In a note addressed to David Lloyd George, the British Prime Minister, however, the Government promised to take all necessary measures to minimize the liberty of Hohenzollern and prevent him

from endangering the world's peace.

The second communication from the Dutch Government, which was delivered in London this morning, states that these precautions will be taken "on the spot." It is understood the Dutch authorities have assured Allied diplomats that close guarding and censorship will be instituted when Hohenzollern occupies his estate at Doorn.







BEHIND CLOSED DOORS.

Beyond doubt there are occasions when it is both desirable and advisable for the City Council to carry on its deliberations without publicity. It is quite conceivable that sometimes there are matters under consideration the premature disclosure of which might do the city a certain amount of harm. But the decision to transact public business behind closed doors should be dictated by only very exceptional circumstances and the certainty that it is called for by the public

The public will not tolerate Star Chamber sessions merely because members of the Council, with their eyes upon the next municipal elections do not wish to act and speak freely on various questions in the open for fear of political consequences. It is entitled to know how its business is being dealt with by its elected representatives, and would resent very keenly the adoption by the Council of any deliberate policy of secrecy.

This is not a new story in Victoria, as many of our readers will remember. Some years ago The Times exposed and killed a scheme which had been hatched in secret sessions of the Council and which, if it had been carried into effect, would have been detrimental to the city. 

While in the Antipodes she gave humerous addresses to the various branches, and also took a prominent share in the State Conference of the National Board of Women. A member of the British National Council of Women, Miss Roberton is conveying greeings from that body to the Women's Councils in Canada and Australia, and during her stay in the latter commonwealth was furnished with the opportunity of speaking before a number of these organizations, describing the problems studied and the measures taken for their remedy in Britain.

Nor are Miss Roberton's activities confined to the sphere of women's organizations. Her active interest in the public welfare has resulted in her becoming one of the three women councillors among thirty-three men on the Glasgow Parish Council and the District Board of Control, voluntary offices to which candidates are elected by vote and which control the administration of the Poor Law. The particular work to which she has devoted her energies is welfare work, which involves the children's section and contains 3.000 little ones, either orphans, deserted, or separated from their parents. These little waifs are boarded out amongst kindly country people in surroundings which give them a chance to regain that birthright of happiness and well-being of which circumstances have conspired to rob them. Miss Roberton has been engaged in this work for the past seven and a half years until a breakdown in health necessitated her temporary, relinquishment, of the self-imposed task.

Removal of Embargoes Helps Canadian Foreign

Trade

"Labor returns indicate that all-industries continue active," says the Monthly Bulletin of the Canadian Bank of Commerce. "Many distributing establishments reduced the number of their employees after the turn of the year, but in almost all industries, such as building and construction, lumbering, clay, glass, stone, leather, pulp, paper, printing, textile and vehicle manufacturing, more hands were put to work. Only in districts where weather conditions were unfavorable for agricultural operations during 1919, are there any complaints as to collections or the volume of huntages."

tate the export of lumber, flour, canned provisions and other commodities which are needed in the latter market. West African exports are cocoa beans, palm oil and other tropical products, some of which are already largely used in Canadian industries. This new service is typical of other developments which indicate that reconstruction is under way. Transportation difficulties by both land and sea have hampered Canadian foreign trade as they have that of the United Kingdom. Our ports have been congested and goods are awaiting shipment, but vigorous attempts are now being made to overcome these difficulties. While improvement is needed at our ports, and industrial centres it is equally necessary that adequate transportation facilities should be provided in districts into which settlers are beginning to creatin commodities, the trade in which is subject to license. Payments arising out of pre-war transactions, and transfers of securities are still prohibited.

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FLUCTUATIONS IN EMPLOYMENT SERVICE

Decrease in Placements of Men as Compared With Preceding Week

The Employment Service of the Department of Labor reports that returns from the Dominion and Provincial offices of the Employment Service of Canada for the week ended January 31, show a decrease in placements as compared with the preceding week. During the week the ninety-four offices reported that they had referred 6.124 persons to regular positions and that 5.204 of these were placed. This represents a decrease of 246 placements as compared with the previous week, when 5.459 persons were placed. This decline is largely a reflection of the adverse weather conditions reported in the Maritime and Western provinces. In addition 1,029 casual jobs were supplied as compared with 1,423 during the week ending January 24. The placements for the week were distributed as follows:

According to the Vancouver Angling and Game Association, the pres-ent method of enforcing the game laws of the Province by means of the

ent method of enforcing the game laws of the Province by means of the Provincial Police has proved a failure. And in view of the Association's belief that a number of mis-statements have been mada on the floor of the Legislature in connection with the game affairs and the working of the Act, a resolution, submitting proposals to correct what the organization considers to be a condition detrimental to the game of the Province, has been trasmitted to various members of the House.

Described as the result of careful deliberation between men-conversant with game conditions throughout the Province, the Associations recommends that a Board of Game Commissioners be appointed to enforce the game laws. It suggests that this Board be nominated by the sportsmen of the Province and appointed by the Government, with a salaried staff consisting of a competent Provincial Game Warden and Deputy Wardens, whose sole duties would be to enforce the law.

The association further contends that if game is to be effectively protected the funds collected from license fee paid by sportsmen should be expended solely for the purpose of protection and propagation.

Aldermen Admit "Leak" Is Bound to Occur, But Close Doors Anyway

In spite of strong protest from a section of the Council and the general admission that the news would leak out to the newspapers anyway, the City Council led by Alderman Cam-

The plan to eject the public and the newspapermen from the chamber was introduced in the form of a resolution by Alderman Cameron, who claimed that there were a number of matters which the Council should discuss secretly. These matters he defined as "policy" and the request of the civic employees for increased salaries.

the civic employees for increased salaries.

Alderman Fullerton promptly opposed the suggestion. "It does absolutely no good," he declared. "Let the people know what their representatives are doing. I am not afraid of the city employees knowing how I vote. The last time we held a private session, 'observed the alderman, referring to the Council's recent proposal to leave the Union of B. C. Municipalities, "what happened? The papers got it all—I don't know how—they are pretty smart. That meeting should have been private because it affected a man prominent in municipal affairs in the Province (F. A. McDiarmid, Solicitor of the Union). Besides the Council's hand was given away. After this, when the papers get everything anyway, I feel I am going to vote against any private session. Let the reporters stay here and get a correct report instead of a garbled one."

Was Hostile.

"I feel the same way," agreed Alderman Todd. "When I saw in the papers the next day following our last secret session a correct report—a very correct report—of the meeting, and when I realized that an alderman must have given it away, I say frankly that I was hostile. The Council was particularly asked to keep it private, though I think that the matter should have been publicly discussed in the first place. I certainly don't like to see the result of a private meeting handed out to the press by a member of this Council. Whether the matter should have appeared in the papers is another matter, but when a request is made to keep it private I think the aldermen should do so. If we go into private session to-night the same procedure will be repeated. We might as well take it now as later."

"Everything we do will become public later," protested Alderman Todd did not admit this, but suggested that the sum of \$2,000. Alderman Dewar strongly urged upon the Council the necessity of making adequate improvement to the park this year, so that it could be used for different forms of athletics. "I don't like sitting in camera, but when a meeting does sit in camera I don't like someone to make it public. I would like to think I was sitting among a body of gentlemen who would not break a confidence, instead of among a bunch of old women. But as for the matter in hand, I don't think that the civic employees should be present when we are discussing their salaries and in some cases their qualifications. It is simply a privilege to allow them to be absent. In all other cases, however, I am going to vote against sitting in camera. We never did anything in camera in my time but that it appeared in the morning paper the day after, or in the evening at the latest."


