Orders booked before January 1st, 1889, will be delivered without extra charge during the month of January (detention from unavoidable causes not preventing) at any of the following named places, which the purchaser may designate, viz: San Diego, National City, El Cajon, Ramona, Ballena, Bernardo, Linda Vista, Escondido, San Marcos, Valley Centre, and any railroad station in San Diego county.

Later orders will be accommodated so far as circumstances admit.

Plants in earth and other stock not capable of ordinary packing and transportation are excepted from the foregoing offer, and subject to special arrangement.

Customers not familiar with varieties, by stating for what purpose desired, can depend upon a selection being made with strict regard to the same, which my acquaintance with fruits of this region will enable me to do with general satisfaction.

NOTICE TO CUSTOMERS.

TERMS.—Cash, unless otherwise expressly agreed. Payment must be made, or satisfactory reference or security given before shipment of order.

PRICES.—Are for quantities named, taken at one time, but five trees will be supplied at the rate per ten and fifty at the rate per one hundred. For selected single trees of extra quality rates will be charged according to value.

PACKING,—Will be done in a suitable manner, for which no charge will be made ex-

cept in cases requiring unusual labor and expense.

SUBSTITUTION.—In filling orders, substitution of one variety for another will not be practiced, except in case of limited numbers, when the nature of the order indicates that an assortment of fruit for general purposes is desired more especially than a specific kind for some particular object. In such cases, unless otherwise directed, for any kind out of stock, when practicable, another of the same general character answering the same purpose will be substituted; also, should stock of a particular grade or size ordered be exhausted, the variety wanted will be supplied from the nearest approaching grade or size on hand.

GUARANTEE.—We sell our stock and warrant it true to name, with the express understanding that should mistakes occur and any prove not true to name, we will upon proper proof refund the money paid or refill the order free, but are not to be liable for damages other than herein named.

ERRORS.—Should such occur will be cheerfully rectified on proper evidence promptly furnished. All claims should be made within ten days from receipt of stock.

Each customer requesting the same will be given free of cost a "MANUAL ON ORCHARD PLANTING," containing careful directions for the laying out of orchards by the most advantageous methods, preparation of the soil, planting of trees, protection of same and other information of value to new settlers from distant localities and others not familiar with orchard operations in Southern California. NOTES ON NEW VARIETIES.

Extensive planting in any section, of varieties not tested by local experience, is not recommended. The favorite of one place very frequently proves of inferior value, if not practically worthless when grown in another a hundred, and sometimes even only a few miles distant.

Consequently, as a guide for local practice, no absolute dependence can be placed upon recommendations originating at a distance, no matter how well suited to the place of their origin or enticingly backed by samples there produced. Improvement in fruit however is constantly being effected-all our best were once new-and it is advised that a discreet trial be given those new kinds which from the best obtainable information give promise of adaptation. In this way results of ultimate great value are often indicated.

Among new varieties, continued experience warrants approval of the P. Barry Pear as a more reliable bearing substitute for Winter Nelis.

In Plums, Grelck for its extreme earliness and fine character, and Kelsey's Japan for extensive market planting.

"Champion" Quince as an improvement on the "Orange" variety.

The "White Adriatic" Fig as the best drying kind yet introduced,

In Peaches, Muir for drying, Purker's Seedling of San Diego origin and a most superior freestone, highly colored yellow fleshed market fruit commanding the very highest prices. Saucer for its earliness and unique form and flavor.

AN ACQUISITION

Of great promise will be first offered to the public next season (1889-90) in a seedling of the Saucer peach above referred to-possibly a hybrid with some other variety. This novelty, in time of blossoming and habit of tree maintains the characteristics of its parent, but the fruit is a white freestone several times larger, of the ordinary peach form and of delicate luscious flayor much superior to the Saucer. Ripening, as the original tree has done in this county, at the middle of June, it promises fruit at a time when there is nothing of its kind of equal merit to compete with it, and must prove of very high value.
