In 1793, Talleyrand was officially included in the list of emigrants: and (driven from England sa well as France) he sought refuge in this country. At that period, treaty of peace was negotiating between this country and England: and Talleyrand used all his political dexterity, diplomatic talent and social to postpone if not prevent its accomplishment. He negotiated as an amateur; and with exquisite skill manonavred with both parties-federals and republicans -of whom he was simultaneously the ally and antagonist m different espacities. He did not indeed hold the cards; but he betted, gave advice, and saw both games. If he did not succeed in preventing the treaty, he did in delaying it. But when he found himself foiled, he was determined net to be fooled with impunity. He could not conceal the lively vexation he felt; and in many of the circles of Philadelphiawhere the American congress was then convened—he loudly asserted that sooner or later the Americans would repent of their independent obstinacy. And he enforced this menner for an mon as he acquired sufficient ascendancy in the control of the French government, after his return to Europe, he issued orders for the capture of American vessels and property to an immense amount. In short, it was chiefly from his resentment and infinence that the spoliations were committed; for which we now seek an inden nity: to him are we indebted for having our claims bandled and triffed; and to him will we be indebted if they are final-


