

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN.

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE TOWN OF MILFORD:

We hereby submit our report for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1924, with an itemized account of the expenditures of the various departments under our supervision.

### HIGHWAYS.

The report of the highway surveyor, who has exclusive control of the ordinary repairs of highways, town ways, streets, sidewalks and bridges, will be found under a separate heading.

We recommend that a reasonable amount of money be appropriated for highways, town ways, streets, sidewalks and bridges so that they may be kept in proper condition.

Cedar street from the end of the 1923 layout to Dilla street was rebuilt during the year 1924 under the supervision of the Department of Public Works, Division of Highways.

As the final estimate of the work done by the contractor has not been as yet received from the Division of Highways, we are unable to determine the amount of money expended under the contract.

If a balance remains after the final estimate we recommend that it be used to improve the condition of this highway in front of the old Catholic cemetery, provided that the Division of Highways approve of such action.

#### CENTRAL STREET DRAIN.

The work on the Central street drain, for which the town appropriated a sum of money, has been completed, and it is hoped that the installing of this drain will relieve the Milford Shoe Co. plant from damage to their stock by water backing into their cellar.

### CARE OF TREES.

We recommend that a reasonable amount of money be ad-

propriated for the care of shade trees and the planting of young trees.



Maintenance account this year is in excess of last as was to be expected in some degree at least, due to the necessary care of the additional disposal plant, and on face of the above, returns show an increase of Six Hundred Seventeen Dollars and Eight Cents (\$617.08). Three Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$350.00) is for land taking which was unusual and unforeseen, but was paid on advice of Town Counsel and our own best judgment, in order to avoid present and future expense on roadway, but this amount is practically offset by the unpaid bills of Two Hundred Seventy-Five Dollars and Eighty-Four Cents (\$275.84), so that additional expense is about Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00.)

Unpaid bills of the construction account amount to Five Hundred Thirty Three Dollars and Fifty-Three Cents (\$533.-53), making total unpaid bills of the department Eight Hundred Nine Dollars and Thirty-seven Cents (\$809.37,) which

were incurred through a misunderstanding of the availability of the amount returned to this department by the Charles R. Gow Company, of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000 00), and due to the ruling of the Town Treasurer it could not be used by this department.

In reference to the construction of the additional disposal plant, reference is made to the report of the Engineer bereto appended.

We recommend for the coming year the following appropriations:

# Report of Engineers to Sewerage Commission.

Boston, Mass., January 16, 1925.

Dear Sirs :-

We respectfully submit the following statement of operations during the past year in connection with construction of additional sewage disposal plant.

As you know, the original contract for constructing the additional disposal plant was terminated by the acceptance by your board of the contribution of \$1000 made by the C. R. Gow Company early in the year, as their share of costs of completing the work.

In view of the character and amount of work remaining to be completed, it was decided by you to complete this work with local labor, consequently, in May, an agreement between the Town of Milford and Marbel Mainini was entered into, whereby Mr. Mainini was to receive a fixed weekly wage and 10 per cent of amount paid by him for labor employed in the completion of construction.

About the middle of August, the question of the right to use the \$1,000 contributed by the C. R. Gow Company for their share of the cost of completing the construction was raised and as this amount formed a considerable part of the available funds and as Mr. Mainini had about completed all the work he could do at that time, orders were given to stop work.

On September 4, we were advised by letter from your board that the \$1000 received from the C. R. Gow Company would not be available for expenditure in completing the construction, a vote of the town being necessary to authorize its use for this purpose.

The additional disposal plant, is therefore, not completed at this time, and we are informed that the construction ac-

count fund is exhausted. It appears, therefore, that a statement of the estimated cost to complete construction necessary to place this plant in complete working condition is now in order.

Based upon recent observations and estimates, it appears that in addition to the amount contributed by the Gow Company, which, in our judgment, can only be used for the completion of construction of the plant, that \$2500 will be necessary to finish the work.

We, therefore, recommend that the above stated amount of money be raised so that the additional disposal plant may be completed as quickly as possible.

# REPORT OF THE TOWN LIBRARY.

The Trustees of the Library respectfully submit the following:

Since the last annual report we have suffered the loss of our faithful chairman, Patrick E. Sweeney. Mr. Sweeney had been a member of the Library Trustees for a number of years and was especially well equipped and keenly interested in the library work.

During the past year the library circulation has increased over all previous years the circulation for 1924 being over 52,000 books. Records show an increase of 17,417 in the circulation in five years. This large increase in the circulation has required the addition of more assistants to the library staff.

The Reading Room was visited by 10,000 people during the year just closed, which shows that nearly every inhabitant of the town visited there once.

We are pleased to note the interest shown by our school children in obtaining books and feel that much good has been derived. As the year 1925 advances we hope the teachers will encourage further reading.

Miss Louise Jones of the State Department of Libraries visited the library twice and made several suggestions most of which have been carried out. The library was painted and thoroughly cleaned during the summer and we are well pleased with its appearance.

As the Library circulation increases we are naturally confronted with more demands in order to cope with the situation and in this report we shall mention some of them. More money is needed for salaries of the Librarian and his assistants. More books are needed. The library should be open daily, and a part of the library should be set off as a Children's Room.

# REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

To the Trustees of the Town Library:

Gentlemen:—I submit herewith the sixty-sixth annual report of the Library for the year ending December 31, 1924.

Again I am pleased to report an increased circulation in spite of the fact that the Library was closed from August 10 to August 21 for necessary repairs.

The Library was open 296 days. Circulation for the year was 52,478 volumes, as against 51,048 in 1923, 46,521 in 1922 and 44,203 in 1921; an increase for the current year of 1430 volumes.

Largest daily circulation, February 23, was 390 volumes. Smallest daily circulation, August 30, was 14 volumes. Average daily circulation was 177 1/3 volumes. Amount received for fines was \$200.20, which was paid the Town Treasurer, according to State Law. Notices sent delinquents, 396; number of new cards issued, 504; visitors to reading room, 10,558.

The Library contains, as per catalogue, 22,994 volumes, 301 having been added during the year; by purchase 241 volumes, by gifts 60 volumes. There have also been purchased 432 volumes to replace those worn out, mostly in Fiction and Juvenile Departments. donors were Miss Annie Daniels, 11 volumes; State of Massachusetts, 12 volumes; United States Government, 7 volumes; Estate of Benjamin F. Butler, 6 volumes; Chemical Foundation, 3 volumes; Boni and Liveright, 2 volumes; and the following 1 volume each, MacMillan Company, Jewish Publishing Company, Richard H. Badger, B. A. # REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

Comparatively speaking the contagious and infectious diseases reported in 1924, vary but little from the previous year. One case of rabies occurred, but the strict quarantine of suspicious acting canines and the muzzling order issued by the Selectmen undoubtedly prevented other cases of the dread disease. One case of sleeping sickness, (encephalitis lethargica) was reported in March, and one of infantile paralysis in November, and fortunately no others occurred.

There were 45 cases of scarlet fever reported to the Health Dept. and undoubtedly as many more unreported, either through carelessness of the parents in not reporting as the statutes demand or classifying the rash as "merely stomach trouble." These unreported and unrecognized cases often lead to the more serious types of the disease, and also to the spread of the infection to others with whom they come in contact. The close co-operation of the school physician, Supt. of Schools, teachers and school nurse with the Board has been of untold assistance.

It is my belief that the reason that so many whooping cough cases are not promptly reported is due to the condition at the onset resembling a cold or bronchitis and by the time its true type is realized much damage in the way of the spreading of the disease has occurred.

While we were fortunate in not having many cases of diphtheria even these might have been prevented had they been Schicked, and then given the toxin-antitoxin treatment, which has been used so successfully in surrounding towns, and in the schools of Boston by Dr. Ceconi. The State Board of Health laboratory is

at present working on a method similar to one used in England, and especially perfected by Australian Health authorities, whereby immunization doses of a Toxoid may be used, doing away with the necessity of Schicking. When this is perfected it will be one of the most wonderful achievements of preventive medicine, and by its use we will be able to reduce diphtheria mortality to a zero.

October 14th notice was received of a case of typhoid fever and within forty-eight hours two other cases in the same family. All three were removed to the hospital as the hygienic home conditions were very bad and there were five more in the family. Immediately steps were taken to trace its source, by examining the farm and the help where they secured their milk, but all were negative. The mother, apparently in perfect health, proved to be the carrier. The rest of the family were given the prophylactic vaccine and the mother carefully watched and instructed how to protect her family. The Board recommended to the Sewer Board that the sewer should be extended on this street.

During July several persons were afflicted with what resembled "Flu," in fact had all the characteristic symptoms of "Flu malaria" and "Paratyphoid." Drs. Bigelow and Ohler of the State Dept. came out in consultation on these cases, examined blood, urine and feces and they were diagnosed as Influenza.

The Dept. of Public Welfare has already launched its ten-year program to endeavor to eradicate Pul. T. B. by discovering it in its incipiency. A motor truck has been equipped with an X-Ray and all necessary equipment for developing the plate after the picture is taken. There is a specialist in charge with his assistants.

By the co-operation of the School Authorities and the Health Board this travelling clinic may be available for our school children, and many incipient or Hilum cases discovered. This early discovery will prevent the adult types of the disease, and is another step in preventive medicine, and will save countless human lives.

The examination if properly carried out should begin with the teacher, for if tubercular, she is as much a source of infection as a pupil. Other defects will also be noted, such as enlarged tonsils, bronchitis, heart, or enlarged thyroid glands. Goitre is especially prevalent in some of our western towns, and it is noticed in girls more especially between the ages of 12—18.

# REPORT OF INSPECTOR OF WIRES.

TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF SELECTMEN: -

I would submit the following report of the Wire Inspection Department for 1924, the tenth year of the service.

The inspections of interior wiring for the year 1924 were as follows:—

Certificates issued for

107 meters in 94 finished buildings,

53 meters in 39 new buildings,

21 new buildings rough wired and not completed,

32 changes and additions to existing installations.

The actual number of visits of inspection would average nearly two per installation, which indicates the volume of work. A large number of inspections and conferences, both personally and by telephone, which were of an advisory nature, were quite an important part of the business of the office.

It will be noted that 59 new or reconstructed buildings were wired during the year, showing a better condition in building construction than has existed since the beginning of the World War.

Two rather extensive installations in factories have been completed and two others are in process of coastruction.

Some important changes in the "National Electrical Code" have accomplished further development and improvement in construction standards, and will add to the safety of apparatus, both from fire and personal safety standpoint.

There has been a steady and rapid growth in the business of the Milford Electric Light & Power Co. and the New England Telephone and Telegraph Co, calling for several extensions of lines and increase of capacity of equipment.

A large number of replacements of poles have been made

and the lines are at present in very good condition. The policy of joint ownership of poles by the three public service corporations is being extended with a great improvement in appearance and safety of many streets.

# REPORT OF INSPECTOR OF ANIMALS.

HON. BOARD OF SELECTMEN:-

Gentlemen:—In submitting my annual report as Inspector of Animals I wish to state that I have examined some 500 head of cattle and swine, and found them, in general, in good condition and free from contagious diseases. During the year I have received from the Department of Animal Industry, communications notifying me of general and national outbreaks of various types of infectious and contagious diseases, but locally we have been free of all.

We were unfortunate in having an outbreak of rabies among our dogs, in which three positive cases resulted after the first of September. There were many more cases reported, but either not positive or were destroyed without examination. But one case of a child being bitten by a rabid animal and that a positive case, shows that the quarantine established and kept on 90 days was an effective means of stopping a serious outbreak, both to human beings and domestic animals

It is evident that the best method of prevention from further outbreaks of this kind is for each owner of dogs to prevent their animals from getting the roaming habit and straying away, so as not to come in contact with animals who might develop this disease and transmit it to their dog.

Success has been had in making collection of some moneys due the town, and there has been recovery, in whole or in part, for assistance furnished by the Overseers of the Poor and Board of Health in cases where it has been established that the recipient has been able to pay.

No new actions have been brought against the town.

I sincerely thank all boards and officials for the aid, courtesy and consideration extended to this department.





Reference to the foregoing attendance forecast, made by the method in use for a number of years,the accuracy of which has been vindicated by events year after year,—indicates for next September, a High School attendance of nearly 550, a Stacy School attendance of over 450, two extra rooms needed for fifth and sixth grades, a still more acute situation in the High School, calling for a continuance of the double platoon in that school as well as in two or three grades. The attendance in the public schools has increased since the opening of the Stacy School, 300 full time pupils, taking no account of from 80 to 150 part-time Continuation School pupils. An attendance of over 3,000 full time pupils for September, 1925 and of 3,100 for September, 1926,—about the earliest date we could hope to open a new building—is conservative. In the High School, an attendance of 533 is indicated for September, 1925, and of nearly 600 for September, 1926, the earliest date at which we could hope to open a new building. This all means a High School working to meet State requirements and the life needs of the children in a building only 46%, 38% and finally 32% large enough, working on double platoons, with shortened sessions, to the considerable sacrifice of the pupils' interests and to the inconvenience of everybody

concerned. The story of the increase in our school population is a story common to cities and growing towns. The ever increasing enrollments and growing degree of overcrowding means decreased efficiency, and accounts for the growing number of retarded and over-age pupils, with the staggering costs in money entailed by keeping large numbers of pupils in school one, two and three years longer than would otherwise have been necessary.

# PROPOSED ADDITION TO THE HIGH SCHOOL

A need for more school room in Milford, particularly for more room in the High School grade is fully recognized and plans are under way for a considerable addition to the present High School Building. Mr. Robert Allen Cook, who designed the present High School, has spent some time upon the problem and has produced a plan which solves more problems, and that for a longer time in the future, than any other that has been suggested, and seems to offer the town a High School unit of which it will be proud, a building effective, according to modern practice, and to be realized at a reasonable cost.

Mr. Cook's account of the proposed addition to the High School, follows:—

"In enlarging the present High School building, after a very thorough study of the problem; the present building is located about 120 ft. back from the street and with only comparatively small spaces on the sides and rear; to obtain an addition of the required accommodations, the front seemed the logical place for an addition and particularly the arrangement of the existing unit alterations to the existing building. With the sloping grade from the existing building to the street, a ground floor or basement at the front would be wholly above grade and make a ground floor more available for several purposes.

"The addition contemplated, will be 20 ft. on each

side longer than the front of the present building and 86 ft. deep, projecting 5'—6" at the central front portion; with a set-back of 30 ft. and 35 ft. from the street sidewalk line.

"The exterior design is to be carried out in the same general style as the present building so that when completed, the whole will have the appearance of the existing building and addition as one unit.

"In general plan the addition is to have a twostory high assembly hall on the first floor in the center, surrounded on three sides by a 12 ft. corridor on each floor, connected by passageways to the corridors of present building, and also to entrances on the front and each side of the building, and on opposite sides of the corridors the general school and class rooms.

"A central front entrance, with a vestibule at a lower level than the first floor, with broad outside steps up to two pairs of entrance doors, and steps within the vestibule to a foyer which opens into the assembly hall. Also entrances on each side giving access to ground floor, first floor, and corridors with enclosed fireproof stairways to floors above.

"On the first floor in addition to the assembly hall, which will be 60 ft. x 48 ft., seating, including its gallery, 686, with a stage 24 ft. x 18 ft., and two anterocms in the rear of the stage 10½ ft. x 12 ft. A reception room 17 ft. x 19 ft. adjacent to the front entrance, with principal's office 13 ft. x 16 ft., with toilet and storage closet adjoining; and four class rooms 23 ft. x 32 ft. and one class room 19 ft. x 29 ft.

"On the second floor the gallery of the assembly hall on three sides of the same connecting direct to the corridor; this floor to have five class rooms, the same as the first floor, and also a school library.

"On the third floor additions 35 ft. x 32 ft. to the chemical and physical laboratories in the present building, are provided in the addition, also a lecture room

 $31\frac{1}{2}$  ft. x  $36\frac{1}{2}$  ft., two science class rooms 23 ft. x 32 ft., and instructor's room 16 ft. x 19 ft., and an apparatus room 19 ft. x 23 ft.

"On the ground floor at the front southeast corner quarters for the school committee and superintendent of schools which will make available another school room in the Stacy School. These quarters will have a separate entrance from School St.; a School Committee room 15 ft. x 23 ft., Superintendent's office 19 ft. x 25 ft., and the school supply room 11 ft. x 11 ft. Also on the ground floor will be provided a gymnasium 80 ft. x 55 ft., additional toilet rooms, coat rooms and shower baths for boys and girls, manual training rooms, gymnasium instructor's room, and lunch serving room.

"The addition will provide for 400 more pupils.

"In the present building by rearrangement two additional class rooms on the first floor will be obtained, a book storage room  $14\frac{1}{2}$  ft. x 21 ft., and the present assembly hall on the third floor divided and a drawing class room 21 ft. x 35 ft. and a study room 35 ft. x 37 ft. obtained."

# PHYSICAL DIRECTOR FOR THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS

One of the accomplishments of the year is the recent appointment of a physical director for the public schools. This action on the part of the Committee is a step in advance, in that it meets a State recommendation and certain State legislation and what is of ultimately far more consequence, it offers large opportunities for the children in the public schools. We are fortunate in being able to secure for this work, the services of Mr. Albert D. Riopel of Worcester, Mass., Worcester Commercial High School, 1929, A. B. Holy Cross, 1924, whose work as football coach during the past season is widely known.

# IMPROVEMENT OF HEALTH IN THE SCHOOL CHILDREN

Attention is particularly called to certain statis-

tics in the report of the school physicians and their comment thereon.

It appears that the number of "normals"—children showing no physical defects—is increased from 9% in 1911 to 22% in 1924. As the school physicians pointedly observe, this result is especially a tribute to the work of the school nurse and dental clinic.

## HIGH SCHOOL

The report of the High School Principal follows: Milford, Mass., January 6, 1925.

Mr. A. O. Caswell,

Superintendent of Schools, Milford, Mass.

Dear Sir:

In submitting my fifth annual report I believe mention should be made of the growth of the High School, during the past five years. The records of September, 1920, show that 294 pupils were enrolled while the attendance of the past year was 472—the largest in the history of the school. This constant increase has necessitated more teachers and more class rooms. Prior to 1924 some of our students were located on the first floor of the Stacy School, an arrangement which proved satisfactory to a great extent. The incoming seventh grades in September were so large, however, that these freshman rooms were no longer available and we were forced to adopt a new plan whereby the three upper classes of the High School would attend school from 8 A. M. to 12:40 P. M. and the freshmen from 12:45 P. M. to 5 o'clock. This double platoon arrangement has shortened our school day to some extent and, I think, is ant to prove detrimental to our students. During the morning session every room in the High School is utilized and the afternoon classes require nine of the rooms, which are used in the morning.

The past year has been one of quiet and conservative progress. No changes in the curriculum have been made, as the course of study adopted by the committee, some few years ago, is suited to the conditions and meets the demands of institutions of higher learning.

A class of sixty-one was graduated last June before an assembly which taxed Town Hall to capacity. The essays delivered by the students were enthusiastically received by the audience and the musical program, under the direction of Supervisor Helena F. Swift, was especially well rendered. Praise is due also to Miss Dorcas Whipple, Art Supervisor, for the beautiful decoration of Town Hall. At the close of the graduation exercises the following awards were made: -Harry S. Broudy, '24, received the first prize, \$20 in gold, for the Patrick Peace Essay on "The United States as a Member of the League of Nations to Prevent War." Mabel Gillman received the special book prize of the class of 1917—interest from Liberty Bonds—awarded annually to the Senior with the highest average in Latin, History and English for four years. George W. Griffin was given the Dr. John V. Gallagher gold medal awarded annually to the boy making the "M" in athletics at least three times and also obtaining the highest scholastic standing of those eligible for this prize. Many of the members of this class are now enrolled in institutions of higher learning.

The annual publication of the Oak, Lily and Ivy, under the supervision of Miss Marion A. Ryan of the English department, was highly successful from a literary and financial standpoint. The proceeds were used in purchasing sweaters for the boys who earned their "M" during 1923—1924. The class of 1924 and Miss Ryan are to be complimented on the success of the edition.

During the past year Miss Margaret G. Quirk, a member of the faculty, organized for the freshmen a General Science Club, which was to offer practical

knowledge on scientific subjects along with the theoretical knowledge gained in the classroom. Trips were taken to various local manufacturing plants.

The David Garrick Dramatic Club had a membership of one hundred students, composed of members of the two upper classes. Under supervision of Miss Sadie A. O'Connell. The Club held several entertainments year, and each proved successful. during the The first one was held January 10th, at which time the club presented two comedies - "Food" and "The Teeth of the Gift Horse." Later in the year two more comedies were presented — "The Trysting Place" and "The Fan and Two Candlesticks." A Prize Speaking contest was held and the gold prizes for excellence in Public Speaking were awarded to Helen Grayson, '24, and Clarence O'Connell, '25. Popular enthusiasm was marked by the large attendance, and the rendition of each selection was most gratifying.

The 1924 High School Orchestra, under the leadership of Frank Todino assisted at the various entertainments during the year and provided excellent music at the graduation.

Last year's baseball team under the capable coaching of Sub-master Francis C. Berry was very successful. Our schedule numbered eighteen games. Among the teams defeated by Capt. Visconti's heroes were Brighton High, Hyde Park High, Malden High and Natick High, some of the representative teams of the state.

The double platoon system adopted in September prevented Sub-master Berry from coaching the football team, and Albert D. Riopel, Holy Cross, '24, a star in various lines of athletics, was secured to direct our team. Twelve games were played, ten of which were victories, one a tie with Northbridge High and one a defeat by Natick. Mr. Berry and Mr. Riope I have proved excellent athletic directors, and have impressed upon the boys the importance of clean athletics.

The class of 1924 conducted three dances, two in

Assembly Hall and the annual May Dance in the Town Hall. The committees in charge proved very efficient in entertaining their guests. The receipts from the first two were given to the Athletic Association. The proceeds of the May Dance were donated to the Library.

The following gifts from the class of 1899—the sum of \$26.00—and from the Class of 1924—the sum of \$45.60—were gratefully received, and have been used in adding volumes to the school library.

A complimentary dinner was given on December 16th, in Elks' home by the Chamber of Commerce and the townspeople to the victorious 1924 football team and Coach Albert Riopel. Harvard University, Dartmouth College, Amherst, Boston College, Massachusetts Agricultural College, Tufts Medical College and Holy Cross College were well represented at the speakers' table. Among the speakers were Mr. Frederick W. Fitzsimmons, chairman of the committee, Committeeman Alfred Cenedella, who was toastmaster, School Committeemen George E. Stacy, John C. Lynch, John E. Swift, and Edward Gamache, member of Harvard, 1924, football team, Cleo O'Donnell, head coach of Holy Cross, Kenneth Simondinger, assistant coach at Holy Cross, Emory Grayson, M. H. S., '13, assistant coach at Amherst, Frank Clark, assistant coach at Massachusetts Agricultural College, Superintendent of Schools Almorin O. Caswell, Edward N. White, faculty director of athletics at Natick High, Coach Riopel and Capt. Julius D'Agostino. Over two hundred enjoyed the banquet. It was gratifying to note the interest taken in our High School activities by officials of the state and town, as well as by many of our prominent business men. During the evening Mr. Edward F. Coye, a memManager George V. Brown of the Boston Arena, an invitation to the boys to be present at the Harvard vs. Boston Club hockey game on December 19. This invitation was willingly accepted. The football team is very grateful to the Chamber of Commerce and the people of Milford for the reseption-dinner tendered to them.

In closing my report I wish to state that it is the aim of Milford High School to train her graduates not only for schools of higher learning, but also to train them in the duties and responsibilities of good citizenship. To fully achieve this purpose the hearty co-operation of the parents is most essential. May I take this oportunity to thank the members of the School Committee, the members of the teaching staff, and you, for every helpful suggestion during the past year.

# GEORGE E. STACY SCHOOL

As announced in connection with the High School, the increase in the number of students in the High and Stacy Schools, particularly the High School, made necessary the exclusive use of the Stacy School, for 7th and 8th grade pupils. The Stacy School enrollment as of January 1, 1925, was 525. The work in this school is being carried on substantially as last year. In his report, Principal Beaudry expresses the hope that with testing for homogeneous grouping next September, material for real scientific measuring will be available.

Among collateral activities, a play, "Boots," was presented by the pupils, under the direction of Miss Rose Gagliardi; a second play, "Twins," and a pageant, "Our Emblem," were written and presented under the direction of the Principal.

A baseball team was organized that had a suc-

cessful season, and a feature of the physical training and activities of the school was the Field Day, held June 19, 1924.

Principal Beaudry recommends the organization of a complete Junior High School system, to be realized by January 1, 1926, either on the 3—2 plan or with a 2—4 organization. In his opinion, the latter is the more desirable and the former the more feasible, under present conditions.

# CONTINUATION SCHOOL

Owing to quiet business conditions, the enrollment of the Continuation School was much smaller than one year ago (see summary of statistics), but the interest has continued at a high pitch, and progress has been made in this work.

# Girls' School

The girls' school opened September 3, 1924, with an enrollment of 42. This year the work was arranged on a 10 week basis, with ten weeks of cooking and ten weeks of sewing, alternating, for the second half of the session, with the general improvement work and English, Civics, Arithmetic and Hygiene, the first half of the year as formerly. An 8 week unit of Millinery was given the higher grade girls who had completed the Sewing course of last year satisfactorily.

A Home Nursing course, with equipment for demonstration, under the supervision of a trained worker, would be of value to these girls.

Visits to the factories aid the teacher in becoming better acquainted with the girls.

Commendation is due to the factories and homes for the spirit of cooperation extended to the teacher and for the interest they manifested in securing prompt and regular attendance.

# Boys' School

The work of the Boys' Continuation School is along the same lines as last year.

Not so much effort is spent on trade specialties, the aim in the academic room and the shop being to give the pupil a more general and broad realization of every-day trade problems, more especially those that come up in and around the home.

Much good has been accomplished through these schools and the coöperation of the manufacturers and others who employ these boys has helped to give the boys more responsible ideas of life.

The records, as kept, are very helpful.

I would recommend that a permanent room be given to Continuation School work, large enough for use for class room purposes as well as a place for supplies and records.

# EVENING SCHOOL

The sessions of the Evening School opened September 29, 1924, continued 12 weeks and closed December 17, 1924, three evenings per week as in former years, under the leadership of William J. Moore, Esq., who reports as follows:

"The classes were the same as for the past several years, consisting of 'Americanization' subjects, Civics, English and American History, and subjects to and including the sixth grade.

"The total registration was larger than for several years, and of this registration less than fifty percent. were compulsory pupils, all minors enrolled not being compulsory pupils. I cite this fact as showing that the illiterate adult, the one beyond the compulsory educational law, the voluntary pupil, is beginning to take advantage of the opportunity being offered through evening school; I trust more will do so another year.

"With the exception of but two or three cases, little difficulty was experienced in attendance, which mantained the best average for some time, in spite of the lack of employment of some compulsory pupils."

## MUSIC

The observation made in this report one year ago in discussing the work in Music is increasingly true. The work in Music has made real progress under the leadership of Miss Swift, and that under conditions of short periods and an ever lengthening program. Miss Swift submits the following comments upon the work of the year:

"Considering the over crowded conditions of our schools, a keen interest and great patience has been shown in the study of music by the teachers and pupils during the past year.

"In the High School, the pupils are studying Choral work and much time has been spent on phrasing, attack, release, enunciation and pronunciation and very satisfactory results have been attained.

"In our Grammar and Primary Grades, we have taken special care to have the child read intelligently the song he sings and sing it with musical feeling.

"In all the Grades the scales, octave, and arpeggio are written and recited in the various keys, thus aiding the child in his sight-singing.

"On Christmas Eve many of our pupils participat-

ed in the Community Christmas celebration held on the Jeweler's Institute Grounds. Two and three-part songs were sung and these little carellers brought to the observance of Christmas a beautiful touch of the sentiment and spiritual significance which prevails at this particular season.

"If it becomes necessary to establish additional rooms to accommodate the increasing number of pupils in our schools, as now seems probable, it may be physically impossible to spend sufficient time with each class, so as to insure proper instruction in music. In that event, an assistant teacher may become necessary.

"I strongly recommend the installation in each building of a Victrola as an aid toward the appreciation of good music."

#### DRAWING


On account of the greater pressure upon the Drawing Supervisor, brought about by the increase in enrollment generally, but more especially by the increased amount of elective work in this subject in the High School, it has been found necessary to have an assistant to Miss Whipple and Miss Vetrana Mazzarelli was appointed to that position at the beginning of the fall term. Miss Whipple reports as follows:

"A great many of the drawing periods in the grades and High School during the latter part of the school year were spent on poster projects. Our aim was to work for and achieve simplicity.

"The State Art Director sent out an appeal for posters on 'Accident Prevention.' All grades as well as the High School were well represented. The best three from each grade and the best five from the High School were selected and sent to the state. In the final selection by state judges, the third prize in the 1st grade group was won by David Jones of the Claffin School.

"The Quinshipaug Woman's Club again offered a

banner and money prizes for the best poster on 'Clean-Up.'

"The banner went this year to Room 14, Stacy School.

"1st prize won by Irving Mellette, Stacy School.

"2nd prize won by Jennie Gregorio, Stacy School.

"3rd prize won by Mario Lucciarini, Stacy School.

"Cther posters were made for Fire Prevention Week.

"Two students from the High School, Class of 1924, have entered higher schools in Art training.

"Since September, supervised lessons have been given every other week instead of every month as previously and this, it is hoped, will prove more beneficial both to the students and to the teachers."

Upon appointment of Miss Mazzarelli, as Assistant Teacher of Drawing, the work in the High and Stacy Schools was assigned to Miss Whipple and Miss Mazzarelli was given the work in the lower grades. Miss Mazzarelli has worked in Color, Flower drawing, Designing and Lettering and Holiday projects. Outlines for return and specimen projects were furnished teachers in each room.

In this work, the aim has been, as it must ever be in any educational project, two-fold—accurate impression and adequate expression—training of the eye to perceive beauty and suitability to form color and proportion, and the hand to reproduce them in various media suitable to the different grades.

# EXTENSION SERVICE 4-H CLUB WORK

The Worcester County Extension Service Junior Workers have been very busy the past year. Mrs. Cora M. Granger, Leader, and Miss Myrtle C. Jeffrey, Junior Leader, submit the following resume:

"The Canning Club of six members conserved over 500 jars of fruits and vegetables, meeting at the Stacy School every two weeks for instruction and practice,

but doing the major part of the work at home. The members gave a fine exhibition at the Trade Show, which received much favorable comment.

"In the winter Home Economics work 15 girls have enrolled for the sewing course. As there were many requests for cooking instruction it was deemed advisable to have a cooking club also, 25 girls have enrolled for this course. The two clubs meet on alternate Saturday afternoons.

"Club work pledges the head to clear thinking, the heart to greater loyalty, the hands to larger service, and the health to better living for home, community and country. These are the 4 H's from which the clubs derive their name.

"We are grateful to the School Department for their interest and co-operation, also for the use of the Stacy School sewing and cooking rooms for meeting places."

#### GIFTS DURING THE YEAR

The most notable gift during the year was a beautiful silk flag with staff and standard, presented to the George E. Stacy School by the State W. R. C., in memory of the late Mrs. Anna Bell. This flag was one of 28 presented to various persons and organizations with thrilling ceremonies, in Shawmut Congregational Church, on the evening of April 10, 1924. This beautiful gift was assigned to Milford largely through the efforts of Mrs. Florence Knight, Patriotic Instructor of the local chapter of the W. R. C. Master Robert Knight, a student of the Stacy School, reflected distinct credit on his school and town in the content of his speech of acceptance and the manner of its delivery.

The W. R. C. donated silk flags to Grades I and II at the Chapin Street School.

The North Purchase Chapel Association donated the chairs and tables in the building to the Purchase Grammar School Association, the Purchase Street schools to have the privilege of using this equipment as necessary.

The Quinshipaug Woman's Club presented the Braggville School with a very beautiful picture, "The Old Shepherd," by Zugal.

The retirement of Miss Devine is an event of far greater significance than many that have received more attention. Miss Devine's personality and work were marked by strength and dignity with her pupils,

serene confidence and high courage in the facing of difficulties and kindly courtesy toward all who came into her school from the outside. Miss Devine retires with the respect and good will of the entire community. It is a pleasure for the writer, after working with Miss Devine for more than a decade, to add his tribute to her large effectiveness as a teacher and leader of the young and to her high personal qualities and dependability as a worker.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

In addition to the High School addition, featured earlier in this report, attention is again called to the need of providing in the near future for more and better housing at the South and Plains districts.

Attention is also again called to the State mandate for atypical classes in towns and cities having more than ten pupils three or more years retarded. Milford has a list several times as large as is necessary to qualify.

The manual training system in the middle and upper grades remaining in statu quo, and the injustice to the boys who have no manual work provided, remains.

The growth of school enrollment has necessitated a second drawing supervisor. That situation was cleared up at the beginning of the present school year. A similar situation is becoming more and more evident in the matter of school music.

I am sure, gentlemen of the committee, that you are fully alive to all the problems that are facing the department and it remains only for the public to become fully sensible of the situation, as you are, to secure general and hearty coöperation in realizing the needs of the children of Milford.

In conclusion, I thank you heartily, for myself and my co-workers, for your patience and consideration during another year, and I am indebted to my associates for continued coöperation under increasing difficulties,—all of which is respectfully submitted.

A comparison of the reports for the past 14 years will show that the proportion of those having no noticeable defects, or what we call normals, in 1911 was 9 %; from 1911 to 1922 inclusive, 12%; in 1923, 14%; and for ths year, 1924, 22%. The very encouraging improvement shown in this year's report, and to some extent in last year's, seems to be due largely to two things: The first of these is the work of the school nurse, who has cooperated in every way with teachers and physicians, and has succeeded in securing a good degree of interest on the part of the parents in matters pertaining to the health of their children. She has been untiring in her efforts, and the results are each year more apparent. The second element is the dental clinic, which has now been in operation long enough to show appreciable results. These were especially evident this year in the eighth grade pupils, who showed a much larger proportion of normals, and especially great general improvement in the condition of the teeth, over anything we have found in any previous year.

A long-felt need has recently been supplied by the election of a physical director for our schools. Regular and systematic exercise will soon be provided under competent supervision, and improved health is sure to follow.

Some of the classes are still too much crowded and some of the sanitary arrangements are still antiquated and inadequate, but the remedy for these evils is a problem in finance which we believe the town is doing its best to solve, with good prospects for success in the near future.





# WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, MARCH 3, 1924.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

Worcester, ss.

To either constable in the town of Milford, in said County,
Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth aforesaid, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town, qualified by law to vote in Elections and in Town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Town, on Monday, the third day of March, A. D. 1924, punctually at 5.45 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, namely:—

(The polls may be closed at four o'clock in the afternoon on said day of meeting.)

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose all necessary town officers, a town clerk, town treasurer, tax collector, auditor, three selectmen, highway surveyor, (for one year), one assessor, (three years), two members of the school committee, (three years), one overseer of the poor, (three years), one member of the board of health, (three years), one member of the board of health, (two years), to fill vacancy, one sewer commissioner, (three years), two trustees of town library (three years), two trustees of Vernon Grove Cemetery (three years), one park commissioner, (three years), one member of the planning board (three years), one tree warden (one year), and five constables, (one year) to be voted for on ballots prepared and furnished in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 54, of the General Laws of Massachusetts, and acts in amendment thereof and addition, thereto.

Also upon said ballots the voters shall give in their votes "Yes" or "No" in answer to the following question:

"Shall licenses be granted for the sale of certain non-intoxicating beverages in this town?".

Article 3. To hear and act upon the reports of the selectmen, town clerk, town treasurer, tax collector, auditor, assessors, overseers of the poor, sewer commissioners, school committee, trustees of town library, trustees of Vernon Grove cemetery, park commissioners, highway surveyor, chief of police, engineers of the fire department, town solicitor, inspector of wires, inspector of plumbing, inspector of animals, sealer of weights and measures, and any other officers or committees of said town.

Article 4. To raise and appropriate such sum or sums of money as may be necessary to defray town expenses for the financial year ending December 31, 1924.

Article 5. To determine when all taxes for the year 1924 shall become due and payable, the time from which interest on unpaid taxes of said year shall be charged, and the compensation of the collector of taxes for the year ensuing.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) towards defraying the expenses of Memorial Day.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to take charge of all legal proceedings for or against the town.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the treasurer, with the approval of the selectmen, to borrow money on and after January 1, 1925, in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year, beginning January 1, 1925.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to contract and agree for and in behalf of the Town of Milford, to contribute a portion of the money, labor or materials towards the cost of laying out and constructing a certain part of Cedar street, within the town of Milford, and for this purpose see, if the town will vote to raise and appro-

priate the sun of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000 00), or will authorize the town treasurer to issue notes or bonds to an amount not exceeding Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000.00), at a rate of interest not exceeding five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of OneHundred Dollars (\$100.00), to be paid to the Trustees for County Aid to Agriculture, in accordance with the provisions of, and for the purposes of Chapter 128, General Laws of Massachusetts, or for the support of demonstration work in Agriculture, Home Economics, or Boys' and Girls' club work, under the direction of the agent or instructors, or the trustees, co operating with local town director, or pass any vote or votes in relation thereto.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to choose a director in accordance with the previsions of Chapter 128, General Laws of Massachusetts, or pass any vote or votes in relation thereto.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand, two hundred ninety-six and 66-100 dollars (\$2,296 66), to pay the judgment entered in the matter of petition by the Home National Bank for abatement and refund of taxes assessed for the year 1920.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to appoint a town accountant under the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 41, Section 55.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to appoint a committee to report at the next annual town meeting, on whether the town should establish a town forest, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the treasurer to transfer the unexpended balances of the following accounts into the surplus revenue account, or take any action in relation thereto.

Highways:Unpaid bills of 1922\$ 8 40Incidentals:Unpaid bills of 19227 45Poor:Unpaid bills of 192222 89

Poor: Mother's Aid. Unpaid bills of 1922 \$15 12 Poor: Fire repairs, Town Farm 14 08 Ravenna Street 10 00

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$180.00), for the purpose of locating ten street lights on Beaver street, from Central Street to Medway Street, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to adopt a plan to establish a better and brighter electric lighting system for Main street, raise and appropriate money for said purpose, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to accept and allow the report of the selectmen on the laying out of Archer avenue, so-called.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00), for the purpose of draining, laying sidewalks and repairing Union Street, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00), for the purpose of constructing suitable drains and sidewalks and repairing Goodrich Court, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to prepare a by-law or by-laws to provide for the limitation of particular classes of buildings to specified districts or zones, as provided for in General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 25, and amendments thereto, they to report at a future town meeting, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to purchase traffic signals similar to those now on exhibition at the intersection of certain streets in Milford, raise and appropriate money therefor, or take any action in relation thereto

Article 23 To see if the town will vote to authorize the

selectmen to provide parking space for automobiles on the town property either or both sides of Town Hall Building, raise and appropriate money therefor, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to discontinue the watering trough located on Main Street, or remove the same to another location, raise and appropriate money therefor, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the engineers of the fire department to locate a fire alarm box in the vicinity of the Hopedale Manufacturing Company plant, raise and appropriate Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00), therefor, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to purchase a new triple combination pumping apparatus, for the fire department, and raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00), for the same, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00), for the purpose of building a suitable drain on the northerly end of Grant street, and putting that part of the street in passable condition, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred and Twenty-six Dollars (\$126.00), for the purpose of installing street lights on West Fountain Street, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00), for the purpose of constructing a sidewalk on the westerly side of East Main Street, beginning at a point known as the Supple property, to the corner of East Main and Meade Streets, or take any action in relation thereto.

We have included in the General Appropriation for the Board of Health sufficient money to take care of the contract for the removal of garbage.

We recommend that the Board of Health in its annual report include a full list of the expenditures incurred by the Dental Clinic, and that they confer with the Town of Hope dale to ascertain if it is interested in patronizing the Clinic.

We call attention to the fact that the Incidental department, Memorial Hall, School Department, Soldiers' Relief, contracted bills in excess of their appropriation in 1923. As previously pointed out this is in violation of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 31, as amended by Asts of 1922, Chapter 253, and that it is their duty as well as that of this committee to report the facts to the Disiriet Attorney.

#### TOWN WARRANT.

Article 9. Relative to an appropriation of \$7,000.00 for Cedar Street construction in conjunction with the State and County, we recommend be acted upon favorably.

Article 22. Relative to the purchase of certain traffic signals, we recommend that it be passed over.

Article 5. Voted: That all poll taxes for the year 1924 shall become due and payable July 10, 1924, and that all personal and real estate taxes shall become due and payable October 15, 1924.

of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00), for the purpose of repairing Whitney Street.

Article 31. Voted: To raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred and Ten Dollars (\$510.00), for the purpose of extending the sewer on Mount Pleasant Street.

Voted: To pass over the remainder of the article.

Article 32. Voted: To accept and allow the report of the Selectmen on the laying out of Westbrook Street Extension, and raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred and Twenty five Dollars (\$52500) to construct said street.

Voted: To pass over the remainder of the article.

Article 33 Voted: To raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,400 00) for the purpose of extending the sewer on Hayward Street, from East Walnut Street 500 feet in a southerly direction.

Voted: To pass over the remainder of the article.

Article 34. Voted: To recommend that the Board of Selectmen grant licenses to conduct entertainments on the Lora's Day, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 136. Yes, 86; No 3.

Voted: To pass over the remainder of the article.

Article 35. Voted: To raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000 00), for the purpose of repairing West Walnut Street, and constructing sidewalks on said street.

## BY-LAWS OF THE TOWN OF MILFORD.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

Worcester, ss.

Milford, March 7, 1924.

At an adjourned town meeting of the inhabitants of the town of Milford, held March 7, 1924, it was voted to accept and adopt the following by-laws:—

#### ARTICLE 1.

The annual town meeting for the election of town officers shall be held on the first Monday in March, and the business session or sessions thereof shall be held as specified in the vote of adjournment taken at said meeting or meetings.

#### ARTICLE 2.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE.

Section 1. There shall be a finance committee consisting of fifteen citizens of the town, who shall be sworn to a faithful performance of their duties. No town official, either elective or appointed, shall be eligible to membership on the finance committee.

The board of selectmen shall appoint, not later than the first day of May, 1922, the said fifteen citizens, five for the term of one year, five for the term of two years, and five for the term of three years, and annually, not later than the first day of May, the said selectmen shall appoint five members for the term of three years in place of those whose term shall expire in that year.

They shall immediately give public notice of such appointment in one of the local newspapers, if there be such.

If any person so appointed does not within fifteen days thereafter take the oath aforesaid, his office shall thereupon become vacant and such vacancy shall forthwith be filled by the selectmen.

Section 2. The committee shall meet, choose its own officers, and adopt such rules affecting its government as may from time to time be necessary.

Section 3. The committee shall have power to fill by ballot any vacancies that may occur in its membership by death, resignation, removal from town, or other causes.

Section 4. This committee shall consider matters relating to the appropriation and expenditure of money by the town, its indebtedness, the administration of its various departments, property valuations and assessments, and other municipal affairs of the town, and make such report and recommendation to the town concerning the same as circumstances and conditions may require.

It shall have authority at any time to investigate the books, accounts and management of any department of the town, and the books, accounts, and records of all departments and officers of the town shall be open to its inspection.

All officers of the town shall, upon its request, furnish it with facts, figures and other information pertaining to that department.

Section 5. The finance committee may furnish a report of any or all matters which have been considered by them pertaining to the town, with their recommendations and suggestions, so that same can be published in the annual Town Report.

#### ARTICLE 3.

Section 1. The selectmen shall have full authority, as agents of the town, to employ counsel to institute and prosecute suits, in the name of the town, to appear for and defend suits brought against it, to provide counsel to assist the police department as they may direct, unless otherwise specifically

ordered by vote of the town, or otherwise provided by the laws of the Commonwealth.

Section 2. The selectmen may settle any claim or suit against the town, which in their opinion, acting upon the advice of counsel, cannot be successfully defended.

#### ARTICLE 4.

#### TREASURER.

Whenever the treasurer is to borrow money in behalf of the town, a sum of money exceeding ten thousand dollars, unless otherwise directed by the town, he shall advertise for bids thereon.

#### ARTICLE 5.

#### Town Solicitor.

The selectmen shall, within thirty days after taking office, appoint some member of the bar, a resident of the town of Milford, as town solicitor and it shall be his duty to give legal advice to the various town officials and town boards on such questions connected with their duties as may by said officials and boards be referred to him.

#### ARFICLE 6.

The overseers of the poor may in March annually at a fixed salary appoint some doctor of medicine, resident in the town of Milford, as town physician, and he shall hold office for the term of one year from the first day of April following. He shall render such medical service to all sick or injured poor and indigent persons within the town and perform such other professional services as said overseers may from time to time require.

#### ARTICLE 7.

#### POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Section 1. The board of selectmen shall annually appoint at a fixed salary some competent person to act as chiefof-police.

Section 2 The selectmen shall make such rules and regulations not inconsistent with law or these by-laws, for the

government and discipline of the p lice department as they may from time to time deem necessary.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the members of the police force to immediately make a careful investigation of every case of accident which results in an injury to person or property coming within their notice, in which the town might be liable, secure the names of all witnesses thereto and make report thereof to the chief-of-police, who shall report forthwith to the selectmen.

#### ARTICLE 8.

#### PLANNING BOARD.

Section 1. There shall be a planning board with all the powers and duties provided for said board by Section 70 of Chapter 41 of the General Laws and any acts in amendment thereof or in addition thereto.

Section 2. Said board shall consist of three (3) members, one to serve for the term of one year, one to serve for the term of two years, and one to serve for the term of three years from the first Monday of April, 1923, and thereafter one member shall be elected annually by ballot at the annual town election to serve for the term of three years and until his successor is elected and qualified.

Section 3. The board shall meet, choose its own officers and adopt such rules and regulations affecting its government, as may from time to time be necessary.

Section 4. The members of the board shall serve without compensation.

#### ARTICLE 9.

## REQUIREMENTS IN TOWN CONTRACTS.

Section 1. Every contract entered into by the town exceeding one thousand dollars shall be accompanied by a suitable bond for the faithful performance of the same, or by the deposit of money or security to the amount of such bond.

Section 2. No contract involving the creation of an obligation against the town shall at any time be made except by vote of the committee or board having supervision of the de-

partment to which the same relates and the contract shall be in writing signed by a majority of the board or committee making such contract and a duplicate of the same shall be furnished the town clerk.

#### ARTICLE 10.

JUNK DEALERS AND DEALERS IN SECOND. HAND ARTICLES.

Section 1. The selectmen may license suitable persons to be dealers in and keepers of shops for the purchase, sale or barter of junk, old metals, or second-hand articles subject to the provisions of Sections 54 to 56 inclusive of Chapter 140 of the General Laws, and may revoke such license at pleasure.

Section 2. Every such shopkeeper shall keep a book in which shall be written, at the time of every purchase of any such article, a description thereof, the name, age and residence of the person from whom, and the day and hour when such purchase is made. Such book shall, at all times, be open to the inspection of the selectmen, constables, and police officers of the town. Every keeper of such shop shall put, insome suitable and conspicuous place in his shop, a sign having his name and occupation legibly inscribed thereon in large Such shop and all articles of merchandise therein. may be at all times, examined by the selectmen, constables and police officers of the town, and no keeper of such shop shall directly or indirectly, either purchase or receive, by the way of barter or exchange, any of the articles aforesaid of a minor or apprentice knowing or having reason to believe him to be such, and no article purchased or received shall be sold until a period of at least one month from the date of its purchase or receipt has elapsed.

Section 3. Whoever, not being so licensed, keeps such shop or is such dealer in the town, or being licensed keeps such shop or is such dealer in any other place or manner than that designated in his license, or after notice to him that his license has been revoked, shall forfeit Twenty Dollars for each offence, and whoever violates any rule, regulation or restriction contained in his license shall forfeit a sum not exceeding Twenty Do'lars for each offence.

#### RULES AND REGULATIONS.

Every person owning or having the care, or driving of a cart, wagon, dray, truck, hand cart, sleigh, sled, hand-sled, or other vehicle which shall be used in the town for or in the collection of junk, old metals, rags, paper or second hand articles shall be licensed by the selectmen, and each of said vehicles shall have placed upon the outside and on each side of the same the name of the licensee in plain, legible letters and figures of not less than three inches in length, and so that the same may be distinctly seen and read, and any person owning, having the care, or driving of any of the above described vehicles, shall wear a badge on some conspicuous part of his clothing, with the number of his license thereon in plain legible figures of not less than one inch in length.

Any person who shall collect junk, old metals, rags, paper, or second-hand articles without a wagon, eart, dray, truck, hand eart, sleigh, sled, hand-sled, or other vehicle, shall be licensed by the board of selectmen and shall wear a badge on some conspicuous part of his clothing, with the number of his license thereon in plain, legible figures of not less than one inch in length.

For every license so granted there shall be paid to the town treasurer the sum of five dollars for the use of the town.

#### ARTICLE 11.

Section 1. The board of selectmen may license suitable persons to carry on the business of hawkers and peddlers in accordance with the provisions of the General Laws, Chapter 101, Sections 13 to 30, inclusive, and any acts in amendment thereof or in addition thereto.

#### ARTICLE 12.

#### STREETS AND SIDEWALKS.

Section 1. No person except the selectmen or the highway surveyor in the lawful performance of their duties or those acting under their orders, except such other persons as are or may be authorized by statute, shall break or dig up the ground in any street or public way in the town without obthe regulations under which the work shall be done. All per sons acting under such permit shall erect and maintain a suitable railing or fence around that part of the street so broken up so long as the same shall remain unsafe or inconvenient for travellers, and he or they shall keep one or more lighted lanterns fixed to such railing or fence, or in some other way exposed, every night from sunset to sunrise so long as such street or way shall remain unsafe or inconvenient for travellers. The work done under said permit must be in accordance with said regulations and upon completion of said work the surface of said street or way shall be restored to a condition satisfactory to the selectmen.

Section 2 Whenever the selectmen or high way surveyor are about to construct or prepare any street or way the surface of which is paved with block or macadam, or rolled, they may, before beginning the work give reasonable notice of such intention to the departments of the town, to corporations liable to be affected thereby, and all abutting owners having connections by drains or otherwise with structures in the street.

If such parties have any work to be done in such public streets or ways they shall consult and arrange with said selectmen or highway surveyor, in order that such work may be done before the surface of such street or way is again prepared for and opened to public travel. After such notice and opportunity has been given no such parties shall for the space of two years break up or disturb the surface of said street or way within the area so constructed or repaired except in case of reasonable necessity, and then only on written permission of the selectmen.

Section 3. Any person who intends to erect, repair or take down any building on land abutting on any way, which the town is required to keep in repair, and desires to make use of any portion of said way for the purpose of placing therein building materials or rubbish, shall give notice thereof to the selectmen. Thereupon the selectmen may grant a per-

mit to occupy such portion of said way to be used for such purposes as in their judgment the necessity of the case demands and the security of the public allows; such permit in no case to be for a period longer than ninety days, and to be on such conditions as the selectmen may impose, and especially in every case upon the condition that during the whole of every night from sunset to sunrise sufficient lighted lanterns shall be so placed as to effectually secure all travellers from liability of coming in contact with such building material or rubbish.

The selectmen may before granting such permit require such persons to furnish a satisfactory bond to save the town harmless for any damages which may arise from such use of the street, and to insure the faithful compliance with the conditions of said permit.

Section 4. Whoever shall use any portion of any way which the town is required to keep in repair for the purpose mentioned in the preceding section without the written permission of the selectmen, as above provided, or having obtained such permit shall fail to comply with the conditions thereof, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

Section 5. Whoever violates any of the provisiona of Sections 1 and 3 shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

#### ARTICLE 13.

USE OF STREETS AND SIDEWALKS.

Section 1. Whoever, except drivers of ambulances, or patrol wagons, or members of the fire department responding to an alarm of fire, shall drive or ride a horse or other animal at a rate of speed exceeding ten miles per hour through any public way, street or avenue in the town shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

Section 2. Whoever, having charge of a vehicle in any street shall neglect or refuse to stop the same, or to place the same when stopped, as directed by a police officer, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars.

Section 3. Whoever shall erect, set up, or maintain any fence, portico, platform, or door-step, extending into any highway or street, and whoever shall hoist any material from any street into a building adjoining the same, so that said material by being hoisted shall overhang any part of said street after notice from the chief-of-police that the apparatus used for that purpose, or the manner of doing the same, is in his opinion unsafe until said parties shall obtain apparatus suitable therefor, and until it shall be done in a manner satisfactory ttohe chief-of-police, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

Section 4. Whoever shall establish or maintain any shade or awning over any part of a street or highway, unless the same be securely and safely supported, and unless the lowest part thereof be not less than seven feet above such street or sidewalk shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars.

Section 5. Whoever shall establish or maintain over any street or highway any sign sign-board, or advertising device without a permit from the selectmen shall be punished by a fine not exceeding five dollars. Such a permit shall be granted, if such sign, sign-board or device is safely and securely made, fastened, supported and maintained, does not interfere with the public use of such street or way, is not affixed to any tree, tree guard or other object within the limits of the street or way, and is not of a dangerous character.

Section 6. Whoever shall use any sidewalk or street for the display of merchandise or other articles of personal property without first obtaining the written permission so to do from the selectmen shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars.

Section 7. Whoever shall drive, wheel or draw any vehicle, coach, cart, wheelbarrow, handcart, or carriage of burden or pleasure (except children's carriages drawn by han i) upon any sidewalk in the town shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars.

Section 8. Whoever shall permit any horse, cattle, swine

or sheep under his care to go upon any sidewalk in the town shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars.

Section 9. Whoever shall coast upon any sidewalk in the town, or upon any street of the town except at such times and in such places as may from time to time be designated by the selectmen, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding five dollars.

Section 10. Whoever shall distribute or display posters, handbills, placards, pamphlets or other advertising matter in any public street or way without first obtaining a permit therefor from the selectmen shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

Section 11. Whoever shall discharge into any drain or sower inlet, manhole, or catch basin, any matter or thing which may tend to cause obstruction therein or any injury thereto shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

Section 12. Whoever shall drain any roof water, surface water, or other unpolluted water into the sanitary sewer shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

Section 13. Whoever shall fire or discharge any cannon, gun or firearm in or across any street, public park, or square, or within fifty feet of any dwelling house within the town, except in the performance of a legal duty, or fire or discharge any air-gun, bow gun, or other instrument discharging a projectile in or across any such street, park, square or within said distance of a dwelling house shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

Section 14. Whoever shall place or cause to be placed any wood, lumber, coal, box, crate, barrel or other obstruction upon any public way or sidewalk and allow it to remain more than one hour after being notified by a police officer to remove it shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars.

Section 15 Whoever shall sweep dirt or rubbish onto any sidewalk or street in the town shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars.

Section 16. Whoever shall suffer any snow or ice to re-

main on a concrete or curbed sidewalk abutting on premises owned or occupied by him as a tenant, within the town for a period longer than twenty four hours after the snow or rain, shall have ceased to fall, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars.

Section 17. Whoever shall in any of the public ways of the town throw stones, sno v-balls, sticks, or other missiles, or kick a foot-ball, or play at any game in which a ball is used or fly any kites or balloons, or engage in any other game or exercise interfering with the free, safe, and convenient use of said street or highway, by any person traveling or passing along the same shall be punished by a fire not exceeding five dollars.

Section 18. Whoever shall allow any gate or door belonging to the premises under his legal control and adjoining any public way to swing on, over or into such public way shall be punished by a fine not exceeding five dollars.

Section 19. Whoever shall give any public address, speech or harangue in any street or public way within the town without a written permit signed by the selectmen, or within any public park within the town without a written permit signed by the park commissioners, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

Section 20. No street band shall play, nor any musical instruments be played upon by any one in the public streets, sidewalks, or ways of the town without the written permission of the chief-of-police.

Violation of this section shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

Section 21. Whoever shall in any of the public streets or squares in the town interfere with the free and uninterrupted travel in such streets or squares, either by playing on musical instruments of any description, or by loud talking or singing, and whoever shall refuse to move on or disperse after having been requested to do so by any constable or police officer of the town, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

#### ARTICLE 14.

#### CURFEW:

Section 1. No person under the age of sixteen years shall be, or remain in or upon any of the streets or public places of the town in the night time after nine o'clock P. M. unless such person is accompanied by parent, grardian, or other person having legal custody of such minor person, or in the performance of an errand, or duty directed by such parent, guardian, or other person having legal custody of such minor person.

Section 2. No parent, guardian or other person having the legal care and custody of any person, under sixteen years of age, shall allow or permit any such child, to go, be in, or upon any of the streets or public places in said town, in the night time after nine o'clock, P. M unless there exists a reasonable necessity therefor.

Section 3. Whoever violates the provisions of either of the foregoing sections shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars.

#### ARTICLE 15.

Section 1. Whoever shall be, or remain upon any sidewalk, or upon any door-step, portico, or other projection of any house, or other building not his own, to the annoyance or disturbance of any person, or whoever shall in any street stand or loiter for more than five minutes after being directed by a police officer to move on, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

Section 2. Whoever shall by any noise, gesture or other means, wantonly or design-dly frighten any horse, in any street or other public place in the town, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

Section 3. Whoever shall stand in any public way in such a manner as to obstruct a free passage for travellers shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars.

Section 4. Whoever shall destroy, extinguish or interfere with any street light, or destroy, extinguish or interfere

with any light placed to denote an obstruction or defect in any street or way, without proper authority, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

Section 5. Whoever shall intermeddle with any hydrant, gate, gatebox or water pipe, placed in or located within the limits of any public way, without permission from the proper official in charge thereof, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

Section 6. Whoever shall empty into any public street or highway of the town any part of the contents of a sink, cesspool or privy, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars.

Section 7. Whoever shall, between the first day of May and the first day of November, carry through any public street or highway, any part of the contents of a sink, cesspool or privy, in any cart, wagon or other vehicle, except between the hours of ten o'clock in the evening and sunrise, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars.

Section 8. Whoever shall at any time carry into or through any public street or highway any part of the contents of a sink, cesspool or privy, in a cart, wagon or other vehicle which is not effectually covered and water-tight, shall, be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars.

Section 9. If any cart, wagon or other vehicle, having therein the contents of any sink, cesspool or privy, shall be permitted to stand, except while loading, in any street or highway, the owner or owners, driver or drivers of such cart, wagon or other vehicle shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars.

#### ARTICLE 16.

TIME OF TAKING EFFECT.

These by-laws shall take effect on their approval and publication as required by law, and all by-laws heretofore adopted

by the town are hereby repealed on the date on which these by laws become legal and binding.

In the name of the Commonwealth, aforesaid, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town, qualified by law to vote in elections and in town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said town, on Tuesday, the fourth day of November, A. D, 1924, punctually at 5.45 o'clock in the forenoon, at which time the polls will be open

for said voters to give in their ballots to the Selecture of said town, for Electors of President and Vice President of the United States, Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Secretary, Treasurer, Auditor and Attorney-General of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, a Senator in Congress, Congressman, (Fourth Congressional District), Councillor, (Seventh Councillor District), Senator, (Fourth Worcester Senatorial District), Two Representatives in General Court, (Ninth Worcester Representative District,) Two County Commissioners, (Worcester County), Register of Probate and Insolvency, (Worcester County), County Treasurer; (Worcester County), all on one ballot designating the office intended for each person voted for, as provided for under the provisions of Chapter 54, General Laws of Massachusetts, and acts in amendment thereto.

Also upon said ballots the voters will give in their votes "Yes" or "No", on the acceptance of the following "Proposed Amendments To the Constitution;" and "Laws Submitted Upon Referendum After Passage;" and Question of Public Policy.

#### ARTICLE OF AMENDMENT.

Article III of the Amendments to the Constitution, as amended, is hereby further amended by striking out in the first line, the word "Male."

## ARTICLE OF AMENDMENT.

Section 1. No person shall be deemed to be ineligible to hold State, County or Municipal office by reason of sex.

Section 2, Article IV. of the articles of Amendment of the Constitution of the Commonwealth, as amended by Article LVII of said amendments is hereby further amended by striking out the words "Change of name shall render the commission void, but shall not prevent reappointment under the new name," and inserting in place thereof the following words: "Upon the change of name of any woman, she shall register under her new name, and shall pay such fee therefor as shall be established by the General Court."

Acceptance of Chapter 370, Acts of 1923, entitled "An Act relative to intoxicating liquors and certain non-intoxicating beverages."

Acceptance of Chapter 454, Acts of 1923, entitled "An Act to provide funds toward the cost of construction and maintenance of highways and bridges by means of an excise tax on gasoline and other fael used for propelling motor vehicles upon or over the highways of the Commonwealth."

Acceptance of Chapter 473, Acts of 1923, entitled "An Act relating to deposits with others than banks."

Acceptance of Chapter 210, Acts of 1924, entitled "An Act to ascertain the will of the people with reference to the retention of the Daylight Saving Law, so called."

Acceptance of Chapter 509, Acts of 1924, entitled "An Act to ascertain the opinion of the people of the Common-wealth as to the ratification of the proposed amendment to the Constitution of the United States empowering the Congress to limit, regulate and prohibit the labor of persons under eighteen years of age."

## VITAL STATISTICS.

Parents and others are requested to carefully examine the following lists and if any errors or omissions are discovered report them at once to the town clerk, that the record may be corrected, as it is of importance that the record of Vital Statistics should be complete. Herewith are extracts from the General Laws of Massachusetts, Chapter 46.

Section 3. Every physician, or hospital medical officer registered under Section nine of Chapter one hundred and twelve, in this chapter called officer, shall keep a record of the birth of every child in cases of which he was in charge, showing date and place of birth, the name, if any, of the child, its sex and color, the name, age, birthplace, occupation, and residence (including the street number, if any, and the ward number, if in a city) of each parent, the maiden name of the mother and the name of the physician or officer, if any, personally attending the birth. If the child is illegitimate, the name of and other facts relating to the father shall not be set forth except upon written request of both the father and Said physician or officer shall, within fifteen days after such birth, mail or deliver to the clerk or registrar of the town where such birth-occurred, a report stating the facts herein above requried to be shown on said record and also the said written request, if any; provided that if said report is not so made within forty-eight hours after such birth, said physician or officer shall, within said forty-eight hours, mail or deliver to said clerk or registrar a notice stating the date and place of the birth, the street number, if any, the ward number, if in a city, and the family name. Upon presentation to him of a certificate of the town clerk stating that any such birth has been duly reported, the town treasurer shall pay to such physician or officer a fee of twenty-five cents for each birth so reported Any physician or any such officer violating any provision of this section shall forfeit not more than twenty five dollars.

Section 4. A member or servant of a family in which a child is born, having knowledge of the facts required for record relative to such births, shall furnish the same upon request of the clerk of the town where such child was born or its parents reside, or of any person authorized by him. Such member or servant refusing to furnish such facts shall be punished by fine not exceeding ten dollars.

Section 6. Parents within forty days after the birth of a child, and every householder, within forty days after a birth in his house, shall cause notice thereof to be given to the clerk of the town where such child is born. Every householder in whose house a death occurs and the oldest next of kin of a deceased person in the town where the death occurs shall, within five days thereafter, cause notice thereof to be given to the board of health, or, if the selectmen constitute such board, to the town clerk. The keepers, superintendent or other personin charge of a workhouse, house of correction, prison, reformatory, hospital, almshouse or other institution, public or private, which receives inmates from within or without the limits of the town where it is located shall, when a person is received, obtain a record of all the facts which would be required for record in the event of the death of such person, and shall, on or before the fifth day of each month, give notice to the town clerk of every birth and death among the persons under his charge during the preceding month.

Blanks for returns of births and deaths may be obtained at the office of the town clerk.


