A copy of the General Election Law State of California, 1910, compiled by Charles F. Curry, Secretary of State, was received by the Press this morning, and can be seen at this office.

SHIPMENT OF PEARS FROM

Nine Hundred Tons Packed in Cars and Sent East in One Day.

Sacramento.-A record shipment of Bartlett pears was made from this city the other day, when seventy-five carloads were forwarded to the East ern markets. One hundred and fifty men worked until after midnight be fore sealing the doors on the last car Thirty thousand crates of pears were received from the river island district on the steamers and transferred to the refrigerator cars. The cars were loaded with 480 boxes of fruit, making 24,000 pounds to each car, or 1,800,000 pounds or 900 tons in the total shipment. Never before has the shipment of pears in one day approached this record by thirty cars. For this season more than 2,300 tons of fruit have been shipped, as against 1,745 for the same period in 1909. It required 11,000 pounds of ice to refrigerate each car at Roseville and the supply was increased at Truckee. In addition to river districts, scores of farmers wagons were constantly unloading

California's Fruit Commanding High Prices in East

RA TO FARMS IS SHOWN
BY SCHOOL CENSUS REPORT WEEK'S DOINGS HEGIRA TO FARMS IS SHOWN

Agricultural Sections Reveal Greater Increase Than Cities.

Sacramento.-The State school census for the year ending June 30, 1910 which has just been issued, shows that with one or two small exceptions the agricultural counties have gained both in number of families and in school census children, indicating that the trend of population is to the farm, where the family can live at less ex pense and combat the increased cos of living.

The enumeration is also interesting East is steadily adding to the future problems of California.

The School census shows a total of 634,963 children in California under the age of 17, of which 460,288 are of school age-between 5 and 17 years.

While there is an increase of 4348 in the total number of children, there is a decrease of about 9234 in the numbe of census children. This is due mainly to the operation of the new law requir ing census marshals to obtain sworn reports from parents and guardians

The total number of families is 289, 465, a gain of 4178, but the average number of children per family of those families having children under 17 years of age has fallen from 2.21 per family last year to 2.12 this year. If the total number of families in the State could be determined, the ratio of children per family would be much lower, as there are many families in each dis-trict that have no children. The average number of children of school age is still less, being 1.59, a decrease of 6 per cent. There are many families in each district that have no children

While the ratio used by statisticians in estimating population on the basis of the school census varies in different parts of the State from 3.9 to 5, in view of the decreasing number of children per family, the ratio is very close to the figure, which would give an estimated population today for Califor-

AUTO GOSSIP

LOS ANGELES AND RETURN.

One of the most interesting and enjoyable trips of the past month was that of Leland W. Dake, vice-president of the Dake Advertising Agency of San Francisco and Los Angeles, who drove his five-passenger 20-horsepower 1907 Locomobile touring car from San Francisco to Los Angeles and return. The party was composed of Mr. and Mrs. T. P. Sherman, C. H. Sherman Jr., and Mrs. L. W. Dake. In speaking of the trip, Dake said:

"I had been figuring on this trip for some weeks and everywhere I turned for information was told the roads were bad and I would never make the grades with a 20-horsepower machine and such a load. Such remarks from men who ought to know, naturally caused me some worry, but having confidence in the machine, I determined to make the most of it, so start ed May 15. Our route was via Oakland, through San Jose, over San Juan grade past Salinas, Jolon to Pasc Robles over excellent roads. TENTS, AWNINGS, FLAGS, there on through San Luis Obispo, Arroyo Grande, Santa Maria, Los Olivos, to Santa Barbara via Gaviota pass, roads are good. Casitas grade beyond Santa Barbara is one of the most picturesque parts of the trip. From the foot of the grade through Ventura, and beyond, are as good roads as I have ever gone over. Going into Los Angeles, I had the misfortune to go over the Newhall grade, which was in bad shape owing to the fact that it was plowed up and in the worst possible condition for quite a few miles. This was the worst piece of road on the whole route, but promises to be one of the finest after the repair work is completed. There are numerous side trips out of Los Angeles. The return trip was over the same route except out of Santa Barbara we returned by way of San Marcos grade, which is very steep and rocky, but the magnificent view from the top is well worth the trip. Let me say to those who have never taken this trip, that it is one of the best in California, with fine roads and not difficult to make, if your machine is in good condition, and your brakes in the best of shape. The scenery is superb and nowhere can a motor car be driven 1.200 miles through such an ever-changing country with beautiful mountains, picturesque

streams and forests. "The garage people along the route are ever courteous in attending to your wants, and the hostelries as recommended in the road books, are of the best at reasonable rates.

"In conclusion let me say that my 20-horsepower Locomobile never missed a stroke and went over as much as 35 per cent grades without the least bit of trouble, and contrary to the predictions of my friends, the car made the trip, with ease and seems to be in better running order than As for casings, the Diamond on the driver looks as though they had never been over the roads, and a puncture I never had until over half the return route was traveled. I believe more people would take this trip if owners of cars would be more appreciative of good roads and fine scenery, instead of handing out to their friends such tales of conditions as they did to me, when there is absolutely no excuse for it.

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

Some Benefits of Local Option

One strong argument in favor of local option is that it takes the saloon question out of local politics. Under existing conditions the liquor question is perennially involved in the election of city trustees and county supervisors. The result is an effort by the saloon element to dominate local politics. The saloons are often cursed for doing this, but so long as a few officials hold the life of the local liquor traffic in their hands, we can hardly blame the liquormen for seeking to keep those hands friendly. Take Saloon Question Out of Politics

Under local option it would be different. The question of whether or not licenses should be issued in any locality would then be settled by the people at the ballot-box. If a majority voted for license, licenses would issue. If a majority voted against license, no matter how friendly the officials might be to the liquor traffic, they could not grant a license. Under such conditions there would be no legitimate reason for saloons interfering in local politics. Brewer Busch Favors Local Option

Some of the far-sighted leaders among the liquor-men have recognized this. Sometime ago the Associated Press reported Adolphus Busch, the millionaire brewer of St. Louis who has a palatial winter home at Pasadena, as saying that he favored local option and the closing of saloons for part of every Sunday. The exact words attributed to brewer Busch were-"I am in favor of local option. If a saloon is obnoxious to a community it should be voted out." A few months ago Captain Smith of Chicago, attorney for the Model License League, visited Los Angeles and addressed a committee of the City Council there on the license question. He declared that the Model License League favored local option, and did not want to see saloons forced upon any community where a majority were opposed to them. Is this heresy in the eyes of the Royal Arch, or will California's liquor-men show that they have as much loyalty to American principles as have brewer Busch and the Model License League? If they have they will not oppose the passage of a local option law by the next legislature.
