#### WHOLESALE SELLING PRICES (FREIGHT, TRUCK AND EXPRESS) FEDRUARY 26

New York: Freight receipts were very light throughout the week, trading was actived and supplies were far short of trade requirements. All offerings cleared readily in a very firm market. Truck and express receipts were very light and consisted mostly of fryers and roasters. Miscellameous items were limited. Demand was active for all classes of live poultry at fully supported levels. Market firm and unchanged. 20½ truck loads delivered to dealers up to 12 noon included: 11½ cross Delaware, ½ Virginia cross, ½ Maryland cross, total 12½ fryers; 3 Delaware cross, 1 Virginia rocks, total 4 roasters; ½ Virginia, ½ New York, 1 Rhode Island, 1 Tennessee, total 3 fowl; L Pennsylvania mixem mostly fowl; plus 1 West Virginia rock due and 3 cars on track. There were 12 cars unloaded via freight this week in comparison with 36 cars last week. Direct receivers received up until 11:30 today 134,517 lbs.

PHILADELPHIA: ACTIVE TRADING ON ALL CLASSES CLEATED SUPPLIES. MARKET FIRM, RECEIPTS WERE LIGHT AND INSUFFUCIENT TO FULLY SATISFY DEMAND.

BOSTON: FOWL ANDCHICKENS CONTINUE FIRM WITH SUPPLIES SHORT. PRESENT STOCKS WERE UNABLE TO SUPPLY THE DEMAND.
