

Christmas Bird Census at Benicia

Benicia, California. December 24, 1934, from 8 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. Low fog in the morning lifting in afternoon, but obscuring sun throughout the day; light east wind changing to north; temperature 38° at start, 36° at return. Observers traveling together by automobile with frequent stops to canvass the marsh and hills along highway between Benicia and Cordelia, these towns being fourteen miles apart.

The large number of Tree Swallows skimming over the marsh was unusual for this season of the year. A gun-club keeper advised us that Whistling Swans, observed on some of the former Christmas censuses, were present in the marsh, but were wintering further to the east.

Yosemite Valley, Yosemite National Park, California. (Mirror Lake, 4,000 feet elevation, to El Portal, 2,000 feet elevation.) 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. Slightly overcast; snow, none; wind, none; temperature at start 38°; maximum temperature, Yosemite Valley, 54°; El Portal, 70°. Fourteen observers working in pairs. In addition to the above, the following birds were observed only along the Marina and at the Beach: Farallon Cormorant, 40; Surf Scoter, 14; Sharp-shinned Hawk, 2; Killdeer, 2; Surf-bird, 28; Ruddy Turnstone, 1; Black Turnstone, 35; Sanderling, 120+; Ring-billed Gull, 45; Short-billed Gull, 68; Bonaparte Gull, 18; Horned Lark, 37; California Jay, 1; Meadowlark, 10; Purple Finch, 3.

Golden Gate Park only: Hutchins Goose, 1; Green-winged Teal, 4; Redhead, 4: Buffle-head female, 1; Cooper Hawk, 2; Band-tailed Pigeon, a flock of about 200 flying over the park; Slender-billed Nuthatch, 2; Varied Thrush, 5; Hutton Virco, 1.

Lake Merced only: Eared Grebe, 65; Great Blue Heron, 4; Red-breasted Merganser, 6; Sora Rail, 1; Wren-tit, 1; Tule Wren, 9; Green-backed Goldfinch, 3.

Black-crowned Night Heron and Pine Siskins found at Fort Mason, Willow Downy Woodpecker found at Mountain Lake, and Winter Wren found in the Presidio were new species added to the territory covered by Mr. and Mrs. Albert B. Stephens and Miss Cornelia C. Pringle. A flock of fifteen Townsend Warblers found in Sutro Gardens by Messrs. B. C. Bremer and Carl R. Smith brings the total number of species observed at Christmas time in this section of the city to \$0 species.

The Herring Gull and Hutchins Goose observed by Commander and Mrs. Henry E. Parmenter are new species for Golden Gate Park at Christmas time, making a total of 72 species for the combined Christmas censuses. The Hutchins Goose was seen on South Lake and is a new species on the Association's life-list. Other observers in the park were Mrs. L. W. Cummings, Miss Christine Danz, Messrs. Chas. A. Bryant, Frank A. Roberts, Joseph J. Webb, and Master Fritz Lippmann.

The Lake Merced district yielded the smallest list of both species (37) and individuals (1979) ever obtained by us on any of our visits there. The total number of species observed on Christmas censuses is 90. The observers this year were Mr. and Mrs. Oliver J. Millard, Mrs. G. Earle Kelly, Mr. B. K. Dunshee, Master Harold Kirker.

A few lines from an article written December 20, 1916, by Harold E. Hansen and Walter A. Squires, in "The Condor," vol. XIX, March, 1917, entitled "List of Birds Breeding in San Francisco County," may be of interest: "The Lake Merced region is a natural bird refuge, and it would be the part of wisdom to make it such in fact. If the waterfowl and other species of birds found there were given adequate protection the bird life of the region would in a few years be such as to surpass the expectations of the most sanguine—an unending source of pride, pleasure, and profit to all right thinking people of this generation and to all the generations that are to come."

It is to be regretted that the above suggestion made many years ago was not taken and acted upon.

The following observations were reported: Wood Ducks on Chain of Lakes from November 17th to December 10th, reported by Miss Werner, Mrs. Stephens and Commander Parmenter; also three male and one immature on Phoenix Lake, December 4th, reported by Mrs. Stone.

Gordon Bolander: December 9th, three American Egrets, Manzanita.

Mrs. Kelly: December 8th, 40 or 45 Buffle-heads on Lake Merritt.

Mr. Webb: December 7th, Shrike, San Francisco.

Dr. George Haley spoke of his summer in Spitzbergen, where he was sent by Prof. E. D. Merrill, Director of the Bronx Botanical Gardens. He was sent to collect type locality species. There are 146 species in the country, eightyeight of which Dr. Haley collected, a total of 2500 specimens.

Dr. Haley stopped at Iceland, where many Eider Ducks were seen. A visit was made to Tromsö, where the French government has erected a monument to commemorate the death of Andre, who went to the help of the aviator Nobile. Dr. Haley gave a vivid picture of Spitzbergen as a land, in summer, of white poppies and purple saxifrage, cultivated vegetables and English Sparrows, although it is three degrees north of the Arctic Circle. In the bays he saw Sea Gulls, Jaegers and Arctic Terns.
