RECOMMENDS HOME RULE

As a result of its survey of Springfield, Illinois, the Russell Sage Foundation, comes out strongly for home rule in taxation and annual appraisal of land values for taxation.

A new law requiring that land be assessed all over the state of Illinois at from 90 to 100 per cent of actual value is recommended.

Regarding the listing of personal property for taxation, the report says:

The assessment of personal property in Springfield, as in many other places, has not been just or successful. It favors the perjurer at the expense of the conscientious, tends to make false swearing an accepted custom, and comes down heaviest on small investors with a narrow range of opportunities for placing their funds.

Experience throughout this country indicates the impossibility of taxing personal property, especially entangible personality, at the same rates as those applied to real estate. The alternative suggested is the laying of a more moderate tax upon personal property, say about one-fourth or one-fifth the rate applied to realty.—Ground Hog.

Why Colors Are Associated With Various Characteristics.

The association of colors with mental and moral characteristics is a matter of imagination, although the symbolism is psychologically sound and is founded on easily traced analogies. Black is associated with crime because black represents darkness, which widely serves as a cover for crime and is also representative of ignorance, which is the real cause of crime. White stands for purity because it represents light, or enlightenment, and also, perhaps, because it represents cleanness and freedom from blemish. And it is easy to see why red should represent courage, because it is the color of blood and may be taken to signify vitality. Also a courageous man is supposed to be willing to shed his blood, if necessary, in the defense of right and justice.

If you read it in the Pine Cone you may safely repeat it.

Garbage Collection Charges

Section 10, of City Ordinance No. 14, reads:

"A charge shall be collected from the owner, lessee, tenant, or occupant of all occupied premises within the corporate limits of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea for services rendered in the removal of garbage and waste. The charges for such collections shall be as follows:

For the removal of the contents of a single garbage, ash or waste receptacle, 15c.

For one removal per week, garbage and waste, 50c. per month.

For two removals per week, garbage and waste, \$1 per month.

For three removals per week, garbage and waste, \$1.50 per month.

For six removals per week, garbage and waste, \$3 per month."

ORDINANCE NO. 19

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA PRESCRIBING THE FORM AND MANNER OF GIVING NOTICE OF GENERAL AND SPECIAL MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS, IN THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA, WHEN NOT OTHERWISE FIXED BY LAW, AND REPEALING ALL CONFLICTING ORDINANCES.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1—Notice of General and Special Municipal Elections to be hereafter held in the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, County of Monterey, State of California, when not otherwise fixed by law, shall be given in the following manner:

Not less than thirty days preceding the day set for the holding of any General or Special Municipal Election in the said City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, the Board of Trustees of said City shall, by resolution to that end adopted, require the City Clerk of said City to give notice of said election by posting copies of the notice hereinafter prescribed,—one on or near the door of the Council Chamber of said Board of Trustees, and one in each election precinct at the place designated by the said Board in each election precinct as the polling place for such precinct, and by causing a copy of such notice to be published in a newspaper published and circulated in said City of Carmel-by-the-Sea.

The notice herein provided for must be posted and published not less than twenty-five (25) days preceding the day set for such election. The publication to be by three insertions in a daily or weekly newspaper published and circulated in said city. The last publication to be at least one week before the day such election is to be held. Said notice shall contain:

1. A statement of the time of the election and whether the same is a general or special election.
2. The place where and the hours during which the polls will be open.
3. A description of the voting precincts.
4. The names of the persons appointed to constitute the Boards of Election in the several precincts.
5. A statement of the municipal office or offices to be filled, if any.
6. A statement of any matter or proposition, if any; other than the election of officers, which is to be submitted to the voters of a municipality at such election.

Section 2.—All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 3.—This Ordinance is declared to be urgent and necessary for the maintenance of the form of government provided for by the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, and therefore necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, and shall take effect and be in full force on and after its final passage and adoption, and it is to be

Chinese Orange Tart

Beat the yolks of two eggs until thick and light, add the grated peel of one orange, the juice of the orange, the grated peel of half a lemon and the juice of half the lemon, also one cup of white granulated sugar and two ounces of melted butter. Mix these well together and add stiffly beaten white of egg. Line a plate with a thin paste, pour the orange filling in, and bake. When done, cover it with a meringue, made by beating the white of one egg stiff and adding powdered sugar and lemon juice. These tarts may be made in individual size.

TWO BITS A Day Clubs

"Two bits" is the old term, dating back to the early days of the country, for a quarter of a dollar, and is still used in the South and West. Every patriotic American now wants to "do his bit." The members of these clubs are carrying out the idea finely in doing their "two bits" every day. It is hoped that "Two Bits a Day" clubs will be formed all over the country in the great war savings campaign.
