Peace, Liberty and Love

The Aspirations of President Baba

The reporter called on Mr. Tsunego Baba at Mr. Hirashima's No. 2237 Sakurayama, Zushi, Yokosuka City, and was told about his aspirations as follows:

"The press must not be possessed by the military clique, the financial magnates or the bureaucrats. Neither the president nor the share-holders should own it, while it must not be considered as the workers' private property. But it should be the common instrument of the public. I never doubt that it is a possession of the general readers. The press must aim at nothing but service for the readers. President Pulitzer of the American newspaper, "The World," made it his motto that "The press reporter's master is nobody but the readers." I also have no other idea than to serve our readers in my capacity as president. Service for the readers means nothing but democracy. We must serve wholeheartedly for the development of democracy in Japan and for the interest of our readers, that is, the general public. I believe that there is no real democracy where there is no love. It is the same with the international relations; without mutual sympathy and understanding, true world peace cannot be realized. Where there is no peace, there is neither democracy nor liberty. Looking for peace, liberty and love, I want to do my best as president for the establishment of democracy in the regenerated Japan."

New president Baba was born in Okayama Prefecture in Meiji 8 (1875). Was educated at Doshisha University and in the political department of Waseda University. He worked with the "Japan Times" for a while, and then went to U.S.A., where he took an active part for four years as the chief editor of the "Oriental Review", an English weekly edition, and the "Japan Times", a daily in New York City. Coming home he joined the "Kokumin Shimbun" and held the chair of the chief of the political section and later the chief editor. He retired from the press in Taisho 13 (1924) when Mr. Soho Tokutomi became the president of it. Ever since, up to the present, he has been adhering to his principle as a liberalistic critic. He was writing for the "Sunday review" of our press for about five years since Shows 9 (1934), but after the outbreak of the China Incident, he was taken exception to by the military. Moreover he was barred from writing at all after the outbreak of the present war, and the only book permitted to be published is his masterpiece "Ito Hakubun", published in 1943. He stood aloof from the extreme current of militarism by amusing himself with composing Japanese odes
