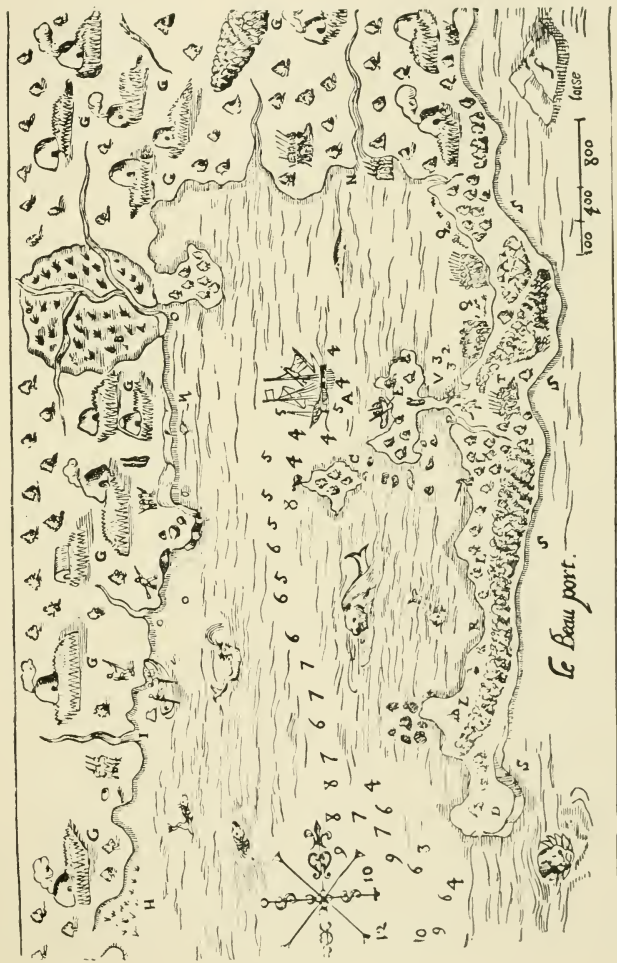

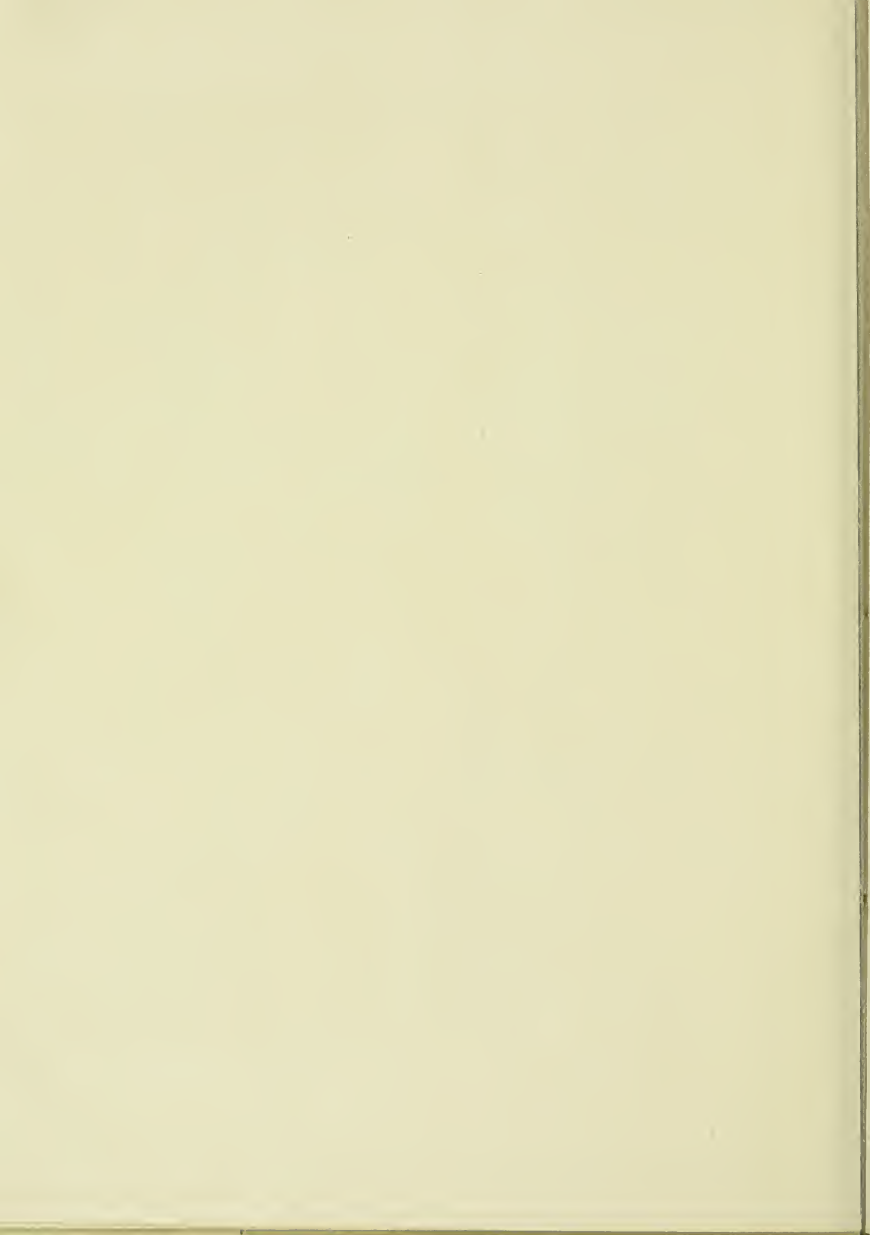

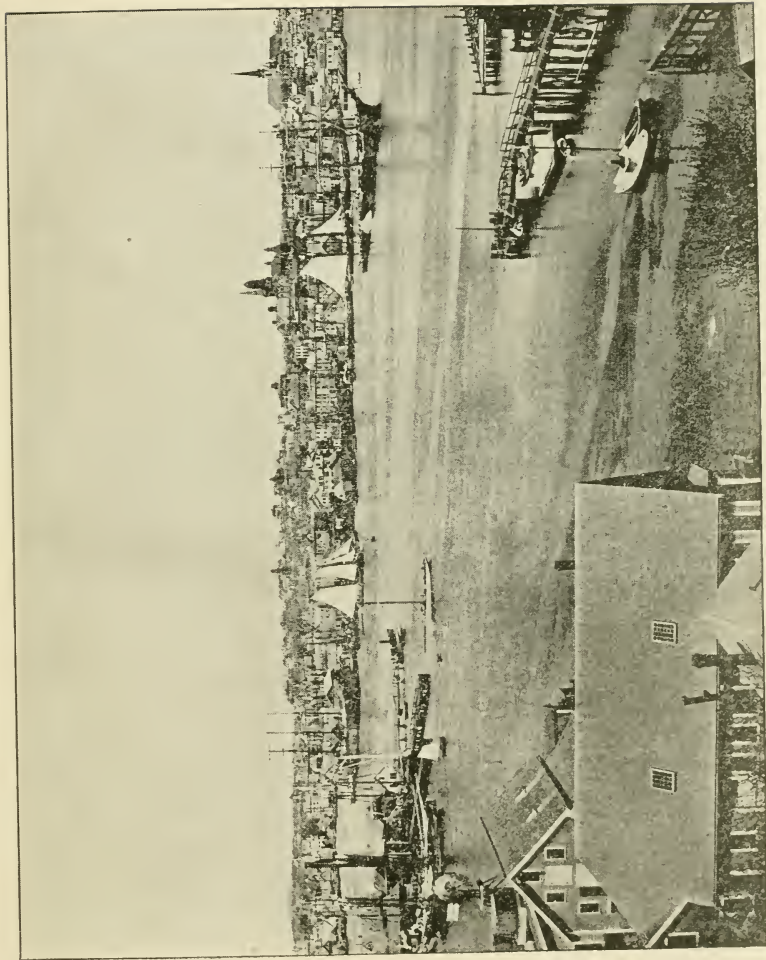




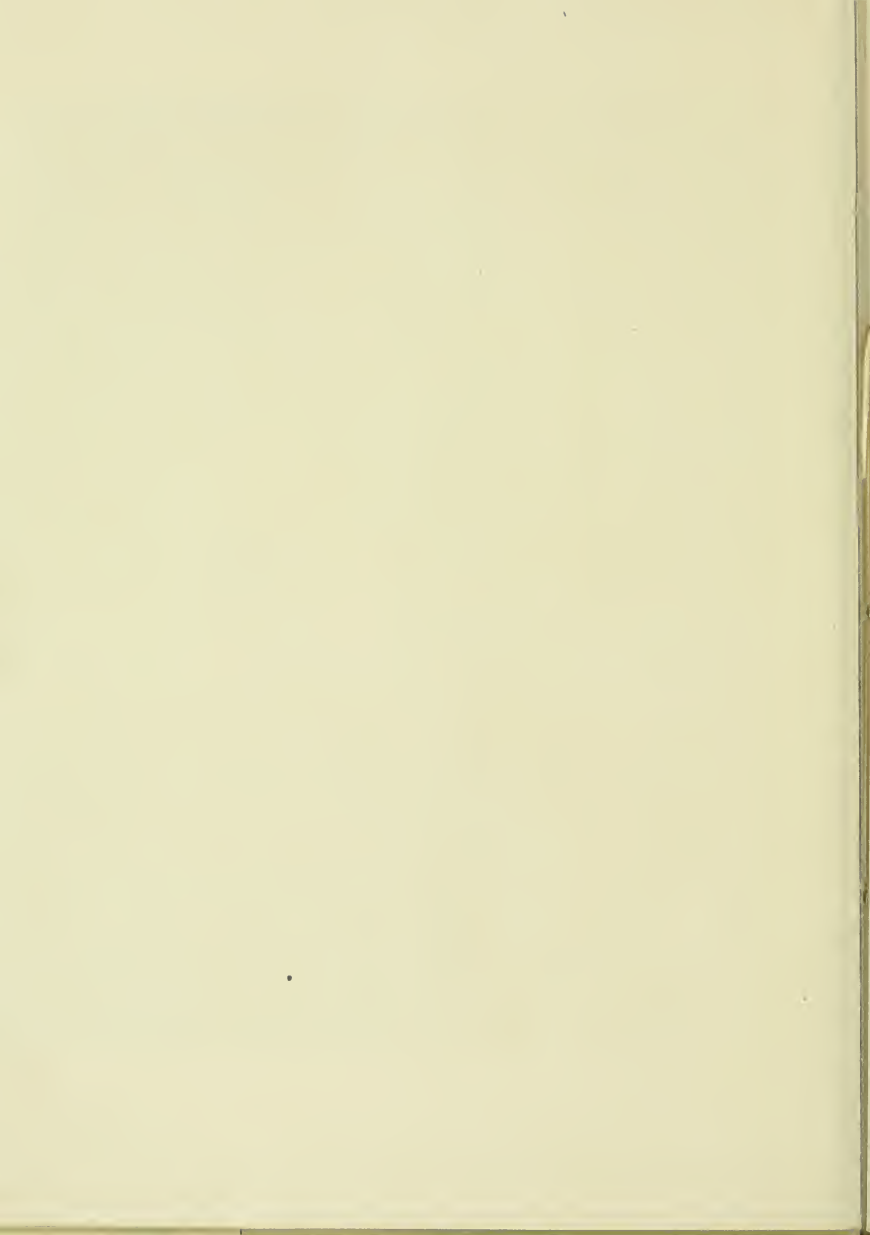
GLOUCESTER HARBOR, 1606.

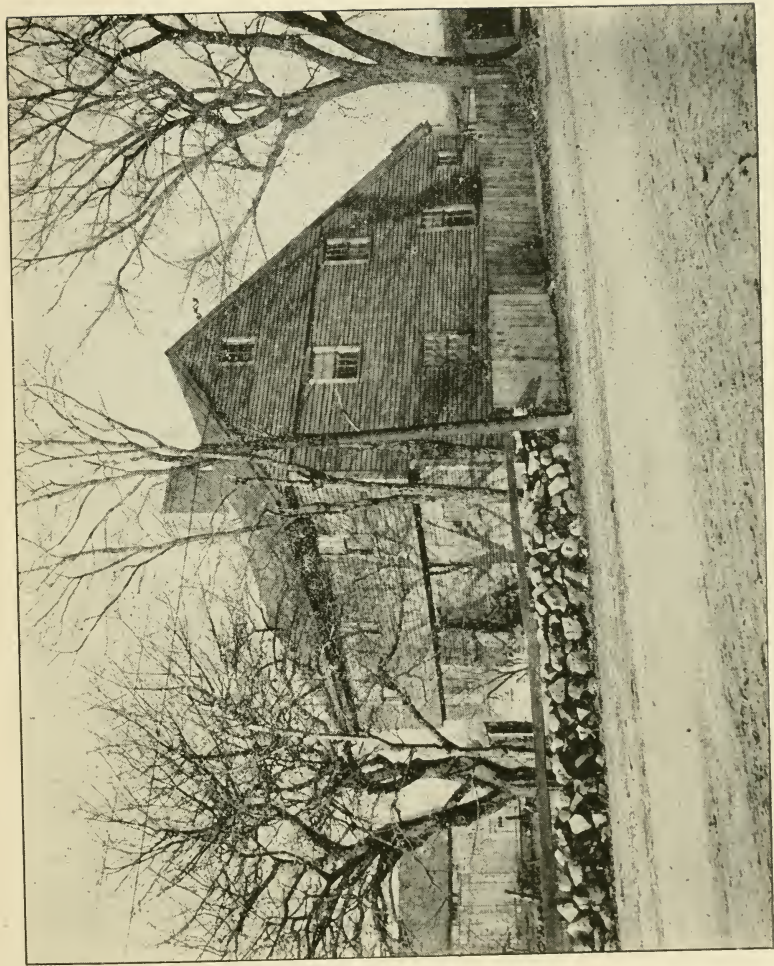
From a map first published in France in 1613. Represents the harbor as it first appeared to Champlain, an early French navigator, who visited it in 1606, and named it "Le Beauport."





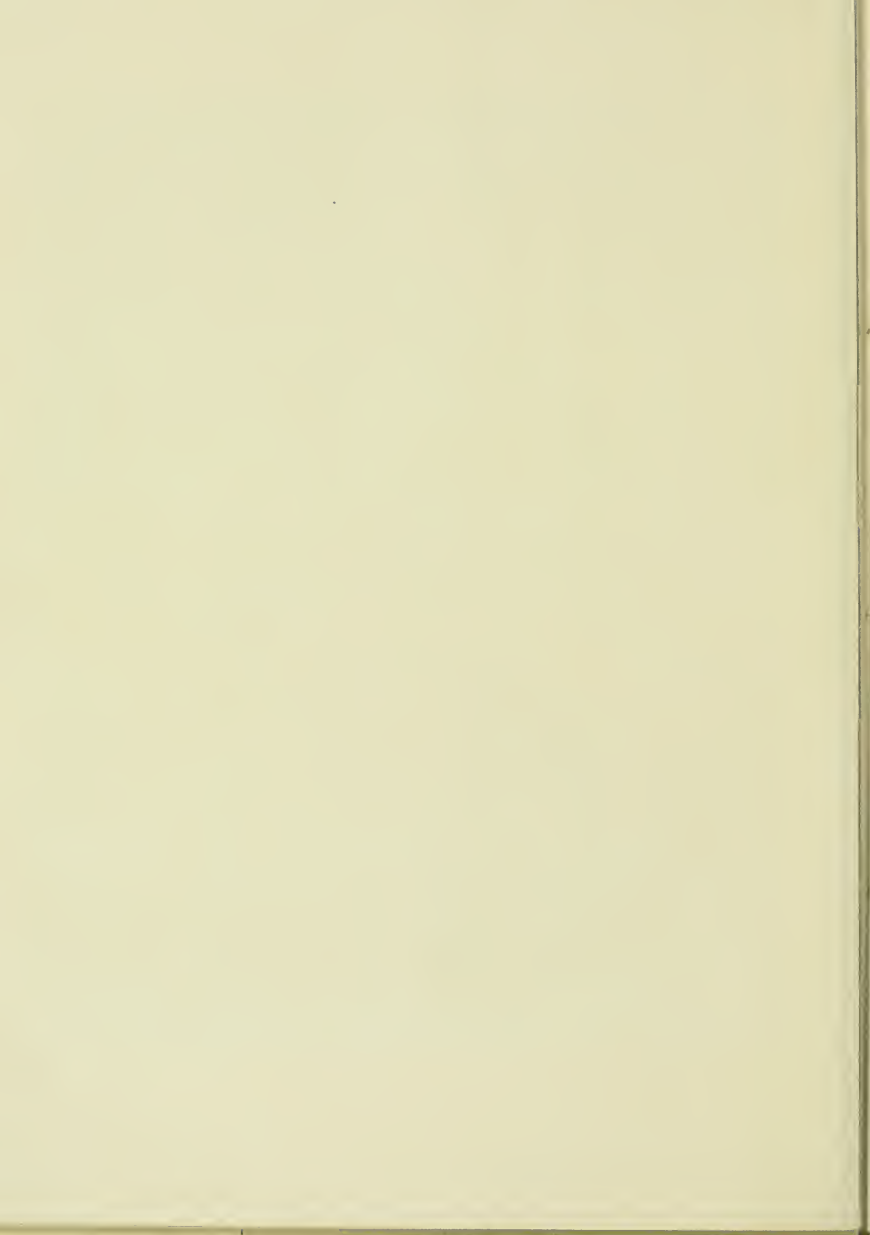
View of Gloucester, 1892, from the high lands of East Gloucester, with the inner harbor in the foreground.





THE ELLERY HOUSE.

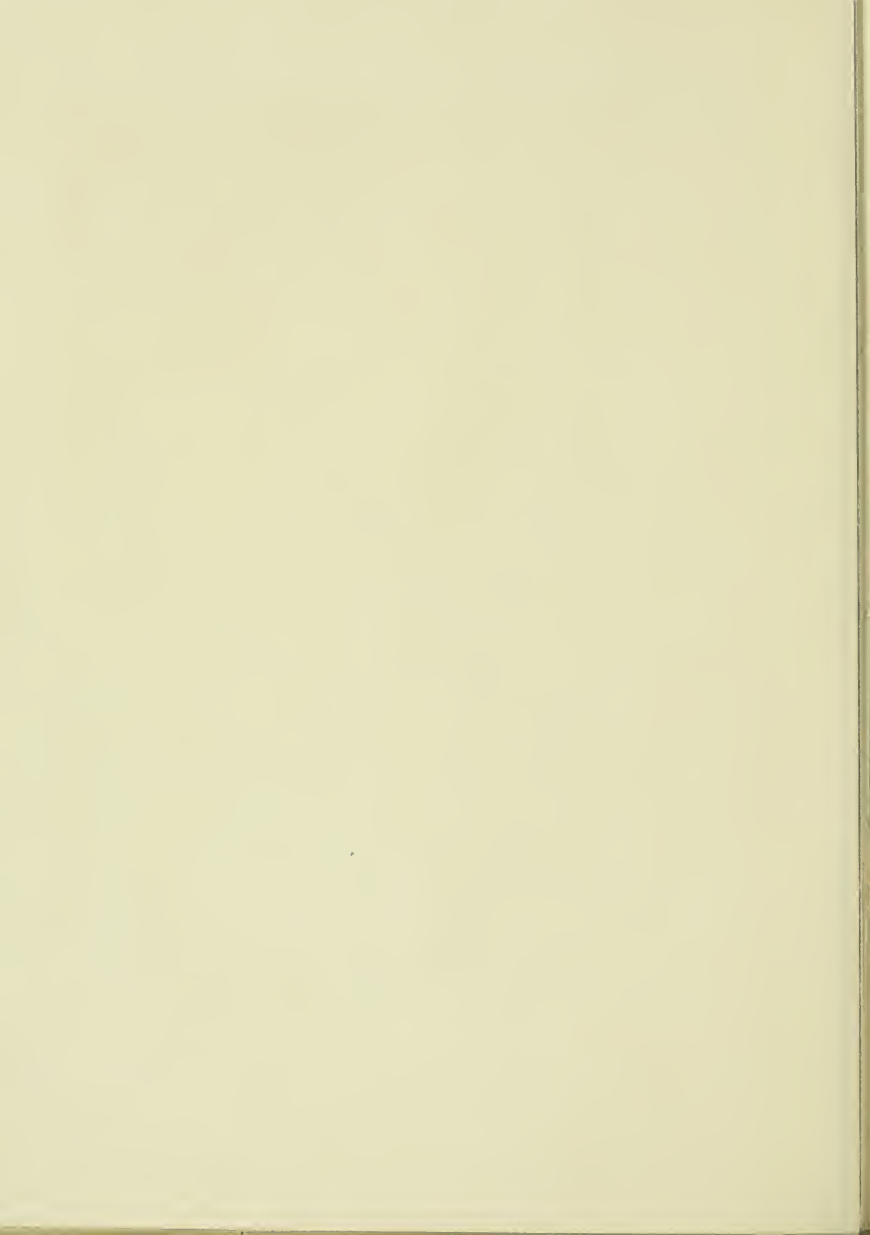
At the "Green." Supposed to be the oldest house in the city. Built by Rev. John White, about 1705; sold to James Stevens and used as a public tavern until 1740; then bought by Capt William Ellery, and still in possession of his descendants.

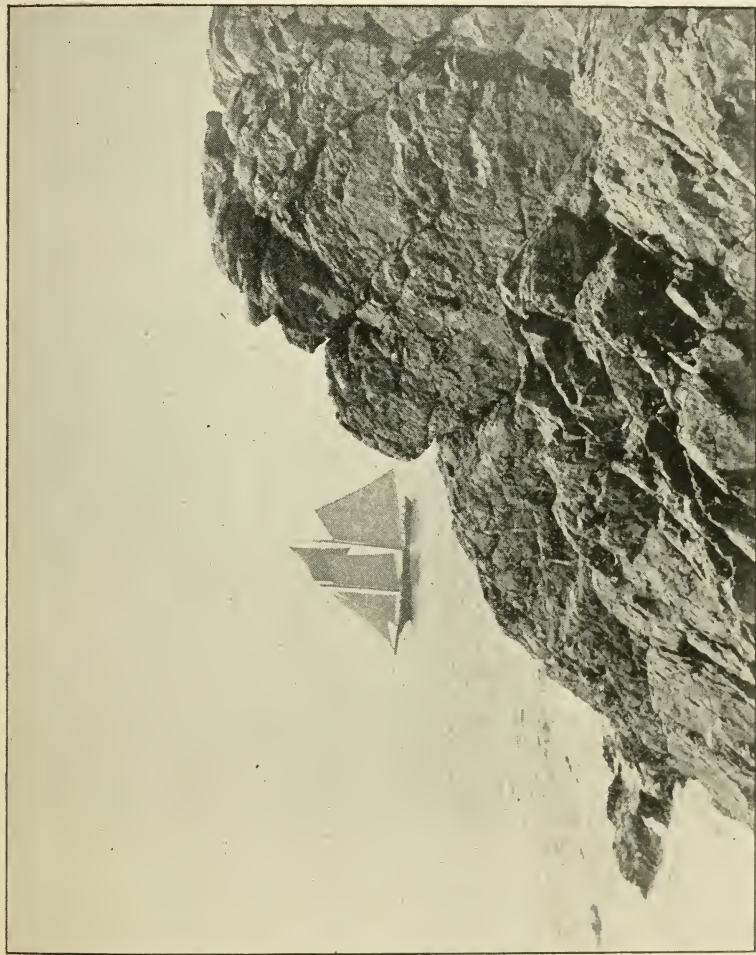




THE CITY HALL,

Built 1870, at a cost of \$100,000. Contractors, D. Some Watson and Albert S. Currier. Size of building, 90x100 feet. Seating capacity of hall, 1200. Tower, 159 feet high. Tower clock and bell the gift of Mr. Samuel E. Sawyer.



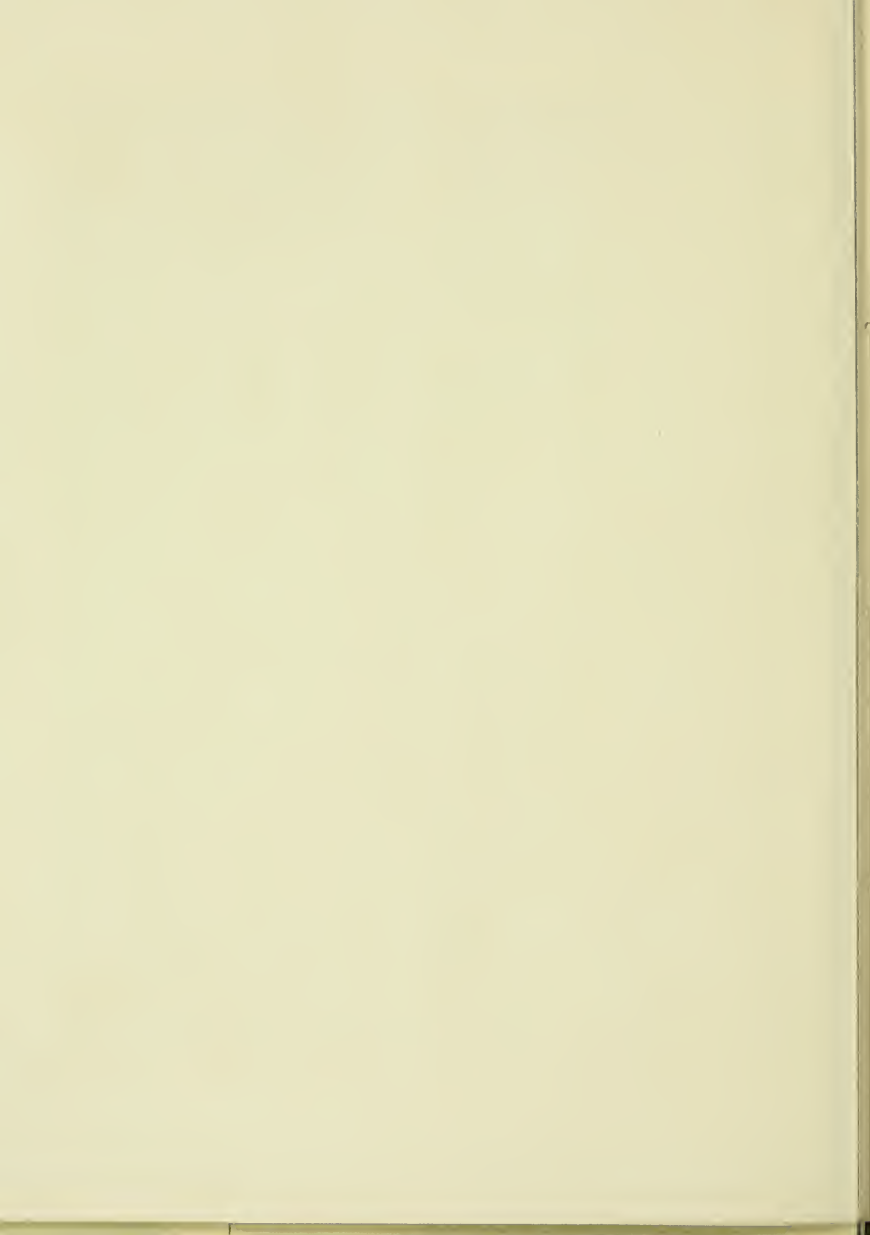


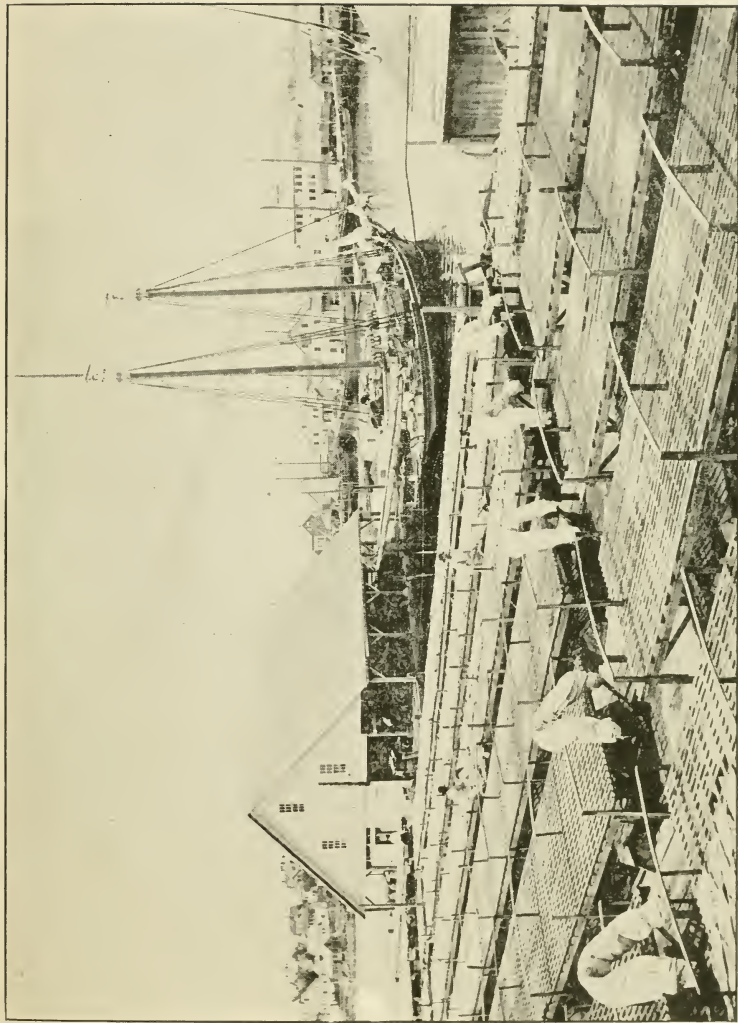
MOTHER ANN — at the extreme end of Eastern Point.

And on to the scarlet light—

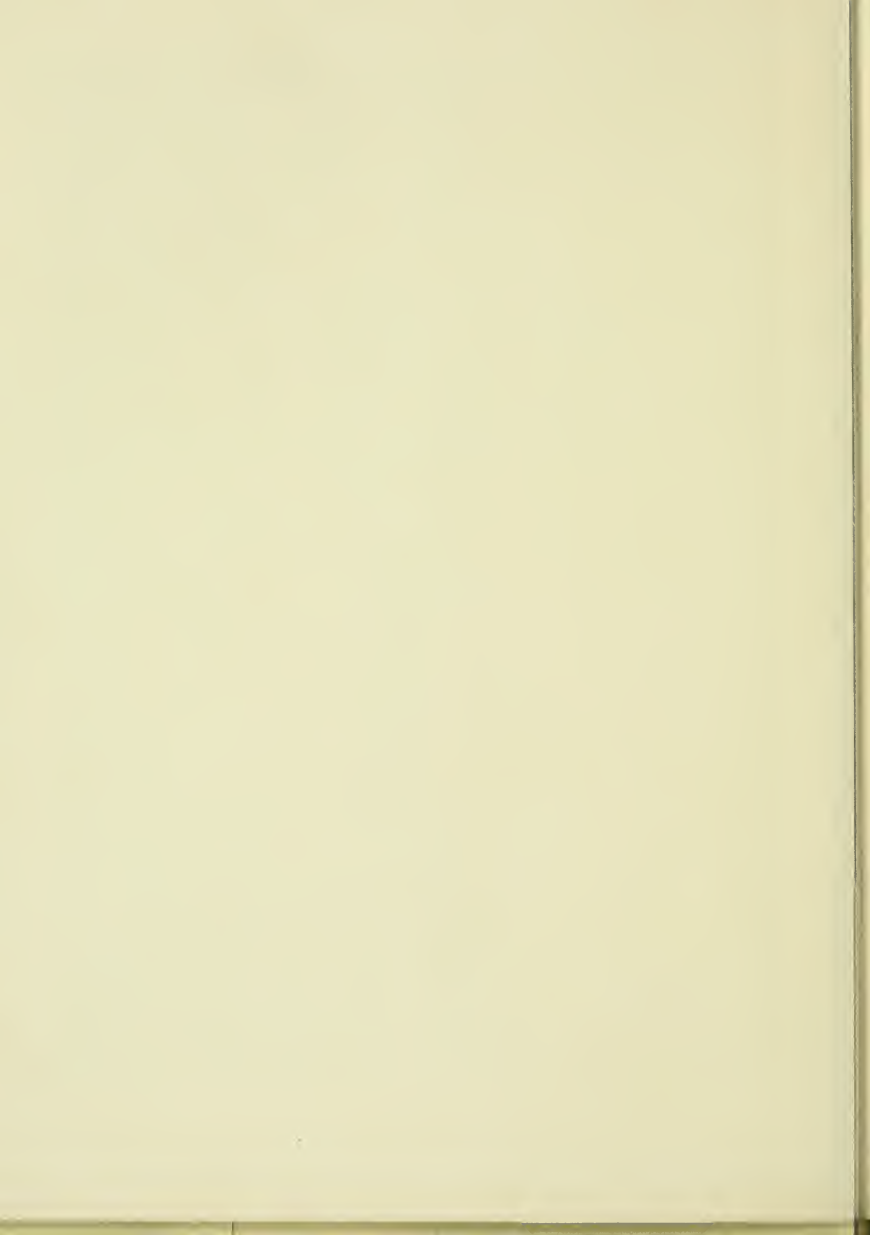
Shapen of stone and of chance,

Haunting my heart and my rhyme.

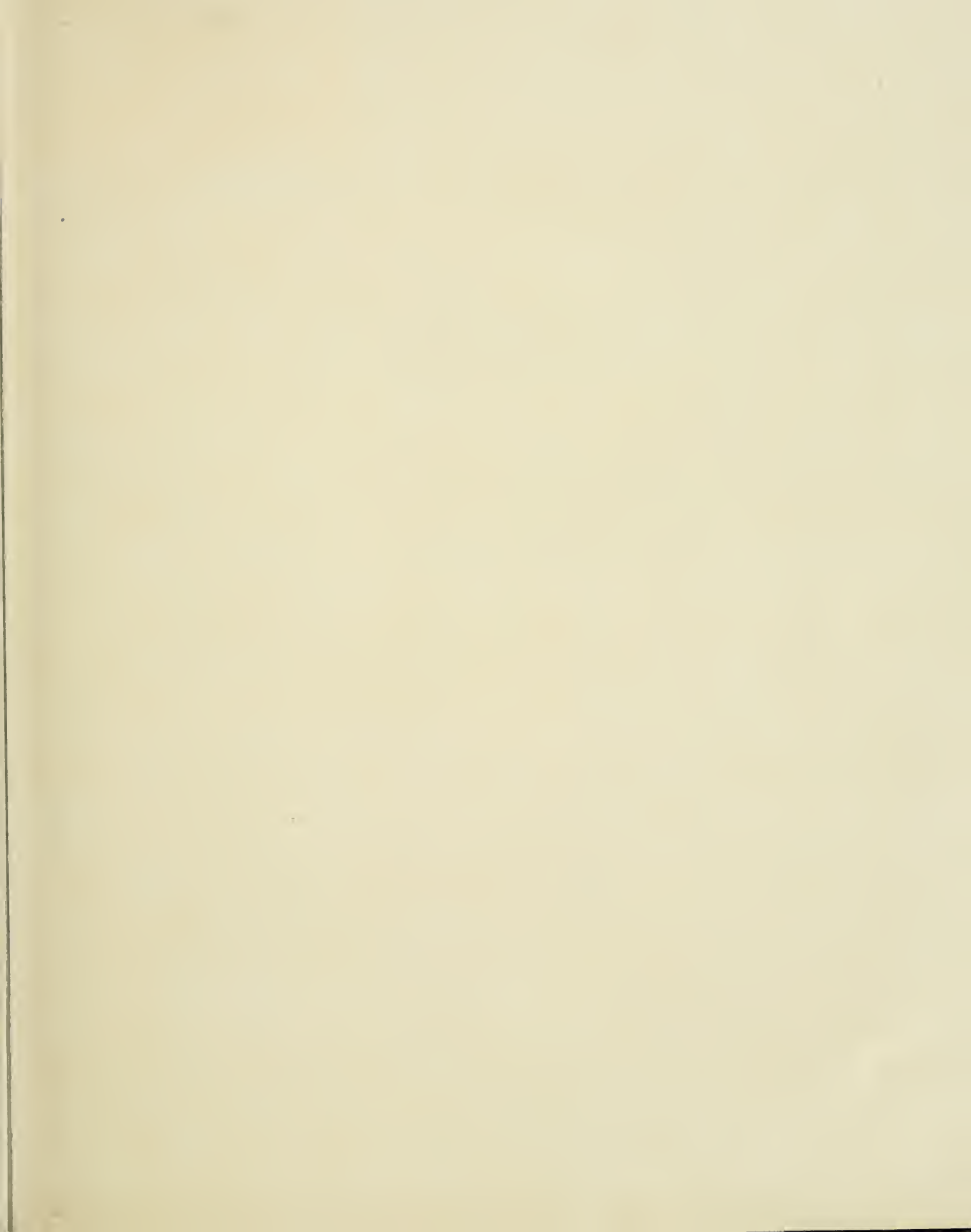
Wind-blown and grief-worn and brave,
