





STOP STEALING BEING MADE

More Than Million Dollars Worth of Autos Taken Since January First

Every possible effort to protect motorists and to curb auto thefts will be made this summer by the Automobile Club of Southern California, according to an announce-

ment just issued. Motor car stealing in the southern part of the state is reaching the apex of its annual activity at this season, and the recovery of stolen cars is becoming more difficult as the art of the thieves be-

comes perfected, it is stated.

More than \$1,000,000 worth of autos have been stolen in the southern counties since January 1, according to the club's theft Sureau and only \$410,000 worth have been recovered. This is not because of inactivity on the part of the authorities, say the officials, but because the thieves are becoming more closely organized.
