First-The growers who remain with the corporation until the contracts expire, two years hence, will receive \$1 a ton for their '97 grapes Lower Main Street. in addition to the \$5 already paid. Second-The withdrawing growers will receive no further compen-

Third—Growers who, in lieu of Notice of Sale of accepting the \$1, desire to have the wine held a vear longer will be accommodated on consideration of their paying I cent storage and taxes and insurance, amounting to

2 cents a gallon in all.—Santa Rosa Republican. It will be remembered that last year when grapes were selling for from \$12 to \$15 dollars per ton this corporation persuaded a large number of growers to join their association under the belief that they would be benefited there by and get a better price for their grapes. Contracts were made for three years by which the growers was to get \$5 per ton on the delivery and ba of his grapes and \$1 per ton for every cent above 3 cents per gallon that was received for the wine. Since the grape growers signed these contracts with the corporation they could have sold the wine for as high as 15 cents which would have given them a fair return for their grapes. Instead of this they are now offered the alternative as stated above, of taking less than half what they could have sold their crop for at harvest time or hold it at a great expense under the manipulation of this corporation. Those who signed these three year contracts with the corporation are beginning now to see the point, and




