



When the disturbances were at their height forty-eight policemen, armed with carbines, arrived in command of Inspector McDonagh, who persuaded the loyalists to retire to their quar-ters, which was accomplished amid singing, cheering and other manifes-tation on the part of the rival factions. Volleys. The Sinn Feiners continued their disorderly demonstrations and the police charged and scattered them into the side streets. Many of them made for the quay near the Great Northern station. It was there that Moroney met his death. Rioters, con-cealing themselves behind railway wagons, directed volleys of revolver shots pointblank at the police. This led to a hot return fire. Moroney was struck, walked a few yards and collapsed, exclaiming: "Boys, I'm done!" On Way Home.

On Way Home. A few yards from this scene, Mc-Cafferty was found dying on a tram-way line. He said he was on his way home from the theatre when shot. During these happenings a Unionist crowd literally took possession of a thoroughfare in the neighborhood of Carlin Square and stoned persons be-lieved to be of a different political profession. The audience of the Em-pire Theatre were stoned so furiously when leaving that they had to return, the doors being locked.
