VERDICT FOR HARRIS.

Special Jury Gives a Verdict for \$10,377 Against Messrs. Dunsomuir.

The special jury in the case of Lowenberg, Harris & Co. vs. Dunsomuir last evening brought in their verdict, but judgment will not be given until argument is heard on the application for a non-suit on the part of the defendant. The jury answered the questions submitted to them by Mr. Justice Walkem as follows:

1. Did plaintiff, Mr. Harris, accept and act upon the terms contained in defendant's letter of 18th September, 1892, as constituting the complete contract between him and defendant as principal and agent? "No."

2. If not, did the defendant verbally authorize the plaintiff "to do his best" to effect the sale of the mine plant, etc., or in the event of his being unable to find a purchaser within the time, and upon the terms mentioned in the written instructions mentioned; and was such authority intended by both parties to be considered as incidental to the written instructions and as part of the contract between them as principal and agent? "Yes."

3. Were the terms mentioned in the defendant's letter of 18th January, 1892, intended to be a modification of the written instructions of the 18th of September, 1892, and were they so treated by both parties? "Yes."

4. Were these terms accepted and acted upon by the plaintiff as the complete contract between them? "No."

5. If not, did the defendant verbally authorize the plaintiff to do his best, etc., same as question 2? "Yes."

6. Did the plaintiff procure a purchaser for the mine upon the terms and within the time limit mentioned by the written instructions of 18th January, 1892, (as modified in March, 1892, by the defendant agreeing to throw in the colliery steamers and vary the terms of payment); and if so, was the completion of the negotiations within the time limit prevented without just cause by the defendant? "Yes."

7. In the event of the plaintiff being entitled to damages, what is the amount? "\$10,377."

CURING CONSUMPTION.

An authentic, well certified case of treatment of tuberculosis by the Maragliano method comes from Spesia. A native of that seaport, Edilio Mercenaro by name and an able seaman by occupation, had since 1883 been suffering from phthisical symptoms, and on examination was found to have both pulmonary apices infiltrated with tubercle. The disease was not largely diffused, but it made steady progress, and by the beginning of 1894 the area of destroyed tissue was considerably increased. The injection of the serum was practiced continuously for two months till the close of Prof. Maragliano's summer course, by which time Mercenaro had so far improved as to return to his native place.

Convinced of the benefit he had received, he returned to the ward as a patient in November of the same year, and was once more subjected, under Prof. Maragliano's eye, to the serum treatment. The case, though the progress of the malady had been arrested, was still a very serious one, and it was not until the close of July 1895—eight months from the resumption of the treatment—that a substantial cure was effected. Several hundred injections had been practiced, and in the latter weeks of the treatment it was evident that Mercenaro was conquering the malady—'hand-over-hand.'—He left the hospital at the end of July, as has been said, absolutely cured, and since has been regularly on duty in the Italian navy. At present he is at Spesia, the object of no little professional interest, and described by the physician who last saw him as 'sano come pesce' (sound as a roach). Prof. Maragliano has no severer critics than among his compatriots, chiefly of the Neapolitan school, but it is fair to add that even in that quarter testimony in favor of his treatment is gaining in volume and authority.—London Lancet.

MAKING THE CLYDE.

"Glasgow made the Clyde and the Clyde made Glasgow." Toward the close of last century the true trading spirit had been aroused among the inhabitants of the budding city, and it was not long before they perceived that if the community were ever to rise to eminence in that direction the city must become a port open to the commerce of the world. The task was one of Herculean dimensions, but they set themselves to it with a determination of purpose which was not to be daunted by any degree of difficulty. Much of the best engineering enterprise and skill of the world have been devoted to the altering, widening, narrowing and deepening of the channel, according to the requirements at different parts of the course. As a specimen of changes that have been made during the progress of the work it may be mentioned that when, in 1839, the act of parliament was passed which defined the boundaries of the river, one of the most extensive textile factories in the country stood in a line of what was considered to be the best course for the river to take, and the water is now deep enough over the site to allow ocean liners to sail.

Many experiments were resorted to ere success was achieved in the deepening at particular places, and the confinement of the water within the desired limits. Several of the obstacles encountered might well have deterred the authorities from proceeding further, had that been possible. The chief of these was Elderlie Rock, a mass of dolerite or whinstone, which was found to occupy the bed of the stream over an area of 925 feet by 320, and which came within ten feet of the surface of the water. The discovery of this was a shock to all concerned, but the breaking up and removal of it was at once proceeded with in the ordinary course. It took ten years to do it, however, and during that time 110,000 tons of rock and clay were raised by dredging at the place, while a sum of £70,000 was found to have been expended in the operations.

DENMARK'S BUTTER.

The Little Kingdom's Remarkable Success in the Dairy Lane. Denmark is both an exporter and importer of butter. No excellent in the quality of the butter produced in that little country of Northern Europe that it pays to sell nearly the whole product abroad at a high price, and to import a cheaper kind of butter for home consumption.

That so small a country as Denmark should be able to export ten times as much butter as the United States seems strange. England is the principal market. The order of the countries supplying the English market with butter is Denmark, Sweden, Australia, Germany, Holland, France, New Zealand, United States and Canada.

This superiority is a direct result of the rational and practical education given in Denmark to farmers' sons and especially to farmers' daughters.

Primary education is universal, and it is nearly always supplemented by a course in the high schools, where practical instruction is given in all that concerns agriculture. From these schools some 10,000 young men and young women are graduated each year and return to their farms. The butter is worked by the hands of these girls who know enough about microbes to boil the water in which it is to be washed.

Meanwhile the French peasant seems incapable of changing from the wheat growing which no longer supports him. On the American continent it would seem worth inquiring if the market for dairy exports could not be strengthened by the means employed in Denmark.

The packing of butter in Denmark for exportation is particularly worthy of note. Over 4 per cent. of the whole, comprising the richest, though not the costliest butter, that of the full summer, is put up in tins, holding all the way from one-half to twenty-eight pounds.

The exportation of frozen milk from Jutland to England is also becoming quite a profitable business. A certain quantity of milk is first frozen solid and then broken into pieces, which are put into suitable vessels for the voyage.

A BY-LAW.

To Authorize the Sale of Lands Within the City of Victoria Upon Which Taxes Have Been Due and in Arrear for Two Years.

Whereas it is expedient that all lands or improvements or real property within the limits of the Corporation of the City of Victoria, upon which municipal taxes have been due and in arrear for two years, shall be sold, and the proceeds applied to the reduction of such taxes:

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Victoria as follows:

1. The Collector of the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Victoria is hereby authorized and directed whenever taxes on any land or improvements or real property have been due for two years preceding the current year, to submit to the Mayor of the City of Victoria a list (in duplicate) of all the lands or improvements or real property liable, under the provisions of this by-law, to be sold for taxes...

2. It shall not be the duty of the Collector to make inquiry before effecting a sale of lands or improvements or real property for taxes, to ascertain whether or not there is any distress upon the land...

3. The Collector shall prepare a copy of the list of lands or improvements or real property to be sold, and shall include therein, in a separate column, a statement of the proportion of costs chargeable on each lot for advertising and for the commissions authorized by this by-law to be paid to him, and shall cause a copy of such list to be printed for a period of one month preceding the date of such intended sale in some newspaper published in the City of Victoria.

4. The advertisement shall contain a notification that unless the arrears and costs are sooner paid he will proceed to sell the lands or improvements or real property for the taxes, on a day, a time, and at a place named in the advertisement.

A BY-LAW.

A By-Law Respecting the Qualification of Electors at Municipal Elections for the City of Victoria.

Whereas, by sub-section 4 of section 5 of the "Municipal Elections Act, 1894," it is enacted that the council of any municipality may, by by-law, provide that electors otherwise qualified shall be entitled to vote, notwithstanding the non-payment of taxes, rates and assessments due or payable by such electors to the municipality:

Therefore the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Victoria enacts as follows:

Sec. 1. Electors otherwise qualified to vote at any municipal election in the Municipality of Victoria shall be entitled to vote at such election notwithstanding the non-payment of taxes, rates and assessments due or payable by such electors to the Municipality.

Sec. 2. This By-law may be cited as the "Municipal Electors By-Law, 1896."

Passed the Municipal Council the 3rd day of July, A.D. 1896.
