for local auto owners. Many hundreds of auto parties are polishing off the summer with a last-minute run to one of the national parks, usually Sequoia or Yellowstone. General Grant and Yosemite are also having a large number of late visitors, according to the auto club touring bureau.

Rush to Mountains In San Diego, San Bernardino, San Luis Obispo and Ventura couties there is an unusual rush for the mountain districts, it is stated. Orange. Riverside, Imperial and Kern counties are favoring the beaches. Los Angeles and Tulare are sending large numbers of motorists on even longer trips, into Oregon and Washington as well as Arizona.

Suggestions for September tours are now ready at all Auto club county offices, it is just an-nounced. Motorists who wish to take early fall trips will have plenty of suggestions offered them if they apply at once.

Last year local motorists were principally concerned in visiting beaches and resorts within a short distance of home, but true to form, this has been a "long dis tance" year. Every other year in southern California finds motorists going further and further from home.

SACRAMENT.O, Sept. 2.- The registration of automobiles in California has increased 136,385 since July 31, 1921. This is shown by a report made public by Director C. J. Chenu of the State Motor Vehicle department. Chenu's report shows there were 708,097 automobiles registered for the period

February 1 to July 31, 1922, as against 571,712 for the corresponding period in 1921. In the 1922 period there were registered 35,187 trucks, 14,266 motorcycles and 3,935 trailers. In a similar period in 1921 there were registered 32,216 trucks and 15,752 motorcycles.

The report shows Los Angeles far outdistances any other city in the state in the registration of cars, there being a total of 239,739 automobiles registered from that city. It also exceeds in the number of trucks, registering 10,935. It has also more motorcycles, registering 4,618, and is supreme in the case of trailers, with 1,380.

San Francisco is the nearest competitor, registering 58,896 automobiles, 4,977 trucks, 1,187 motorcycles and 1,781 trailers.

Sacramento has 18,644 automobiles, 1,206 trucks, 420 motorcycles and 89 trailers.

Editor Issues Warnings for Motorists: Certain Things Make Endless Trouble

At this time of year many thouands of our fellow countrymen are embarking in their cars and setting forth on more or less. lengthy tours. An admirable custom, but if the tour is to be a really enjoyable one, there are a number of pieces of advice the tourist should heed.

To begin with as to speed. "Not too fast" is the first rule. An even, conservative touring gait will get the traveler farther and enable him to see more and get greater enjoyment from his trip than bursts of speed, interspaced with stops to repair damages. Twentyfive or thirty miles per hour at most is a consistent touring speed.

Fear Tire Trouble

Of course, tire trouble is the great bugaboo of the motor tourist. Be sure, therefore, that you start with good tires, two spares and tubes, enough for emergencies. Reasonable speed conserves the tires. The casings get hot enough in any event, and excessive speed sends the temperature up rapidly, with blowouts inevi-

Electrical troubles are also a source of endless annoyance to the touring motorist. Therefore start tery should be fully charged and the car and extra fuses to fit the road

A vigilant eye on the gasoline tank is also necessary in touring. More halts by the roadside are induced by an empty fuel tank than by any other single cause. Al-Taxicab drivers in Atlantic City, ways keep the tank more than half full.

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COAL PRODUCTION

Recent developments in the coal industry of the United States lend interest to some figures of world coal production and consumption presented by the Trade Record of the National City Bank of New York. They show that the United States which has more than one-half of the underground coal of the world supplied 42^{1/2} per cent of the world's coal output from the beginning of the war to the end of 1920 as against an annual average of about 38 per cent in the years preceding the war. In 1921, however, with the big fall off in our own output, we supplied but about 40 per cent of the world's coal production, though in the immediately preceding year, 1920, our share of world production was 45 per cent.

GOVERNMENT ACCEPTS Secretary of the Interior Fall has announced that he has accepted the bid offered by the Eagle-Pitcher Lead company for

lead and zinc mining leases covering Quapaw Indian lands in Ottawa county, Okla. The leases have been the subject of much controversy and the final action of the Interior Department was awaited with interest by mining interests.

The Eagle-Pitcher company had leased the properties pre-viously from persons who had made original contracts with the Indian allottees. The department found that the company received seventeen and one-half per cent from the operators and paid twelve and one-half per cent to the lessees of the first instance, who, in turn, paid five per cent royalty to the Indian owners. This system was condemned by offi-cials.
