and order Mr. Dickson to be restored to duty. Your Committee can see no ground or recommendation such a course to the Board and therefore advise Mr. Dickson to remain in the service of the City as a Chaplain and not as a Constable.

of the Commonwealth passed in the year 1837, relating to Alien  
Passengers, the amount of one dollar each which alien pas-  
sengers are required to pay to the Superintendent, is to be  
paid into the treasury of the City or Town, to be appropri-  
ated as the City or Town may direct for the support of  
foreign paupers. The mode of proceeding in this City, under  
this act, has been for the Superintendent, from the moneys re-  
ceived by him, to pay such sums as he found occasion to, in  
sending away such alien passengers as arrived, with a view  
of effectually preventing their becoming chargeable to the City.  
The net balances remaining in the hands of the Superinten-  
dent after such payments by him, have been regularly  
paid over by him to the City Treasurer, and by the Treasurer  
passed to the credit of an account opened by him with the  
Superintendent of Alien Passengers. In this way there stood  
to the credit of that account, on the first day of January,  
last, in the books of the Treasurer, as stated by him, the  
sum of seven thousand nine hundred and twenty five dol-  
lars and thirty four cents. It is from the mode of keeping  
the account referred to, to be a balance remaining in the  
treasury at that time, there having been no formal appro-  
-priation of it by the Council. Yet it is merely nominal,  
as amount very nearly, just as it having been actually ex-  
-pended by the City, since July 1<sup>st</sup> last, for the support of for-  
-eign paupers in the House of Correction. In this state of things

The Legislature at its last session, passed an Act requiring the Treasurers of town and city in this Commonwealth, on the month of May of this year, to pay into the Treasury of the Commonwealth all balances then remaining in their treasuries under the provisions of the Alien Passenger Law before referred to. Notwithstanding the particular mode of keeping the account before stated, your Committee are of opinion that the total sum expended in fact, upon foreign paupers, in the House of Correction is a sum equal to the fund derived from Alien passengers, there is, in fact, no balance now remaining in the Treasury of the City, to be paid over under the law in question. The Committee would further state, that no part of the law of 1837 is repealed, so that the power of the City to appropriate the amount received from this source "to the support of foreign paupers," is not abridged. And it seems not only legal, but equitable in every point of view, that any portion of this fund not required to send away from the country those aliens who arrive, should be appropriated to pay the expenses of any foreign paupers who are now in fact chargeable to the City. These in the House of Correction are of the class. In order therefore, to place the matter in proper form both as respects the past and the future, your Committee recommend that an Order be passed by the Council, remaining appropriate so much of the fund derived from Alien passengers as is expended in sending them out of the country, to the support of foreign paupers in the House of Correction. They accordingly submit the following Order. In the Committee

The Committee on the Reduction  
of the City Debt were themselves at the commencement of  
this financial year instructed to report to the City  
Council some plan or course to be adopted to the relief of the City  
and the management of the commonest debt of the City.  
By an Ordinance passed March 10, 1834, it is provided  
in Section 2<sup>d</sup> that the Mayor be President of the Common  
Council and the Chairman of the Joint Committee of  
Finance on the part of the Common Council, shall be a  
Committee on the Reduction of the City Debt, which July

it shall be to cause all money, passed to the credit in the 16<sup>th</sup> Book of the Auditors Accounts to be applied to the purchase or payment of the capital of the debt of the City. And by the 3<sup>d</sup> Section of the same Ordinance it is provided that all moneys in money remaining in the Treasury at the end of any financial year, all receipts in money on account of the sale of real estate of any description, now belonging or which may hereafter belong to the City, all receipts on account of the principal sum of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars in the annual rate tax, shall be appropriated to the payment or purchase of the capital of the City Debt. By virtue of the 1<sup>st</sup> Section of the same Ordinance, these amounts are annually placed to the credit of the Auditor, and there are also annually charged with the whole amount of the public debt falling due within the financial year. But as the amount of these credits is always much less than that of the debt falling due, this account with the Committee is an imperfect one. The balance which of course is required to be raised by loan is blended with the other loans made in anticipation of the tax, and for other purposes, and the consequence is a want of simplicity and order. It seems to your Committee that these several points would be secured, if the management of the public debt were kept distinct from the other financial operations of the City and the immediate superintendance of it intrusted to a Committee constituted like the Committee on the Reduction of the Debt. They further think the amount which

163 The Council is annually authorized to borrow, at the time the annual appropriation bill is passed, should be limited to that which is simply necessary in anticipation of the taxes, and that the whole of this be made payable within the year, so that the whole should be paid off from the receipts of the year and so constitute no part of what may be termed the more permanent debt of the City. As to the latter debt, they propose, that the Committee upon the Reduction of the City Debt should annually in the month of April or May cause to be submitted to the City Council, First, a statement of the whole amount of the City Debt, with the amounts falling due in each year respectively. Second. - A statement of the amount thereof falling due in the then present financial year, specifying the amounts falling due in each month respectively of that year. Third. An estimate of the amounts which will probably be placed to their credit, during the financial year, under the Ordinance before referred to. From these statements the Council will each year perceive how much more will be required to meet the public debt falling due within the year, than will be furnished from the resources named, and the amount so proposed to be borrowed, and they shall authorize to be borrowed under the direction of the Committee on Finance, the amount so borrowed to be placed to the credit of the Committee on Reduction of the Debt, to be by them applied to that purpose and no other. The amount thus borrowed, which will be simply equivalent to postponing so much of the debt of each year as cannot be paid off during the year, will be made payable at such future periods as will equalize it

may as possible the amount falling due in each year. - The 1894  
Committee shall then at the end of each financial year,  
make a detailed report to the Council, in their proceedings,  
showing how much of the debt has been actually paid off and  
how much postponed under the loan authorized. The Council  
will thus be furnished with a short and simple statement, in  
itself, and disconnected with other matters, of the operations in  
relation to the public debt, which can be published to the citi-  
zens, in connection with the Annual Statement of Receipts  
and Expenditures. In conformity with these ideas, the amount  
which the City Council has authorized the Treasurer to borrow  
this year, in anticipation of the taxes, is Three hundred thou-  
-and dollars, - less by One hundred and fifty thousand dollars  
than before, when the payment of the debt has been min-  
-gled with other matters. And the whole of this loan of  
Three hundred thousand dollars is required to be made pay-  
-able within the present financial year, as it should be. So  
that if the income of the City from taxes and other sources  
equals the estimate, the whole of this temporary loan will  
be paid therefrom during the present financial year and will  
become a part of the more permanent debt. Provision there-  
-fore remains to be made for that part of the City debt which  
is due the present financial year. And in conformi-  
-ty with the suggestions herein before made, your Commit-  
-tee have procured from the Auditor and herewith submit the  
-following statements viz. First Statement marked A. show-  
-ing the whole amount of the Public Debt of the City on the  
-first day of May, 1890. to be One Million six hundred  
-ninety eight thousand two hundred and thirty two dollars and

Under their power and authority to provide for their compensation. The 49<sup>th</sup> Section of said Chapter provides for the safe keeping of prisoners in the several Counties committed to their custody, and allows them an salary of twelve dollars per month, and a fee of ten cents for each day, which salary shall not be less than twenty dollars annually to any Sheriff. This act was originally passed in 1830, and the whole Code was revised in 1835, and this section continued without alteration, the late Sheriff James was at that time the incumbent and the sum of twenty five dollars was paid upon by the Board of Supervisors to County Commissioner as a compensation for the discharge of his duty, and by reference to his returns in the office of the County Treasurer it appears he received that sum annually to the time of his resignation. Your Committee are not aware of any change of circumstances to justify any increase of compensation, and indeed, if the statement of the petitioner be taken as evidence, it goes to prove that the number of commitments are diminishing, for by his report it appears that in 1835 there were 2132, and in 1837 only 1800. The Committee consider that the provision in the 49<sup>th</sup> Section was intended to give other

...tunity for the County to provide a sufficient and permanent support for the Sheriff, in cases where compensation from other sources should not be sufficient for that purpose. The committee, however, believe that this does not apply to the County of Suffolk, as by again referring to the returns of the late Sheriff Sumner in the files of the County it appears that he was in the receipt of a fraction more than twenty five hundred dollars per annum during the last eight years of his service, and the Committee have no reason to apprehend that the sources of compensation have diminished. With these views the Committee would recommend that twenty five dollars per annum be continued as the salary or compensation to the Sheriff of Suffolk for the safe keeping of the prisoners committed to his custody, until the further order of this board, as County Commissioners. Public Buildings respectfully represent, that the City now owns an estate in No. 107 Street in Boston, on which is a building which has been heretofore leased for a dwelling house and shop. The tenant of the shop having expired, has surrendered his lease, and the shop is now vacant. The dwelling house is now occupied by several individuals who hire rooms by the week of the tenant of the shop, but much of the rent has not been collected and probably never can be. An application has been made to your Committee, to hire the whole building for \$150. per annum. But as the City has no use for this estate for any purposes of the government, and as your Committee are of opinion that it is in every respect poor policy for the City to hold property merely to lease, your Committee recommend that the same should be sold. The City also owns another piece of land on Broad Street, being about eighty feet front on that street, and about twenty five feet in depth, a portion of an estate remaining after widening Broad Street. This piece of land has been leased to Messrs. J. & G. Cunningham for the sum of One Hundred Dollars per annum and their lease expires during the present month. They have placed a wooden building upon the land, and now ask a renewal of the lease. Your Committee however in the same reasons stated in the other case, are of opinion that it will be for the interest of the City, that this estate should be sold. They accordingly submit the following Order—

The Joint Committee on Public Buildings who were instructed to consider and report what disposition shall be made of the old County Court House, and the adjoining grounds, having considered the matter, do leave to Report: That they find the City in possession of this building, which in a short time will be entirely vacant. They consider it a settled point that it should neither be taken down, nor sold, and that it cannot be leased for any purpose which the Council would approve. Upon careful examination the building appears to have had little care or money expended upon it for many years, and consequently to require a very thorough repair even for its proper preservation. It must be done to whatever use it may be put, if it is intended to preserve it from gradual decay. Under these circumstances it has seemed to be a general desire, that the building should be fitted for a City Hall, if it could be done without a waste of money, - your Committee directed their joint inquiry, to ascertain whether for a very little more expense

232 There was absolutely requisite for the preservation of the property, that it could not be obtained. By means of estimates made by competent mechanics, your Committee are satisfied that a thorough repair of the building in all its parts, within such alterations, only inside, as would be absolutely necessary, if it were to be occupied by the City Government, could be made for the sum of Eight thousand Dollars. These repairs embrace making tight the roof, — painting and drawing the outside walls, — clearing the present gutters, — making new outside doors, new plastering both entries and both Court Rooms, with new ceilings, cornices and centre pieces, — making new treads to all the stairs, — whitewashing all the other walls, and ceilings, and all the doors, floors, windows and woodwork both inside and outside, and thoroughly whitewashing and painting the building throughout. The alterations contemplated within this estimate consist of putting an iron fence around the entrances upon the north side, so as to prevent the nuisance at present existing, partitioning off two small rooms from that designed for the Mayor and Aldermen, and removing sundry partitions in other rooms to accommodate the officers intended to occupy them, — putting in new windows in the wings, and raising the floor of the Mayor and Aldermen's Room, so as to conform to the present height of the windows. And as stated before, the Committee learn from the estimates made, that these alterations and repairs can be made for the sum of Eight thousand Dollars. There is also proposed that within alterations, what is necessary to be done in the Mayor and Aldermen's Room two feet, and putting in new heart wood sashes, — can be made for an additional sum of Six Hundred fifty dollars, — making the whole

cost by this plan eight thousand six hundred fifty dollars. 2.3.3.  
This in the opinion of a majority of the Committee, was pre-  
ferable, as avoiding the necessity of raising the floor in the  
room, and as improving the external appearance of the build-  
ing. The Committee were further informed by the mechanics  
who estimated that by keeping the entrances as they now are,  
the present stairs might be taken away and new stairs car-  
ried up in the rear of the main part of the building, conform-  
ing precisely in the second and third stories in all the  
arrangements to the plan heretofore submitted to the Council  
by Mr. Preston, for the additional sum of eight hundred and  
twenty five dollars, - making the whole cost of altering by this  
plan and repairing as before stated, nine thousand four hun-  
dred and seventy five dollars. A majority of the Committee  
preferred this plan, under these circumstances, to either of the  
others, on the ground of its furnishing two rooms in each of  
the upper stories, in place of the present entries, and more conmo-  
dous than those to be made from the Mayor and Aldermen's Cham-  
ber also of its bringing the room of Clerk of the Common Council,  
close to Council's room, and also as furnishing an internal com-  
munication through the length of the building, in both the up-  
per stories. It should be observed that the amount and style  
of repairs, and of finish both inside and outside the building, is  
the same in all the three plans. The difference is only in the  
amount of alterations in the interior arrangement of the building.  
A majority of the Committee are in favor of that last report,  
which makes the most alterations, for the reasons which have  
been stated; - whilst a minority are in favor of that which makes  
the least alterations, on the ground that with the present arrangement.

234. A good Hall can be made as the building will furnish, with  
out any disproportionate expense, that it will be as satisfactory  
in situation in the other mode proposed, - and that if alterations  
in an old building are once commenced, it is impossible to say  
where they will end. The committee, therefore, desiring that in one  
mode the building should be fitted for a City Hall, and wish-  
ing to express their preference amongst  
the plans, recommended in the first place, that the old County Court  
House be fitted for a City Hall according to the plan thirdly  
stated; - or if that should not be acceptable to the Council, then  
according to the plan secondly stated; or if neither be approved,  
then according to that first named. As to the adjoining grounds  
on the east side, - if the building is in any way improved as  
a City Hall, the Committee recommend that they be graded,  
laid out into walks, and grass plots with trees, and that a  
suitable iron fence be placed on the front and the western  
side, and a brick wall upon the eastern. The cost of this is  
estimated at Three Thousand Dollars. Provision must also be  
made for lighting the building, and if done by gas, the cost is  
estimated at One Thousand Dollars, also for fire-iron, gas  
and conveniences of warming the building which will require  
another One Thousand Dollars. It is the opinion of the Com-  
mittee that one of the rooms in the east wing can be made  
to accommodate the meetings of Ward. But another engine  
house must be provided in lieu of that which now stands  
upon School Street. No estimate has been made as to furnishing  
the building. It is intended however, that the desks should  
be removed from the present rooms and all other furniture that  
can be made available. Putting together the various items as

estimated, it appears that by the first named plan, the whole cost of fitting the building for a City Hall, (exclusive of furnishing) together with grading and ornamenting the grounds, will be Thirteen thousand dollars. By the second plan Thirteen thousand, six hundred and fifty dollars. By the third plan Thirteen thousand, four hundred & seventy five dollars. To guard against mistakes in the foregoing estimates, it will be observed that the order subjoined is so framed as to enable the Council to revise the subject, in case they should prove incorrect. In conformity therefore, with the opinion of a majority of the Committee as to the particular plan, the passage of the following order is recommended. For the Committee, Jonathan Chapman, Chairman. Ordered. That the Joint Standing Committee on Public Buildings be authorized to cause the Old County Court House on School Street, to be fitted for a City Hall upon the plan therein named in the foregoing report and also the land adjacent to be laid out in the manner stated in their report, provided, that if on receiving proposals for the whole work, it shall appear that the same will cost more than estimated in their report they report the same to the City Council for further instruction before making any contract. The Joint Committee on Public Lands who were authorized by an order of the City Council to sell the estate belonging to the City situated on Cross Street, and also the lot of land belonging to the City situated on Broad Street, now occupied by A. & C. Cunningham, have considered the subject and Report; That they have examined the estate on Cross Street, and find that the City purchased said estate in 1837, containing eighteen hundred & ninety eight feet of land, for which they paid Three thousand & five hundred dollars, and a brick building was erected with two privies, covering nearly all the vacant land, and now occupied by two Primary Schools, in the back part of the lot, about forty feet from Cross Street, bounded on a narrow passage way, and the only entrance to the school to be used in common with several other estates, and their back yards and privies bounded on said passage way, and frequently encumbered to the great annoyance of those who attend the schools. Between the School House and Cross Street, is that part of the estate, proposed to be sold, on which is a wooden building formerly occupied as a store and dwelling house, covering nearly

all of the remainder of the land belonging to the City. The

Government intended should be made of that portion which is  
proposed to be sold, at the time they made the purchase. But

In 1838 William Hayden proprietor of one of the adjoining buildings gave notice that he was about rebuilding on his estate, and he was directed to set back the front of his building to the new line - this placed Mr Hayden in the same situation in regard to one end of his store as your petitioner was before the erection of the temporary front; therefore, under existing circumstances it was deemed expedient to remove the temporary front of the store of your petitioner, and as there were but two buildings remaining to complete the improvement, the board were desirous to finish the same at that time, and a Committee was accordingly authorized to negotiate with the owners and tenants, but on proceeding to make inquiries they found that the tenants had long leases upon the estate, and that both owners and tenants demanded substantial damages if the alteration took place, and consequently the

259 The prosecution of the improvement was relinquished, and the front of said building has remained recessed four feet in the rear of the adjoining building and there is also five feet recessed rear in each of the stories, together with a recent expansion of this board, which render it probable that no litigation will take place for some time to come. These indiscretions and ill advised acts have alienated from him the minds of his neighbors so as to lead to conduct on their part frequently

258 *Impetuous and meddling, urging his claims, not naturally placid,*  
to show itself in actions and language unbecoming his office  
and for which the Committee believe he is himself *to* responsible in his  
whole conduct. The Committee therefore cannot avoid saying that  
they think it desirable that some person less impetuous to the ill  
will of his neighbors and of a cooler temperament should be em-  
ployed in an office, which, however exercised inevitably leads  
to act thwarting the wishes and interests of others. but they do  
not think that there has been such intentional abuse of office  
as to call for the extreme remedy of displacing Mr. Vose from

of Mr. Dolliver. The facts of the case appear to be substantially



these. On the night of the 7<sup>th</sup> of August, there was a dis- 259  
-turbance in Ann Street, caused by one John Wright, who was  
drunk and turbulent. The three watchmen before named, with  
Mr. Dillaway as the senior at the head were on the spot,  
endeavouring to suppress the disturbance. Wright was exceed-  
-ingly abusive to the watchmen, particularly to Dillaway,  
applying to him the foulest language, threatening to strike  
him, putting his fist in his face, and desiring the whole  
watch to take him to the watch house. Mr. Dillaway rebated-  
-ly told him to go into his house, in front of which the  
scene occurred, or that he should be carried to the watch  
house. Mr. Dillaway stated, that he forbore as long as he  
did, because Wright was a notorious character, and had  
been in the watch house before. and he desired to see if  
he would strike him, in order that if he did, he might be  
committed and more severely punished. In this state of  
things, which lasted about five minutes, and whilst Wright  
was thus storming & threatening, Mr. Dolliver, whose route was  
in the neighbourhood, attracted by the noise, came running  
down to the scene. Mr. Dillaway and the two watchmen  
who were with him all state that as Dolliver came up,  
Mr. Dillaway called upon him to help him carry Wright  
to the watch house. Mr. Dolliver, however, and his wife  
all state that they did not hear Mr. Dillaway make this  
-quest. But however this may be, Dolliver, without stopping  
seized Wright, - none of the watchmen at that time having  
their hands upon him - and thrust him into his house, and  
went in with him, and Mr. Wright who was present shut  
the door. The three watchmen then went home and Mr. Doll

200  
was followed shortly after, as soon he stated, as Wright went  
in jail. Mr. Dillaway made complaint to the Captain of  
the Watch, that the act of Mr. Dilliver, of interfering &  
putting Wright into the house, — in a route not his own, —  
and after being asked to assist in taking him to the watch  
house was an act of insubordination and a rescue of Wright  
from the other watchmen. And under the circumstances as  
presented to him, the Captain of the Watch deemed it his  
duty to discharge Mr. Dilliver. Whilst the importance of  
strict subordination in the Watch Department is fully  
appreciated by your Committee, and whilst there can be  
no doubt that, the Captain of the Watch, in this matter,  
acted from the best of motives and with a single view to  
the discharge of his duty, and under all the evidence sub-  
mitted, and as nothing further appeared in regard to Mr.  
Dilliver, except the act in question, — your Committee can-  
not consider that act, under all the circumstances of the  
case, as sufficient to warrant his discharge. Even admit-  
ting that Mr. Dillaway did request Mr. Dilliver to help  
him take Wright to the watch house, — which is the only  
material fact, about which there was much discrepancy  
in the evidence, yet as in the noise and confusion of the  
scene, Mr. Dilliver may not have heard it, which he states  
to be the fact, and as his act, though strictly perhaps  
an interference, seems to have proceeded from zeal, without  
wrong intention, and from the idea that a sudden and en-  
ergetic act would best quiet this riotous disturbance of the  
peace, your Committee is of opinion, in view of the whole mat-  
ter, that Mr. Dilliver, if he desires it, should be again retained.

The Committee on Public Buildings to whom was referred the petition of the Boston Artillery Company, desiring that the City would either furnish them with a new Gun House, or repair their present one, which is in a dilapidated condition, having attended to the subject will leave to Report: The Committee are satisfied that the present Gun House of the Company is not a suitable place of deposit for their arms, and therefore the Company cannot receive from the Commonwealth, the arms which it is required to furnish, by the late militia law, upon receiving "satisfactory evidence that a suitable armory or place of deposit has been provided by the town within which the company is situated, or otherwise." The law does not seem positively to require of the town or city to furnish such armory. But it has been usual for the City to furnish them, and the one in question is the property of the City. The Committee have therefore proceeded upon the ground, that the City will still continue



to provide them, and if so, the claims of the petitioning Com-  
pany seem strong. After examination, the Committee ascer-  
-tained that the present building might be repaired and made  
-suitable at an expense of about six hundred dollars. And  
that they think the best course. As however, the case is  
not one that was contemplated when the appropriation was  
made for the repairs of public buildings, and as the ordi-  
-nary repairs will probably require the whole of that fund,  
the committee have thought best to submit the matter to  
the Council, and if the building is repaired, to ask for a  
special appropriation from the reserved fund. The Committee  
accordingly submit the following Order. For the Committee  
-eration Chapman Chairman. Ordered That the Joint Com-  
-mittee on Public Buildings be authorized to repair the Gun  
House of the Boston Artillery Company, situated at the foot  
of the Common, provided the expense does not exceed the sum  
of Six hundred dollars, and that the same be charged to  
the appropriation for a Reserved Fund. Reported in Common  
Council and the order passed. Came up for concurrence. Read and  
concurred.

The Joint Committee who have charge the section of a Hospital at the House of Correc-  
-tion, to whom was referred an Order relating to the section  
of a Work Shop at the House of Correction, with instructions  
"to report the actual cost of completing the said Hospital and  
the balance remaining of the appropriation for that object  
and the remaining sum of the appropriation to repair the dan-  
-age occasioned by the late fire at the House of Correction.  
Also to report the kind of Work Shop it is proposed to erect and

the same matter, - And to whom was also referred a communication from the Clerks of the House of Correction, upon the same subjects - having attended to the subjects committed to them we have to report, First, as to the actual cost of completing the Hospital, and the balance remaining of the appropriation for that object. - In the latter part of the financial year 1838, and which ended April 30<sup>th</sup> last, the City Council appropriated the sum Nine thousand dollars, for the erection of a Hospital at the House of Correction. Of that amount there was expended, during that financial year, only the sum of Three thousand, nine hundred and ninety eight dollars and sixty nine cents, as appears by the Auditors books, and also by the last published Statement of the Annual Receipts and Expenditures of the City. The unexpended balance, viz. Five thousand and one dollar and thirty one cents, remaining at the end of that financial year, as must be well known to every member of the Council, could not be applied to the object for which the original appropriation was made, in consequence of the Ordinance in relation to the City Debt, is, with all unexpended balances of appropriations, to be applied in payment of the City Debt. The whole amount, therefore, expended by the City upon the Hospital, prior to April 30<sup>th</sup> last, was the above named sum of Three thousand, nine hundred and ninety eight dollars and sixty nine cents, and no more. In consequence of the remainder of the Nine thousand dollars, being diverted, as before stated, by the Ordinance, it became necessary, in making the appropriations for the present year, to supply its place, in a new appropriation, and was done to the amount of Five thousand

dollars. A precise similar proceeding was had this year, 1861, in relation to the building for the Probate office, and Registry of Deeds, and this is what has always been done, when a financial year closes, before an object for which an appropriation has been made, is completed. The new appropriation is not an addition to the original but is only a substitute for that part of the original one, which has not been expended and which goes at the close of the year, towards the payment of the city debt. Of the five thousand dollars which was thus appropriated for the present financial year, there has been expended, as appears by the Auditors Books, the sum of Seventeen hundred and eighty three dollars and seventy one cents, and leaving an unexpended balance of thirty two hundred and sixteen dollars and twenty nine cents. But the estimate is not yet completed. Your Committee cannot therefore, from actual knowledge state the actual cost of constructing the Hospital. But they learn from the mechanic who superintends the building, and from the Board of Overseers of the House of Correction, in their communication which is referred to this Committee, that the sum of Twenty two hundred and sixteen dollars and twenty nine cents, will complete it. Your Committee fully rely upon these statements, and they accordingly state as their full belief, that the cost of the Hospital when completed, will be as follows. -

1. Of the original appropriation of \$5000. of last year the amount expended was	\$3,218.01
2. Of the appropriation of this year there has been expended	1,883.71
3. Of the same appropriation there will further be required	2,216.27

Making the total cost of the Hospital when completed, as above

274 stated, Seven thousand nine hundred and ninety eight dollars and eight nine cents. As it appears from the foregoing statement, that of the five thousand dollars appropriated this year, but Four thousand will be expended, the balance remaining of that appropriation will be the sum of One thousand dollars. Second, As to the remaining sum of the appropriation to repair the damage occasioned by the late fire at the House of Correction. During the present financial year, the sum of Four thousand dollars, was appropriated for this purpose. Of this there has been expended as appears by the Auditors Books, the sum of Twenty two hundred and thirty three dollars and sixty eight cents. The work has been completed, but there are unsettled bills to the amount of about Two hundred fifty six dollars and thirty two cents, which will make the whole cost of the repairs Twenty five hundred dollars, and leave an unexpended balance of Fifteen hundred dollars. It thus appears that from the two appropriations there will remain the sum of Twenty five hundred dollars. Third, As to the kind of Work Shop it is proposed to erect and the estimate thereof. Your Committee sometime since caused a plan to be made of a Work Shop of wood and an estimate made of the cost, which amounted to Two thousand dollars. They still propose that it should be of wood, but they now contemplate extending its length, so that it shall extend from the front of the main building to the rear line of the Hospital. This will of course increase its expense. But the reading express your confidence in the statement of the Overseers made to the Council, that the sum of Twenty five hundred dollars, that is, the remainder of the two appropriations will complete the Shop.

Your Committee fully believe that the interest of the City requires that a new Workshop should be erected, and having answered the questions proposed to them, to the best of their knowledge and belief, beg leave in conclusion to submit the following Order, in lieu of that which was submitted to them. For the Committee Jonathan Chapman, Chairman. Ordered, That the Joint Committee, who have under charge the erection of a Hospital at the House of Correction, be and they hereby are authorized to cause to be erected a Work Shop in the Stables in the said House, and that all the unexpended balance of the appropriation which was made for completing a Hospital in the said House, after the same is completed, and all the unexpended balance of the appropriation which was made for rebuilding and repairing the damage done by the late fire at the said House after the same is completed, be and the same hereby are appropriated for the purpose of building the said Work Shop. Accepted in Common Council, and the order passed. Wm. W. for concurrence. Read and concurred.

The Joint Special Committee Messrs. to whom was referred the petition of James B. Richardson, Chairman of the Board of Assessors, have attended to that duty and ask leave to report. That the sum of Four Hundred dollars heretofore granted to the Assessors to defray the extraordinary expense of block hire was continued to them this year in consideration of the increased duties devolved on said board by the Militia Law in collecting and enrolling the names of all persons in the City between the ages of eighteen and forty five years liable to military duty, but in the opinion of your Committee the Assessors

shall show good cause for not having done so, and made

six months after the date of his tax bill." Although this last  
provision would seem to bar the claim absolutely, after the ex-  
-piration of six months yet your Committee, as informed by the  
City Solicitor, that the practice has been to consider it as limiting  
the action of the assessors only and not that of the County Com-  
-missioners, and that upon good cause shown for not applying  
within that time, they have acted upon it afterwards. Whatever may  
be the opinion of your Committee as to the propriety or expediency  
of this practice, they are unwilling to recommend a departure from  
it, in the case of the petitioner who has shown what is claimed.

242 a good cause is not proceeding earlier, and was from his own  
statement under oath is not the means of trying the question of law  
in a suit with the City. Under these circumstances, your committee are

House of Industry, Correction and Reformation, to whom was referred  
the communication from the Rev. C. S. Spang, Chaplain of the House  
of Correction, House of Industry and Lunatic Hospital, at South  
Boston, having attended to the subject, with leave to report:  
Your Committee have for some time given their attention to the  
subject of the duties of the Chaplain of the Houses at South  
Boston, and to the discharge of them by the present incumbent.  
They became satisfied that that gentleman, with the most un-  
exceptional personal and religious character, and with the best  
intentions in the discharge of his duties, did not possess the  
peculiar qualifications necessary for the station. This is not, and  
should not in the slightest degree be imputed to him as a  
rebuch, the Station being a difficult one, and the qualifica-  
tions requisite for it, a rare occurrence. With a view of making  
what your Committee deemed their duty, under these circumstan-  
ces, as little as possible disagreeable to the Chaplain, in whom  
the Committee entertain a high personal respect the Chairman  
on the part of the Board of Finance with the concurrence of the  
other members of the Committee, addressed to him a friendly note  
intimating the feelings of the Committee. And it was in con-  
-sequence to that note, that the communication from the Chaplain  
has been referred to your Committee, was made. In that communi-  
-cation, the Chaplain after stating certain parts of his own

and desiring, that as he was a house in some degree  
and a family to support, "some time, or an equivalent should  
be given him for a removal," which would seem to be unreason-

Ordered, - That the Standing Committee on the House of Industry, Invention and Reformation, be and they are authorized to cause to be erected within the limits of the House of Industry at South Boston, a suitable building to be used as a Hospital, for that institution and for the reception of patients from the other institutions at South Boston and from the City generally, having any contagious or malignant disease which shall render a removal necessary or expedient, provided the cost of the same does not exceed the sum of Thirty five hundred dollars. Ordered, That the sum of Thirty five hundred dollars be and the same hereby is appropriated for the erection of a Hospital at the House of Industry at South Boston, and that the same be withdrawn from the appropriation for a reserved fund. The said Special Committee appointed  
to consider the subject of running a straight line between the burial  
ground and other City land on School Street, having considered the  
subject we have to report: That the line of the old fence between  
the burial ground and the City land on School Street, is exceedingly  
irregular & which is of more importance, the passage way between  
the Court House & the burial ground, which is the only avenue  
from School to Court Street, is very narrow, & always in a most  
disgusting condition. It has been ascertained, that the tombs border-  
ing upon the old wall are so low as to admit a brick walk  
over them without disturbing them in any manner. By setting the  
proposed iron fence on a line from the corner of the new Bridge &  
Siderow dividing, to the upper corner of the City's land on School  
Street, an unnecessary log in the land will be removed, the line  
of the fence will be straightened, the passage way will be widened  
to about seven feet at one end, and about seven feet at the other,  
which the burial ground for its appropriate purposes, will not in fact  
be diminished. The sidewalk will extend over about two hundred and  
twenty seven feet the tombs being under it. Under these circumstances,  
your Committee are unanimously and strongly of opinion, that it  
will be a very great improvement and ought to be made. But it is  
provided by the Revised Statutes Chap. 24. 2. 59. that "no highway or  
avenue shall be laid out or constructed in, upon, or through any

inclosure used or appropriated in the burial of the dead unless by authority to that effect shall be specially granted by law, or the consent of the inhabitants of the town where such inclosure is situated, shall be first obtained, under the penalty in this behalf provided in the 130<sup>th</sup> Chapter." And in the 130<sup>th</sup> Chapter, which prescribes the penalty, the expression used is, "unless the consent of such town" shall be obtained. Your Committee have consulted the City Solicitor, who is of opinion, that it is competent in the City Council to express the consent of the City, within the provisions of the Statute. Your Committee therefore, earnestly recommending the expression of such consent by the City Council, have only further to recommend the passage of the accompanying Resolution. In the Committee Jonathan Chapman, Chairman. Resolved. - That the consent of the City of Boston be and the same hereby is given, to the laying out of a public foot passage way over so much of the eastern end of the burial ground adjacent to the City's land in School Street as will be included between the City's said land, and a straight line from the South westerly corner of the said said building, running to the upper corner of the City's said land on School Street. Accepted in Common Council and the resolve passed. Came up for concurrence read and concurred.

tion I would observe that the qualifications of voters for the officers  
in question are prescribed in the Revised Statutes, Chapter 3, Section  
1; the provisions of which are nearly in the same terms with those  
of the 3<sup>d</sup> Article of the Amendments of the Constitution of the  
Commonwealth; differing from the latter in this particular, that  
the Statute extend the constitutional qualifications of voters for  
State officers to voters for Town & County officers also. By these  
Statute provisions, residence in a town for six months previously  
to an election is made an essential requisite to the right of  
voting in such town; and, as the first of the questions above  
submitted supposes the voter to have "removed his residence" from  
Boston within six months prior to an election, the conclusion nec-  
essarily follows, that he thereby loses his right of voting in  
Boston at such election. It may be added, that the time when  
the voter may have "removed his residence" whether before or af-  
ter the first day of May, is not material. The question would  
be simply whether he had thus removed his residence, and this  
must be decided by the circumstances of each case, as having  
taken in another town, or discharging other duties or obligations  
as an inhabitant of such other town, &c. 2. The second question  
is answered by the remarks now made in relation to the first.

326. 2. In answer to the first question I would remark that the  
case seems to be distinctly provided for by the Revised Statutes,  
Chapter 15, Section 11 which is in these words: "Every person remain-  
ing from the town in which he held a town office shall be deemed  
at liberty to exercise such office." The provisions of the  
Statute has proved to be correct, being applicable to all towns  
in the Commonwealth and there is nothing in the Special Act  
relating to the city of Boston, as a municipal corporation, which

has confined itself to annually electing a Board of Directors,  
leaving them to appoint such officers as they deemed proper &  
to fix their compensation, with the single exception of the salary  
of the Superintendent, which is fixed by the City Council in the  
annual Salary bill. The Directors, in the exercise of the discretion  
now left to them, have deemed it proper that there should be a Chap-  
lain of the House. When the late Superintendent, Mr. Quinn, was  
appointed he was a clergyman, and the Directors, as they were  
deeming it well that the same person, if possible, should be both  
Superintendent and Chaplain, they appointed him to both offices  
giving him Two Hundred Dollars per annum as Chaplain, in ad-  
dition to the Eight Hundred Dollars salary as Superintendent fixed  
by the Council. It appears, therefore, from the conference which your  
committee have had with the Directors that they have not intended  
to add to the salary of the Superintendent, as such, - but have paid  
the same individual Two Hundred Dollars as Chaplain in lieu of  
paying another person. And the authority by which they have taken  
this course is the general discretion which seems to have been left  
them in regard to the number and compensation of all the extra-  
neous officers. As to the propriety of thus placing one individual in  
two such offices your committee can find no ordinance or order of the  
Council forbidding it. The Directors, therefore, seem to have had a perfect  
right to do as they have done, under the entire discretion which has  
been left them and that they acted from the best of motives, your  
committee entertain not the least doubt. They would however regret  
that it would not in their opinion, be unreasonable in the salary  
of the Superintendent to be liberal one and to intend to require  
his whole time and services, but if competent he might perform

258 The Julia C. Chapman, without additional compensation. As to the  
views in general your Committee need only say, that a statement  
was made in regard to them, by the Committee on Salaries of the  
present year, to whose report, which is No. 11. of the printed documents  
your Committee would refer the Council for information. As to the ex-  
penditures the Auditor's report was shown that the expense of the  
establishment is about Nine thousand dollars, per annum. Your  
Committee have no reason to suppose, that the expenditures are  
conducted in other than a judicious manner. As to the condition  
of the House, there are now in it about 45 males, no females.  
A change has recently been made in all the three male offices,  
and of course, the institution does not present that appearance  
of neatness, order and discipline, which would be expected from  
more experienced officers. Whilst your Committee believe that all  
is done for the Institution by the Directors that is in their power,  
they cannot but think that there is some defect in its organiza-  
tion, and from this cause are led to doubt, whether it is pro-  
ductive on the whole of an amount of good commensurate with  
its expense. The subject, however, is one of difficulty, and your  
Committee, though they have thought much upon it, are not pre-  
pared to propose a remedy. They can only commend it to the  
careful observation of future Councils in the hope that it may  
be made productive of the most beneficial results. In behalf of

whom was referred the communication of the Captain of the City  
Watch, upon the subject of altering the hour of striking the watch  
from seven o'clock to eight o'clock during a portion of the year,  
and also upon the subject of increasing the pay of the constables  
of the Watch having attended to the subject with leave to report:

560. In relation to the matter of changing the time of calling the watch, the Captain of the Watch, upon further consideration, is of opinion that it is not expedient to make any change, your Committee accordingly dismiss that point. As to increasing the pay of the Constables of the Watch your Committee find that these officers are ten in number. Their present pay is One dollar each per night, whilst that of the men is merely cents per night. The men, however are required for this compensation, to do duty for only half of the night, and if from any cause, they are kept on duty all night they receive double pay, that is One dollar & eighty cents for the night. — But the officers, whatever extra duty they may be called upon to perform, and which is not inconsiderable — receive only their One dollar per night. — In consequence of this inequality and as the duties of the Constables of the Watch are arduous and responsible your Committee are of opinion that their pay should be increased to One dollar and twenty five cents per night. — This increase will amount to about Nine hundred dollars a year. Your Committee would further state that they find the appropriation for the present year for the Watch Department was thirty eight thousand dollars. — This was made upon the basis of the number of watchmen then employed which was one hundred, and in addition to the ordinary expenses of the Department only. It has been found necessary however, upon representations from citizens and from the Captain of the Watch, to increase the number by nine, placing them upon the rock, around the South Cove and upon the Millpond. It has also been necessary to repair and furnish with new beds two of the watch houses, whose condition had become intolerable. And there is now an application from the citizens of East Boston that the watch there now four in number, may be doubled, in consequence

of the great disturbance caused by the rascals connected with the 361  
Team Thieves that are there. As the preservation of the public peace  
and safety by night is an object of paramount importance, it will  
undoubtedly be necessary to increase the watch there, certainly to  
some extent. And as the city continues to increase, the number  
of watchmen must necessarily be gradually multiplied. To meet  
this increased expense, it will be necessary to make an addition  
to the appropriation for the Watch Department. And believing  
it better that this should be foreseen, and provided for in season,  
rather than postponed until the appropriation has been expended,  
your Committee have deemed it proper to bring it to the attention  
of the Council at the present time. And to meet the object men-  
tioned in this report, your Committee recommend the passage of the  
following Order. For the Committee, Jonathan Chapman, Chairman.  
Ordered. That the sum of Twenty one hundred dollars be added to  
the appropriation for the City Watch, and that the same amount be  
withdrawn from the appropriation for a Reserved fund. In Common

Ordered, that the City Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized and directed to pay the bounty of five dollars to each and every field and Staff officer of the Volunteer militia residing in Boston, upon receiving from such officer a certificate signed by himself, that he has performed all the duties required of him by the 92<sup>d</sup> chapter of the Statutes of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts passed 21<sup>th</sup> March 1840. Passed in Common Council - Came up for concurrence. Read and concurred.

Niles

The Joint Committee on Public Buildings to whom was referred the application of William J. Niles that the City would proceed to lay out a passage way between the City's lands



on School Street, and the land of said Niles lying easterly thereof 30.3  
having attended to the subject, asks leave to report: That the claim  
of said Niles to the passage way in question is founded upon an  
agreement in writing bearing date the 6<sup>th</sup> day of June A. D. 1830,  
and signed by the former Mayor and Mr. Niles, by which in the  
words of the agreement it was "mutually understood and agreed be-  
-tween the City of Boston and William T. Niles, that whenever the  
City should open a passage way adjoining his estate, on the land  
recently purchased for the site of a new City Hall, he shall have  
a right of way over it, and that any buildings he may erect, shall  
and may be bounded by said Street a passage way." And Mr. Niles  
on his part agreed to give his note for One thousand Dollars, pay-  
-able January 10. 1840 and also stipulated as to placing stables &c. on said  
passage way. When the note mentioned in the agreement fell due, on  
January last, Mr. Niles tendered payment of it to the City, which  
however, it was thought best, under the circumstances of the case, not  
to receive, and Mr. Niles then made the application which has been  
referred to your Committee. As to any legal claim of Mr. Niles for dam-  
-ages, or for a specific performance of the agreement by a process in  
equity, it is sufficient, in the opinion of your Committee, to reply, that  
the agreement is not that the City will open a passage way, but  
simply that whenever they do open one, he shall have certain rights  
therein. In taking this ground, however, the City of course would not  
claim of Mr. Niles the payment of his note. Your Committee therefore  
upon the mere claim of Mr. Niles as founded upon the written agreement  
must simply state that inasmuch as the passage way has not  
yet been opened, Mr. Niles has no legal right against the City,  
but as the note was given by him under a different understand-  
-ing of the agreement, it would be most proper for the City to give

364. up to him. Your Committee, however, after they had laid out the ground in front of the new City Hall, were of opinion that it would be for the interest of the City, to have a passage way from School to Court Street on the easterly side of the Hall, provided it could be arranged on fair terms between the City and Mr. Niles. Notwithstanding what they have said as to Mr. Niles' legal claim, they believe that from what occurred the last year, he might reasonably enough indulge the expectation that a passage way was to be opened. And they are confident that the City under such circumstances would be desirous to meet the just expectations of an individual, with whom they had been dealing, even though there might not be a strictly legal claim upon his part. And if, still further, by such an honorable course towards the individual, an object important to the City, could also be attained, and an unpleasant litigation avoided, there would seem to be more than a common inducement for action. With those views, your Committee entered upon a negotiation with Mr. Niles, upon the subject of opening a passage between his estate and the City's; and after much discussion and deliberation, terms have been proposed which are satisfactory to Mr. Niles and to your Committee. As however, your Committee have as yet no authority to enter into any agreement, they submit these terms to the City Council, with a view of asking the requisite authority. The terms are as follows. The City to put in a strip of land nine feet on School Street, by two feet on the rear line and containing seven hundred, fifty one and one sixth square feet. Mr. Niles to contribute a strip of land, seven feet on his rear line and running to a point at the distance of ten feet from School Street and containing six hundred and thirty

and a half square feet. Those two strips of land making to-  
-gether a piece nine feet in width through the whole length of  
the two estates, to be used as a common passage favored by the City  
and said Niles, with the usual rights of a passage way, to each par-  
ty. "A." The City also to covenant not to build or obstruct in any  
way light and air, for the distance of six feet westwardly from said  
passage way, so that in fact fifteen feet shall be forever kept open  
between the two estates for light and air, though the passage way  
is not required to be more than nine feet wide. - The City, how-  
-ever, to have the right to place and maintain an open fence on  
the westerly side of said passage way, not exceeding six feet  
in height. - The present building also to be no breach of this  
covenant, but may remain at its present distance so long as  
the building stands. "B." - The City at its own expense to make  
and maintain the passage way and fence, - grading it so that  
there shall be no steps therein. And in case they continue said  
passage way beyond their rear line towards Court Street by fur-  
-ther widening the Street behind the City Hall, - said Niles to  
have a free passage over it. Said Niles, on his part, besides  
giving the aforementioned quantity of land, to place upon his rear  
line a suitable support for the brick walk which the City may  
make. Also to place a suitable fence or wall along his line.  
Said Niles also to covenant that so long as he owns the es-  
-tate, no stables or stalls for horses shall be placed nearer the  
passage way than they now are. Also that there shall never  
be any passage from his estate to said passage way for horse  
or carriages, - but free right to open upon it by both parties for  
foot passengers. The City also to have a right to place & keep  
posts at the entrance on Gehole Street, to exclude handcarts,

366 wharfbanks &c. but leaving free passage for foot passengers—  
The note of Mr. Niles to be given up to him— he on his part to  
cancel the agreement of the last year—the work to be done  
is soon as spring opens, and thus the whole matter to be  
settled. These are the terms of the proposed negotiation. Your  
Committee have estimated the expense to the City of making  
the passage way including the work and fence, at about six  
thousand dollars. It should also be stated that the opening of this  
passage way in the mode contemplated, will undoubtedly lead to  
widening the street in rear of the City Hall, by taking about  
four or five hundred feet of land. This however will be left  
to the appropriate Committee and to be acted upon hereafter—  
Under all the circumstances of the case, as the passage way  
in question is a desirable one, and to settle amicably an un-  
pleasant controversy between the City and an individual, your  
Committee recommend that the negotiation upon the terms stated,  
be concluded, and after so much negotiation has been had by  
your present Committee, they deem it important, that the matter  
should be settled if possible, the present year—rather than leave  
the matter to be gone over by the next Council. They accordingly  
recommend the passage of the following Order— Jonathan Chap-  
man Chairman. Ordered that the Mayor in behalf of the City, be  
and he hereby is authorized to conclude and execute an agreement  
between the said City and William J. Niles for the opening and  
making a passage way on the westerly side of the new City Hall,  
according to the terms specified in the preceding report. (A.)  
Ordered that the sum of six thousand dollars be and the same  
is hereby appropriated for the purpose of making the said passage  
way together with a fence along the westerly side thereof, and

that the same amount be withdrawn from the appropriation for a  
Reserved fund. Passed in Common Council. Came up for concurrence.  
Road and concurred with an amendment, to the first order by  
inserting at (A) the words "excepting the words between A & B  
on 5<sup>th</sup> page." Sent down for concurrence. Came up concurred.

Nuisances

368. "Relative to nuisances, sources of filth and causes of sickness, within the city of Boston." Passed. Sent down for concurrence. Came up with amendments. Read and laid upon the table.

Bees Island

The Joint Committee on Public Lands who were authorized by an order of the City Council to lease Bees Island, and make the necessary repairs on the buildings and fences. Report: That owing to the late season of the year they have not been able to find a tenant for the Island, and Mr Thayer having the barn filled with hay, it was found difficult to make the necessary repairs at that time, and it being necessary that some person should remain on the Island to take care of the buildings during the winter, the Committee have consented and agreed with Mr Thayer for him to remain on the Island until Spring, and take care of the buildings so free of rent - to remove any time in case the City should find a tenant; they have also agreed with Mr Thayer for the betterment, which he has for a long time claimed, and allowed him One Hundred and twenty five dollars. This appeared to your Committee to be the best arrangement that could be made under all the circumstances. They therefore recommend this subject to the early attention of the next City Council. For the Committee, Thomas Hunting. Read and accepted. Sent down for concurrence. Came up concurred.

Public Lands & City Debt

An ordinance in addition to an ordinance concerning the Public Lands and reduction of the City Debt, passed in concurrence with the Common Council.

Gray Public garden

Whereas the City of Boston leased to Marco Gray, and others, certain lands for a public garden, and whereas by an order passed November 19. 1838, the trustees or directors of

Said Establishment shall make annually a report, signed by a majority of their board to the City Council stating the expenditure made and the income received. Therefore, ordered, that the said trustees or directors be requested to make a report, in conformity to said order of the City Council. Passed in Common Council. Came up for concurrence. Read and concurred.

The Committee on the House of Industry, Correction and Reformation, to whom was referred the communication of the Directors of the House of Reformation, accompanied by a Report which had been adopted by them, in which the opinion is expressed that "the great end of the Institution, - reformation of offenders, - would be essentially promoted by removal of the girls," - having attended to the subject with leave to Report: That by the Act of the Legislature establishing the House of Reformation, a discretion is given to the Directors, as to the persons who may be admitted into the House, so that in fact no admission can take place there, without the declared assent of the Directors. In addition to this power which they thus have of excluding all whose influence they should deem injurious the fact now is, that there are no girls in the House. In order, therefore, that there may be a fair opportunity to try the experiment of having boys only in the House, - your Committee recommend that the subject be referred to the next City Council. In the Committee, Jonathan Chapman, Chairman. Accepted in Common Council. Came up for concurrence. Read and concurred.

The Joint Special Committee who were instructed "to consider and report on the situation and connection of the City of Boston and Nainford Island, and

House of Reformation.

Special Joint Committee

370 what course it would be proper for the City to pursue, taking into con- sideration all its relations under the present law," and to whom was also referred the petition of John Mind, Keeper of Quinsaid Island, that the City would pay or advance a portion of the salary, amounting to One hundred and four dollars and forty four cents, which the Commonwealth has usually paid him, but which was not paid the last year - having considered the subject, ask leave to Report: 1. to the property of Quinsaid Island, - the Island itself, the large Hospital, the Surgeon's House and the Boatman's House being to the Commonwealth, whilst the small Hospital, the Physician's House and the Store House are the property of the City. The City also built the two wharves. The Commonwealth and the City are in this way, therefore, jointly interested in the property. 2. to the connection between the Commonwealth and the City, in the care and management of the establishment there, there is much confusion in the legislation in regard to it, and it is very difficult to state its precise position. A brief outline of it will be submitted. By the Act of the Legislature passed June 20<sup>th</sup> 1810. Sec. 6. the Board of Health who are now by the City Charter, the City Council, were empowered to establish and regulate the quarantine to be performed by all vessels arriving within the harbor of Boston. And by Sec. 7. they were authorized and required to select the Physicians, the Island Keeper boatmen and such other officers and servants as might be necessary - to prescribe their duties, fix their salaries & fees, - to save the care of the island and Hospital, - and annually to render to the Commonwealth a statement of the property connected with the Hospital establishment, and of all money expended thereon. All these duties and powers of the Board of Health passed to the City Council by the Charter Sec. 1<sup>st</sup>. and they were also authorized to execute all



then powers as a Board of Health or the appointment of Health 371  
Commissioners, or in such other manner as they thought best. The  
City Council in pursuance of these powers, by an Ordinance passed  
August 10. 1833. placed the Department of Quarantine, under the  
superintendence of the Mayor and Aldermen, giving them the sole  
and complete control of Mainsford Island, and its appurtenances,  
making it their duty to see the Ordinance executed - its duty pro-  
tected, - and also their duty annually to render the account to  
the Commonwealth of the property connected with the establishment  
and of the money expended as required by the Act. The Ordinance,  
however, provided that the Physician and Island Keeper should be  
chosen by concurrent vote of the City Council - who should also fix  
their salaries. By this Ordinance, therefore, it appears that the City  
Council acted in the Mayor and Aldermen, all the power which  
the Legislature had given it over Mainsford Island, excepting that  
of choosing the Physician and Island Keeper and fixing their  
salaries. In this state of things, the Legislature in 1836 by the  
said Statute Chap. 11. Sect. 4. 2. provided that the Hospital establish-  
ment on Mainsford Island, should be under the sole care of the  
Mayor and Aldermen - authorized them to appoint all such officers  
and servants as they should deem necessary, to prosecute their work  
and station their compensation - and required them to transmit to  
the Commonwealth the annual statement of the receipts and expen-  
ditures upon the establishment, as aforesaid. The act of the  
Legislature was considered as a repeal of the Act of 1833  
and as consequently superseding the Ordinance of the City based  
upon the Law of 1833 - and as giving the whole control of the  
establishment at Mainsford Island, including the appointment  
of all the officers to the Mayor and Aldermen. And the power

3<sup>rd</sup>. They have since exercised. The Mayor and Aldermen acting under the provisions of the Revised Statute were tided, have annually rendered to the Commonwealth an account of all the property at the island and connected with the Hospital establishment, and also of the monies expended thereon. As to this matter of monies expended, - until the last year, they confined that account to the amount expended in keeping the buildings and boat in repair, and the Commonwealth has always refunded to the city that amount. In the year 1839, the Legislature passed another law, requiring the Treasurer of the City to transmit annually in the month of January, an account under oath, of all monies which have been expended by the City upon the Hospital establishment on Mainford Island and also of all monies received by him on account of said Island, - and if any balance shall be found in favor of the City, it is to be so reported by the Committee on accounts. Acting upon this new provision, the City Treasurer, in January last, rendered an account, in which the Commonwealth was charged not only with the amount of repairs on the buildings, as heretofore, but also with the salaries of the Physician, Island Keeper and Boatman on the ground that these were properly within the description of "monies expended upon the Hospital establishment." The Legislature however, of the last year refused to allow the account as thus rendered or rather the Committee on accounts refused to report in favor of it, but were willing to report in favor of so much of it as related to repairs. It was brought out for the City not to object to this, and accordingly nothing was done and nothing was paid by the Legislature. They immediately however, repealed the law of 1839, and thus matters are now thrown back to the provisions of the Revised Statute of

1850. In the commencement of reference to the members of the Council, the Committee would state that the provisions of the Revised Statutes upon which the matter now rests, may be found upon page 45, of the Rules and Orders of the Council. This is an outline of the legislation upon the subject of Mainford Island, and such is the position in which it now stands. Connected in some degree with this matter, it should be stated, that the same Revised Statutes, make the City Council the Board of Health for the City, and authorize every Board of Health to appoint a physician to the Board. And the quarantine stations and regulations are made matters within the control of each town and city, each in itself, and are not matters of State legislation. Your Committee have made this detailed statement of facts, in order that the Council may see that the matter referred to them is involved somewhat in confusion. And as this is so, and as the settlement of it must be a matter of arrangement between the Commonwealth and the City, your Committee think it the better disposition of the subject, to refer it to the next City Council who can act upon it in connection with the Legislature, at its approaching session. They accordingly recommend such a reference of it. As to the petition of Mr. Minot, your Committee are of opinion, that as the City paid him the salary which they fixed on their part, there is no reason why they should pay in advance any amount for which he has a claim upon the Commonwealth. They therefore report that the petitioner have leave to withdraw his petition. Which is respectfully submitted. In behalf of the Committee Jonathan Chapman, Chairman.

The Committee on External Health and Sanitation

whom was referred the communication from Messrs. Sturge, representing  
that large quantities of ballast have recently been taken from

mittee are satisfied that ballast and gravel have been taken from  
from Deer and Bird Islands, although they have not sufficient  
evidence to warrant the belief that the quantities so removed are as  
large as have been represented to this board by the communication  
above referred to and to similar anonymous letters which have been  
received. The committee have also been furnished with sufficient  
evidence to induce the belief that the continued removal of ballast  
and gravel, from these islands, would in due time, and it would  
impair the power of resistance to the action of the sea and the  
reach later made through the northern part of Deer Island is clearly  
accounted for by the removal of ballast and gravel from said  
Island. In an Act for the preservation of Deer Island in western  
harbour passed June 12<sup>th</sup> 1818. it is provided that any person who  
without permission, shall remove earth or stone from said Island  
shall forfeit and pay for each offence the sum of twenty dollars  
to the use of the City. The committee also find that a resolution  
was adopted on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of April, 1818 which authorized the  
Mayor to offer a reward of fifty dollars to any person or persons

6. and are such information as shall lead to a conviction of the  
person or persons who may hereafter repeat the offence of taking, with-  
out licence, baited from Deer Island. These offers of reward have  
not proved sufficient for the protection of the city property in these Is-  
lands. The committee believe that the execution of these offences might  
be prevented, at least to a considerable extent, if an officer were appoint-  
ed and specially instructed to take this subject into his particular  
charge. The Captain of the Quarantine boat, whose present duties do  
not afford him full employment, has signified to the committee his  
willingness to perform a further use to the City, without any addition-  
al compensation. He is particularly acquainted with the circum-  
stances which relate to the subject under consideration, and is  
frequently called by his present duties, to the immediate vicinity of

Read, excepted and the order passed in Common Council. Came up for concurrence. Read and concurred.
