The Lines are to be Drawn.

That there is to be a thorough organization of our party in California there can be little doubt in the minds of those who have noted the indications. That this organization may not be fully completed throughout the entire State within the year may be true. It may be one or two years ere the border counties, those at the north being composed of a comparatively new and changing population more intent upon finding a new placer and making a fortune than in the permanent interests of the State; and those at the south having in a great measure yet to learn what political freedom is, and in what consists the difference between the parties: a year or two may elapse before party lines will be distinctly drawn or well understood in them. But that it will eventually be so, we can almost demonstrate. The nepointing their committees and making preparations to define their position and do battle. We hail these indications with gladness, for we look upon the existence of parties as not only inevitable to a free form of government, but as absolutely necessary to its health and preservation. Bodies elected upon party grounds have been and are supposed by some prone to error, to corruption and abuse of power. But it is doubtful if the charge can be made good with half as much evidence as that bodies elected without reference to party have much oftener failed and more signally in working out the

In our country the two great parties have usually been very nearly matched, a majority seldom amounting to more than one twentieth of the whole and often deciding by a single vote. It is not likely therefore that the dominant party can, if it would, work out a great and continuous evil for the country at large while ten thousand Arguses are watching every movement and stand ready to turn to their own advantage any misstep, and to use to the utmost every licencious and aggrandizing use and abuse of power. The majority is the steam power that drives the great machine of Government, but the minority is the balance wheel, impelling when the power slacks, restraining when it rushes headlong. Men elected thus upon party grounds, known advocates of great leading questions, the object of working out which in detail with either party is the public good, are much more reliable for the fulfillment of their duties than men elected with only a vague pledge to the whole country. Partizans owe a more immediate accountability than others. Their hopes must be with the success of their party; they will therefore generally prove true to their party principles. Now it must be granted by all candid men that the great bulk of either party is honest in its convictions. The difference between the two is not a moral question but a political; one of policy not of virtue and vice. Hence it is better that a party of a fixed and avowed policy should be in the ascendant, whose adherents and leaders are bound to accomplish a well known policy, than to trust to the uncertain views of those who advocate nothing but personal advancement and hold themselves amenable to no known principles or plan. Let the organization therefore of the Whig

against having anything to do with the cabals calling themselves "Independents," upon whom the Times also is very caustic:

"No party" and "independent party" are

the weak devices of men who have no principles to support, or of corrupt politicians, whose only aim is to slide into office or obtain public patronage. Political organizations based on "no party" or independent party grounds, have a degrading tendency in free States. They re-verse the maxim of "measures and not men," and go for men, not measures. Personal jealousies, avarice, rivalry and ambition, grow up and produce selfish combinations and cabals. We have had no party men elected to our State, of not only the State itself, but of nearly every county and city in the State answer. On the other hand, when the administration of government is in the hands of a powerful party, watched by a powerful minority, government esses a power and unity of purpose and action that accomplish great things, and serve to keep alive that patriotic ardor so essential to the existence of a free government. We do not say that party should be supported merely for the sake of party—for party is only the means adopted by those who desire the advancement of a common cause—but support party in order the more effectually to carry out high and lasting principles, held to be essential and right. Entertaining such views, we believe that time has arrived when it is the duty of the voters of California to take ground in favor of principles, not men-to vote for party, not fac-

The delegates are generally sound, discriminating men, who, we trust, will be uninfluenced by sectional jealousies. MUSIC BY STEAM .- Mr. Wm. Hoyt, of Dupont, Indiana, has invented the following plan for making music on a steamboat :

Place a pipe horizontally across the boilers, of such length and size as may be p. oper; both ends of said pipe to be stopped tight; in or near the centre, there must be a connection ope to let the steam out of the boilers into said orizontal pipe. On top of said pipe there must be placed seven or more small pipes, perpendicular, of such a height as may suit the operator; on top of said small pipes, place whistles of different sizes and tones, similar to those used on locomotives and steamboats. Said whistles to be so made that the top part will screw down or up, so as to regulate the sounds while tuning them at any convenient part of the boat; place a set of keys to operate on said whistles, to let on and off the steam by means of pressing down those keys, similar to playing on a piano; or there can be a cylinder so ar ranged as to operate on the whistles by turn-

ing a crank similar to a hand organ.
