COMMON CALENDAR ACHIEVED; CCE ADOPTS QUARTERLY SYSTEM

In a move designed to provide maximum scheduling flexibility for all students, the College of Continuing Education has adopted the quarterly calendar already used by the balance of the Institute. The move will become effective on September 1.

In making the announcement, CCE dean, Dr. Robert Pease, said that "the sharing of a common calendar will make available to all students a freer selection of class schedules and will allow a greater flow of day and evening students between colleges than is now possible..."

Among other anticipated benefits of the move will be an easier transfer of credits among all RIT colleges, a single registration period for the entire Institute, and the possibility of accelerating programs through attendance at both evening and day classes.

In accordance with the calendar change, CCE has adjusted its tuition charges from \$50 per semester hour to \$37 per quarter hour.

RIT CATHOLIC CHAPLAINS EARN DIOCESAN, NATIONAL POSITIONS

Catholic chaplain, Fr. Gerald Appelby, was elected director of the Catholic Campus Ministry for the Diocese of Rochester, at a recent meeting of chaplains and faculty and student representatives of the 16 colleges in the diocese.

In addition, associate Catholic chaplain, Sister Theresa Daniel, was selected New York State chairman for Women Religious in Campus Ministry. She will act as a liaison with the national office for all sisters in campus work in New York State.

Dr. John P. Dietrich, chairman of the Biology department in the College of Science, is returning to the classroom. Effective July 1, Dr. Dietrich has asked to be relieved of his administrative duties, so that he may devote his full energies to teaching.

Dr. Dietrich joined the biology faculty in September, 1962, and assumed the chairmanship of the department in 1963. Since that time, the faculty has grown from two to nine. Dr. Dietrich was promoted from assistant to associate professor in September, 1964, and to a full professorship in September, 1969.

JOB EVALUATION PROGRAM UNDER WAY

The R.I.T. Personnel Department is meeting with groups of general and hourly staff employees and their supervisors, in the initial phase of a comprehensive job evaluation program for non-exempt positions. The goal of the study, which is being conducted by wage and compensation analyst Pam Morrill, is to develop a formal wage and salary program for these positions and to insure equitable pay for jobs in accordance with their contribution to overall R.I.T. objectives. The resulting job descriptions will also be used for comparison of salaries for similar jobs in the Rochester community.

Each R.I.T. Department will be contacted to arrange the time and place for the short presentation. After a slide-tape program, there will be ample time for discussion and questions about the R.I.T. plan.
