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MEMORANDUM MINUTES OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE COMMISSION OF FINE ARTS WASHINGTON, D. C. 17 MAY 1960 *

EXECUTIVE SESSION

*Public Law 181, 61st Congress, Establishing the Commission of Fine Arts was signed by President Taft on May 17, 1910.

The Commission met pursuant to notice, at 2:00 PM, with David E. Finley, Chairman presiding.

I. ADMINISTRATION

1. As a commemoration of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the first meeting of the Commission of Fine Arts, Mr. Felix W. de Weldon, the sculptor member of the Commission, presented the Commission with a granite plaque on which the much-admired words of the first Chairman of the Commission, Daniel H. Burnham, had been engraved. The Chairman accepted the plaque on behalf of the Commission. He described it as a most fitting gift for the occasion, and a lasting tribute to the founders of the Commission of Fine Arts and to the drafters of the McMillan Plan. It will serve, he said, as a constant guide to the present and future members of the Commission. The members of the Commission all joined in thanking Mr. de Weldon for his generous gift. (Note: The plaque is $31 \frac{1}{2^{m}}$ wide by $22 \frac{3}{4^{m}}$ high. The material is black Swedish granite of a type called "emerald pearl." The letters are sandblasted in the surface which has a high polish.)

2. Approval of Minutes of April Meeting

The minutes of the April meeting were approved as written.

3. Date of Next Meeting

The date of the next meeting of the Commission was confirmed for 15 June, with the Executive Session to be held on 14 June.

4. <u>Enactment of S. 2778, "A bill to amend the Act Relating to the</u> <u>Commission of Fine Arts," with Respect to Lifting the Limit of</u> <u>Authorization for the Commission</u>

The secretary reported that the legislation (S. 2778) to change the limit of authorization for appropriations had been anacted into law (P.L. 86-461/86th Congress) on 13 May 1960 following acceptance by the Senate of the wording of the House Bill (H.R. 7923). During the discussion on the floor of the House, the number of the Senate Bill had been affixed to the text of the House Bill, which, in effect, had removed a fixed sum as the limit of authorization and made appropriations dependent on the justification of needs by the Commission. The members considered this amendment of enabling legislation of the Commission (P.L. 181, 61st Congress) by the Congress, and by the President, an appropriate notice of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Commission, and directed the Chairman to send letters of thanksto the Congressmen who had sponsored the Amendment in the Senate and the House of Representatives. 5. Request for Supplementary Appropriation for Fiscal Year 1961


The Secretary reported that a request for a supplemental appropriation in the amount of \$26,700 had been forwarded to the Bureau of the Budget, in accordance with desires expressed by the members of the Commission. This sum represented the amount stricken by the Congress from the Commission's budget estimate for fiscal year 1961, because the Congress did not wish to appropriate a sum that exceeded to so great an extent the fixed limit of authorization, \$35,000, although legislation to remove this technicality was pending, at the time, in both Houses of Congress. The restoration of the \$26,700 would enable the Commission to employ two technical assistants whose services otherwise would not be available until fiscal year 1962, and to print the Fiftieth Anniversary Report. Having once been approved by the Bureau of the Budget, favorable action on the request by the Bureau of the Budget was expected.

II. SUBMISSIONS

1. <u>National Society of Interior Designers</u> White House, Diplomatic Reception Room, Refurnishing

The members of the Commission, accompanied by Mr. Michael Greer, President of the National Society of Interior Designers, met with Mr. West, the Chief Usher, at the White House to discuss plans for refurnishing the Diplomatic Reception Room as a gift from the members of the Society. This visit made it possible to judge the suitability of the proposed furnishings in relation to the actual size and scale of the room and with the portraits that hang there.

It was at once evident that, because of the height of the room, a chandelier was undesirable and it was recommended that the offer of the



crystal chandelier be declined with thanks. The proposed rug was approved as to design and color. The other items in the proposed scheme, such as the furniture, were also approved, as well as the color of the walls and fabrics, in accordance with samples, which Mr. Greer left with Mr. West. A suggestion was made to replace the existing doors at the south end of the room with French doors and it was understood that such a change could be made. Some thought was also given to the replacement of the existing grandfather clock with one more suitable to the room. The members also agreed that the design for the doors of the china cupboards would be improved if changed in accordance with Mr. Greer's sketch, but Mr. West thought that it would be impossible to make such a change at the present time.

The Secretary was directed to prepare a letter for the Chairman's signature to Mr. Greer, this letter being made a part of the permanent record of the proceedings. EXHIBIT 2

2. <u>Department of the Interior</u> <u>National Capital Farks</u> a. Inner Loop Freeway - Tunnel Through Lincoln Memorial Grounds

The Chairman welcomed Mr. Harry Thompson, Director, National Capital Parks, who attended the meeting to present the preliminary plans for a roadway and tunnel through the Lincoln Memorial Grounds between the watergate and the Memorial. Mr. Thompson informed the members of the Commission that the National Parks Service had recently awarded a design contract for a roadway and tunnel carrying six lanes of traffic through and beneath the Lincoln Memorial Grounds as a link in the "inner loop" freeway system. The roadway and tunnel was to loop around the Memorial on the Potomac River side. On the south it would emerge and connect with Independence Avenue; and on the north, near Constitution Avenue, it was to join up with the Inner Loop Freeway and approaches to the Theodore Roosevelt Bridge under the jurisdiction of the District Highway Department. Mr. Thompson stated that the tunnel would disturb neither the Lincoln Memorial's foundations nor the plantings on the memorial terrace. Only a portion of the 1,250 foot tunnel would pass directly beneath the memorial grounds and none of it would go under the Memorial itself.

Mr. Thompson also outlined plans for the construction of two oneway drives along the Mall on either side of the Reflecting Pool and parallel to it. These roads merged with existing roads and flowed around the Memorial grounds to connect with Arlington Memorial Bridge. Construction of these two roads would enable the Park Service to eliminate automobile traffic entirely from the eastern portion of the Lincoln Memorial circle with the area overlooking the Reflecting Pool. Authorization to complete these drives, however, would have to await the demolition of temporary building, including the Old Navy and Munitions Buildings

south of Constitution Avenue.

The members of the Commission felt that the designs for the tunnel, were, in general, satisfactory although they emphasized that they could never approve the Inner Loop itself. They agreed that elimination of motor traffic east of the Memorial seemed desirable, but felt that the plan submitted needed further study. There was also some discussion of the existing landscaping of the Lincoln Memorial grounds, which is beginning to hide the podium on which the Memorial stands. No formal action was taken, at this time, on any of these matters because of the preliminary nature of these plans. Mr. Thompson was thanked for bringing the plans at an early stage and was invited to return when developed further.

b. Central Maintenance Shop, Brentwood, Md.

The members studied the design proposed for the group of connected buildings to house the Central Maintenance Shops of the National Capital Parks at Brentwood, Maryland. They considered the design satisfactory in general. Further discussion was reserved until the following day when representatives of National Capital Parks were scheduled to attend the meeting of the Commission.

c. George Washington Memorial Parkway

(1) Glen Echo, Md. Bridge (Revised Design)

The members noted that the drawings submitted for the Glen Echo, Md. Bridge on the George Washington Memorial Parkway appeared to be the same as those submitted at the April meeting of the Commission. Mr. Haussmann of National Capital Parks, was scheduled to discuss this design with the members of the Commission at the meeting on the following day and further discussion was withheld until that time.

(2) Turkey Run and Dead Run, Va. Bridges

The Secretary presented designs submitted by National Capital Parks for bridges at Turkey Run and Dead Run, Va., which would be part of the George Washington Memorial Parkway System on the Virginia side of thePotomac River. Both bridges were almost identical in design, consisting of heavy concrete piers and beams supporting steel girders. The members considered the design of the piers and beams to be somewhat heavy. Representatives of National Capital Parks were scheduled to be present at the meeting of the Commission on the following day and final action was withheld until that time.

3. <u>District of Columbia Government</u> a. <u>Department of Sanitary Engineering</u> Sewage Pumping Station

The members studied the sketches of the proposed sewage pumping station between the eastern approaches to the Theodore Roosevelt Bridge. The Secretary reported that the distance from the approach roadways had definitely been fixed and that it would now be possible to study the design in relation to the embankments of these roadways, and to the Inner Loop, from which the pumping station would be entered. A conference being scheduled for the next day with representatives of the Department of Sanitary Engineering, further action was withheld until that time.

b. Department of Highways and Traffic

(1) Theodore Roosevelt Bridge Approaches

The Chairman stated that General Welling, Engineer Commissioner for the District of Columbia, had been requested in writing to submit the plans for the approach roads to the Theodore Roosevelt Bridge, but no answer had been received to the letter.

(2) Inner Loop, Southwest Freeway, Eleventh Street Overpass

The members studied the drawings of the proposed Eleventh Street Overpass, Southwest Freeway, which was to be a part of the Inner Loop Freeway System. There were no serious objections to the design of the overpass, which follows in general the patterns of previous submissions. However, final action was deferred until the following day when discussions were scheduled with representatives of the District of Columbia Department of Highways and Traffic.

4. <u>National Capital Planning Commission</u> a. <u>Land Acquisition</u>, Fort Drive - Confirmation

The members of the Commission confirmed the Chairman's prior approval of a land acquisition at Fort Drive, District of Columbia.

b. Columbia Plaza Urban Renewal Project

Mr. William E. Finley, the Director of the National Capital Planning Commission met with the members of the Commission of Fine Arts and showed them the proposal for developing an area in Northwest Washington to be called Columbia Plaza, bounded by 23d Street, Virginia Avenue, 25th and E Streets, Northwext. He stated that a public hearing was to be held on the following day by the District Commissioners with reference to determining the advisability for establishing a renewal program for this area under the auspices of the Redevelopment Land Agency and the National Capital Planning Commission.

The members of the Commission of Fine Arts studied the plans for the development of Columbia Plaza and agreed that its location made it preferable to develop this area as a unit rather than haphazardly by real estate promoters. The Commission recommended that favorable action be taken by the Commissioners in the District of Columbia in authorizing the development of Columbia Plaza as an urban renewal project.

A letter was to be prepared, for the Chairman's signature, to the Board of Commissioners of the District of Columbia, informing them of the views of the Commission of Fine Arts, such letter to be made a part of the permanent record of the proceedings. EXHIBIT 3

c. June 16 Meeting, "2000 A.D. Planning Session"

The Secretary informed the members that an invitation had been received from the National Capital Planning Commission to attend their meeting on June 16, at which time they planned to discuss planning for the year 2000 A.D. It was suggested that since the Commission of Fine Arts would hold its meeting on June 15, at least one of the members might remain in Washington until the following day, in order to attend this meeting of the Planning Commission. The Chairman said he would attend and hoped some of the members could do so also.

5. <u>Department of the Army</u> <u>Improvements, Quarters 7, Fort Myer</u>

The members of the Commission met with representatives of the Department of the Army and the architect to discuss proposed remodeling of Quarters 7, Fort Myer, Virginia, which was currently being occupied by the Chief of Staff of the Air Force. It was planned to increase the size of the living room, add a larger dining room, increase the size of the library, and increase bedroom and closet space on the second floor. The members considered that the proposed changes would improve the appearance of the house and approved such plans as presented. EXHIBIT 4

6. <u>General Services Administration</u>

Public Buildings Service

a. Oaklahoma City Courthouse - Sculpture - Status

Mr. de Weldon reported that he had inspected preliminary sketches for the sculpture for theOklahoma City Courthouse, but they were very sketchy and it was not possible to formulate a firm opinion of them. More sketches were to be submitted at a later date.

b. Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation Building

The Secretary reported that the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation Building was under restudy as the result of a decision to set the building back further from the street. No new drawings were ready to be submitted at this time.

7. Department of State Statue of George Washington for Presentation to Uruguay

The Secretary displayed plans and photographs, which had been received from the State Department, and which outlined details for presenting a copy of a statue of George Washington to the people of Uruguay, in accordance with Public Law 86-345, 86th Congress.

The State Department proposed to use a bronze replica of the statue of George Washington by Houdon which stands in the United States Capitol. The only changes from the original involved reducing the height of the pedestal.

The plans were approved with the recommendation that the projecting plinth at the bottom of the pedestal be omitted, thus making thepedestal a single block of marble, of the same overall height, as shown in the sketch drawing.

The Secretary was directed to prepare a letter for the Chairman's signature, to the Secretary of State, such letter to be made a part of the permanent record of the proceedings. EXHIBIT 5

8. <u>U.S. Senate Committee on Aeronautical and Space Sciences</u> Design of Robert H. Goddard Medal

The Secretary reported that the U.S.Senate Committee on Aeronautical and Space Sciences had verbally requested the assistance of the Commission of Fine Arts in selecting a design for the proposed Robert H. Goddard Medal (H.J.Res. 19/86th Congress). Sketches were being made for the Committee by the Mint, but were not yet completed. In order to save time a conference had been scheduled for the following Friday at which time the Chairman and Mr. de Weldon, sculptor member of the Commission, intended to view these drawings. The members asked the Chairman to make any necessary decisions to advance the design, so that it could be presented at the June meeting.

- Rehabilitation of Central Business Area
- 9. Downtown Center, Inc.

The Chairman reported that he had attended an exploratory conference called by the director of the Downtown Center project for the purpose of discussing the contributions that the various Federal agencies could make in carrying out the plans by Downtown Center, Inc. Representatives of the National Capital Planning Commission and the National Park Service, and others, also presented the views of their respective agencies. The Chairman, in explaining the role of the Commission, stressed that the area to be rehabilitated touched the Shipstead =Luce Area on Pennsylvania Avenue and 15th Street, N.W. No specific plans have yet been developed, but there was agreement that accomplishment of the aims of Downtown Center Inc. would be beneficial to the city.

Board of Trade - International Trade Fair

The Chairman reported that he had attended a luncheon at which the Board of Trade announced its interest in erecting a building from 8th Street to 11th Street and from D to E Streets, to include an underground bus terminal, an information bureau, an auditorium seating at least 10,000 persons, a hotel, and other units for business enterprises who might which to join in promoting a trade fair. Ninth and 10th Streets were bridged by the building. Drawings that were exhibited showed a very large structure, which will be tangent on its south side to the Shipstead-Luce Area. It was expected that plans for this proposed building would be submitted at a later date. No opinion was expressed at this time, although there was some question raised about the effect such a building would have on the governmental area and the overall plan of the city.

III. SHIPSTEAD-LUCE ACT

a. <u>Report of Actions Taken on Shipstead Luce Applications Since</u> 19 April 1960 (Report dated 17 May 1960 - Appendix 1)

The Secretary reported the actions taken, after recommendations of the Shipstead-Luce Panel of Architects, on the Shipstead-Luce Building Applications forwarded for review by the District of Columbia Department of Licenses and Inspections since 19 April 1960. This report was dated 17 May 1960 and comprised Appendix 1 of the Order of Business. After discussions, the action as noted on Appendix 1 was confirmed by the mem-bers and action was taken on the following cases which had been disapproved by the Shipstead-Luce Panel and held for review by the Commission:

The members discussed the plans to combine two stores at 941 and 943 Pennsylvania Avenue, N.W., into one store. They recommended that the remodeling be approved, provided the show windows were kept within the building line.



The Secretary read to the members the report which had been written on S. 3381, stating that, in the opinion of the Commission, the success of the design of the National Cultural Center was contingent upon the acquisition of more land to the north and in order to reroute the existing Potomac Parkway to the east of the building. 4. S. 3386 - Mr. Johnston - 19 April 1960 - "To provide for the acquisition or construction of a building to be used as a residence for pages of the Senate and of the House of Representatives, for a Capital Pages Residence Board, and for other purposes."



The Secretary reported that the Commission had been requested to submit a report on this legislation. However the provisions of the bill placed the responsibility for selection of the site, and approval of the design in the hands of the architect of the Capitol and the Capitol Pages' Residence Board, with no provision for seeking the advice of the Commission of Fine Arts. 5. H.R. 8911 - Mr. Seldon - 27 August 1959 - "to provide for the presentation by the United States of a Statue of General George Washington to the people of Uruguay and for other purposes."

It was noted that in September 1959, a report was forwarded to the Bureau of the Budget stating that the Commission of ^Fine Arts had favored enactment of this legislation. (See paragraph II. 7.) EXHIBIT 10

Finlay, the Director of the National Capital Flanning Commission showed the members of the Commission of Fine Arts a proposal for developing an area in Northwest Washington to be called Columbia Flaza, bounded by 23rd Street, Virginia Evenue, 25th and Contracts. We understand that a hearing is to be held tomorrow with reference to determining the advisability for establishing a renewal program for this area under the auspices of the Fedevelopment 2 and Agency and the National Capital Flanning Commission.

The members of the Commussion of the Arts studied the plans for the development of Columbia Jasa and agreed that it would seem advisable to develop this area as a unit. The Commission recommends that favorable action be taken by the Commissioners of the District of Columbia in authorizing the development of Columbia Jaza as an urban renewal project.

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



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

To provide for the acquisition or construction of a building to be used as a residence for pages of the Senate and of the House of Representatives, for a Capitol Pages' Residence Board, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-1 $\mathbf{2}$ tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, 3 That there is hereby created a Capitol Pages' Residence Board (hereafter in this Act referred to as the "Board"), 4 5which shall be composed of three Senators, to be appointed 6 by the President of the Senate, and three Members of the 7 House of Representatives, to be appointed by the Speaker of 8 the House of Representatives.

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SEC. 2. (a) The Board shall (1) acquire real prop-

erty for use, or to be renovated for use, as a residence for 1 pages of the Senate and the House of Representatives, or $\mathbf{2}$ (2) select a site and have a building constructed thereon, 3 for use as such a residence, in accordance with plans prepared 4 by or under the direction of the Architect of the Capitol 5 and approved by the Board. Such residence, whether pro-6 vided pursuant to clause (1) or (2) of the preceding sen-7 tence, shall be in the vicinity of the United States Capitol, 8 and shall include a gymnasium, cafeteria, television and 9 10 recreation room, and study hall.

(b) (1) The Architect of the Capitol shall acquire on
behalf of the United States by purchase, condemnation, donation, or otherwise, the real property or site selected by the
Board pursuant to subsection (a) of this section.

(2) Any proceeding for condemnation brought under
paragraph (1) of this subsection shall be conducted in accordance with the Act entitled "An Act to provide for the
acquisition of land in the District of Columbia for the use of
the United States", approved March 1, 1929 (D.C. Code,
secs. 16-619 to 16-644, inclusive).

(3) There is hereby authorized to be appropriated such
sums as may be necessary (A) to acquire and renovate the
real property selected by the Board pursuant to clause (1) of

subsection (a) of this section, or (B) to acquire the site
 and construct the building authorized by clause (2) of such
 subsection.

4 SEC. 3. (a) Until the residence provided for in section 5 2 of this Act is ready for occupancy, the Board shall utilize 6 as a residence for pages of the Senate and House of Repre-7 sentatives so much of that real property at lot 20, square 692 8 in the District of Columbia (now known as the Congressional 9 Hotel) as the Board determines is necessary for such 10 purpose.

(b) During the period of its use as a residence for pages
of the Senate and House of Representatives so much of the
real property referred to in subsection (a) of this section
as may be used for such purpose shall be known as the "Capitol Pages' Residence", and thereafter the building acquired
or constructed pursuant to section 2 of this Act shall be
known as the "Capitol Pages' Residence".

18 (c) The Board shall appoint a headmaster who has had 19 professional training as an educator and in youth guidance 20 and two assistant headmasters to supervise pages residing in 21 the Capitol Pages' Residence during such periods as they 22 are not attending school or are not under the supervision of 23 an officer of the Senate or House of Representatives. The person appointed as headmaster shall also be responsible for
 the operation and maintenance of the Capitol Pages' Resi dence under rules made by the Board.

SEC. 4. (a) Each page employed by the Senate or the 4 House of Representatives shall be required to reside at the 5Capitol Pages' Residence while the Senate or the House of 6 Representatives, as the case may be, is in session and during $\mathbf{7}$ all periods when he is entitled to receive compensation as a 8 page, unless he is residing with a parent or legal guardian or 9 10 a person selected for such purpose by one of his parents or 11 his legal guardian.

(b) Any page employed by the Senate or the House of 12 Representatives may, with the approval of the Board, reside 13 14 at the Capitol Pages' Residence during such times as the Senate or the House of Representatives, as the case may be, 15 16 is in recess or adjournment, if he was entitled to reside at 17 such residence during the session of the Senate or the House immediately preceding such recess or adjournment or if 18 he has been appointed as a page subsequent to the end of 19 20 such session.

SEC. 5. The Board shall establish such rates and fees
as it deems necessary for residing at the Capitol Pages'
Residence. Such rates and fees shall, insofar as practicable,
be sufficient to make the operation and maintenance of such
residence self-sustaining, but shall not exceed the average

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of rates and fees charged for comparable accommodations 1 by college and university dormitories in the District of $\mathbf{2}$ 3 Columbia. The obligations incurred by any page employed 4 by the Senate or the House of Representatives, for residing at the Capitol Pages' Residence shall, at the request of the 5Board, be deducted by the Secretary of the Senate or the 6 Clerk of the House of Representatives, as the case may be, 7 from any compensation to which such page is entitled. All 8 amounts charged for residing at the Capitol Pages' Resi-9 dence, including amounts deducted from their compensation 10 under authority of this section, shall be paid to the Secretary 11 12of the Senate and shall be credited to the current appropriation for the operation and maintenance of the Capitol Pages' 13 14 Residence.

SEC. 6. There are authorized to be appropriated such
sums as may be necessary for the operation and maintenance
of the Capitol Pages' Residence, to be disbursed by the
Secretary of the Senate on vouchers signed by a member of


