

NOT WORTH SAVING

A thoughtful judge at Bakersfield has been doing a little figuring. He finds that the longest crosstown ride there is two miles. The automobilist moving at the legal speed of twenty miles an hour would accomplish this journey in three minutes. At thirty of a pretty "German-Scotch-Spanish girl" is announced. Thus by breaking the law, endangering life and limb, and being not only a menace but a nuisance, it would be possible for the speeder to save as much as ninety seconds. Of course the madly reckless driver might save more. The forty-mile chap, however, is a common type of offender.

Having saved the ninety seconds, the question of what to do with the prize naturally comes to mind. The driver himself usually has no idea on the subject. He did not save the ninety seconds in order to devote them to the accomplishment of any definite purpose. He did not even reflect that he was saving anything. Ordinarily there is no reason for him to be on one side of the town rather than on the other. He might have crossed at snail's pace, or not have crossed at all, and the universe still would have been unaware of any effect.

Having saved the ninety seconds, he perforce must do something with them. So he makes a return trip and saves ninety more, unless the alert copper gathers him in. This leaves him three minutes ahead of the game; plenty of time in which to buy a package of cigarettes. If arrested and sent to jail he loses a span amounting to days. If smashed up and taken to the hospital, the loss may be greater. And if killed in the effort to save ninety seconds on a crosstown run, he profits absolutely nothing, even though the community be made safer by his absence.


