MISSION LOG REPORT
REPORT NO. 40

29 May 1945.

MISSION: DAVAO ALERT-HAFALK.

FLIGHT COMPOSITION: Segal, Watts, R.G. Bradley, Hellerude, Benz
Butts.

TIME: TFO:0950. ATA:1340.

WEATHER: Cumulus from 2-10000 feet, 3/10 coverage.

COMMENTS: The target was atop a hill and represented gun en-
placements and trenches. The first Nagals hit directly on the
target; the second short (Southeast by 500 yards); the third
was right on the target. The short one may have hit Jap
houses in a clump of trees. The fourth hit about 50 yards
long among a cluster of buildings. All exploded and burned
well. The fifth was 100 yards long but also exploded among
buildings. All 500-pounders were right on the target. They
were dropped on the last of the three runs, and results were
not observed. Everyone strafed on two runs and five strafed
on the third.
