thinking all day

Wednesday Feb 18th 1834
Up early and at work -
At breakfast - Up in the study
to carry a pencil to Dr. —
Got in a H.H. & Molasses in
AM - At dinner - At tea
to carry some paper to Sarah
otherwise might not have
gone for I could not eat -
And why?

Have been working
the store more than half of
the day - And had not
ought to sleep on it tonight;
would go home and study
but am afraid of troubling
Mam - Sometimes I wish
that I might not trouble
any one - but that is not
right so will not wish so

Wednesday Feb 18, 1837.

Sarah says what I must write a piece for her paper and probably will expect me to bring it up in the morning - so will write a little if I can though I feel more like them than that drawing fast all day and river rising fast & coming down this evening George away on aye, - not far off but I am ready to go to bed. Rained last night. and drawing all day - river high and rising. Snow falls very damp indeed. but to bed.

Thursday Feb. 19, 1857.

Up at 2^o o'clock this morning; took a slate and scribbled a piece for her paper - Out early to see how high the water had risen. Home at breakfast and wrote off on paper the piece for S. J. for the steels with S. all of the AM, after she got excused -

S - giving her lesson in French &c. Went down to dinner without being sober - At least I learned enough not to be sober - Uncle Castman called on me for one hundred \$^c. Amount of note due him said he wanted it next

Saturday night - told him
he could have it just
the day it became due and
not 60 minutes before) -
had the money on my
pocket and would have
paid it if he asked me
directly) and not got
mad - One day I
saw Mr. Silver - said he had

a little money in the National
Bank that I could if I wanted
it - Took a check for 100,000 off
and gave my papers
at home and at St. M.
house a little while - At
supper had a high time -
Up in the study and
read & - Read the paper

At the store - And George
at sea - Come back so
that I could go to the
Symposium - Up and have
the paper read and all
of the business done -

I'm in the Study as usual
till past nine - At the
store and built a good
fire and have got
warm and feel pretty
good, so will go to
bed - Shawing and
aiming all day - Run
high so that there is
danger of breaking the

Did not sleep much last night
however up early -


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


