Since the opening of the institution 25 July 1948 through Nov. 1949 208 girls have been cared for. Thirty have been placed in employment as maids or factory hands mostly, 45 have been returned to their own homes, 3 have married, 54 have run-away and 44 now remain. The average length of stay is 6 mos. The longest 9 months.

A daily schedule is prepared, most time being devoted to work shop activities. For recreation the girls have a radio, pingpong table & equip and an organ. Occ. they are taken on excursions.

The building appeared to be clean. Adequate bathing & laundering facilities are available.

This institution is operated on a self-supporting basis. The Pref. owns the building and all facilities and the project is entrusted to the Kanagawa Shakai Jijyo Kyokai. The building was constructed specifically for this purpose in April 1949. The persons who reside here are the ones who may be seen loitering around the Sakuragicho Station. Most of them are day laborers. Every prefecture in Japan is represented among the inmates. About 60 same families living in the country where they were evacuated during the war. The population is more or less transient. Only about half of the inmates have been here since the opening of the institution. Some have had much higher living standards. One was graduated from Tohoku University in Sendai, 13 were graduated from higher schools or colleges. Most have a desire to become regular salaried employees rather than day laborers but it is difficult to "pull out" of the routine. ^{Approx. 30 hand down, so to date allied men.} Only 135 have ration cards. These inmates eat breakfast & supper at the institution at a charge of ¥40 per day. Fifty-three eat at ration restaurants. All others have either sold or traded their ration cards and usually get their meals at Black Market restaurants near Sakuragicho Station. The cost for lodging is ¥20 per day. The inmates average earnings of ¥250 to ¥300 per day. Out of the profit which the institution makes, loans of ¥3000 to ¥5000 may be made and arrangements may be made for the purchase of clothing. No money is put into the institution by the Shakai Jijyo Kyokai. Neither does it show in the profits. It is claimed that there is no other source of income.

While the bedg. was extremely cold, it appeared to be clean and well cared for. There are more than adequate bathing and laundry facilities. Inst. is located next door to Sai Sei Kai Hospital where medical treatment is available if needed.

The Chief seems to be a competent person who is endeavoring to do some casework with the residents. He proudly displayed some sketches done by one of them. He feels that living in this type of dormitory places a stigma upon the individuals and limits their sphere of employment.

The only possible objection to this type of dormitory is that it permits the inmates to loiter around the streets when not employed. This can hardly be remedied under the circumstances.

The institution is considered to be excellent.

Building was erected originally as a farm house. Later, about 1943, was purchased by Tokyo - Commerce & Industry & Economic Assoc. and used as a training school for brides who were to be sent overseas to marry Japanese. Kanagawa Ken purchased from this group in 1946 - Sept, at which time this orphanage was opened. Two wings have been built, including a hall which is used by the neighborhood.

The Chief is obviously one of the accepted social workers in the Ken who was previously employed by the Central Nippon Shakai Jigyosha Kyokai. He could not answer many of the questions and had to rely on one of the two office clerks. All employees live on the premises.

Inst. operates a farm, all food consumed by inmates and staff. They have at present 5 goats, 2 pigs and 2 chickens.

Clothing is furnished through Prof. funds or LARA distribution and is considered to be the minimum adequate amount. Fuel is plentiful. Food is adequate. Children are fed 2200 Calories per day, all appear healthy.

There is no regular daily schedule - inst. is operated on family plan. Last year 11 child was returned to parents, 1 the year previous and 3 so far this year. Only 1 child has been released to parent's care in the history of the institution. No punishments are few in number.

The town doctor is available at all times. 1 registered nurse is on the staff.

This institution is considered to be good.

Although it is claimed by Officials that the chief concern of this institution is the welfare of the inmates, it is quite obvious that more emphasis is placed on psychiatric testing of children referred from other sources. An average of 300 children are tested monthly. There is no specific referral system. There are two branches which are known as temporary shelters which simply house and feed children who are referred until they can be admitted to the Center. A total average of 150 children are cared for per mo in these two temporary stations at a cost last year of \$1,898,000, exclusive of salaries.

There is no planned daily program carried on in the institution. Children help to clean their quarters but after that are allowed to come and go at will. Since this institution is directly across the street from the Central Railway Sta, it is felt that many of the children who loiter around the station are inmates. Welfare Officer was approached by one before leaving automobile to make this inspection.

Admittedly 33 1/3% run away from the institution prior to treatment.

The average length of stay is 9-10 days.

The children are fed 1800-2000 calories per day. It is claimed that the 2 cooks are the only persons who live in and are dependent upon the institution for food other than the children.

The children appeared to be dirty and unkempt. While the building is new and was built at a cost of \$400,000, no provision was made for bathing and public baths must be used. This does not appear to be the ideal situation as far as sanitation is concerned.

At a later date a survey of clinic activities will be made. Institution is considered to be poorly operated.
