Election Law

A copy of the General Election Law, State of California, 1910, compiled by Charles F. Curry, Secretary of State, was received by the Press this morning, and can be seen at this office.

The Christian Endeavor meeting last Sunday evening was conducted by two of the county superintendents, Frank Young, evangelist work, and Geo. Campbell, Tenth Legion.

One of the best features of the annual report of the California Development Board, which has just been issued, is the map of California, covering all railroad additions and extensions to date, together with changes in county boundaries, making the most complete and comprehensive publication of the kind in existence. The map is twenty by twenty-six inches, and in addition to railroad and steamship lines, it shows the topography of the State in colors. On the border is a comprehensive list of industrial products, together with the counties in which each is to be found. The Board makes a special feature of its maps, and in addition to a rack containing official county maps, it has a number of relief maps of the State and various districts. These show mountain and valley regions in such manner as to impress them indelibly on the minds of observers. The report, with a copy of the map, may be had free on application to the Board at its headquarters in the Ferry Building, San Francisco.

BOOST

By J. E. PALMER

The logical and well-nigh invariable sequence to consistent, persistent and indomitable boosting is success and advancement.

Success as we all very well know usually is attained only by energy and in many instances sacrifice.

To boost means to assist, never to disparage or retard. To be a consistent booster one must be enthused by a firm, honest and unconquerable belief in the merits of the question in mind.

Many loud and energetic exponents of the maxim "Boost," are inconsistent, and when not lacking in this virtue, are woefully deficient in that energy and force so necessary to the successful completion of purpose.

Remove this question for a moment from the broader field and confine it to matters purely local, if you please.

Every effort on one's part tending to the furthering of one's interests in the larger cities to the detriment of home interests, whether in matters purely commercial or otherwise, in our opinion is detrimental to the best advancement of our little city, likewise ourselves. Every dollar expended away from home for the purchase of commodities the like of which can be secured at hand is a diverting of money from the home channels through which it might reasonably be expected to seek employment and eventually return to ones self either directly or indirectly in improved conditions or enhanced values and in many instances both.

No man liveth to himself alone. We are all dependent on our neighbor, no matter how independent we may feel, in and of ourselves.

Co-operation and patriotic loyalty to our beautiful little city and its environments and interests should demand the best there is in us; and a whole hearted Boost for anything and everything that will work for the good of all.

The village in the United States is as indispensable to our welfare in the broader sense as the great city. This is most strikingly set forth in the vast middle west.

Millions of acres have enhanced in value greatly, not from the fact that they will produce more than in their virgin state, nor that they are the better tilled, but largely from their nearer proximity to the village which is the open door to a large part and share of our material prosperity.

Since we must all admit the truthfulness of this statement, it seems obvious that any tendency to centralization detrimental to the smaller interest must eventually work a hardship on all.

Campbell has no more places of business nor institutions than the exigencies of the situation demands, and should receive the hearty endorsement and support of all.

Make the matter "Boost" a very personal one. Would that you might all make it as much so as two or three good old soles with whom the writer, fortunately has become acquainted. Before making a trip away from Campbell they ascertain first that the article desired is not procurable in their home stores. This is loyal boosting and applies to us all in all walks of life. Always give your fellow Campbellite the preference.

Finally, fellow townsman, be consistent. First make all possible purchases locally, and give every local interest your hearty support, then require the same from your neighbor.

An ounce of well directed, simple pure enthusiasm is worth several tons of luke warm or constrained effort. BOOST.

Some Benefits of Local Option

One strong argument in favor of local option is that it takes the saloon question out of local politics. Under existing conditions the liquor question is perennially involved in the election of city trustees and county supervisors. The result is an effort by the saloon element to dominate local politics. The saloons are often cursed for doing this, but so long as a few officials hold the life of the local liquor traffic in their hands, we can hardly blame the liquor men for seeking to keep those hands friendly. They are compelled to do so or go out of business.

Take Saloon Question Out of Politics

Under local option it would be different. The question of whether or not licenses should be issued in any locality would then be settled by the people at the ballot-box. If a majority voted for license, licenses would issue. If a majority voted against license, no matter how friendly the officials might be to the liquor traffic, they could not grant a license. Under such conditions there would be no legitimate reason for saloons interfering in local politics. If they wanted to be decent, the better the men that were put into office the better for them; for in case licenses were issued the saloon-keepers would not then be held up for graft nor be annoyed by impartial police regulations. On the other hand if the majority voted against license and the liquor men intended loyally to submit to that decision, they would not try to put friends of the "blind pig" in office. Hence under local option any interference in local politics by the saloon crowd could mean only one thing, that they did not intend to submit to majority rule, or to keep within the bounds of the law. Thus they would be branded as un-American and unworthy of consideration at the hands of any good citizen. If the liquor-men are wise they will favor rather than oppose a local option law for California, and will welcome the opportunity thus afforded them to get out of local politics.

Brewer Busch Favors Local Option

Some of the far-sighted leaders among the liquor-men have recognized this. Sometime ago the Associated Press reported Adolphus Busch, the millionaire brewer of St. Louis who has a palatial winter home at Pasadena, as saying that he favored local option and the closing of saloons for part of every Sunday. The exact words attributed to brewer Busch were—"I am in favor of local option. If a saloon is obnoxious to a community it should be voted out." A few months ago Captain Smith of Chicago, attorney for the Model License League, visited Los Angeles and addressed a committee of the City Council there on the license question. He declared that the Model License League favored local option, and did not want to see saloons forced upon any community where a majority were opposed to them. Is this heresy in the eyes of the Royal Arch, or will California's liquor-men show that they have as much loyalty to American principles as have brewer Busch and the Model License League? If they have they will not oppose the passage of a local option law by the next legislature.

California Development Board Issues Annual Report

Nearly two hundred thousand people visited the Exhibit Hall of the California Development Board during the year 1909, according to the annual report of that organization, just from the press. These visitors, to great extent, came from the states east of the Sierra Nevada range and from foreign countries. Twenty-six counties have installed exhibits of their products, giving a comprehensive idea of what California can do. This exhibit taken in conjunction with that of the Mining Bureau at the opposite end of the building, makes one of the most complete expositions of a state's products to be found anywhere, as the wide diversity of country covered by the counties gives broadest range to possibilities. It is well worth a visit from Californians, who will thus be able to learn much regarding the State's productivity. The Exhibit Hall is open every day, Sundays and holidays included.

Old School House For Sale

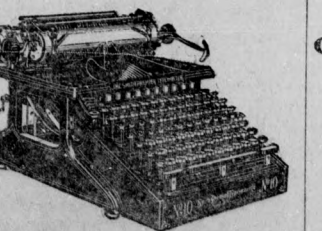
