SIONARY —Townsend's Select Missionfor Southern growers. It is this variety that you see on the fancy fruit stands in the Northern markets from Thanksgiving to March 15th every year. Large blood red juicy berries that sell from 50 cents to over \$1.00 per quart. It is the berry that put Florida on the map as a strawberry state. We introduced this variety to the State of Florida in 1908. Since that time we have shipped probably 100,000,000 plants into that State, and to date it is growing stronger than ever. Few varieties have been sent out that has kept the faith so long a time. We begin to ship plants into Florida about October 1st for the main crop of fruit, and again shipping starts in January for plant propagating for those wishing to grow their own stock plants.

Champion K. —This variety hails from Tennessee; is said to be the earliest berry to ripen there, being ten days ahead of Klondyke. Fruit medium in size, firm and of very good quality for so early a berry. Plants make a strong matted row and should be restricted for best results. We recommend it for trial where an extra early variety is wanted.

Lord Salisbury is of the Klondyke type; a good plant maker and vigorous grower; fruit medium to large in size; very solid; extra good quality for home use or commercial purposes. Will outyield the Klondyke. Should be grown by every commercial grower throughout the Southern States. Introduced by us four years ago-with our guarantee to please or money refunded.

The New Prince —For the southern half of the country the Prince is a grand money making variety. A strong hardy grower of the Missionary type, of which it is a seedling. Fruit medium to extra large, very dark red in color, and of excellent quality. Good for home use or market. Exceedingly productive. Not recommended for the Northern states.

RED GOLD (Per)—An extra early variety, very productive of medium to large good quality fruit; a strong healthy plant maker, and a variety that will grow well on most any soil. We have watched this variety very closely for two years, and while we cannot agree with all the originator says of it, we feel that it is a variety worthy of a trial. Were it not for Premier and the Fruitland, we would feel like recommending it more strongly; however it seems to be a favorite with some of our good customers, and they have asked us for the plants for the past 2 years.



ST. LOUIS -The largest extra early berry grown. A strong hardy grower, and a valuable variety for home or distant market. Will grow on just ordinary soil and produce big crops of extra large good quality berries. We recommend it for all sections where such an early variety is wanted. The crop can be harvested and gone before Premier gets under way. Fruit will average larger than Premier, about same shape, a little lighter in

DR. BURRILL -The Million Dollar Strawberry of the Dunlap family, Dr. Burrill is to the North and West what the Klondyke is to the South and East. Will grow on most any soil under most any conditions. Really the lazy man's berry. Commercial growers in many parts of the country plant more largely to Dr. Burrill than any other variety. On account of its long-rooted habit it does better in the very dry sections than any other variety in a dry season. Fruit medium in size, rich dark to very dark red when fully ripe; quality excellent, and very productive.

KLONDYKE (Per). — Improved strain. Same as the old standard except improved thru plant selection. One of the most valuable varieties for the South and Southwestern States. Townsends strain of Klondyke plants has been known for over 20 years as the best money could buy. And will produce from two to three times as much fruit as the common grown Southern Klondyke. Many of the largest Associations send to us every year for Good Klondyke plants.

### Medium Early Varieties

COOPER —Where soil and conditions are right, Cooper is a favorite fancy market variety. We have seen crops of these berries that would average larger than any other variety, often 27 berries filling a quart. Cooper is exceedingly productive; good firm quality, mild and sweet. Has a rough appearance. Berries not as uniform in shape as many growers wish, but where an extra large irregular shaped berry is wanted Cooper will fill the bill. Plants extra large and hold fruit well off the ground. Every season finds us sold out on Cooper plants.

-One of the heaviest producers. Laton Large, uniform in size and color, rich dark red clear through. Its flavor and quality is the very best, and is considered by most growers who have grown it to be almost perfect. Its firmness makes it a favorite with distant shippers. More Eaton should be grown in all producing sections.

Haverland -An old-time variety; very Has given away to Premier. Planted now only by a few growers who have soil suited to it.

Lady Corneillie (Per). — This variety originated in the South. It is a grand variety in many sections. We have received several very good reports and many large orders for the plants in different sections of the country. Rapid plant maker; very productive of medium red shiny berries of good quality; firm enough to ship across the continent.

Senator Dunlap —Is favorably known throughout the country as a medium early variety that has made profits for thousands of growers. Until the introduction of Premier, Dunlap was the standard variety in most sections. Fruits large, crops of medium sized good quality berries. Suitable for home use or market. Sure to please.

### The Aberdeen

The Aberdeen has been grown in New Jersey, Pennsylvania and New York states for several years and has proven almost a gold mine on account of its great productiveness, attractive color and good quality. It is moderately firm and therefore cannot be recommended for Southern states where the haul is a great distance. But for all Eastern and Northern growers we recommend it as a most worthy variety.



### Medium Late Varieties

AROMA
—One of the very best medium late standard varieties for nearly all sections. Many of the large growers and Associations plant Aroma only. Aroma is a clean hardy growing plant. Does well on most soils. Fruit large deep red with excellent quality either for home use or market. We are always headquarters for best grade of Aroma plants. Townsend's strain of Aroma has produced over 10,000 quarts per acre where the average yield in same locality was less than 3500 quarts.

Gibson —A valuable berry in some localities, but not a universal variety. In most sections it produces a big crop of inferior fruit. Too soft for long-distance shipment. Its big yields is about all that can be truthfully said of Gibson. Gibson was originated in Wicomico County, Md., under the name of Parson's Beauty. It is also known as Pocomoke.

Marshall —Marshall is medium season; it does well when soil and conditions are right. Fruit large, firm and good quality. Not very productive.

Nic Ohmer —A very valuable variety for home use or market. Fruit large, firm and sweet. Not very productive.

PARSON'S BEAUTY—See description of Gibson.

Paul Jones —Paul Jones is one of the most productive varieties grown. Fruit medium in size and very firm. Quality ordinary for table use. But where a berry is wanted that will grow anywhere and turn out the quarts, Paul Jones is a good one to tie to. Color is a bright rich red; berries slightly pointed, and run uniform in size, holding up well throughout the season. Should be fruited with Big Joe, Ford or some good perfect flowering of same season.

Sample —Sample has been on the list a good long time and still in demand. Fruit medium to large, bright red, ordinary quality; fairly productive. Should be fruited with Big Joe, Ford or Lupton, equal rows to do its best.

Gold Mine —Gold Mine is a medium late variety, with excellent quality; very firm and sweet fruit, large to very large, moderately productive. A strong plant maker on most soils and worthy of a trial where a good medium late berry is wanted.

hills. We have never seen a rust blemish on any Ford plant in ten years growing it, and never heard of a crop failure. Plant Ford and you will not go astray.





Gandy must be planted on low springy soil to do its best. When conditions are right Gandy is a valuable variety, as it has size, quality and appearance.

Lupton —A very large handsome berry and an excellent shipper. Compares in size with Chesapeake. Very attractive in appearance and a good seller on all markets. Makes plenty of strong vigorous plants. Not quite as productive as Chesapeake, but will hold size longer and nearly every berry good perfect one.

McALPINE—A very late valuable variety for high sandy soil. Does better on this kind of soil than any late berry we know of. Fruit medium in size, very prolific, and of excellent quality.

PEARL—This is said to be the latest strawberry on the market and insures a big crop of late berries that usually bring good prices. It blooms freely and opens its buds very late, generally late enough to avoid all late frosts. The berries are enormous. of very dark red with prominent yellow seeds, remarkably firm. Comes into bearing very late in June or July in the North.

HERE are so many different methods of growing Strawberries that it is useless to set down any special rule for our customers. Most any soil that will grow good garden truck will produce good berries. Strawberries usually grow well after garden crops, also Potatoes, Soy Beans and Cow Peas. It is best to plow land late in the fall or very early in spring, and work over lightly with smoothing harrows just before plants are set.

Any method of setting plants is all right, just so the roots are set straight and same depth they were grown. Every plant should be practically level with the soil after being set out.

Often and very shallow cultivation is the rule, keeping all weeds and grass out during the entire growing season.

### **FERTILIZATION**

FERTILIZATION

If the soil is a good rich garden soil no fertilizer is required for the newly set plants. If the soil is thin we can recommend nothing better than raw bone meal—400 pounds per acre broadcast in the drill before the row is made up.

Frequent applications of any good fertilizer or fine barnyard manure may be sprinkled around the plants during the growing season. Chicken manure is one of the best for top dressing, but should be used sparingly, or mixed with good rich soil, as too much at one time will injure the plants. Never use a fertilizer with any potash in the mixture directly under the plants. This will be sure to kill most of them.

Potash mixtures may be applied after plants are set out without injury if not put directly on plants.

### PERFECT AND IMPERFECT VARIETIES

VARIETIES

(See photographs herewith)
When an imperfect flowering variety is used for the main crop a perfect flowering variety of the same season should be planted at least every fourth to fifth row. This method insures proper polinization at fruiting time. For instance, if you plant Townsend's Big Late, you should set every fourth row to Ford.

at fruiting time. For instance, if you plant Townsend's Big Late, you should set every fourth row to Ford, Townking, Chesapeake or some other good late perfect flowering variety.

Setting Plants After Sod Land. If no other site for the berry patch is handy, this may be done if the sod land is plowed early in the fall and limed. Allowed to stand in the rough during the winter, most of the grub worms that live in the sod will be winter-killed and the soil ean be put in good condition the following spring by plenty harrowing and smoothing. Some grubs will be left, and you will lose some plants; but I have known elegant crops to be grown on such soil. to be grown on such soil.

to be grown on such soil.

Distance Apart to Set Plants. Usually the rows are made three to four feet apart, depending on the variety and the cultural methods to be followed. Many growers plant in cheek rows at this time 30 inches one way, 36 the other way, and set plant in each check mark. And cultivate both ways for a time, using the Kruegers circle runner cutter. This is the least expensive way to grow berries, and the fruit is always larger and firmer, as it gets plenty sunshine and roots have more room to gather moisture. The old standard way is usually to mark rows three and a half feet apart, set plants from 15 inches to two feet apart, depending on the variety, and let the plants form a matted row. This method requires lots of hand work in pulling weeds during the growing season, as the first plants formed are left to root and multiply

the matted row. Some varieties do very well this way—like Chesapeake, Town King, Big Joe, and Premier. Other varieties, like Dunlap, Ford, Mc-Alpine often make too many plants for the matted row system, and fruit is smaller than it should be. These varieties should be set wider in the row and kept thinged out. kept thinned out.

### TIME TO PLANT

Early spring is the most logical, natural, and most successful time to set Strawberry Plants, Don't neglect to set some Strawberry Plants this spring—thinking you can make it up by summer or fall planting. It can't be done, unless you have some growing on your own plantation that you can transplant.



HOW TO REMIT. Money Order, Registered Letter, or Check—do not send loose currency. We will ship C.O.D. when one-fourth cash accompanies the order.

TIME OF SHIPMENT. We commence to ship plants October 15th and ship all winter to sections where the conditions are suitable for fall and winter planting, and up to May 1st. We will fill orders up to May 30th, but at purchaser's risk only after May 1st. We will also fill a limited number of orders during September at 50% above list prices so as to accommodate our customers only.

25 PLANTS. All Strawberry Plants are tied twenty-five to a bundle and labeled. We make no extra charge for packing.

TRUE-TO-NAME.
