BRYAN AND BOOZE.

Although William J. Bryan's political ambitions have encountered repeated failures, the country that thrice refused him the presidency nevertheless reposes profound confidence in his sincerity. The people have faith in the man Bryan, even though they withhold confidence from Bryan the partisan. He has imprinted himself indelibly on the national consciousness as preacher of moralities who believes in his own preachings and practices them to the fullest possible extent. He believes that the welfare and happiness of this people are dependent upon the abolition of the liquor traffic. Boundaries of the Proposed Game Refuge

A description of the boundaries in the proposed game refuge in the Santa Lucia mountains, as provided for in a bill introduced at Sacramento by Assemblyman Martin is printed below. Mr. Martin, in a recent letter to the American, disclaims responsibility for the bill, having introduced it at the request of the Game Protective Association, and he does not favor the bill particularly, believing that the proposed game refuge embraces too much teritory.

It would be well for Carmel sportsmen to look into the matter, and communicate their views to Assemblyman Martin.

If this bill goes through, it will close a large tract of land to hunters which would otherwise be open to anyone, as most of the land is in the government forest reserve.

If this game refuge bill was passed, it would chiefly benefit private holdings which border that territory, and give the sportsman who has plenty of money all the best of it, as is usual in these cases.

The boundaries of the refuge are

Beginning at a point on the Arroyo Seco in Township 19 S., R. 5 E., where the ridge on the west of Santa Lucia creek meets the Arroyo Seco; thence up the summit of the ridge west of Santa Lucia creek to Santa Lucia mountain; thence westerly along the summit of the ridge separating the watersheds of San Antonio creek and the Arroyo Seco to the summit of the Coast Range; thence northwesterly along the summit of the Coast Range to the divide separating the Big Sur drainage area and the Arroyo Seco; thence along said ridge to the divide separating the Carmel watershed from the Arroyo Seco watershed; thence easterly along the summit of said divide to the divide separating the Arroyo Seco from Piney creek; thence along the sumit of said divide to the Arroyo Seco; thence easterly along the Arroyo Seco to the point of beginning.

ORDINANCE NO. 6

AN ORDINANCE TO PROHIBIT CERTAIN DOMESTIC ANIMALS FROM RUNNING AT LARGE WITH IN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE SEA, PROVIDING FOR THE IM POUNDING OF SUCH ANIMALS AND PROVIDING FOR A POUND-MASTER AND THE BURIAL OF DEAD ANIMALS.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE SEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any horse, mare, colt, ass, jack, mule, ox, bull, steer, cow, calf, goat or hog to be or run at large or to be pastured, herded, staked or tied, for the purpose of grazing, in or on any public street, alley, park or public place in the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, and it shall be unlawful for any of said animals to be tied, staked, pastured or be or run at large on any property belonging to any private individual within the corporate limits of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea without the consent of the owner or the occupant of such property first had and obtained, or to be so staked or pastured within fifty (50) feet of the residence of another without the consent of such occupant first having been had and obtained.

Section 2. It is hereby declared to be the duty of the Poundmaster to take up and safely keep in a pound to be provided by the Board of Trustees of said City any animal mentioned in the first section of this Ordinance that may be found at large in or upon any public street, alley, park or other public place, or in and upon any property belonging to any private individual within the corporate limits of the City of Carmel-hy-the-Sea contrary to the provisions of Section one of this Ordinance, but he shall not take up any animal that is in the immediate charge of any person who is driving it in, through or from the City.

Section 3. The Poundmaster shall collect the following fees, charges, costs and expenses, which he shall re- impounding the same, provided, howceive in lawful money from the owner ever, that notice to the owner of said or other person or persons redeeming animal of the intention of said Poundany animal so impounded under the provisions of this ordinance, or from be given, if the owner is known to the proceeds wit:

- 1. For every horse, mare, colt, ass, jack, mule, ox, bull, steer, cow or calf impounded by him the sum of \$3.00, and \$1.00 additional for every day animal is necessarily held by such him.
- 2. For every other animal impounded by him the sum of \$2.00 and 50c additional for every day such animal is necessarily held by him.
- 3. For advertising each notice of sale of any such animal, that is, for posting notice of sale of such animal, \$1.00, together with the cost of publication.
- 4. For selling (including certificate of sale) any such animal a commission of 15 per cent on the gross proceeds of the sale.

Section 5. When any animal is impounded the Poundmaster shall at once notify the owner thereof, if known to him, and he shall post a notice in three public places in the a description of said animal and brands thereof, if any, and setting forth that unless said animal is redeemed before the time of sale fixed in the notice, which shall be not less than seven days from the date of the posting of said notice, it will be sold at public auction to the highest bidder at the time and place to be provided in such notice to pay the charges which have and shall accrue against it, with costs, and if no redemption be made, the poundmaster shall sell such animal or animals at the time stated.

Every such sale shall be made for cash in United States Gold C Dir. Coin and shall take place at some place in the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea to be designated by the Poundmaster between the hours of ten (10:00) A. M. and two (2:00) P. M. on any day not more than ten days from the first posting of the notices, provided notice given at the time and place of sale, and thereafter from day to day there are no bidders present, or for any cause that he may believe the animal or animals will not bring a reasonable price.

Upon receiving the purchase money the Poundmaster shall deliver to the purchaser the animal sold with a bill-of-sale thereof, signed by himself as Poundmaster, and shall pay the money so received to the Treasurer of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea.

Section 6. If any animal impounded by the poundmaster is sick and disabled or in such condition as to be unfit for further use, said animal shall be destroyed by the Poundmaster within twelve hours from the time of master to destroy said animal shall aid Poundmaster.

The judgment imposing s fine may provide for its collection imprisonment at the rate of one day for each \$2.00 of the fine.

Section 18. This Ordinance is de clared to be an emergency measure Section 13. If any person shall fail required for the immediate preseranimal or animals sold under the pr | provided in this Ordinance, then and The facts constituting its urgency being as follows:

Many of the animals aforementioned are now running at large throughout the Ctly of Carmel-bythe-Sea and are a source of danger to life and limb, and are destroying and injuring gardens and growing plants and no provision has been made for disposing of dead animals, and therefore the foregoing Ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately from and after its final passage and approval.

ORDINANCE NO. 7

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE CUTTING DOWN, REMOVAL, MUTILATION AND INJURY OF TREES, SHRUBS AND BUSHES ANY OF THE PUBLIC STREETS, PARKS AND PUBLIC PLACES OF THE CITY OF CAR-MEL-BY-THE-SEA.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY THE-SEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS, TO-WIT:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to cut lown, remove, injure or mutilate any tree, shrub or bush growing or standing upon any of the streets, squares, parks or public places of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea.

Section 2. Nothing in this Ordinance contained shall in any manner be deemed to prohibit the proper auor Superintendent of Streets or the Section 2. It shall be unlawful for D. W. W. Johnson, O. T. Breezustry Commissioner of Streets of said City any person to make, build or mainof Carmel-by-the. Sea from ordering tain bonfires, camp fires or fires for the cutting down or removal of any tree, shrub or bush growing on any of the streets, squares, parks or public places of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, if in the judgment of said authorities, Board of Trustees, Superintendent of Streets or Commissioner of Streets of said City the public interest shall require the same.

Section 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment in the County Jail of Monterey County not exceeding ninety days, or by a fine not exceeding \$100.00, or by both such fine and imprisonment. The judgment imposing the fine may provide for its collection by imprisonment at the rate of one day for each \$2.00 of the fine.

Section 4. This ordinance is declared to be urgent and necessary for the immediate preservation of public health, peace and safety, and shall take effect upon its final passage and

URDINANCE NO. 8

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE DISCHARGING OF FIRE-ARMS, THE USE OF CERTAIN WEAPONS AND THE EXPLOSION OF FIRECRACKERS, ROMAN CAN-DLES, SKY-ROCKETS AND LIKE ARTICLES, THE KINDLING OF BONFIRES OR CAMP FIRES WITH IN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE SEA.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person within the corporate lim its of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea to discharge any, firearm or any weapon or mechanical appliance of any character whatsoever, by means of which any bullet, shot, stone, dart or any projectile shall be propelled, sprung or thrown from one place to

burning hay, straw, shavings or other waste or combustible material on any street, alley, square or public place within the city limits of the City of Carmel-by the Sea without first having obtained written permission therefor from the Commissioner of Streets, Sidewalks and Parks of this Board, and without notifying the Marshal.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person to explode, fire off or discharge within the corporate limits of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea any firecracker. Roman candle, skyrocket, squib or fireworks of any kind, except at the places hereinafter provided for, under the supervision and with the permission of the Marshal.

Secton 4. It shall be permissible, upon obtaining the consent of the Marshal and under his supervision, to build bonfires or camp fires and to explode, fire off or discharge firecrackers. Roman candles, skyrockets, squibs and other fireworks on the sea beach or on the sand dunes which slope facing the sea within the corporate limits of said City.

Section 5. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdeameanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment in the County Jail of Monterey County not exceeding ninety days, or by a fine not exceeding \$100, or by both such fine and imprisonment. The judgment imposing the fine may provide for its collection by imprisonment at the rate of one day for each \$2.00 pf the fine.

Section 6. This ordinance is declared to be urgent and necessary for the immediate preservation of pub lie health, peace and safety, and shall take effect upon its final passage and
