Introduction

This index shows you what data are available from the 1980 census in four series of computer tapes: Summary Tape Files (STF's) 1, 2, 3, and 4. These files present data for States, SMSA's, counties, places, census tracts, and other small areas.

This index consists of four parts:

- a key to geographic areas (pages 8 and 9), to help you determine which of the STF's include the type of geographic area you are interested in;
- a subject cross-reference (pages 11 to 20), to help you select appropriate terminology in searches through the index;
- the index (pages 21 to 31), with subjects arranged in alphabetic order and references to all of the tables in which each subject occurs; and
- table outlines for STF's 1, 2, 3 and 4 (pages 33 to 145) which allow you to see exactly what categories and universe are included.

GEOGRAPHIC AREAS

The typical request for data will have both geographic and subject dimensions. The Key to Geographic Areas explains the structure of STF's and their files and indicates which areas appear on each STF. For example, if you were looking for data on enumeration districts, figure 2 on page 8 would tell you to confine your search to STF's 1 and 3.

SELECTING TERMINOLOGY

An important step in most searches for particular data is the use of the subject cross-reference. That section tells you, for instance, that data on unemployment are found under "Labor Force Status", that citizenship data are indexed under "Nativity and Citizenship," or that data on person in the Armed Forces appear not only under "Armed Forces Status" but also under "Labor Force Status".

USING THE INDEX

In the index, each census variable is presented in alphabetic order, followed by references to every table in which it occurs. The index is designed to highlight every pair of variables. Thus a 3-way cross-tabulation of age, relationship, and sex would be indexed under Age x Relationship, Age x Sex, Relationship x Age, Relationship x Sex, Sex x Age, and Sex x Relationship.

Each table is identified by STF and table number (e.g., STF1:10). To conserve space, the usual space between "STF" and the STF number is omitted. Where more than one table in the same STF is listed, the STF designation is not repeated (e.g., STF3:75,83). Consecutive table numbers are shown as ranges (e.g., STF1:34-36).

A table number in parentheses represents something less than a full 2-way cross-classification of the variables shown: the table is restricted to only one category of one of the variables. For example, a table showing relationship for persons under 18 years old would be indexed under Age x Relationship and Relationship x Age, but the table number would be shown in this form: STF1: (17).

FINDING RACE, SPANISH ORIGIN, AND ANCESTRY DATA

Persons interested in race and Spanish origin data should take advantage of the fact that STF 2 tables beginning with "B", and STF 4 tables beginning "PB" or "HB" are repeated for race and Spanish origin groups (listed in

figure 1). Further, those same STF 4 tables are available for ancestry groups for certain geographic areas on STF's 4B and 4C (files A, B, and C within an STF are explained in the Key to Geographic Areas.) Thus, for example, in searching for all tables of age by race, look not only for that entry, but also for any age table with a "B", "PB", or "HB" prefix.

(or Race, not elsewhere classified) is the label applied to sample data for the remaining other races after "Other Asian and Pacific Islanders" have been reassigned to the Asian and Pacific Islander major group.

³ These two groups are combined on STF 2, but shown separately on STF 4.

⁴ These ancestry groups vary from State-to-State, but are consistent for areas reported within State. For most States, they include the following multiple ancestry groups: English and other, Irish and other, German and other, and either Scottish and other or French and other.

USING THE TABLE OUTLINES

To confirm that desired data are available, look at the table outlines shown in the last section. Only here is it possible to determine whether desired data categories are actually present or whether the universe of the tabulation is appropriate to your needs. (If you are not familiar with reading table outlines in this form, see "How to Read Table Outlines" on page 7.)

Programmers will need additional information not shown in the table outlines, such as the location and size of each data item and the conditions under which data suppression may occur. This information is found in the "data dictionary" in STF technical documentation. The technical documentation for each STF is available for sale from the Data User Services Division, Customer Services Branch, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233.

STF 4 tables may appear to be out of alpha/numeric order. STF4:PA and PB tables precede STF4:HA and HB tables because that is the sequence of records on the tape.

For definitions of geographic and subject matter terms used in this index see the "Glossary", Part B in this Users' Guide series.

Examples on pages 4 to 6 illustrate the use of the various parts of this index step by step.

CHOOSING THE STF TO USE

You should be aware that data on STF's 3 and 4 are less precise than those on STF's 1 and 2. The first two STF's summarize data asked of every one (i.e. 100-percent counts). STF's 3 and 4 contain only estimates based on a sample of persons and housing units. The reliability of those estimates, which can be problematic for small numbers, is discussed in Chapter 6 of Part A "Text" in this Users' Guide series.

Another factor affecting your choice of files to work with is that STF's 2 and 4 involve rather large logical records and relatively complex structures. STF's 1 and 3 are usually much easier to work with, as well as less expensive to purchase.

AND IF YOU CANNOT FIND THE DATA HERE...

Don't give up finding the data you want in STF's 1 to 4 until you have thoroughly exhausted all alternate terms presented in the Subject Cross-Reference.

If the desired detail or crosstabulations are not available in STF's 1 to 4 and your geographic area of interest is fairly large, you may want to investigate STF 5. The geographic areas on STF 5 are shown in figure 2. Virtually all of the tables in STF 5 have counterparts in printed reports, but fewer geographic areas are summarized.

Another alternative is to use 1980 census public-use microdata samples. If you have confirmed that the 1980 census collected the subjects you want, and the area for which you need data has at least 100,000 inhabitants, you may be able to create the desired tabulations from a 5-percent (or smaller) sample of unaggregated records for unidentified individual persons and housing units on tape.

For data from the 1970 census of population and housing, see the *Index to 1970 Census Summary Tapes*, by Paul T. Zeisset, now out of print but available in libraries and for sale on microfiche from the Census Bureau's Data User Services Division.

An index to printed reports from the 1980 census is being published as a separate report in this Users' Guide series.

Using the Index: Step-by-Step Illustrations

Example 1: Find data to compare income level by race in Smithville, a small city of 2,330 residents.

Step 1. STATE YOUR DATA REQUIREMENTS

State your data requirements as completely as possible. List the key words and phrases. In example 1 the keywords are income and race. We also need to know the type of geographic area: a place of 2,330.

Step 2. USE THE KEY TO GEOGRAPHIC AREAS (pages 8 to 9)

Use the key to geographic areas to determine which STF's have data for the type of geographic area in which you are interested.

Comment: Figure 2 indicates that places of 1,000 to 2,500 appear on one or more files of STF's 1, 2, and 3, so any indexed tables other than in STF 4 will include data for Smithville.

Step 3. USE THE SUBJECT CROSS-REFERENCE (pages 11 to 20)

Look up each key word or phrase in the Subject Cross-Reference. Think up alternative terms if the ones you seek are not there. Make a note of every "see" or "see also" reference that seems relevant.

Excerpt from Subject Cross-Reference, page 14.

INCOME IN 1979 - see also: Income of Family in 1979; Income of Household in 1979; Income of Unrelated Individual in 1979; Income Type in 1979.

INCOME OF FAMILY IN 1979 -

INCOME OF HOUSEHOLD IN 1979 - see also: Rent as a Percentage of Household Income in 1979, Gross; Value-Household Income in 1979 Ratio.

INCOME OF HOUSEHOLD IN 1979, UNEARNED - see also: Income Type in 1979.

RACE - Note: Every STF 2 table with a "B" prefix and STF 4 table with a "PB" or "HB" prefix is repeated for up to 15 race groups groups; see page 2. See also: Ancestry; Race of Householder.

RACE OF HOUSEHOLDER - See also the note for Race.

Comment: The entry for income in 1979 suggests that we also look under Income of Family in 1979 and Income of Household in 1979. The entry for Race indicates that we should look for table numbers beginning with B, PB, or HB, even if Race is not specifically listed. It also cross-references Race of Householder.

Step 4. USE THE INDEX

(pages 21 to 31)

Look in the Index for the terms you found in the Subject Cross-Reference. Record each table number listed for the STF's you selected in step 2.

Comment: There are no entries under Income in 1979 by Race nor Income of Household in 1979 by Race of Householder. There are 2 entries for Income of Family in 1979 by Race of Householder: STF 3, tables 75 and 77. We can also look for any other income entries with a B, PB, or HB in the table number. Quite a few are present but all are STF 4 tables, and we know from step 2 that STF 4 does not include data for places as small as Smithville.

Step 5. USE THE TABLE OUTLINES

(pages 33 to 145)

Once you have found the specific tables, determine whether the categories meet your needs. Make sure the universe includes the population you want to study. Look up applicable footnotes and refer to the Users' Guide "Glossary" for concept definitions.

Comment: The universe of table 75 does not include all families; by consulting the glossary or another table with more race categories we find that "Other (Race n.e.c.)" is the missing category. Thus, to compare the income distribution for families of one race to the income distribution for all families, we need to obtain the latter from another table (e.g., look at STF 3:73).

Table 77 provides aggregates to calculate mean (average) family income by race. For instance, to obtain mean family income for Blacks, divide the third cell in STF 3:77 by the number of Black families (derived by adding the counts of Black families in table 75, cells 10 to 18).

USING THE INDEX: Two Additional Examples

Example 2

Step 1. Desired data: Children in poverty by census tract.

Step 2. Figure 2 shows us that census tract data are available on one or more files of each of STF's 1 to 4.

Step 3. The Subject Cross-Reference entry for children (page 12) refers us to Relationship; Age; Children Ever Born; Own Children of Selected Ages, Presence of; and Related Children of Selected Ages, Presence of. Poverty Status in 1979 is listed (page 17), but the cross-reference to Income Deficit in 1979 is not relevant to this problem. Although the cross-reference is not explicit, we can also see that related data may appear under Poverty Status in 1979 and Receipt of Public Assistance Income in 1979, and under Poverty Status in 1979 and Receipt of Social Security Income in 1979, which are listed right below Poverty Status in 1979.

Step 4. Since there is more than one census variable identifying children, but all poverty variables appear together, check first under Poverty Status in 1979 (page 26). Poverty Status in 1979 by Age is in 5 tables; by Related Children of Selected Ages, Presence of, appears in another 4; by Relationship in 3 tables; and by Relationship and Age in 2 tables. There is also an entry under Poverty Status in 1979 and Receipt of Social Security Income in 1979 by Age.

Step 5. With so many tables to choose from we might first decide to look at only STF 3 tables, because STF 3 is easier to use than STF 4. Alternatively, we could give preference to STF 4 tables since STF 4 has totals for split tracts and STF 3 does not. (Study figure 3 on page 9 for this kind of information).

Upon examination of the table outlines we see that only one of the Poverty Status by Age entries is of any relevance--STF4:PB114. All of the other tables deal only with higher age brackets. Similarly, the listed Relationship tables are not relevant because "children" is not one of the Relationship categories. The

two tables by Relationship and Age (STF3:94 and STF4:PB117) do give data for related children. The tables by Related Children of Selected Ages, Presence of, are all relevant, except that they provide counts of poor families with children rather than counts of poor children, which are found in the Relationship and Age tables. As a matter of fact, the two tables can be interrelated to yield the average number of related children per poor family, and that figure can be compared to that for other families.

Example 3

Step 1. Desired data: Presence of plumbing facilities by crowding for owners and renters by block.

Step 2. Only STF 1 (file B) contains block data.

Step 3. The Subject Cross-Reference refers us from crowding to Persons Per Room (page 12) and from owner/renter status to Tenure (page 16). Plumbing Facilities is listed (page 17), with cross-references also to Bathrooms and Water, Source of.

Step 4. The index is not explicitly designed to index three variables at once, but it is not hard to use it that way. First we are looking only for STF 1 tables. Plumbing Facilities (page 26) is crosstabulated by Persons Per Room in STF1:(48) and (51) and by Tenure in STF1:(48). Thus STF1:(48) involves all 3 variables, though the parentheses warn us that something less than a complete cross-tabulation is present. (There are no STF 1 entries under Bathrooms or Water, Source of.)

Step 5. The outline for STF1:48 (page 37) shows Tenure for crowded units lacking plumbing, only 2 cells of the 2 x 2 x 2 crosstabulation we had hoped for. Still, other index entries show Tenure by Persons Per Room in STF1:37 and Tenure by Plumbing Facilities in STF1:47, and with some resourceful subtraction we can fill the cells of our desired 2 x 2 x 2 matrix. (Three-way crosstabulations of these variables which do not require subtraction can be found in STF's 2 and 4, but data in these STF's are not provided below the tract level.)

How to Read Table Outlines

The table outlines are an abstract representation of the data cells in an STF table or matrix.

The first line gives the table number and each variable name, followed, in parentheses, by the number of categories shown for the variable. At the end of the line, within brackets, is the total number of data cells in the table, which is also the result of multiplying together the number of categories for each variable (e.g., $5 \times 2 = 10$).

The universe is the type of entities counted in the table, generally persons, families, households or housing units. Any further wording indicates that the table is restricted in its coverage to only certain categories of particular variables. Those restricting variables may or may not be the same as those on the title line. In the example, the universe is restricted to persons "with unemployment in 1979", a category of Labor Force Status in 1979.

The categories are listed then in their actual sequence on the tape. A line ended by a colon does not correspond to a single data cell, but rather is a heading for the lines that follow. For instance, although the word "total" appears in the example, there is no one cell which gives the total number of persons 16 years and over with unemployment. To obtain that total you must add together the numbers for male and female. As always, careful attention to concept definitions, as presented in the "Glossary" (Part B in this Users' Guide series), is appropriate.

Some tables cite "aggregate" in the title. In these tables the unit being counted changes from persons or households to weeks, years or dollars, as cited in the variable name. These tables are most frequently used to derive averages. For instance, by dividing the cells in table 64 by corresponding cells in table 62 above (the first two cells), it is possible to generate the mean number of weeks unemployed in 1979 for those males, females or total persons who were unemployed for any time during 1979.

Key to Geographic Areas

Each STF constitutes a particular set of data tables for specific types of areas. The records for all areas on a given STF have the same format and subject contents.

Each STF has three or more files (e.g., "A", "B", "C") which are identical in record contents, but which differ in the types of geographic areas reported, as spelled out in figures 2 and 3 in this section. Figure 2 is a quick reference to help you locate which files have data for a type of geographic area. Figure 3 then illustrates the structure of the major files. That structure can be important. The identations in figure 3 indicate hierarchical organization. For instance, both STF 1A and STF 2A feature summaries for tracts, but the indentation indicates that they are organized within higher level entities. Since tracts may cross place or MCD boundaries, the summary presented initially is only for that part of the tract within a place and/or MCD. The chart shows that STF 2A also includes totals for split tracts, while STF 1A does not.

Note that the files labelled "C" are nationwide files. All others are issued by State.

STF's 1A, 1C, 3A, and 3C are available on microfiche as well as on computer tape.

- 1 The count of households in the complete-count tabulations by definition equals the number of occupied housing units. For this documentation the term "Household" is used unless the matrix is stratified by a housing item such as tenure, plumbing facilities, etc., in which case, the term "Occupied housing unit" is used.
- 2 "Asian and Pacific Islander" in 100-percent tabulations, includes "Japanese," "Chinese," "Filipino," "Korean," "Asian Indian," "Vietnamese," "Hawaiian," "Guamanian," and "Samoan." "Asian and Pacific Islander," in sample tabulations, includes the groups listed above and those persons who have a write-in entry of an Asian and Pacific Islander group in the "Other" category.
- 3 For data tabulated on a 100-percent basis, includes all persons in the category "Other." For data tabulated from the sample, excludes those persons who have a write-in entry of an Asian and Pacific Islander group in the "Other" category.

- 4 Vacant seasonal/migratory units are excluded from all matrices except as noted specifically in the documentation.
- 5 This matrix can be used to derive data based on the 1970 "household head" concept. 1980 householders differ from 1970 household heads primarily where the wife in a married-couple family was listed as the "person in column 1" on the questionnaire. In 1970 the husband was automatically assumed to be the "head" of such a family. Therefore, to compute "age of head" for married-couple families add the distribution of male householders to the distribution of male spouses.
- 6 Tabulations of "Persons in household" based on 100-percent data by definition are the same as tabulations of "Persons in Unit." The phrase "Persons in household" is used unless the matrix is stratified by a housing item such as tenure, plumbing facilities, etc., in which case the phrase "Persons in unit" is used. (See footnote 13 prior to computing mean value or price asked.)

 - Units on 10 or more acres
 - Units with a commercial establishment or medical office on the property

- The condominium value distribution is tabulated for all "owner-occupied" condominium units; the condominium price asked distribution is tabulated for all "vacant-for-sale-only" condominium units.
- 12 Contract rent is tabulated for all "renter occupied" units except one-family houses on a property of 10 or more acres. Rent asked is tabulated for all "vacant-for-rent" units except one-family houses on a property of 10 or more acres. - 13 Multiply the aggregate value and price asked by \$250 to obtain the true value or price asked. The tabulation was scaled by a factor of \$250 for tally purposes.

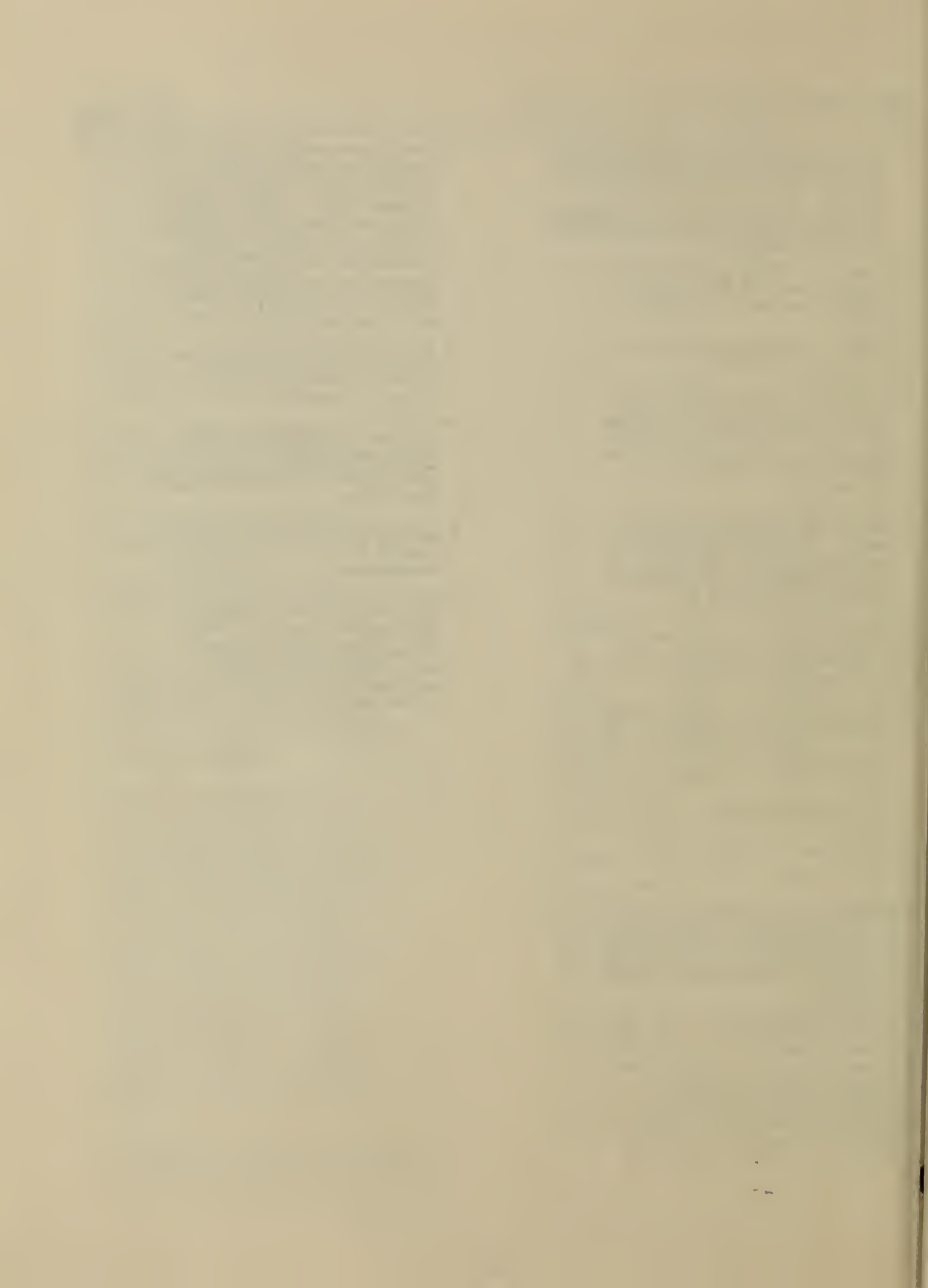

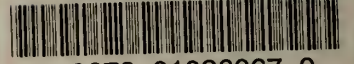
