Frequently they give us preference on their new things as they did with "Ideal Darwins" and other new Tulips.

Chameleon Julips

Everyone knows the Cottage Tulip Picotee and is familiar with its habit of changing from white to pink and rose as the flower ages. The bloom of Picotee is rather small and its stem weak. By crossing and careful selecting there finally has been created the Chameleon Tulips. In form and strength they may be compared with the Darwin Tulip. But the fascinating changing of color from day to day has been retained and improved upon. Chameleon Tulips are offered on page 12. Include some in your collections this year and observe white Tulips change to pink and rose in a few days.

Chinese Lantern Julips

Especially Suited for Southern Gardens

Gorgeously colored globe-shaped Tulips which begin blooming when the Darwin Tulips are just about over. The flowers are of good size and richly colored in magnificent pastel shades of salmonpink, orange and peach, reflecting all the glorious shades of a sunset. When fully in bloom they resemble lighted Chinese lanterns. A point particularly in their favor is the splendid results they give in southern gardens where other Tulips often do not do well. They are offered in many choice varieties on page 8.

Multiflower Julips

Bunch-Flowered Tulips as they are frequently called produce from 4 to 6 flowers on one stem. For cutting this type is most satisfactory because it requires only 6 stems to fill a vase to overflowing. In habit and form they resemble the Hybrid Cottage Tulip, many lovely shades are found amongst them. They multiply freely and last a long time under reasonable care, are listed on page 11.

New Giant Breeder Tulips

Within the very near future we are afraid most of us will have to revise our idea about the size of Tulips. The Giant Breeders, when grown on reasonably good garden soil, will often reach a height of over 30 inches. The blooms are of enormous size carried boldly on stiff stems giving a most impressive and dignified effect in the garden. In our test garden they always create somewhat of a sensation. Their colors are rich but subdued, reminding one of rare old woods, old tapestries, and old gold. For pure dignity they are unequalled! Reve d'Or, Rayon d'Or, Dillenburg, Jessey, Thos. Stephenson, Augustus, are but a few. Golden Goblet was so popular along with the New Giant Breeders we could not fill all our orders last year.

The New Ideal Darwin Tulips

This strain or group of Darwin Tulips is the result of very skillful breeding. Through the reintroductions of the Wild Tulip blood, a new strain was developed with much greater strength than the old-fashioned Darwin Tulips possessed. The colors are sparkling and brilliantly clear. The dull, uninteresting flat tones and shadings so prevalent in the old Darwin Tulips are completely removed in the "Ideal Darwins."

Furthermore, this group contains many new shades such as yellow and also a fine lot of pure white varieties—these colors heretofore have not been obtainable in Darwins. The "Ideal Darwins" begin flowering from 4 to 5 days before the old Darwins, and these new varieties are in perfect condition when the old Darwins are fading or have gone. The flowers of the Ideal Darwins in most instances are 25 per cent to 30 per cent larger than the ordinary Darwin Tulips. Their strength of stem, rich, yet delicate clearness and brilliancy of color as well as the substance of the flower petals which seem to defy the hottest weather, makes this group one of the most worth-while contributions to your spring garden.

Ideal Tulips Adoration, Caroline Testout, Cote d'Azur, Glacier, Grullemans' Giant, Helen Gahagan, Insurpassable, Kriemhilde, La France, La Tosca, Mrs. Grullemans, Niphetos, Queen of England, Queen of the Night (which incidentally is the blackest Tulip in existence), and Scotch Lassie, are but a few of truly magnificent Tulips. It won't be many years before we will import them exclusively. Unfortunately, of many of these varieties stocks are limited. Where possible we have taken over the entire supply for this year. Our sales could be curtailed by increasing prices. This is not our policy, however. Therefore, order these new things as soon as you can. It is not pleasant for us to have to disappoint you by non-delivery.

Lack of space prevents us going into a detailed explanation of crosses of Tulipa Kaufmanniana and Darwin Tulips, resulting in the so-called Grullemanni Tulips, of which Inga Hume is an excellent example.

In every instance we import Top Size bulbs only. All Tulips wherever varieties permit bulbs are 13 cnmt. and over. Top Size Hyacinths are 19 cnmt. and over. Crocus, Scilla, Muscari, etc., etc., all are extra large size.

Leonard Barron's First Letter

It is rather hard for me to control my wild enthusiasm for the Ideal Tulips. I think they are just the finest things that can be put into the garden. The flowers are large, have all the character, dignity and sturdiness of the Darwins; in fact, they look like Darwins except (and here is the great point) that the colors are clear and gay. The Bybloems are queerly striped and feathered rose or violet on a white ground. The Bizarres have dark brown stripes and feathering on a yellow ground. They

flower about the same time as the Breeder and Darwin Tulips but do not grow quite so tall, and are seen at best advantage when planted in clumps in the herbaceous border or among evergreens and shrubs. They are above all sensational show Tulips. All form rare artistic beauty.

Multiflowered Tulips

Bunch-flowering or Multiflowered Tulips are a most interesting lot. Instead of producing the conventional single stem with one bloom on top the varieties offered under this heading all grow a strong main stem with from 3 to 6 branches, half way up the stem, each side shoot or branch carrying its own flower. The result is that 3 to 6 or sometimes 8 flowers are obtained from one bulb. All the

blooms are of good size, are gracefully spaced and as you can well imagine, produce an unusual effect and a great mass of color. The soil must be kept rich because if planted in poor ground they will not be as floriferous.

All the varieties offered are most attractive, some very unusual in their coloring.

Single Early Tulips

Few, if any, of the spring-blooming flowers rival the Single Early Tulips for brilliancy of bloom or ease of culture. They are excellent subjects for formal beds on the lawn or for garden borders. While they do not possess the same size of bloom and length of stem as the May-flowering Darwin, Breeder and Cottage varieties, they are used where earlier blooms are desired. Many of the varieties may be

forced in bloom in January, while all of them may be easily had in flower in pots late in February or early March.

Note: The letters A, B, and C following the varieties indicate their relative earliness of bloom, but, with few exceptions, most of the varieties bloom outdoors about the same time when planted in masses. The figures indicate the height in inches.

Autumn and Spring Flowering Crocus Species

Besides the Dutch Crocuses there are certain species that bloom very much earlier in the year, often before the snow has gone. The flowers of these wild sorts are smaller than those of the Dutch kinds but they are as vigorous and free as the others. Given a sunny position in the rock garden or a sheltered position in grass where the sun may encourage them freely, they will surprise you by their hardy appearance in the face of cold and storms.

Crocus Imperati, pale lilac with buff jacket, often flowers in late February, and is closely followed by Crocus Sieberi, a fuller purer mauve sort; it has as a companion the deep rich yellow Crocus Susianus, which is even more attractive in the bud stage with its dark, rich brown flowers on the exterior of the segments. Once planted, they will take care of themselves for many years. Then comes Crocus Tommasinianus, an exquisite vaselike form, in color varying from a pale mauve to quite a rich purple. This variation is one of its great attractions. These all increase as freely as do the Dutch varieties.

Culture: These Hyacinths should be planted from 6 to 10 inches apart, and covered with at least 4 inches of soil from the top of the bulb. For beds or borders close to the conservatory or dwelling, 6 inches will make a fine display; but where the beds are planted to be viewed from a distance, they may be planted 10 inches apart. Hyacinths planted alternately with Narcissi produce a most graceful effect, and for this combination 6 inches from bulb to bulb is also a very suitable distance. It is advisable to cover, after the bulbs have been planted, with leaves or some heavy material that will prevent them from freezing or being affected by early spring frosts after they have started. Hyacinths, as well as Narcissi, should be planted by November first in this latitude, as they are the better for early planting. Tulips may be planted up to December first, weather permitting.

- *Silver Star. \$1.55 pcr 12; \$11.00 per 100. Perfect broad-petaled, star-shaped perianth of pure cream-white, with finely proportioned, wide mouthed trumpet of primrose, changing to cream-white, just a shade deeper than the perianth; extra fine and free flowering. (Color illustration, page L).

Triandrus Hybrids

Particularly Recommended in This Class is Moonshine.

Division 5: These are the cyclamen-flowered Daffodils with reflexing perianth. The flowers are more or less drooping, of elegant form and graceful habit.

- *Agnes Harvey. \$1.75 per 12; \$12.00 per 100. A most dainty Daffodil of drooping habit, 1 to 3 flowers on a stem; white starry perianth with Triandrus type trumpet, of the same color, sometimes flushed faint apricot. A wonderful flower for naturalizing, especially near water, and also for cutting; desirable in every way. (Color illustration, page N).

Division 6: Cyclamineus blood like that of Triandrus, imparts such a distinct form to Daffodils, that a separate division has been made for its hybrids, which have trumpets of rich yellow, straight and tube-like, and perianths reflexed as in a Cyclamen; very early flowering.

- *February Gold. \$1.45 per 12; \$10.25 per 100. Perianth golden yellow, trumpet tinged orange, very early. (Color illustration, page L).
 - March Sunshine. \$3.75 per 12; \$27.50 per 100. Smaller than February Gold and more adapted for rock garden planting.

Narcissus Jonquilla

Odorus Orange Queen.

A very striking variety, 2 to 3 flowers on a stem, color intense golden orange, cup prettily fluted. Delightful Jonquil fragrance. The flowers are produced in the greatest profusion on wiry stems about level with the tops of the strong but not coarse foliage; truly a Daffodil for every garden and the gayest of the lot, large or small.

Division 7: Hybrid Jonquils with two or more, small, very fragrant flowers on one stem.

*Campernelle, Single.

A tiny golden Daffodil with tips of pointed grass-like foliage reaching above the flowers; the broad overlapping petals make a nicely rounded perianth; frequently three blooms on a stalk; a delightful little flower.

Campernelle, Double.

Two to three golden yellow, small, fragrant flowers on strong stems; lovely for cutting. Height 13 inches.

Division 8: All Poetaz are hybrids from Poeticus Ornatus and Polyanthus Narcissi. The plants are tall and vigorous growers, bearing heads of large, well formed flowers, deliciously fragrant. There is no better group for indoor culture in flats, pots or bowls, while if planted in time, their hardiness outdoors leaves nothing to be desired.

Particularly Recommended in This Class is Bulbocodium Conspicuus.

The following are charming little subjects for rock work, where their dainty flowers are seen to perfection. They should be left undisturbed for years, and if happy, will soon establish themselves and afford a lovely picture in early spring. All the Bulbocodium (except Monophyllus) and the Cyclamineus like moisture, and should, there-

fore, be planted at the foot of the rockery. Bulbocodium monophyllus flourishes in a warm, dry sheltered situation planted in almost pure sand. Triandrus Albus (Angel's Tears) and Juncifolius delight in partial shade and a light, gritty soil, and should be given a well drained position.

become as populous as the tents of the patriarchs.



*Auratum (Gold-Banded Japan Lily).

*Auratum platyphyllum.

Martagon album. Each, 90c; \$9.00 per 12. There are few more beautiful things than the white Martagon Lily. The appearance of these Lilies is graceful and delightful in the extreme. On slender stems 4 and 5 feet high, the numerous drooping, waxlike, white Turk's Cap flowers, with yellow tipped stamens, look fascinating. The small flowers are symmetrical in shape, with reflexed petals and are borne in pyramid-shaped clusters.

Monadelphum szovitzianum. Each, 60c; \$6.00 per 12. One of the finest Lilies and not difficult to grow. It reaches a height of 4 to 6 feet. As many as 20 flowers are borne on one stem of established bulbs, forming pyramid-shaped clusters. The flowers are drooping and of a thick waxlike texture, regularly recurved. They vary from a pale citron-yellow to deep yellow. The first season planted, it sometimes does not show much growth above the ground, but the following season it will grow freely. It dislikes being transplanted. Early June flowering.



We know these will grow without trouble and surely bloom within two years. These young roots are unnamed but are the same varieties as offered above. It will be well worth your while to plant a few of these healthy young roots for growing on.



Scilla - Squill

The rich dark blue of Scilla bifolia and the bright blue of Scilla sibirica in early spring render them invaluable for edgings or for massing in flower beds and borders. As they bloom so early in the year, it is advisable to give them a sunny location. They are not particular about the soil in which they grow. They are ideal for the

wild garden but they are not to be despised in the border, especially if they are left alone for 2 or 3 years without being disturbed in any way. They are splendid in the rock garden. Never plant less than 12 to 18 bulbs in a clump.

PLANTING: The table above shows the number of plants or bulbs required to fill a circular bed of the dimensions given. In planting, begin at outside row—where 6 inches apart, 3 inches from edge of bed; where 12 inches apart, 6 inches from edge of bed. It is customary among professionals in planting a bed to set the plants or bulbs somewhat closer together in the two outer rows, giving more space between each plant or bulb toward the center of the bed. A square bed will take about the same number of plants. For an oval bed, add length and breadth and divide by two. For example, an oval 9 feet long by 7 feet wide will require the same number of plants as a circular bed 8 feet in diameter.






