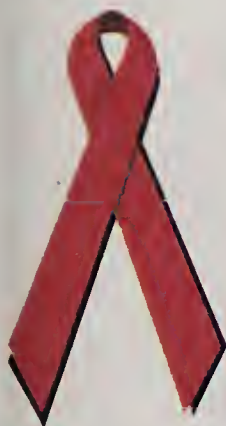

The vision of NAIHS is the public health system will adapt to the change and will meet the needs of the people we serve.

The Mission of NAIHS is to integrate and promote high quality, comprehensive health services.

Comprehensive health care is provided to the Navajo People through inpatient, outpatient, contract, and community health programs centered at 6 hospitals (including 3 medical centers), 7 health centers and 14 health stations. School clinics and Navajo Nation health programs also serve the community. The six hospitals range in size from 32 beds in Crownpoint, New Mexico, to 99 beds at the Gallup Indian Medical Center in Gallup, New Mexico. Health centers operate full-time clinics, some of which provide emergency services. Some smaller communities have health stations that operate only part-time.

Services Provided: Navajo Nation Division of Social Services is committed to identifying the needs of Navajo people and addressing them in a comprehensive, effective, humanistic and culturally relevant manner.

Family Service Unit - provides a variety of services to children, youth, adults, and families requiring assistance of professional social workers. This Unit provides family and individual counseling and protective services for children and adults who may require intervention due to neglect, abuse and/or abandonment. Court intervention and foster care is provided as necessary in protective service work. In addition, this Unit provides services to adults and children who may require placement in special facilities due to physical or mental handicaps and other disabilities. Other services include counseling families experiencing marital child rearing or alcohol related problems.

Home Care Services Unit – provides chore services to individuals requiring assistance such as hauling wood and drinking water, chopping wood, transportation services, housecleaning services, etc.

Day Care Services Unit – A Day Care Service Unit is located in three agencies (Ft. Defiance, Chinle and Shiprock Agency) to provide child care services at a minimal cost for working parents or parents attending training or school.

Financial Assistance Unit – This Unit, comprised of several grants/contracts, supports needy families and individuals who are unable to find gainful employment and are not eligible for other federal or state assistance programs.

Youth Services Program Unit – provides a homelike environment for adjudicated juveniles. Group homes are situated in all agencies with homes for girls in Shiprock and Crownpoint, N.M. and homes for boys in Window Rock, Tuba City and Chinle, Ariz. Residency can be temporary or long-term, depending on court evaluations and orders.

Child Care & Development Fund – pays for all or a portion of the cost of day care for low income families whose parents(s) is/are working or attending a job training or educational program. Funding is also available for before & After School Programs, Early Childhood Development Programs, and Major renovation or construction of day care facilities.

Prevention of Child Abuse/Neglect – coordinates the delivery of services to children and families on the Navajo Nation, specifically, to facilitate the immediate safety of child who are at risk or who have been victimized by child abuse and neglect.

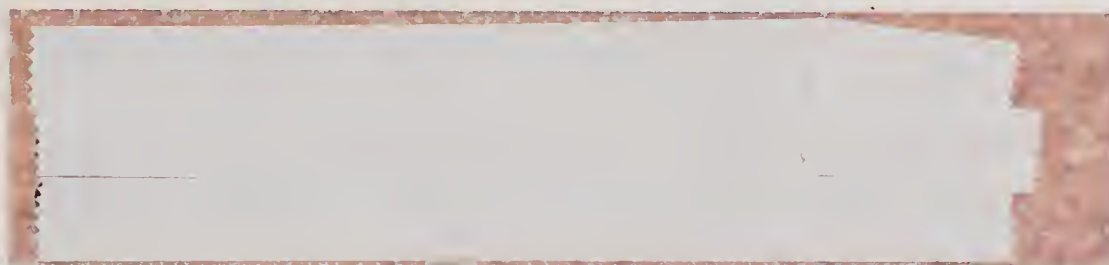

Services: The National Minority AIDS Council (NMAC), established in 1987, is the premier national organization dedicated to developing leadership within communities of color to address the challenge of HIV/AIDS.

Public Policy NMAC's Public Policy Division works to promote sound national HIV/AIDS, health and social policies that are responsive to the needs of the diverse communities of color impacted by HIV/AIDS and to increase the participation of people of color in policy making bodies. NMAC advocates to increase federal resources directed to addressing the epidemic among people of color; sponsors regional policy and advocacy skills training and technical assistance sessions for people of color; holds policy briefings on Capitol Hill; produces policy briefs and newsletters; and works in coalition with other national AIDS groups to promote the interests of people of color.

Technical Assistance NMAC conducts individual, on-site CBO management and organizational needs assessments in order to support long-term organizational health of front-line AIDS service organizations. Based on these needs assessments, NMAC staff prepares strategic plans to support the long-term health of these agencies, focusing on management problems and corrective actions.

Conference NMAC provides in-depth training and conference opportunities to AIDS service Organizations across the country. Training and conference opportunities include Programs such as the Minority Executive Directors' Leadership Forum, Community Planning Leadership Orientation & Training. The Community Planning Leadership Summit for HIV Prevention, The United States Conference on AIDS, and the National AIDS Treatment Advocates Forum.

Treatment Education, Training & Advocacy NMAC provides training and direction to AIDS service organizations serving communities of color in the set-up and maintenance of treatment-related programs at the community service level. NMAC's goal is to involve more persons of color in these local treatment initiatives.
NMAC also advocates for the proper and speedy development of urgently needed AIDS treatments, access to approved and experimental treatments, increased funding to cover the cost of approved medications and the development and implementation of HIV/AIDS research. NMAC also advocates for the development of AIDS treatment education programs as well as the allocation of private and public funding to facilitate their implementation.

Publications NMAC's growing list of publications includes three newsletters. Planning Our Way (Technical Assistance), Update (Public Policy), and Treatment Alert (Research and Treatment Advocacy). NMAC also publishes a series of informative reference Manuals, brochures, and other communications tools.

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
