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

IT therefore Voted and Refolved, That the feveral Towns in this State be required to pay and deliver to Stephen Mumferd, Efq. on or before the Seventh Day of February next, the Sums of Money in Silver or Gold herein refpectively apportioned to them, to be

AND it is further Veted and Refolved, That the Secretary within Four Days after the Rifing of this Affembly, transmit a Copy hereof by Express to the feveral Town-Clerks within this State; who upon the Receipt thereof are directed immediately to convene their respective Towns, that they may be enabled feasonably to adopt the necessary Measures for carrying these Resolutions into Execution

W HEREAS his Excellency the Governor hath reprefented Act for unto this Affembly, that it is indifpenfibly neceffary, for the raifing 1200 Safety and internal Security of the State, that Part of the Militia Men. thereof fhould be forthwith embodied and marched to fuch Place of Rendezvous, by the Fourth Day of *March* next, as he fhall direct.

BE it therefore Enacted by the General Affembly, and by the Authority thereof it is Enacted, That Twelve Hundred able-bodied effective Men of the Independent, Artillery, Senior and Junior Clafs Companies of Militia (Officers included) be forthwith embodied; and that they rendezvous at fuch Places within this State, by the Fourth Day of March next, to do Duty therein for One Month from the Time of their arriving at their respective Places of Rendezvous, unlefs fooner difcharged by his Excellency the Governor, or this Affembly.

AND be it further Enacted by the Authority aforefaid, That each of the faid non-commiftioned Officers and Soldiers furnish himself with a good Musket, Bayonet, Cartouch-Box, Knaplack, and Blanket: That if he shall not be of sufficient Ability, or shall otherwife neglect to do it, the Town-Council of the Town to which he belongs be, and hereby is directed, to furnish him with a Gun, Bayonet, Cartouch-Box, Blanket, and Knaplack, at the Expence of such Town; and receive therefor, out of the Wages of such delinquent Person, Ten Shillings, in Gold or Silver, or paper Money equivalent, which is to be deducted from the Wages of such delinquent Person; and that the Persons receiving the faid Accoutrements return them, or account therefor with the Town-Council who shall furnish the fame.

AND be it further Enatted by the Authority aforefaid, That the refpective Town-Councils be empowered, if neceflary, to imprefs Guns, Bayonets, Cartouch-Boxes, Knapfacks, and Blankets, fufficient for equipping the Delinquents who fhall be detached in Purfuance of this Act, giving Certificates therefor to the Perfons from whom the fame fhall be taken.

AND be it further Enasted by the Authority aforefaid, That each Perfon who shall be detached as aforefaid, or shall voluntarily enter into the faid Brigade, furnish himself with Three Days Provision; and that he be allowed for the same One Shilling and Sixpence per Day, in real Money, or other Money equivalent at the Time of Payment.

AND be it further Enacted by the Authority aforefaid, That if any Perfon belonging to the military Force of this State fhall abfent himfelf, in order to elude or evade this Act, or fhall refufe to march forward, upon being detached, by himfelf or Subflitute, he fhall be fent forward to the Continental Army, to do Duty for Six Months, in the *Rbode-Ifland* Battalion, as a common Soldier : And if any Perfon who fhall voluntarily engage to do Duty as aforefaid, or fhall be detached for the Purpofe aforefaid, and fhall join his Corps, and afterwards fhall defert, fuch Offender, if apprehended before the Tour of Duty fhall expire, fhall fuffer fuch Punifhment as a Court-Martial from the faid Brigade fhall inflict : And if apprehended after the Time fhall expire for which he is now called out, fhall be fent to the Continental Army, to do Duty as a common Soldier for Six Months, in the *Rbode-Ifland* Battalion.

WHEREAS by an Act of this Affembly, paffed at November Aft to com-Seffion, apportioning Three Hundred and Eight Men to the plete this feveral Towns within this State, to be raifed by the First of February lion. last, for filling up and completing the State's Quota of the Continental Army, a Committee was therein appointed to class the Inhabitants, and detach the Men fo apportioned.

AND whereas from the Return of the Recruits already mustered, it appears that fome Towns have furnished the Whole of the Quota of Men affigned them, while in others there is a great Deficiency.

WHEREFORE It is Voted and Refolved, That the Committees of the delinquent Towns be and they are hereby required, immediately to make Return of the Perfons by them detached, to either of the Field Officers of the Continental Battalions, as is in faid Act directed, or in cafe either of faid Committees have neglected to make faid Detachments, they are hereby empowered and directed forthwith to detach an able-bodied Man from any delinquent Clafs within their respective Towns, and make Return thereof as aforefaid, on or before the Fifteenth Day of April next.

## An A C T in Addition to, and Amendment of, an A&, passed in OEtober, A. D. 1779, entituled, "An A& for the better forming, regulating and conducting, the military Force of this State."

WHEREAS no certain Sum of Money is affixed in the faid Act amend-Act as a Penalty for Non-Appearance, or for Deficiency in ing the Miliany of the Articles of Equipment required thereby: And whereas tia Act. unneceffary Delays are found to attend the Mode therein appointed, for collecting the Fines accruing for Non-Compliance with the faid Act:

B E it therefore Enacted by this General Affembly, and by the Authority thereof it is Enasted, That every Perfon, liable by Law to do military Duty, who fhall refufe or neglect to make his perfonal Appearance when duly warned, accoutred as by the faid Act is directed, for training or doing other military Duty, fhall pay as a Fine for every Default of Non-Appearance the Sum of Nine Shillings, Lawful Money, for each Day's Neglect; unlefs he thall make a fufficient Excufe to the commanding Officer of his Company, within Ten Days next after fuch Default: That each Perfon, liable to do military Duty as aforefaid, faid (unless excused by the Town-Council of the Town to which he belongs for Inability to procure the fame) who shall at any Time be found destitute of a good Gun, being his own Property, shall pay as a Fine Six Shillings, a Bayonet Three Shillings, a Belt One Shilling, a Cartouch-Box Three Shillings, a Ram-Rod Two Shillings, a Wormer One Shilling, a Priming-Wire One Shilling, Three good Flints Three Shillings : All which Fines shall be paid in Lawful Money, in Silver or Gold, or other Money equivalent thereto at the Time of Payment, and shall be paid by each Delinquent for each Article deficient as aforefaid : And that the faid Fines shall be collected by Warrant of Diffress, to be iffued by the Captain or commanding Officer of the Company to which fuch Delinquent shall belong, in Ten Days from the Time fuch Default or Deficiency shall appear; which Warrant shall be directed to either of the Sergeants of the faid Company, and be returnable within Four Weeks from the Time of iffuing fuch Warrant.

AND it is further Enalted, That the Sergeant having fuch Warrant shall take and distrain sufficient of the personal Estate of the Delinquent, if to be found, to fatisfy and pay his Fine or Fines, having first required him to pay the fame, if he be to be found, with his Fees as aforelaid for diffraining : That for Want of sufficient Effate, Goods and Chattels, of any Delinquent, to fatisfy and pay as aforefaid, then such Sergeant shall commit him to the public Gaol in the County, there to remain until fuch Fine or Fines and Fees be paid : That in cafe fuch Delinquent be under the Age of Twenty-one Years, the Sergeant shall make Distress upon the Goods and Chattels of the Parent or Master of fuch delinquent Perfon; and for Want of fuch Goods and Chattels, shall commit such delinquent Person to Gaol as aforefaid : And that all Goods taken by Diffraint shall be immediately advertised for Sale, and if not redeemed in Ten Davs, shall be fold by fuch Sergeant at public Vendue, to pay fuch Fine or Fines and Fees; and the Overplus, if any shall remain, shall be returned to the Owner; but if he shall refuse to receive it, he shall have Credit for such Overplus towards his next Fine or Fines, and the fame shall be lodged with the Captain or commanding Officer of the Company to which fuch Delinquent shall belong.

AND it is further Enasted, That the Sergeant who shall ferve and execute any such Warrant, shall be allowed for his Fees Fisteen per Centum upon all Fines by him collected ; which Fees shall be collected in Manner as aforefaid : That such Sergeant shall pay all Fines and Forfeitures, collected as aforefaid, to the faid commanding Officer, who shall appropriate the same for the Purpose of furnishing Fises and Drums for the Use of the Company, and to pay the Corporals for warning the Company, and also for purchasing Arms and Accoutrements for those who are unable to provide for themselves, under the Direction of the Town-Council of the Town to which they belong : And that such Officer shall annually account with the Town-Council for all Fines received by him : And in case a Balance shall be found due on the Settlement of any such Account, it shall be appropriated for for the aforefaid Purposes, in such Manner as the Town-Council shall direct.

IT is ordered, That the Secretary transmit, as soon as may be, a printed Copy of this Act to each Town-Clerk, and Field-Officer of the Militia, in the State.

An ACT more effectually to prevent illicit Trade, Commerce and Correspondence, with the Enemies of this and the other United States of America.

W THEREAS divers Perfons, Citizens of this or fome of the A& to pre-United States of America, refiding within this State, loft to veat illicit every Senfe of Duty to their Country, and who receive Support Trade. and Protection from the good and wholefome Laws thereof, have been and Aill continue in the baneful and pernicious Practice of correfponding, and carrying on Trade and Commerce, with the open and avowed Enemies of the United States of America, and fupplying them with fuch Neceffaries as tend to protract the War, and fruttrate the Meafures vigoroufly purfuing for the common Defence, Safety and Independence, of thefe States; which Acts are, by the common Law of the Land, and in the Effimation of all States, high Crimes and Mifdemeanors, contrary to the Allegiance of the Subject, the Duty which every Citizen is under, and highly punifhable : But as it may be moßt most expedient to point out more particularly the Criminality of fuch Acts, and to declare the Punishment which shall be inflicted upon fuch flagitious Offenders :

**B** E it therefore Enacted by this General Affembly, and by the Authority thereof it is Enacted, That all Goods, Wares or Merchandize, imported from Long-Ifland, or New-Shoreham, alias Block-Ifland, or any other Ifland or Place in the Poffeffion or under the Controul of the Enemy, thall be liable to Condemnation, and to be proceeded against as by this Act is directed; one Half thereof, after all Charges are paid and fatisfied, to the Perfon or Perfons who shall find, feize, and profecute the fame to Condemnation, and the other Half thereof to and for the Use of this State, and to be paid into the General-Treasfury thereof.

A N D it is also Enasted, That all Goods and Merchandize, which fhall be imported from any Place fubject to and within the Dominions of the King of Great-Britain, by Way of any neutral Port or otherwife, fhall be liable to Seizure and Condemnation as aforefaid, in cafe it fhall appear that fuch Goods fhall have been purchafed within the faid Dominions, directly or indirectly, by or on Account of any Subject or Refident in this or either of the faid United States.

AND be it further Enasted, That it shall and may be lawful for any Person or Persons, having just and probable Cause to suspect that any Goods, Wares or Merchandize, have been imported from Long-Island, or New-Shoreham, alias Block-Island, or any other Island or Place in Possession or under Controul of the Enemy, to feize and fecure the Same, if to be found in any Building or Place other than a Dwelling-Houfe, or Shop, or Store, adjoining to a Dwelling-Houfe, and not under Lock; and having found the fame, immediately to give Information thereof to fome Magistrate, Justice of the Superior Court, or Juffice of the Peace of the Town where fuch Goods shall be fo found, who shall forthwith order the fame Goods, Wares or Merchandize, to be deposited in the Hands of the Sheriff of the County wherein fuch Town may be, or of his Deputy, to be fecured in fuch Place as the faid Officer shall judge proper: That the faid Officer, at the Time of his receiving the said Goods, shall procure the same to be appraised at their just Value in Silver Money, by two indifferent and difcreet Perfons, to be appointed by the Magistrate or Justice at the Time he shall order the same into the Custody of the Officer as aforefaid : And that fuch Magistrate or Justice be and he is hereby enjoined to make fuch Appraifement accordingly; whereupon it shall be awful for the Perfon or Perfons, fo leizing the faid Goods, to file his or their Bill Qui Tam before an Inferior Court of Common Pleas, to be specially called in the same Manner and with the same Powers as Special Courts are ufually held, or at the Superior Court of Judicature in the County wherein fuch Goods, Wares or Merchandize, Thall be found and feized, where and when any Claimant may, if he shall fee Cause, appear, and on or before the Second Day of the faid Court file his or their Claim; which Bill and Claim shall be committed to a Jury, to enquire if fuch Goods have been to imported or nor,

not, and as the fame shall appear, to return a Verdict for the Informer to recover the Goods, or that they be discharged, as shall appear to them in Evidence.

A N D be it further Enabled, That upon any fuch Trial, in cafe the Profecutor fhall produce Evidence to make it probable that fuch Goods, Wares or Merchandize, were imported as aforefaid, the fame fhall be fufficient Evidence for condemning the fame, unlefs the Perfon or Perfons claiming Property therein fhall prove by fufficient Evidence that the fame were lawfully imported, and not from Long-Ifland, or any other Ifland or Place in Poffeffion or under Controul of the Enemy.

AND be it further Enalted by the Authority aforefaid; That any Perfon having just Caufe to fuspect that any fuch Goods, Wares or Merchandize, have been fo imported as aforefaid, and that the fame are lodged or fecreted in any Dwelling-Houfe, Shop, Store, or other Building, under Lock, it shall and may be lawful for such Person to make Information thereof, upon Oath, before any Magistrate, Justice of the Superior Court, or Justice of the Peace of the Town where fuch Goods are suspected to be, whereupon such Magistrate, Judge, or Juffice of the Peace, shall immediately issue his Warrant, directed to the Sheriff of the faid County, or his Deputy, or to the Constable of fuch Town, commanding them, or either of them, to take fufficient Aid, and to repair forthwith to the Place mentioned in fuch Information, and fuch Houfe, Shop or other Building, in the Day-Time, between the Rifing and Setting of the Sun, to enter, and, if Need be, to break any Locks of the fame, and to make diligent Search for fuch Goods, Wares or Merchandize; and if he shall find the fame, or any Part thereof, the fame to take and fecure, making Return thereof as foon as may be to faid Magistrate, Judge, or Justice of the Peace, who thall immediately appoint Two indifferent difcreet Perfons to appraise the fame Goods, whereupon fuch Informant shall, at either of faid Courts, inform against the faid Goods, Wares or Merchandize, in Manner and Form as in the Cafes before mentioned. And any Perfon or Perfons shall and may have the like Liberty, as in the Cafes before mentioned, of putting in his Claim: And the Trial thereof shall be conducted as in those Cases before mentioned is ordered and directed.

AND it is further Enasted, That upon any Trials had in any fuch Cafes as aforefaid, in cafe the Goods shall be acquitted, if it shall appear to the Court that there was probable Cause of Seizure, the Court shall tax the Cost, and give an Order upon the General-Treasurer for the one Half thereof, who shall pay the same; and the Profecutor shall pay the other Half.

AND it is further Enacted, That all Goods, Wares or Merchandize, going or paffing through this State, intended to be conveyed or transported to Long-Island, or New-Shoreham, alias Block-Island, or any other Island or Place in Possession of or under the Controul of the she Enemy, and alfo all fuch Horfes and Carriages, Veffels, Boats, or other Water-Craft, as fhall be ufed and employed in conveying and bringing into this State any fuch Goods, Wares or Merchandize, or that fhall be employed in conveying or transporting any Produce of this State, or other Goods, from or through this State to Long-Ifland, or New-Shorebam, alias Block-Ifland, or any other Ifland or Place in Posseficient of or under Controul of the Enemy, shall be forfeited, and shall and may be feized and proceeded against in like Manner as is before herein declared against Goods informed against in any Dwelling-House, Shop or Store; and upon Condemnation to go, all Charges being first paid, the One Half to the Informer, and the other Half to the Use of this State.

AND it is further Enabled, That any Perfon or Perfons who shall unlawfully import any Goods, Wares or Merchandize, from Lang-Island, or New-Shorebam, alias Block-Island, or any Island or Place in the Poffession or under the Controul of the Enemy, or shall so export any Article or Articles of the Produce of this or any of the United States, or any other Goods, Wares or Merchandize, from this State to fuch Island or Place, or shall cause or procure the same to be so exported or imported, or shall knowingly aid or assist in such Exporration or Importation, and fhall, upon Bill or Information before the Superior Court, be convicted thereof, he or they shall for the first Offence fuffer Imprisonment not less than Three Months, nor exceeding Three Years, or be fined at the Diferetion of fuch Court; and for the fecond Offence fuch Person or Persons shall forfeit the Whole of their real and perfonal Effate to the Ufe of this State, and be banished therefrom for Life; and upon their Return, or being found therein after such Banishment, shall suffer the Pains of Death, without Bencht of Clergy.

AND it is also Enasted, That if any Person, without Licence first had from the General Affembly, or the Governor and Three of the Assistants, or Upper House of this State, shall go to or upon Long-Mand, or New-Shorebam, alias Block-Ifland, or any other Ifland or Place in the Poffeffion of or under the Controul of the Enemy, or having fuch Licence, shall prefume to purchase any Goods, Wares or Merchandize, or in any Manner to trade there, and shall be convicted thereof before any Superior Court, or Court of General Seffions of the Peace, in this State, by Bill or Information, fuch Perfon fhall be difabled from having any fuch Licence in future, and shall not be thence afterwards permitted to refide within Ten Miles of the Sea, or of any navigable River within this State, over and above the Penaltics already by Law inflicted for fuch Offence. And the Court, before which any fuch Conviction may be had, shall order the Place and Limits of fuch Perfon's Refidence for a Term not exceeding Three Years. And in cafe any fuch Perfon, fo convicted and fentenced as aforefaid, shall at any Time within the Term limited by the faid. Court prefume to go beyond fuch Limits, or in any Manner tranfgrefs the Order or Sentence of faid Court, every fuch Perfon fhall, for

for every such Transgression, suffer Six Months Imprisonment, without Bail or Mainprize.

A N D it is further Enacted, That any Perfon or Perfons, who shall claim any Goods, Wares or Merchandize, Horfes, Carriages, Vessel, Boat, or other Water-Crast, informed against as aforefaid, and shall fail of supporting his or their Claim, shall be sentenced by the Court before whom the Trial is had to pay all Costs of Condemnation: Provided nevertbeles, That no Person shall be admitted to lay in his Claim to the Property of such Goods or other Articles, in any of the Cases aforefaid, until he shall have given Bond in the Clerk's Office, to the Informant or General-Treasfurer, with sufficient Surety for the Profecution of such Claim with Effect.

A ND it is further Enasted, That if any Perfon or Perfons shall be fued or profecuted for any Thing done in Pursuance or Execution of this Act, he or they may plead the general lifue, and give the special Matter in Evidence. And if the Plaintiff become Nonsuit, withdraw, or Verdict and Judgment pass against him, the Defendant or Defendants shall have and recover double Costs.

A N D it is further Enasted, That no Inhabitant, or Perfon belonging to or refiding in either of the faid Iflands, be permitted to have any Intercourfe whatever with the Inhabitants of this State. And every fuch Inhabitant or Refident on the faid Iflands, who fhall come into this State from either of the faid Iflands, fhall be apprehended and confidered as a Prifoner of War, and fhall forfeit the Veffel or Boat in which he fhall come from fuch Ifland; and all the Goods and Chattels found in his Poffeffion, unlefs fuch Inhabitant or Refident fhall previoufly obtain Liberty therefor from this Affembly, or from his Excellency the Governor, and Three of the Affiftants; which Goods and Chattels fhall be forfeited, One Half thereof to the Ufe of this State, and the other Half to the Perfon who fhall inform againft and profecute any Perfon coming from either of the faid Iflands as aforefaid, to be recovered as aforefaid.

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## An Act for paying for Beef fupplied feveral Towns.

WHEREAS by an Act of this Affembly, passed at the Seffion Act for the in January last, for apportioning to the several Towns in this State, and for collecting fresh Beef for supplying the Army of the P United Towns. United States, it was therein among other Things Refolved, That if any Town should deliver any greater Quantity of Beef, or Sum of Money, than is affigned by the faid Act, such Town shall be credited for such Quantity of Beef as they shall deliver over their Proportion, or for so much Beef as the Monies paid over their Proportion shall amount to, to be deducted from the next Proportion of Beef affigned to such Town : And whereas some of the faid Towns, in Pursuance thereof, have delivered a greater Proportion in Beef or Money than was affigned them as aforefaid, whereby the Purchaser of faid Beef was enabled, with the Credit which he obtained, to purchase and deliver double the Quantity of Beef for the Use aforefaid, than was expected by the faid Apportionment :

WHEREFORE for difcharging the Balances due and payable on the Fifth Day of May next, for the Beef purchafed as aforefaid, and that the feveral Towns may contribute towards the fame in an equal Proportion, agreeable to the Intent and Meaning of the faid Act, It is Voted and Refolued, That the Towns hereafter named pay into the General-Treafury, on or before the faid Fifth Day of May next, the feveral Sums, in Silver or Gold, herein refpectively apportioned to them, to be appropriated as aforefaid, to wit:

## An A C T in Addition to an Act for compleating this State's Quota of Continental Troops.

Act in Addition to an ASt for compleat-Quota of Continental Troops

WHEREAS the Legislature of this State, from a Conviction of the absolute Necessity of having their Quota of Troops in the Field, apportioned the Men to the feveing this State's ral Towns, and ordered the Inhabitants respectively to be classed, and in case the respective Classes should not procure an able-bodied Recruit by a limited Time, that a Perfon should be detached from each delinquent Class: And it having been the Expectation and With of the General Affembly, that the feveral Classes should exert themfelves for procuring the Men to inlift voluntarily, by making an adequate Allowance, it being most conducive to the general Good that all Perfons employed in the public Service should be freely and voluntarily engaged; without Compulsion: And as the Purposes of the Acts for classing the Inhabitants have been in general answered, much the greatest Part of the Men having voluntarily inlifted : But as fome Perfons have been detached, whole Circumstances and Situation in Life will not permit their being fent forward to the Army to da Duty, without great Difficulties and mischievous Confequences enfuing to the Public therefrom: Be is therefore Enacled by this General Assembly, and by the Authority thereof it is hereby Enasted, That the Committees of the several Towns, heretofore appointed by the General Affembly for claffing the Inhabitants, be and they are hereby required, in Cafes where Perfons have been detached from any Clafs, to affess the Sum of Three Hundred Spanish milled Dollars, upon fuch Clafs from which any Perfon hath been detached as aforefaid, in the fame Manner as is directed by the Act ordering the Inhabitants to be classed : That the Monies thus affeffed by the faid Committees be collected by the Collector of Taxes for the Town to which each Clafs shall belong respectively, to whom the faid Committee shall isfue their Warrant for collecting the fame : That the fame be affeffed within. Ten Days from the Rifing of this Affembly, and paid into the General-Treasury on or before the Fifth Day of June next, to be appropriated for hiring a Man for the Class upon whom the fame shall be affessed as aforefaid : That William Taggart, Efg; Colonel Archibald Crary, Colonel Tuomas Potter, Mr. Joseph Hoyle, and Major Asa Kimball, be and they are hereby appointed a Committee for inlifting the faid Men : That for this Purpose the said Committee be and

and they are hereby empowered to draw out of the General-Treafury the whole Money collected and paid as aforefaid: That the faid Committee keep an exact Account of all Expences, and the Bounties paid by them, for procuring the faid Men, and render the fame to the General Affembly, to whom they are to be accountable for the Expenditure: That the Committees of the feveral Towns be reafonably paid for their Trouble and Service in making the faid Affefiment; and that the Expences last mentioned be added to the faid Sum of Three Hundred Dollars, to be assessed and paid by the Clafs deficient as aforefaid, together with the lawful Fees due to the Collector for collecting the fame. Provided nevertheles, That if any Class, now deficient as aforefaid, fhall themfelves inlift, and procure to be mustered, a good able-bodied effective Man, within Ten Days from the Rifing of this Affembly, every fuch Clafs fhall be exempted from having the aforementioned Affeffment levied upon them as aforefaid.

And whereas the Committee of the Town of Gloucefler, hath not proceeded to clafs the Inhabitants of that Town, as heretofore required, which Town is now deficient Ten Men of the Number apportioned to them by the General Affembly: Be it thereof further Enacled, That the Allorney-General profecute the faid Committee according to Law, for neglecting to class the Inhabitants of the faid Town: That in cafe the faid Town of Gloucester, shall not procure to be voluntarily inlifted and muftered the Men of which they are deficient as aforefaid, within Ten Days from the Rifing of this Affembly, the General-Treafurer be and he is hereby directed to iffue his Warrant on the Eleventh Day after the Rifing of this Affembly against the Town-Treafurer of the faid Town, for collecting the Sum of Three Hundred Spanish milled Dollars for each Man the faid Town shall be then deficient, in the same Manner as in Cases of Delinquency of paying State's Taxes affeffed in the usual Manner, which Warrant shall be returnable in Ten Days from the Time of its being iffued: And that Lieut. Col. Jeremiah Olney furnish the General-Treasurer with a Return of the Men wanting from faid Town on that Day.

And it is Ordered, That the Secretary caufe this Act to be immediately printed, and fend a Copy thereof as foon as poffible to the Committee of each Town where any Clafs

fhall

shall have had any Person detached, and is now deficient as aforefaid, as ascertained by the Return now before this Asfembly, and One Copy to the Town-Clerk of Gloucester.

Whereas Mr. Shubael Kinnicut, a Deputy-Sheriff of the County of Briftol, exhibited unto this Affembly an Account, by him charged against the State, for his Time and Expences, in warning the Members of the General Affembly, &c. Which being duly confidered, It is Voted and Refolved, That the Amount thereof, being Two Pounds Five Shillings, Continental Money of the new Emission, be allowed and paid the faid Shubael Kinnicut, out of the General-Treasury.

Upon the Petition of Sylvester Gardner, Efg; of North-S. Gardner's Petition referred. Kingflown, preferred unto this Affembly, reprefenting, That he was Head of a Clafs in faid North-Kingflown, and did procure a Recruit for the Continental Army : That the faid Clafs was at the Expence of Nine Pounds Six Shillings, Silver Money, over and above the Bounty they paid the faid Recruit; and that the faid Sum was affeffed upon the faid Clafs but hath not been collected, by Reafon that the Committee for Claffing the Inhabitants of faid Town forbad the Collectors proceeding to collect the fame; and thereupon he prayed this Affembly to grant him Relief: Which being duly confidered, It is Voted and Refolved, That the faid Petition be, and the fame is hereby, referred to the next Seffion; and that in the mean Time the faid Committee be ferved with a Copy of the faidPetition, and cited to appear at next Seffion to anfwer the fame.

Adjournment. It is Voted and Refolved, That all Bufinefs lying before this Affembly unfinished, be, and the fame is hereby, referred to the next Session: That the Secretary publish the Acts and Orders now made and passed by Beat of Drum in the Town of Providence, within Ten Days after the Rifing of this Afsembly, fembly, and within Thirty fend Copies thereof to the Sheriffs of the feveral Counties in the State, by them to be tranfmitted to each Town-Clerk in their respective Counties; and that this Affembly be, and hereby is, adjourned to the Fourth Monday in May Instant, then to convene at the State-House in Providence.

An ACT for incorporating and bringing into the Field Five Hundred able-bodied effective Men, of the Militia, to ferve within this State for one Month, from the Time of their Rendezvous, and no longer, and not to be marched out of the fame.

W/HEREAS it is indifpenfably neceffary, for the A& for railing Safety and internal Security of the State, that Part of a Regiment of the Militia thereof should be forthwith embodied, and Militia. marched to Newport, in Order that the Safety and Security thereof, and of this State, may be duly attended to.

BE it therefore Enacled by the General Assembly, and by the Authority thereof it is Enacted, That Five Hundred ablebodied effective Men, of the Independent, Artillery, Senior and Junior Claffes of Militia (Officers included) be forthwith embodied, and rendezvous at fuch Places within this State, by the Eighth Day of June next, to do Duty therein for One Month, from the Time of their arriving at their Places of Rendezvous, unless fooner difcharged by his Excellency the Governor, or this Affembly.

And in order that each Town fhould furnish their proper Proportion of Men for faid Service, It is further Enasted, That the Towns herein after named shall forthwith furnish the Number of Men fet against each respective Town, to ferve as Officers and Privates for the Time aforefaid : That is to fay,

And be it further Enalled by the Authority aforefaid, That the Men aforefaid shall be formed into One Battalion, and divided into Seven Companies, to be led by One Lieut. Col. One Major, Seven Captains, Seven Lieutenants, and Seven Enfigus, taken from the Line of the Militia, and be under the Command of Archibala Crary, Efq; who is hereby appointed Commandant of the Post on Rhode-Island.

And it is further Enalled, That there shall be One Adjutant and One Quarter-Masser for the said Battalion, to be taken from the Line, and One Surgeon: And that each Company of the said Battalion shall have Four Serjeants and Four Corporals, with One Drummer and One Fiser.

And be it further Enacled by the Authority of orefaid, That the Colonels or Commanders of each Regiment within this State shall forthwith issue their Warrants to the Captains of each Company under their Command, fetting forth the Number of the faid able-bodied effective Men which fuch Company is required to furnish; and to command, if the faid Number of Men shall not voluntarily turn out to do Duty as aforefaid, that the Captain or Commander of fuch Company forthwith draft or detach the Men for the Service aforelaid, and caufe them to be marched to the Place of Rendezvous appointed therefor. Provided, that the Perfons who voluntarily turned out, or were detached as aforefaid, to do Duty for the Space of One Month, in Purfuance of an Act passed at February Session, A. D. 1781, be exempted from being drafted or detached in Purfuance of this Act.

And it is further Enacted, That where any Independent Company of Cavalry, Artillery, or Infantry, shall be in any Town or Towns, the Colonel or Commander of the Regiment, giment, within whofe Diffrict fuch Independent Company thall be, and the Commander of fuch Independent Corps, fhall fettle and fix the Number to be railed out of fuch Corps, in the fame Proportion as they are to be taken from the Military at large in fuch Town, according to the Number in their Corps, and to be accounted to the Towns to which they respectively belong.

And it is further Enalled by the Authority afore/aid, That the faid Colonels or Commanders of Regiments shall proportion the Men which each Company shall raife, according to the Numbers of Men which the Company shall confiss of, in Proportion to the whole Number to be raifed by the Town to which such Companies shall respectively belong.

And it is further Enalled by the Authority aforefaid, That the Commanders of each respective Company of Cavalry, Artillery and Infantry, within this State, shall forthwith call their respective Companies together, and in cafe the Number of able-bodied effective Men, which such Company is required to ralle, will not voluntarily turn out to do Duty as aforefaid, that then such Commander shall draft or detach such a Number of Men as will make up their Quota.

And be it further Enalled by the Authority afcrefaid. That upon arranging the faid Battalion, the Men belonging to the Independent Companies and Senior Claffes shall be embodied in Companies together, if it be not detrimental to the Service or tend to the deranging the Battalion.

And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforefaid, That the Committees appointed to clafs the Inhabitants of the Islands of Rhode-Island and Jamestown, agreeable to an Act passed at November Session, A. D. 1780, be, and they are hereby, empowered and directed, to draft or detach from the Inhabitants of their respective Towns the Number of Men before assigned to the said Towns, unless they shall voluntarily turn out: And that they make a Return thereof to Col. Archibald Crary, who is directed to cause the Men so detached to appear at the Place of Rendezvous within the Time aforefaid, and perform the Duties required of them by this Act.

And be it further Enalled, That it shall be the Duty of the Brigadier-Generals, Field and other Militia Officers within this State, and they are hereby required, to cause the Men, who shall be drafted or detached in Putsuance of this Act, to appear at the Place of Rendezvous before appointed, within the Time aforesaid, and to perform the Duties required of them by this Act.

And be it further Enasted by the Authority aforefaid, That the Perfons who shall do Duty, upon the present Tour of military Duty, shall be excused from doing any further military Duty, until the remaining Part of the military Force within this State shall have done an equal Proportion of military Service; unless in case of a general Alarm, or Invasion of this State.

And be it further Enacled by the Authority aforefaid, That the aforefaid military Force shall not be marched or carried out of this State. And upon the End and Expiration of their ferving within this State One Month, from the Time of their Rendezvous, if it shall appear necessary then to maintain a Militia military Force within this State, they shall be relieved by other military Force, drawn out of the respective Corps in the same Manner as this Act directs the prefent military Force to be embodied.

And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforefaid, 'That the Brigadier-Generals, and Commandersof Regiments and Companies, hold the Remainder of the military Force (after embodying the Men herein directed to be forthwith raifed) to be in Readinefs to march at a Moment's Warning.

And be it further Enalled, That the Men who shall be detached, and do Service in Purfuance of this Act, as Soldiers, be allowed at and after the Rate of Sixty Shillings, lawful Money, in Gold or Silver, per Month, and One Ration per Day; and that the commissioned Officers be allowed the same Pay and Rations as Officers of the same Rank receive in the Continental Service; and the Serjeants Three Pounds Twelve Shillings, of the like Money, per Month, and the Corporals and Musie Three Pounds Six Shiltings; the said Pay to commence from the Day they shall march out of their respective Towns, and to continue until their Difmission from the faid Service.

And be it further Enalled, That each of the faid noncommiffioned Officers and Soldiers furnish himself with a good Fire-Arm, Bayonet, Cartouch-Box, Knapfack and Blanket. And if he shall not be of sufficient Ability, or shall otherwise neglect to do it, the Town-Council of the Town to which he belongs are directed to furnish him with a Gun, Bayonet, Cartouch-Box, Blanket and Knapfack, at the Expence of the faid Town and receive therefor, out of the Wages of such delinquent Person, if of sufficient Ability to furnish himself as aloresaid, Twelve Shillings, in Gold or Silver, which is to be deducted from the Wages of fuch delinquent Person; the Persons receiving the faid Accourtements to return them, or account therefor with the Town-Council who shall furnish the fame.

And be it further Enacted, That each Perfon who shall be detached as aforefaid, or shall voluntarily enter into the taid Brigade, furnish himself with Three Days Provision; and that he be allowed for the same Two Shillings per Day, in real Money.

And be it further Enafted by the Authority aforefaid, That if any Perfon belonging to the military Force of this State Ihall absent himself, in order to elude or evade this Act, or shall refuse to march forward upon being detached, by himself or Substitute, he shall be fent forward to the Contineural Army, to do Duty for Six Months therein, as a common Soldier : And if any Perfon who shall voluntarily turn out to do Duty as aforefaid, or shall be detached for the Purpole aforefaid, and shall join his Corps, and afterwards shall desert, if the laid Offender be apprehended before the Tour of Duty expires, he shall fuffer fuch Punishment as a Court-Martial from the faid Battalion shall inflict : And if the faid Offender be apprehended after the Time thall expire for which he is now called out, he thall be fent to the Continental Army, to do Duty as a common Soldier for Six Months in the Rhode-Island Battalion.

**B** E it Enacted by this General Assembly, and by the Autho-rity thereof it is hereby Enacted, That a Tax for raising from Silver the Sum of Twenty Thousand Pounds, Lawful Money, pay-Money, by able in Gold or Silver, be granted and affeffed upon the Polls and Estates of the Inhabitants of this State : And that the faid Sum of Twenty Thousand Pounds be collected and paid into the General-Treasury of this State ; Ten Thousand Pounds, Part thereof, on or before the First Day of August next; and the remaining Ten Thousand Pounds on or before the First Day of Oslober next.

It is further Enasted by the Authority aforefaid, That, upon the Refufal or Neglect of any Town in this State to affefs, levy, and pay into the General-Treasury, its Proportion of the faid Tax by the Time aforefaid, the General-Treasurer be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed, to iffue his Execution against the Town-Treasurer of fuch Town for its Proportion or Deficiency of the faid Tax, immediately after the Expiration of the Time of Payment of the faid Tax; which Execution shall be returnable in Ten Days after the Date thereof. It is further Enalted by the Authority aforefaid, That the Town-Treasurer of each respective Town in this State be, and he is hereby, authorized and empowered, to sue out and profecute the Bond and Security that shall be by him taken from the Collector of the faid Tax, to a Special Inferior Court in the County where such Bond and Security shall be fo taken. And such Special Court shall be convened, have the same Power, and take the same Fees, as Special Courts have heretosore had in this State. And the Judgment of such Special Court shall be final.

It is further Enalled by the Authority aforefaid, That the Town-Clerks of the feveral Towns in this State be, and they are hereby, required to fend the Names of the Town-Treafurer, and Collector of Rates, of their respective Towns, to the General-Treasurer, at the same Time that they fend a Copy of the Rate-List.

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## An ACT conflituting a Council of War.

Act conflicuting a Council of War. WHBREAS his Excellency General Washington hath recommended to this State to invest the Executive Authority with full Powers, during the Recess of the General Affembly, to comply with any further necessary Requifition that he may make for Men, Provisions, or for the Means of Transportation : And whereas, from the present Appearances, there is Reafon to apprehend that this State, in the Course of the Campaign, may be subject to Invasion; and unlefs the neceffary Powers to call forth the Strength of the State, in Cafes of imminent Danger, be invested in a fuitable Council the Safety of the State may be greatly endangered :

Be it therefore Enacted by this General Affembly, and by the Authority thereof it is Enacled, That a Council of War be conflituted, to confift of Five Members, Three of whom shall make a Quorum : That the faid Couneil, when called by his Excellency the Governor, or his Honor the Deputy-Governor, shall and may, in the Recess of the General Affembly, make, ordain, conflitute, and appoint all fuch Orders, Decrees, Regulations, and Commands of a military Nature, necessary for calling forth the Strength of this State, in all Cafes that require fudden and immediate Difpatch : And that fuch their Orders, Decrees, Regulations, and Commands shall be as Valid as though enacted and ordained by this General Assembly.

Act in Addition to the Act afcertaining Depreciation, W HEREAS the Depreciation of the Paper Currency is afcertained in the aforefaid Act only up to the First Day of April, A. D. 1780, fince which Time there hath been a still further and great Depreciation thereof; and in Order that Justice may be done, it is necessary that the fame should be afcertained to the present Time; and that the Courts of Law should be directed in what Manner to make up Judgments and issue Executions for Contracts in the Paper Currency:

Be it therefore Enalled by this General Alfembly, and by the Authority thereof it is Enalled, That the following Table or Estimate, exhibiting the Value of the Paper Currency in Spanish milled Dollars, shall be the Standard for fixing the Value of all Contracts, in Bills of Credit of the United States, issue of all Contracts, in Bills of Credit of the United States, issue before the 18th of March, 1780, made fince the state First Day of April, A. D. 1780, to the 30th Day of May, 1781, and that the several Courts of Law within this State shall govern themselves by the same, in making up Judgments, to wit:

And be it further Enacted by the Authority oforefaid, That the Courts of Law in this State be, and they hereby are, directed and required to make up and enter their Judgments, in all Cafes, for lawful Money, in Silver or Gold, as afcertained in an Act of the General Affembly, paffed at June Seffion, A. D. 1763, intituled, "An Act declaring what

what is and shall be Lawful Money." &c. And that all Costs arising in any Suit at Law, of what Kind soever, and Officers Fees, shall be computed in like lawful Money, and shall, on Account of the raised Prices of the Necessaries of Life in general, be 25 per Cent. or One Quarter Part more than as allowed by Law in the Year 1774. And all Fines, Penalties and Forfeitures, shall be computed in like lawful Money, equal in Value to the Sums specified.

And whereas the Continental Paper Billsof the old Emiffions have been confidered as a Medium of Trade, and a Meafure in Dealings, in Lieu of Money, for which Obligations have been given, and are not yet ditcharged, and the faid Bills, by the general Confent of the People, have, in great Meafure, cealed to circulate as a Currency; and the Continental Bills of the new Emiffion have been alfo confidered as a Medium of Trade, and for which like Obligations have been given; and Experience hath fhown, that they are likewife liable to Depreciation, and great Contefts and Difputes may arife between Debtors and Creditors, in determining what fhall be a juft Equivalent for fuch Debts:

Therefore, for the better fecuring of Property, and for caufing impartial Juffice to be done, Be it further Enalled by the Authority afore/aid. That all Contracts made for Continental Bills, of the old or new Emiffions, or Debts for which Depreciation is due by Law, from Perfons who have received Monies for others in Paper Bills, may be difcharged, by paying the juft Value of fuch Debts in Silver or Gold lawful Money, or Bills of the new Emiffion iffued by this State, purfuant to a Refolve of Congress of the 18th of March, 1780; which Value shall be afcertained by the aforefaid Scales of Depreciation, and fuch Scale of Depreciation as shall be agreed upon and established by the Superior Court of Judicature, & as herein after mentioned.

And be it further Enadled, That notwithstanding Execution shall iffue from the Courts of Law, for levying and collecting the just Value of any Paper Money Debts as aforefaid, in Silver or Gold, yet the Person against whom the same is iffued may discharge such Part of the Execution as shall be due from him for a Paper Money Debt as aforefaid, by paying the Value of the Sum of Gold or Silver specified in the Execution to be due from him as aforefaid; in Continental Bills of the new Emiffion, iffued in this State, purfuant to laid Refolve of Congress of the 18th. Day of March, 1780, at the current Exchange on the Day he shall pay the fame; which Value and current Exchange shall be determined from Time to Time by the Justices of the Superior Court of Judicature, &c. who for this Purpose shall meet, if necessary, once a Month, and oftener in Cafe of an apparent Depreciation of faid Bills of the new Emiffion; and who shall monthly notify the Rate of Exchange between the faid Bills and Spanifb milled Dollars, in the Newspapers of this State: And that the Sheriff who shall have such Execution, shall pay the fame immediately to the Perfon in whole Favour it is iffued, or on Default thereof shall pay to fuch Person the Depreciation of the Money, while in his Hands: But in cafe the Sheriff shall be obliged to collect the faid Money, due on fuch Execution, by Sale of Goods, Chattels or real Estate, he shall receive Gold or Silver only in difcharge thereof.

And be it further Enacted, That the reckoning of the Depreciation of faid Bills, as afcertained by the three Scales aforefaid, shall be confidered as having Reference to each Day specified, and as having taken Place regularly and progreffively, in equal Degrees, from any Day specified in faid Scales to the next specified Day.

And it is further Enacted, That Judgments of Court, already obtained for Paper Money Debts, and whereon Executions have been iffued, and are not yet returned, and all Judgments for Paper Money, may be discharged, by paying to the Perlon in whole Favour fuch Judgment is passed, or to the Officer in Posseffion of such Execution, the just Value thereof, at the Time fuch Judgment was rendered, in Bills of the new Emiffion iffued by this State as aforefaid, which Value shall be afcertained, in Cafe of Execution being iffued, by the Officer who has the fame, from the faid Scales of Depreciation. Provided neverthele/s, That until the Scale of Depreciation of the new Emiffion as aforefaid shall be published by faid Court, any Officer now poffeffed of any Execution, may receive in Difcharge thereof One Dollar in the new Emiffion of Continental Currency for Twelve Pounds of the old Emiffions, and in like

like Proportion for a greater or lefs Sum; and that any Perfon, in whole Favour any Bxecution hath been iffued, may, if he fees fit, order it to be returned for an alias, that the Value of fuch Judgment may be justly ascertained.

And whereas Creditors are often injured by being unreasonably delayed from their just Dues, from the Length of Time between the Courts: Be it therefore Enalled, That all Executions from the Inferior or Superior Courts, shall be returnable in Three Months from the Time of iffuing fuch Executions.

And it is further Enacled, That this Act be in Force iminediately from and after the Rifing of this Affembly; and that the Secretary immediately publish the fame in all the Newspapers of the State.

WHEREAS from the Neglect of the Collectors, in diyers Towns within this State, the Taxes and Affeffments respectively made, and ordered to be collected from faid Towns, have not been duly and regularly paid into the General-Treasury, whereby it became necessary that the General-Treasurer should issue his Warrants of Distress against the Town-Treasurers of those Towns where the Collectors had been negligent, feveral of whom have been committed to Gaol, and others have been obliged to raife the Monies due from the respective Towns, without faid Collectors having duly collected and paid in the Amount of the Tax or Affeffment to them delivered to be collected; and thereupon the Town-Treasurers have called Special Courts upon the Collectors and their Sureties: And as it is highly equitable and reasonable, that the Estates of the Principals should be first appropriated towards paying off and discharging the Judgments which have been or shall be obtained against faid negligent Collectors and their Sureties:

Be it Enasted by this General Affembly, and by the Authority thereof it is hereby Enacted, That in all Executions isluing from any Judgment obtained by the Town-Treasurers against the faid Collectors and their Sureties, the Words real

realEstateschall be entered in the mandatoryPart of faid Executions: That the Sheriff or his Deputy, to whom the faid Executions schall issues that in the security of fuch Executions, feize and take into Possessien all the Estate, as well real as personal, which he cau find in his Precinct, belonging or appertaining unto the Principal: And that faid Sheriff'or his Deputy schall, immediately upon his feizing and attaching the Estate of the Principal, advertife the same to be fold at public Vendue, as well real as personal, within Twenty Days from the Time of his making the Seizure or Attachment as aforesaid.

And it is further Enalled by the Authority aforefaid, That in cafe of Accidents, or extraordinary Storms or Tempest, by Reason whereos few or no Purchasers may appear, it shall and may be lawful for the Sheriff or his Deputy to adjourn the Sale of the Essents fo taken, from one Day to the next, and fo for three Adjournments, and no longer.

And it is further Enasted by the Authority aforefaid, That in cafe any negligent Collector or Collectors of Taxes as aforefaid thall have Eftates within two Counties, the Execution or Executions thall be directed to the Sheriffs and their Deputies of the respective Counties in which the Eftates of fuch negligent Collectors are: And their Eftates may be immediately taken and proceeded againft as is in Manner before directed.

And it is further Enalled, That if the Eftate, real and perfonal, of the negligent Collector, which shall be fold in Manner as aforefaid, shall not be fufficient to discharge the Amount of the Execution, Debt and Costs, an alias Execution shall be immediately issued against the Sureties, for collecting the Remainder, which Execution shall be returnable within Ten Days from the Date thereof.

And be it further Enacted by the Authority of orefaid, That if any or either of the Towns aforefaid shall refuse or neglect to procure and deliver the aforefaid Beef or Money. in Gold or Silver, at the Times and Place aforefaids unto the faid William Rhodes, Efg; he shall certify unto the Sheriff of the County within whole Precinct fuch delinquent Town lies, that fuch Town hath not procured and delivered the Beef or Money herein affeffed against them: And the Sheriff of fuch County within whose Diffrict fuch delinquent Town lies is hereby directed and empowered, forthwith, upon Receipt of fuchCertificate, to repair, with sufficient Aid, into such delinquent Town, and there to feize and diffrain double the Quantity of Beeves, or neat Cattle as will make the Weight required and alleffed against fuch Town, and have the Quantity affeffed against faid Town delivered at Coventry, on the Twentieth Day of August, and Twentieth Day of September next, to be appraifed by faid John Demount; and the remaining Part the faid Sheriff shall fell at Public Vendue; and the Monies arifing from the Sale thereof, after deducting the Expence which shall accrue unto the Sheriff, shall be paid into the General-Treasury.

And be it further Enacled by the Authority aforefaid, That the faid Sheriff shall, when he makes the Seizure and Diftraint traint as aforefaid, keep an Account of the Numbers and Marks, natural and artificial, of the Beeves, or neat Cattle, fo taken; and fhall, within One Week after fuch Seizure and Diffraint as aforefaid, lodge in the Town-Clerk's Office of fuch Town where the Diffraint fhall be made, a Copy thereof, that the Owner or Owners of fuch Beeves, or neat Cattle, may have fatisfactory Payment therefor, from fuch delinquent Town at large.

And whereas it will be just and reasonable, in Case any Town shall be so lost to a Sense of Duty and Regard for the public Welfare as not to made sufficient Provision for furnishing the said Bees, or Money in Lieu thereos, as aforesaid, and by such Neglect shall Cause any of their Inhabitants to have their Cattle destrained from them as aforesaid, that such Inhabitants should have sull Compensation for all Damages occasioned thereby, from the other delinquent Inhabitants of such Town:

Be it therefore further Enalled, That any Perfon having any of his Cattle diffrained from him, in Purfuance of this Act, by the Sheriff'as aforefaid fhall be entitled to have and recover against the Town to which he shall belong the full Value of all the Cattle taken from him as aforefaid, together with all lawful Costs and such other Damages as shall be deemed just and reasonable, by the Court before which the same shall be recovered: That the same be fued for and recovered by an Action to be commenced against the Town-Treasurer of such Town at a Special Court to be called in the same Manner as Special Courts are now by Law directed to be called; and that on Judgment being recovered Execution iffue against fuch Town-Treasurer, and be returnable within Fisteen Days from the Time of issues.



An ACT for mitigating of Penalties on Delinquents, heretofore called forth to do military Duty, and for directing Fines to be paid into the General-Treasfury, in Lieu of the Town-Treafuries.

W HEREAS by an Act of this Affembly, paffed at February Act for miti-Seffion, A. D. 1781, for raifing Twelve Hundred Men, and gating, Penalties on Delinquents, to do military Duty within this State for the Term of One Month, the Men who were called forth by Virtue of faid Acts, to do the faid Month's Tour of Duty, and refused or neglected to do the fame, in Perfon or by Substitute, were directed to be fent forward to the Continental tmental Army, to do Duty as common Soldiers for the Space of Six Months: And whereas a Number of Perfons in this State did neglect to do Duty as aforefaid, Part of whom have not as yet been fent forward as aforefaid: And this Affembly being willing to mitigate the Penalty by the faid Acts inflicted,

DO Enaã, and by the Authority thereof it is Enaïted, That fo much of the faid Acts as directs Delinquents to be fent forward to the Continental Army, to do Duty for Six Months, be repealed : And that in Lieu thereof each and every fuch Delinquent, who hath not been fent forward, agreeable to the taid Acts, fhall pay as a Fine the Sum of Nine Pounds Lawful Silver Money, to be collected in the fame Manner as other military Fines and Forfeitures are directed by Law to be collected: That when collected, the fame be paid into the General Treafury: And that in cafe any Delinquent as aforefaid fhall not have fufficient Eftate to pay fuch Fine, he fhall be fent forward to Newport, to do Duty as a common Soldier with the Militia of this State, for the Term of Two Months.

AND whereas by an Act of the Council of War, of the Sixteenth of June laft, and an Act of this Affembly, paffed at July Seffion laft, for raising Five Hundred Men, to do Duty within this State for One Month, and also by another Act of the Council of War, of the First of August inft. for raising the same Number of Men, for the fame Time, the Fines for Delinquency are directed to be paid into the Treasuries of the Towns to which the Delinquents respectively belong; and it is expedient that such Fines be paid into the General-Treasury:

### An ACT for proportioning the Supplies of Beef to the feveral Towns in this State, for the Support of the Army, for the Months of October and November next.

Apportionment of Beef to the feveral Towns.

WHEREAS it is abfolutely neceffary, for the Support of the Army, that regular and due Supplies of fresh Beef tor their Use be furnished, agreeable to the Requisition of the Most Honorable the Continental Congress: And as his Excellency General Washington hath, in the most pressing Manner, requested that the Supplies required of this State be regularly and monthly furnished: And whereas the Supplies of fresh Beef, for the Months of Oslober and November, can be procured in the easieft and best Manner by apportioning the same to the respective Towns in this State:

B E it therefore Enasted by this General Affembly, and by the Authority thereof it is Enasted, That the Towns herein after named fhall, on the Fifteenth Day of Ostober next, procure and deliver, at the Dwelling-Houfe or Mr. Ifrael Bowen, in Coventry, the Quantity of good merchantable Beef respectively affixed unto them, or in Lieu thereof the Sums of Money herein ordered, to be paid in Gold or Silver, on the respective Days aforefaid at the faid Ifrael Bowen's, unto William Rhodes, Efq; who is hereby appointed to receive the Beef, when the fame thall be appraifed as herein after mentioned, or in Lieu of the Beef the Monies raifed by the respective Towns, and give his Receipt therefor, to wit:

AND it is further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That in cafe any Money shall be delivered the said John Topham, in Lieu of Beef, he shall therewith purchase Beef, for the Use of the faid Militia, on the best Terms he can, keeping an exact Account thereof : That Mr. John Demount be and he is hereby appointed to appraise the Weight of the faid Beef to be delivered at Coventry, to judge of the Quality thereof, and to reject fuch as he shall think unfit for the Use of the Troops: That the faid William Rhodes shall forthwith, upon receiving the Beef aforefaid, drive the fame to the grand Army, and deliver it to the Commiffary-General, or his Order, taking his Receipt for the fame : That in cafe any or all the Towns aforefaid shall pay on the Days affixed by this Act Money in Lieu of Beef, then the faid William Rhodes be and he is hereby directed to receive the Monies aforefaid, and to purchase therewith, upon the best Terms he can, Beef to the Amount of the whole Sum he shall receive, for the Use of the grand Army, keeping an exact Account of the Cost of the Beef, and of the Expenditure of the Money: And that in cafe any Town shall for the First Month supply more than the Quantity required of it, such Town shall have Credit for the Surpluffage in the Supply for the Second Month.

AND it is further Enasted by the Authority aforefaid, That if any or either of the Towns aforefaid shall neglect to procure and deliver the faid Beef, or in Lieu thereof the faid Money, to the faid William Rbodes, at the Times and Place aforefaid, the faid William Rhodes be and he is hereby empowered and directed to certify unto the Sheriff of the County in which fuch delinquent Town lies, that fuch Town hath not delivered the Beef or Money herein affeffed thereon; whereupon the Sheriff of fuch County shall be and hereby is empowered and directed forthwith, upon Receipt of fuch Certificate, to repair with fufficient Aid into fuch delinquent Town, and there to feize and diffrain double the Quantity of Beeves, or Neat Cattle, as will make the Weight affelfed upon fuch Town, and have the Quantity affeffed upon fuch Town delivered at the Place or Places by this Act required, on the Days aforefaid : That those delivered at Coventry be appraised by the faid John Demount : That the faid Sheriff thall fell the remaining Part at public Vendue, and, after deducting the Expences that shall accrue, shall pay the Monies arifing from the Sale thereof into the General-Treafury : And that the faid Sheriff, when he shall so make Seizure and Distraint, shall take an Account of the Numbers, and natural and artificial Marks, of the Beeves or Neat Cattle taken, and within One Week thereafter lodge

lodge a Copy thereof in the Town-Clerk's Office of the Town where the Diftraint shall be made, that the Owner or Owners may have fatisfactory Payment from fuch delinquent Town at large.

AND whereas it will be just and equitable, in case any Town shall be fo lost to a Sense of Duty, and Regard for the public Welfare, as not to make sufficient Provision for furnishing the said Beef, or Money in Lieu thereof, and by such Neglect shall cause any of their Inhabitants to have their Cattle distrained, that such Inhabitants should have full Compensation for all Damages sufficient thereby from the other Inhabitants of such delinquent Town:

IT is therefore further Enasted, That any Perfon who shall have any of his Cattle distrained from him, in Pursuance of this Act, by the Sheriff as aforefaid, shall be intitled to have and recover, against the Town to which he belongs, the full Value of all the Cattle taken from him as aforefaid, together with all lawful Costs, and such other Damages as shall be deemed just and reasonable by the Court before which the fame shall be recovered: That the same be such for and recovered by an Action to be commenced against the Town-Treasurer of such Town, at a Special Court, to be called in the same Manner as Special Courts are now by Law directed to be called: And that on Judgment being recovered, Execution shall issue from the Time of issues, and be returnable within Fifteen Days from the Time of issues.

AND it is further Enasted, That the faid William Rhodes give Bond to the General Treasurer in the Sum of Two Thousand Pounds Lawful Silver Money, with Two Sureties, for the faithful Performance of the Trust reposed in him.

AND whereas the Town of Scituate hath, at the prefent Seffion, been divided into Two Towns: It is further Enalted by the Authority aforefaid, That the faid Two Towns procure in their respective Towns their respective Proportions of the faid Beef, or Money, in this Act affigned to the faid Town of Scituate, in Proportion to the Amount of the Sums of the last State Tax affested on the faid Town of Scituate.

AND the Secretary is hereby directed to transmit printed Copies of this Act, as soon as may be, to each of the Town-Clerks in this State, who on Receipt thereof are hereby empowered and directed immediately to issue Warrants, calling Town-Meetings in their respective Towns, in order that the Freemen may take such Measures as shall be necessary for carrying this Act into Execution.

WHEREAS it is abfolutely and indifpenfably neceffary, for Act for raifthe Safety and internal Security of the State, that Part of the ing 500 Mi-Militia thereof should be forthwith embodied, and marched to Newlitia. port, in order that the Safety and Security thereof, and of this State, may be duly attended to:

B E it therefore Enasted by the General Affembly, and by the Authority thereof it is Enasted, That Five Hundred able-bodied effective Men. of the Independent, Artillery, Senior and Junior Claffes of Militia (Officers included) who have not already done their Tours of Duty, be forthwith embodied, and rendezvous at Newport, by the 8th Day of September next, to do Duty there for One Month, from the Time of their arriving at the faid Rendezvous, unlefs fooner difcharged by his Excellency the Governor, or this General Affembly.

AND in order that each Town should furnish their proper Proportion of Men for the said Service, *It is further Enasted*, That the Towns herein after named shall forthwith furnish the Number of Men set against each respective Town, to serve as Officers and Privates for the Time aforesaid : That is to say,

AND be it further Enasted by the Authority aforefaid, That the Men aforefaid shall be formed into One Battalion, and divided into Seven Companies, to be led by One Lieutenant-Colonel, One Major, Seven Captains, Seven Lieutenants, and Seven Ensigns, to be taken from the Line of the Militia. 39

AND it is further EnaEted, That there shall be One Adjutant, and One Quarter-Master, for the said Battalion, to be taken from the Line: And that each Company of the said Battalion shall have Four Serjeants, and Four Corporals, with One Drum and One Fife.

AND be it further Enalted by the Authority aforefaid, That the Colonels or Commanders of each Regiment within this State shall forthwith iffue their Warrants to the Captains of each Company under their Command, fetting forth the Number of the faid able-bodied effective Men which such Company is required to furnish, and to command such Captain or Officer, if the faid Number of Men shall not voluntarily turn out to do Duty as aforefaid, forthwith to draft or detach the Men for the Service aforefaid, and cause them to be marched to the Place of Rendezvous appointed therefor. Provided, that the Persons who have turned out and done Duty, fince February Session last, be exempt from being detached or drafted in Pursuance of this Act.

AND it is further Enalted, That where any Independent Company of Cavalry, Artillery or Infantry, fhall be in any Town or Towns, the Colonel or Commander of the Regiment, within whole Diftrict fuch Independent Company fhall be, and the Commander of fuch Independent Corps, fhall fettle and fix the Number to be raifed out of fuch Corps, in the fame Proportion as they are to be taken from the Militia at large in fuch Town, according to the Number in their Corps, and to be accounted to the Town to which they respectively belong.

AND it is further Enalled by the Authority aforefaid, That the faid Colonels or Commanders of Regiments shall proportion the Men which each Company shall raife, according to the Numbers of Men which the Company shall confist of, in Proportion to the whole, Number to be raifed by the Town to which such Companies shall respectively belong.

A N D it is further Enalted by the Authority aforefaid, That the Commanders of each respective Company of Cavalry, Artillery and Infantry, within this State, shall forthwith call their respective Companies together; and in case the Number of able-bodied effective Men, which such Company is required to raise, will not voluntarily turn out to do Duty as aforefaid, that then such Commander shall draft or detach such Number of Men as will make up their Quota.

AND be it further Enalted by the Authority aforefaid, That upon arranging the faid Battalion, the Men belonging to the Independent Companies and Senior Claffes shall be embodied in Companies together, if it shall not be detrimental to the Service, or tend to deranging the Battalion.

AND be it further Enasted by the Authority aforefaid, That the Committees appointed to class the Inhabitants of the Islands of Rhode-Island and Jamestown, agreeable to an Act passed at November Session last, be and they are hereby empowered and directed, to draft or detach from the Inhabitants of their respective Towns the Number of Men before affigned to the faid Towns, unless they shall voluntarily turn out: And that they make a Return thereof to Lieut. Col. Lemuel Balley, who is hereby hereby appointed to the Command of the faid-Regiment, and who is directed to cause the Men so detached to appear at the Place of Readezvous within the Time aforesaid, and perform the Duties required of them by this Act.

AND be it further Enallyd, That it shall be the Duty of the Brigadier-Generals, Field and other Militia Officers, within this State, and they are hereby required, to cause the Men. who shall be drafted or detached in Pursuance of this Act, to appear at the Place of Rendezvous before appointed, within the Time aforesaid, and to perform the Duties required of them by this Act

AND be it further Enasted by the Authority aforefaid, That the Perfons who shall do Duty, upon the present Tour of military Duty, shall be excused from doing any further military Duty, until the remaining Part of the military Force within this State shall have done an equal Proportion of military Service, unless in case of a general Alarm; or Invasion of this State.

A N D be it further Enalted by the Authority aforefaid, That the aforefaid military Force shall not be marched or carried out of this State. And upon the End and Expiration of their ferving within this State One Month, from the Time of their Rendezvous, if it shall appear necessary then to maintain a Mulitia mulitary Force within this State, they shall be relieved by other military Force, to be drawn out of the respective Corps, in the same Manner as this Act directs the present military Force to be embodied.

AND be it further Enasted by the Authority aforefaid, That the Brigadier-Generals, and Commanders of Regiments and Companies, hold the Remainder of the military Force (after embodying the Men herein directed to be forthwith raifed) to be in Readinels to march at a Moment's Warning

A N D be it further Enatled, That the Men who shall be detached, and do Duty in Purluance of this Act as Soldiers, be allowed at and after the Rate of Sixty Shillings Lawful Money, in Gold or Silver, per Month, and One Ration per Day: That the commissioned Officers be allowed the fame Pay and Rations as Officers of the fame Rank receive in the Continental Service; and the Serjeants Three Pounds Twelve Shillings of the like Money per Month, and the Corporals and Music Three Pounds Six Shillings; and that the faid Pay commence from the Day they shall march out of their respective Towns, and continue until their Dismission from faid Service.

AND be it further Enabled, That each of the faid non-commissioned Officers and Soldiers furnish himself with a good Fire-Arm, Bayonet, Cartouch-Box, Knapsack and Blanket: And if he shall not be of sufficient Ability, or shall otherwise neglect to do it. the Town-Council of the Town to which he belongs is directed to furnish him with a Gun, Bayonet, Cartouch-Box, Blanket and Knapsack, at the Expence of such Town, and receive therefor, out of the Wages of such delinquent Person, if of sufficient Ability to furnish himself as aforesaid, L Twelve Shillings in Gold or Silver, which is to be deducted from the Wages of fuch delinquent Perfon; the Perfons receiving the faid Accoutrements to return them, or account therefor with the Town-Council who shall furnish the same.

AND be it further Enasted, That the Town-Councils be empowered, if necessary, to impress Guns, Bayonets, Cartouch-Boxes, Knapfacks and Blankets, fufficient for equipping the Delinquents who shall be detached in Purfuance of this AA, giving Certificates therefor to the Perfons from whom the fame shall be taken.

AND be it further Enalted, That each Person who shall be detached as aforefaid, or shall voluntarily enter into the faid Battalion, furnish himfelf with Three Days Provisions; and that he be allowed for the fame Two Shillings per Day, in real Money.

AND be it further Enacted by the Authority aforefaid, That if any Perlon belonging to the military Force of this State shall ablent himfelf, in order to elude or evade this Act, or shall refuse to march forward upon being detached, by himfelf or Subflitute, he shall pay the Sum of Nine Pounds Lawful Silver Money per Month, as a Fine, to be collected and appropriated in the fame Manner as the Fines are ordered to be made Ule of in an Act of this Affembly, paffed at the prefent Seffion.

AND be it further Enasted, That the following other Officers be and they are hereby chosen and appointed to command the Men ordered to be raifed by this Act, to wil :

Richard Bailey, Esq; Major; Paris Gardner, Philip Traffan, Viol Allen, Beriab Lewis, James Wheaton, Peter Lewis, and Asa Bennett, Captains; Seth Thomas, Joseph James, Arnold Bliven, James Wells, Sylvanus Maxson, Thomas Biffell, and George Colvin, Lieutenants; William Blis, Robert Edmonds, Eli Read, Benjamin Brown, jun. Arnold Fenner, Elisha Potter, and Noab Ballou, jun. Enfigns.

PROVIDED, that this Act do not extend unto the Independent Companies of the Artillery of Providence, Pawtuxet Rangers, Kentish Guards, and Kingstown Reds; they having already done a Tour of Duty fince the Militia at large.

AND be it further Enasted, That the Field Officers of the faid Battalion be and they are hereby appointed and empowered to fill up any Vacancies, which now are or shall hereafter happen in the Battalion aforelaid.

Campbell, a British Officer: That the Service in a British Regiment being extremely difagreeable to him, he fled from the Island of Rhode-Island, at the Peril of his Life, and placed himfelf under the Protection of the Authority of this State: That from his Representations of the State of the Island of *Rbode-Island*, and all Matters of Fact which came to his Knowledge, the Council of War permitted him to go at large, and have his Liberty: And that fince the Evacuation of Rhode-Island he is difagreeably alarmed with a Claim upon him as a Slave by Mr. William Tweedy, who is Administrator to the Estate of the faid James Honyman: And thereupon he belought this Affembly to grant him a full and entire Manumiffion from the Bonds of Slavery. AND be it further Enacted by the Authority aforefaid, That if any or either of the faid Towns shall refuse or neglect to procure and deliver the faid Beef, as required by this Act, the faid William Rhodes, or Jobn Topbam, according as the Delinquency may happen, are required to certify unto the Sheriff of the County within whole Precinct fuch delinquent Town lies, that fuch Town hath not procured the Beef herein affeffed against fuch Town : And the Sheriff of fuch County within whofe Diffrict fuch delinquent Town lies, is hereby directed and empowered forthwith, upon Receipt of fuch Certificate, to repair, with fufficient Aid, into such delinquent Town, and there to feize and diftrain double the Quantity of Beeves, or neat Cattle, as will make the Weight required and affeffed against fuch Town, and have the Quantity affeffed against faid Town delivered at Coventry, on the Sixth Day of January next, to be appraised by faid John Demount; and the remaining Part the faid Sheriff shall sell at public Vendue, and the Mo-nies ariting from the Sale thereof, after deducting the Expence which shall accrue unto the Sheriff, shall be paid into the General-Treasury.

A N D be it further Enatted by the Authority aforefaid, That the faid Sheriff fhall, when he makes the Seizure and Diffraint as aforefaid, keep an Account of the Numbers, Marks, natural and artificial, of the Beeves or neat Cattle fo taken; and fhall, within One Week after fuch Seizure and Diffraint as aforefaid, lodge in the Town-Clerk's Office of fuch Town where the Diffraint is made a Copy thereof, that the Owner or Owners of fuch Beeves, or neat Cattle, may have fatisfactory Payment therefor, from fuch delinquent Town at large.

AND whereas it will be just and equitable, in case any Town shall be so lost to a Sense of Duty, and Regard for the public Welfare, as not to make fufficient Provision for furnishing the said Beef, or Money in Lieu thereof; as aforesaid, and by such Neglect shall cause any of their Inhabitants to have their Cattle distrained from them as aforesaid; that such Inhabitants should have full Compensation for all Damages occasioned thereby, from the other delinquent Inhabitants of such Town:

BE it therefore further Enalted, That any Person, having any of his Cattle diffrained from him, in Purluance of this Act, by the Sheriff as aforefaid, shall be entitled to have and recover against the Town to which he shall belong the full Value of all the Cattle taken from him as aforefaid, together with all lawful Costs, and such other Damages as shall be deemed just and reasonable by the Court before which the fame shall be recovered: That the same be such for and recovered by an Action to be commenced against the Town-Treasurer of such Town at a Special Court, to be called in the same Manner as Special Courts are now by Law directed to be called; and that on Judgment being recovered Execution issue against fuch Town-Treasurer, and be returnable within Fisteen Days from the Time of issuing the same.
