The health department has adopted measures with a view of prohibiting in New York city the sale of milk which shows evidence of being affected by germs. The doctors aver that many of the diseases which give the health authorities the most concern originate in

thorities the most concern originate in polluted milk.

In a circular issued by that department it says among other things that bacteria found in milk generally multiply most rapidly at a temperature of 95 degrees Fahrehheit and cease to multiply at the freezing point, any reduction of the temperature below 95 degrees limiting the rapidlity of growth. The growth is not stopped, however, until 65 degrees Fahrenheit, is reached. The health department warns farmers to cool their milk to 45 degrees Fahrenheit as soon as possible after production, and to ship it without delay to prevent it from becoming stale.

To Prevent "Corners."

The special committee which has charge of the preparation of rates for the New York Produce Exchange with a view to preventing "corners," or at any rate of making the manipulating of a corner a much more difficult matter than it is at present, has decided to call a public meeting of the grain trade before finally submitting its report. The plan is to increase the number of grades deliverable upon contracts thereby establishing arbitrary differences in prices, so that if the present contract grades are cornered then buyers may deliver other legitimate grades by paying the absolute legitimate grades by paying the absolute difference in the price officially promilgated. CANADIAN PAVILION

At the Pan-American Exposition Has Been Formally Opened.

(Associated Press.)

Buffale, N. Y., June 21.—Although Dominion Day at the Pan-American exposition will not be observed until July 1st, or later, the Canadian building, which by many is claimed to be the handsomest building on the grounds, has been formally opened to the public. It is situated at the east side of the grounds, lust off the Mall, near the dairy building, in a plot surrounded by flower beds and artistic shrubbery landscaping. Its interior is of Swiss style of architecture, with flowering vines and plants on the roof and balconies. The main hall of the ground floof is devoted to a comprehensive agricultural exhibit, all the shown either in glass cases or else fash ioned in quaint designs in the bo around the wall near the ceiling. In centre of this large hall is moun centre of this large hall is mounted, under a glass case, a monster stuffed buffalo, owned by the Canadian government. It is claimed to be the largest specimen of buffalo ever known, and is specimen of buffalo ever known, and is specimen to the Dominion government. Its appearance at the Pan-American is the first outside of Canada. It has never before been founed for any exposition. An oil painting that attracts considerable attention is one by Paul-Wickson, the noted Canadian painter, called "The Story of the Great Northwest." It illustrates the retreat of the red man with his pony, his gun and his red man with his pony, his gun and his tepee before the sturdy Scotch settler with his agricultural implements and his plow horses. It is a masterpiece. In addition to the agricultural exhibition in its own building, Canada has exhibits in the mines building, forestry, fine arts, live stock, etc.

Opening from the large hall on the south is a suite of rooms where the Canadian commissioner, Wm. Hutchinson, and his secretary, transact their business. To the north of the main hall business. To the north of the main hall is a general parlor, floored with light matting and furnished with rattan divans and lounging chairs, the entire effect combining an appearance of luxurious comfort and inviting coolness. The ladies' parlor, where a maid is always in attendance opens off from the general parler. The decoration scheme is green

"Railways in Spain are the most villainously bad in the whole world," said General Moscoso, a widely travelled and highly educated native of San'o Domingo. "The Spaniards' refused to permit the building of any railways until twenty years after Prance and taken up the new method of transportation, because another invision by France was feared. When Spain finally concluded to permit the building of railways, it decided that they should not be of the same gauge as those of France, thinking that this would prevent the use of the roads for the transportation of troops and sinplies from one country into the other. To-day there is but one standard gauge road in Spain—that from Madril to Barcelona. This being between inland points, offers none of the stratege, opportunities to France which Spain fears. This is the only good road in Spain, and it is a single track. The trains reach a speed of forty-five miles an hour, but on the other roads twenty-five miles is, the limit, and the average is twelve. They will stop anywhere for anyone who will stand on the track and wave his hand. I once made a trip from Barcelona to Malaga by rail. It is about 1.500 miles, and it required eight days. 

Upwards of £3,000,000 was expended by the government alone, and fully another million by the public authorities of various Russian towns. The representatives of other powers vied with each other in lavish outlays; and, counting the sums spent by private persons, the coronation of Nicholas II. cannot have cost much less than £5,000,000. Forty thousand nounds was expended orty thousand pounds was expended the Czarina's coronation robe; and harness of the carriage horses taking in the procession involved an out-of £100,000. Lady singers of the nk of prima donna were engaged by o score, no fewer than fifty taking rt in the ceremony. What they cost ay be gathered from the fee of 3,000 inches paid to Mme. Sigrid Arnold-

son.

The coronation of Czar Nicholas I. was also a very expensive affair. The then Duke of Devonshire was the British representative at the imposing function, and spent fully £50,000 of his own ion, and spent fully £50,000 of his ownsoney in connection with it. The Czar's

omposed of five of the most beautiful

Compared with the sums lavished on a Russian coronation, the cost of the eccemony in this country is exceedingly small. The coronation of George IV. was the most expensive of any English Sovereign, and this only cost £240,000. Of this sum £24,000 was expended on coronation robes and £54,000 on the crown.

The amount was considered enormous, and as the public were excluded from Westminster Abbey during the ceremony there was a great deal of criticism and dissatisfaction with the whole affair. A large number of pavilions were erected along the line of route of the procession, the price of a single scat ranging from £4 4s, to £8 8s.

The cost of the coronation of George III. did not amount to half that of the coronation of George IV. But it was a very impressive ceremony, which the

But it was a very impressive ceremony, which the public were not debarred from witnessing—or at least such of them as could afford to pay for seats in the galleries of Westminster Abbey. The front seats were let at ten guineas each Small-fouses cleared £700, and some even as much as £1,200.

William IV. had a pronounced dislike to nome and pageantry, and on his ac-

to pomp and pageantry, and on his ac-cession expressed a desire that the cor-onation ceremony should be made as

onation ceremony should be made as simple and inexpensive as it could be with propriety. His wish was carried out, with the result that the whole cost of coronation amounted to only 230,000. This, of course, involved the sacrifice of some of the functions' attractions as a spectacular affair, but the fees charged for viewing the procession were, if anything, higher than any paid before, small fortunes being made by house owners along the line of route.

The ceronation of our late beloved sovereign, Queen Victoria, was a splendid piece of pageantry. Its cost was \$70,000. The coronation ring had been made for the little finger instead of the fourth, as prescribed by the rubric. The Archbishop of Canterbury insisted that the directions of the prayer book should be precisely carried out, and the foreing of the ring on the Queen's finger caused of the ring on the Queen's finger caused

There seems something curious about apportioning the value of the various members of the human body, but no doubt this is very necessary on the part of accident assurance associations. According to a scale of value furnished by the miners' unions and miners' accident insurance companies of Germany the loss of both hands is valued at 100 per cent., or the whole ability to earn a living. Losing the right hand depreciates the value of an individual as a worker 70 to 80 per cent., while the loss of the left hand represents from 60 to 70 per cent, of the earnings of both hands. The thumb is reckoned to be worth from 20 to 30 per cent, of the earnings.
