


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

To display the affinity of the present royal famil to the Welch nation, I shall introduce the followin abstracted genealogy.

CADWALADER the last King of Britain, was sin named Bhendiged, or the Blessed; he was the son of King Cadwallan (descended from Coel Godeboc, King of Britain) but had no great sway, the Saxons having established seven kingdoms in Britain and obliged the Britains to retire, some beyond the Rivers Severn and Dee, and others into Cornwal and Little Britain, or Armorica, in France.

Amongst the latter went King Cadwalader, to he coulin Alan II. then King of Little Britain, and from thence in 680, to Rome, and died in 688, he ancestors having reigned in Britain 1827 years.

This Meyric had a fon named Edwal, who w. Prince of North Wales, succeeding Meredith a Owen, A. D. 992; but he being slain in a battle wit Harold the Dane, An. 1003, Jago his fon becam Prince of North Wales, succeeding Lhewelvn ap Si fylht, aano roar; but this Jago being flain b Gruffyth ap Lhewelyn, who succeeded him in 103' Conan, the fon of the fail Jago, warred with the fail Gruffydh ap Lhewelyn for the principality of North Wales, and marrying Rapulph, daughter of Alfre King of Dublin, by her had a fon named Gruffvdl who was Prince of North Wales, he fucceeding Tr. haern ap Caradoc, whom he stew in 1080.

This Gruffydh married Angharad, daughter Owen ap Edwyn, which Owen rebelled against hir and invited the English into Wales, who in 109 appointed him Prince of the country; but he for losing it, and dying in 1102, the faid Gruffydh, wh married his daughter, having a fon by her, and daughter named Gwenlhian; the faid daughter b came the wife of Gruffydh ap Rhys, and mother Rhys ap Gruffydh, Prince of South Wales, and he brother Owen, who was furnamed Gweynedh, fucceer ing his father in 1146, was Prince of North Wales. 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shop of Osnabrug in Germany, (in the room of th late Roman Catholick bishop, Charles- Joseph, Princ diof Lorrain, who died December 14, 1715) pursuan to the 13th article of the treaty of Westphalia wherein it was stipulated, that the See of Ofnabru mondo be alternately possessed by a Roman Catholic and a Protestant prince (the inhabitants being a mix ture of both religions) in fuch a manner, that when it should be the turn of a Protestant, he should al ways be chosen in the most serene house of Duke George of Brunfwic-Lunenburgh; and in case the male line of that branch of the Brunfwick family shall become extinct, the alternate right to that bishoprick should go to the line of Augustus Duke of Brunfwick-Wolfenbutle.

On the 29th of June 1716, the said Ernest-Augustus, Bishop of Osnabrug, was created Duke of York in England, Duke of Albany in Scotland, and Earl of Ulfter in Ireland; and on the first of July following, being elected a Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, was installed at Windsor the 30th of April, 1718, by his proxy Sir Adolphus Oughton, Kt. and Bart. but died on the 14th of Aug.

Sophia Charlotte, only daughter of Duke Erneft and the Princess Sophia, and fifter to the fix sons above mentioned, became the 2d wife of Frederick the 3d, Marquis of Brandenburgh, who in the year 1700, with the consent of the Emperor Leopold, affumed the title of King of Prussia, and died in 1712, having had iffue by his faid wife (who died at Hanover Feb. 1, 1704-5) two fons, Frederick-Augustus, born Oct. 6, 1685, and died Feb. 21, 1686, and Frederick-William, late King of Prussia, born Aug. 4, 1688; who on the 18th of Nov. 1706, was married to his cousin German, the Princess Sophia-Dorothea, only daughter of George I. late King of Great Britain, of whom I shall now speak.

At a chapter of the Knights of the Garter, held
t Kensington on the 18th of June 1701, the 13th
of William III. he was elected a Knight of that Most Voble Order; and on the 21st of the said month, harles Gerard, Earl of Macclesfield, and Gregory ling Efg; Lancaster Herald, were sent to Hanover vith the habit and enfigns of the faid order; where, n the 3d of August following, he received the Garer and George, and the next day being Sunday, he as invested with the whole habit; and on the 13th f March 1702-3, the 2d of Queen Anne, he was intalled at Windsor, by his proxy Charles Lord Johun ..

Upon the demise of Queen Anne, August 1, 1714, e acceded to the crown of Great Britain, and was rowned at Westminster on the 20th of October enuing; and having reigned in England 12 years, 10 nonths, and 10 days, died the 11th of June 1727, t Ofnabrug, (in the palace of his brother the Duke of lork, where he was born) as he was on his journey

o Hanover.

On the 21st of Nov. 1682, he was married to Sohia-Dorothea, his first cousin, only child and heiris of his father's brother, George-William, Duke of Brunfwick-Zell (who died on the 21st of August :705) by Eleanora de Mires, his wife, daughter of Alexander Lord of Olbreuze in France, and by her who was born in 1666, and died on the 2d of Norember 1726, in the caftle of Althen, in the Electoate of Brunswick Lunenburgh, where she had lived nany years) had George-Augustus, late King of

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Great Britain; and a daughter named Sophia-Doro thea, who was born on the 16th of March 1686-7 and on the 14th of November 1706, N.S. was married to Frederick-William, late King of Prussia, by whom she had five sons and five daughters. Note here we are to understand, that the mother of the late King of Prussia, was the only sister of King George I. and his wife was the only daughter of tha King.

His most facred Majesty George II. late King of Great Britain, who was born on the 30th of Oct 1683, was in a chapter held at Kensington on the 4th of April 1706, the 5th of Queen Anne, elected a Knt of the most noble order of the Garter; and on the 22d of the fame month, Charles Montague, Lore Hallifax, and John Vanbrugh, Esq.; Clarencieux king of arms, were commissioned by her Majesty to carrethe habit and ensigns to Hanover, where on the 31s of May, O. S. he received the Garter and lesse George, as on Sunday evening the 2d of June, he was invested with the whole habit of the Order; and on the 22d of December the same year, was installed a Windsor by his proxy.

EARL of DONCASTER.

HENRY Scot, Duke of Buccleuch, Earl c DALKEITH, Baron Scot of Buccleuch and Eikdale, i Scotland, and a Peer of England, by the title of Baron Scot, of Tindale, in Northumberland, and Earlof Don CASTER in Yorkshire, was born Sept. 2, 1746, and fucceeded his grandfather, on April 22, 1751, bein great grandfon of James Duke of Monmouth and Buccleuch, and Earl of Doncaster, who was the elder ion of King Charles II. by Mrs. Lucy Walters daughter of Richard Walters, Esq; whose cruel for tune is well known. The faid Duke of Monmout. was born at Rotterdam, in Holland, April 9, 1649 and went by the name of James Crofts until his Ma jesty's restoration. In the year 1662, the King sen for him over into England, and an apartment wa affigued him in Whitehall. The next year the Kin created him Baron of Tindale, Earl of Doncaster, an Duke of Monmouth, and made him Knight of th most noble order of the Garter. The same year 1663, he married the Lady Anne, fole daughter an heir of Francis Earl of Buccleuch, one of the greater fortunes in Great Britain. Upon this marriage, h took the name of Scot, and they were created Duk and Duchess of Buccleuch, in Scotland. He was ap pointed master of the horse to his Majesty in 1665 and captain of the life-guards in 1668; and, on th death of his Grace the Duke of Albemarle, in 1669 he was constituted general of his Majesty's forces lord lieutenant of the east-riding of Yorkshire, go vernor of the town and citadel of Hull, and chie justice in eyre of all his Majesty's forests and chace fouth of Trent; and in 1672 he was constituted lord high chamberlain of Scotland. The same year, 1672 he commanded the fix thousand English and Scot which joined the French army on the frontiers o Holland, and was conflituted lieutenant general a the forces of Lewis XIV, being present at the taking [59]

of Rhineburgh, Doesburgh, and Zutphen, and at the reduction of Utrecht, where the French King kept iis court for some time. In the year 1673, he was it the fiege of Maestricht, and commanded at the utack of the counterfearp. The town being taken, he Duke with the British forces withdrew, it not being thought for the interest of England to assist the rench in making an entire conquett of the United Provinces. The Duke was elected chancellor of the miverfity of Cambridge in 1674; and as he had fornerly commanded the forces, fent to the affiftance of. he French against the Durch, he made a campaign inder the Prince of Orange, in the year 1678, against he French, and was at the attack of the abbey of St. Dennis. The Field Conventiclers in Scotland breakng out into rebellion in the year 1679, and having stembled a very formidable force, the Duke of Monnouth was fent down to suppre's them; and giving he rebels battle at Bothwell-bridge, on the 22d of une, totally defeated them, taking a great number f prisoners, among whom were several of the murlerers of the archbishop of St. Andrew's; and reurning to court in triumph, appeared at that time ery high in the King's favour. Nor was he less in he favour of the people, on his appearing at the head f what was called the Protestant Party, and shewing n uncommon zeal against those who were accused of he Popish Plot; but the King falling fick, and the Duke of York being fent for over from the Netherands, and finding the Duke of Monmouth had renered himself exceeding popular, was apprehensive f his having an eye upon the crown: he procured im, therefore, to be dismissed from all his places, nd sent abroad; but the King recovering from his liness, thought it convenient also that the Duke of Tork should return to Flanders before the meeting f the parliament. The Duke of York thereupon efided at Bruffels, and the Duke of Monmouth t Utrecht; but the Duke of Monmouth on a sudden

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returned

returned from Holland, without the King's leave and arrived at London on the 27th of November about midnight, the watch gave notice of it in the feveral wards. The people thereupon immediately illuminated their houses, rung the bells, and made bonfires, as if it had been for fome notable victory but the Duke of Monmouth coming over without the King's leave, did not think fit to attend the court and foon after his friends the Lords Shaftesbury, Russel, and several other persons of distinction, prefented the Duke of York as a Recufant at the bar of the court of King's-bench, which made the Duke of York their professed enemy The King calling the next parliament to meet at Oxford, the Duke of Monmouth, the Earl of Effex, and several other Lords, petitioned his Majesty that the parliament might not hit at Oxford, where they suggested the houses could not act with freedom; but that he would be pleased to order them to fit at Westminster, the usual place, where they might confult and act with fafety. This perition was figued,

Monmouth, Stamford, Paget, Essex, Kent, Gray, Huntingdon, Shaftesbury, Herbert, Bedford, Mordaunt, Howard, Salisbury, Evers, Delamere.

The King frowned on the petitioners, and gave them no answer; and on the 21st of March, 1680-81, the parliament met at Oxford, and a bill was brought into the house for excluding the Duke of York from the crown, and fecuring the nation against a popish fuccessor, read the first time on the 28th of March, 1681, and ordered a fecond reading. Whereupon the King came to the house, and made a speech, wherein he observed, That their beginnings were fuch, that he could expect no good fuccess from their debates, and therefore dissolved them; and a plot, denominated the Rychouse-plot, being discovered at [61]

time, the Earls of Shaftesbury and Effex, Lord iel, colonel Sydney, and feveral more, were taken enflody as conspirators, and soon after the Duke Jonmouth; but the Duke was admitted to bail, the King, being satisfied he was not concerned in part of the plot relating to the Rychouse, grantis Grace a pardon, who thereupon went over to land, where he remained till the death of King rles II. which happened on Feb. 6, 1684-5. INTHONY ASHLEY COOPER, Earl of SHAFTES-RY, Baron Ashley of Winborne St. Giles, Baron Oper of Pawlet, Baronet, one of the lords of his jetty's most hon. privy council, lord lieutenant custos rotulorum of the county of Dorset, and of town of Poole, recorder of Shastesbury, vice-present of St. George's hospital, and F. R. S. succeeded thony, the late Earl, his father, in Feb. 1712-13. Lordship married, on the 12th of March, 1724-5, Lady Susan Noel, sister to Baptist Earl of Gainfough; by which Lady, who died in June 1758, had no issue. He is nerally admired for his great parts and learning. was a student of Exeter-college in Oxford, fi whence he removed to Gray's-inn, one of the inn court, where he made a confiderable proficiency the fludy of the law. He was elected member of I liament for Tewkerbury in Gloucestershire, in the i liament that met at Westminster the 13th of Ai 1640, being then about twenty-five years of age. the beginning of the civil war, it is faid, he raise regiment for the fervice of King Charles I. be then sheriff of the county of Dorset, and made' vernor of Weymouth in that county; but cold William Ashburnham being made governor of county of Dorfet, whereby Weymouth became pendant on him, Sir Anthony, imagining that loyalty was suspected, came up to London, and off ed his service to that part of the parliament wh fat there, who gave him a regiment of horse, and command of all their forces in Dorsetshire. notwithstanding he appeared a hearty champion the cause of the parliament, he seems to have oppo Cromwell's usurpation with great spirit; whereur Sir Anthony, and above a hundred more of the fa stamp, being kept out of the house of commons force, published a remonstrance, setting forth, tl

Protector had affirmed absolute and arbitrary ver, and that every man ought to affift in oppoit. That the finall number of members he fufed to remain in the house could not pretend to be representatives of the people; they were not enled to confent to any thing in behalf of the nai, if the rest were excluded from sitting and deng matters in the bouse ; which had such an innce on the next convention the Protector called, they began to question his authority; wherenpon lissolved them, and ever after discountenanced oppressed the Presbyterian and Republican party. creupon Sir Anthony and his friends began to their eyes upon the King, believing his restorawould prove a less evil than the tyrannical goment they were under; and as the King's cir-Mances were very low at this time, and he aped forfaken by all the Princes of Europe, they not doubt but they should get the Presbyterian established, and the prerogatives of the crown fiderably reduced, if they engaged to affift him in restoration. After the difgrace Sonterfet, and his conviction of the murder of Sir homas Overbury, he frood in the King's favour, ithout a rival, was advanced to higher honours, nd became the most absolute faveurite, both, to ing James and King Charles, that ever this nation xperienced. In 1616, he was made master of the orfe, Knight of the Garter, and created Baron of Viladdon, and Vifcount Villiers; and on Jan 5; 616-17, Earl of Buckingham. On the next newear's-day, he was created Marquie of Buckingham's on Jan. 30, 1617-18, lord high adurtal, and foon ther chief justice in eyre fouth of Tuent, master of he King's-bench office; high steward of Westmin-ter, and constable of Windsor castle. He became he fole dispenser of the King's favours, and exacted ill his own numerous family and dependents. On May 18, 1623, he was created Earl of Coventry, and Duke of Buckingham, was made warden of the cinque ports, and iteward of the menor of Ham; toncourt. Robert, the first Earl of Oxford, of this family, who was born on Dec. 5, 1661, educated at a school at Shilton, near Eursord, Oxfordshire, which, though a private school, was remarkable for producing at the fame time, a lord high treasurer, (Earl of Oxford,) a lord high chancel or, (Lord riarcourt,) a lord chief justice of the Common-pleas, (Lord Trevor,) and ten members of the House of Commons, who were all contemporaries, as well at school, as in parliament. At the Revolution, in conjunction with his father he raifed a troop of horse, at their own expence, and offered their services to restore the public liberty. After the accesfion of King William and Queen Mary, he served in parliament for Pregony, in corn call, and then for Radnor, from 1690, till he was creeted a Feer, and was a very active member on all occasions, and fpeaker E 6

speaker of the House of Commons in the two last parliaments of King William, and the first of Queen Anne. In 1704, he was fworn of her privy-council, and May 18 following one of her principal secretaries of state. In 1706, he was one of the commis-shoners for treating of an Union with Scotland; in 1710 he was constituted a commissioner of the treafury, and chancellor and under treasurer of the Exchequer. In order to fatisfy all public debts and deficiencies, he formed the scheme to establish the South Sea company, upon which he was created Baron Harley, of Wigmore, in Herefordshire, Earl of Oxford, and Earl Mortimer, with remainder, in case of wanting iffue male, to the heirs male of Sir Robert Harley, his grandfather. On May 29, 1711, he was appointed lord high treasurer of Great-Britain, and Aug. 15, the same year, was chosen governor of the South-Sea company. The next year he was elected a Knight of the Garter. On July 27, 1714, he refigned the staff of lord high treasurer into her Majesty's hands, who died on Aug 1, the same year. July 16, the same year, he was impeached by the Commons, and fuffered a long confinement in the Tower, till July 1, 1717, when, after a public trial, he was unanimously acquitted by his Peers. He was an encourager of literature, and the greatest collector, of his time, of all curious books in print and manuscript, especially those on the history, &c. of his own country, which were preserved and greatly augmented by his fon: But the Harleian Library, (now part of the British Museum,) is too well known for further mention. VILLIAM WENTWORTH, Earl of STRAFFORD, ount Wentworth, of Wentworth-Woodhouse, of Stainborough, Baron Raby, Newmarch, and rsley, Baronet, and F.R.S. succeeded his fa-, Thomas, the late Earl, in Nov. 1739; and ried, April 28, 1741, the Lady Anne Camp-, fecond daughter of John, the late Duke of Arby whom he has no issue. Soon after was appointed lord lieutenant of Ireland, and 1640, elected a Knight of the Garter; but by t partiament, which met Nov. 3, 1640, he was in peached of high treason, and attainted, the circui frances of which are recorded in history. On May 1 1641, his Lordship suffered decapitation on Towe hill, and met his fate with great magnanimity as compositre. GEORGE-CLAVERING COWPER, Earl COWPER, foount Fordwich, Baron Cowper or Wingham, and ronet, born on Aug. 26, 1738, succeeded William, s father, the late Earl, on Sept. 18, 1764, who arried, June 27, 1737, Lady Henrietta, youngest ughter and coheir of Henry, Earl of Grantham, idhad issue one fon, George, above-mentioned, and daughter, named Caroline, born June 20, 1733, nd married, in July 1753, to Henry Seymour, Efq; other to Edward, the eighth Duke of Somerfet. He arried to his fecond wife, Lady Georgina-Caroline, aughter of the right hon John, Earl of Granville, id widow of the hon. John Spencer, brother to the te Duke of Marlborough, and mother to the prent Earl Spencer. William, Earl Cowper, grandther of the present Earl, was bred to the study of ielaw; and foon after he was called to the Bar, as appointed one of the King's council in the reign f King William, and of Queen Anne's council in the next reign; and that Queen constituted him lord eeper of the great feal of England, in the year 1705; nd in 1707, after the treaty of Union, lord Chanellor of Great Britain, which post he held until the ear 1710: and on the accession of King George I. ras constituted lord high chancellor again. It is bserved to his honour, that he refused to accept ew years gifts from the counfellors at law, which ad been long given to his predecessors; and, what is till more to his honour, he forefaw and opposed the lestructive measures pursued in the year 1720, by he South Sea directors, and some of the ministry. He was created a Peer, by the stile and title of Lord Cowper, Baron Cowper of Wingham, in the county of Kent, Nov. 9, 1706, 5 Anne, Viscount Fordwich, and Earl Cowper, March 18, 1717, 4 George I. This noble Earl is descended from Simon Cowper, theriff of London, in the fourth year of King Edward II, 1310. Sir William Cowper, another of his ancestors, who refided at the caule of Hertford, was eminent for his hospitality and charity, making it his busine's, in the decline of life, to vifit and relieve his poor neighbours at their houses, and died much lamented, anno 1664, in the \$3d year of his age. He married, in 1745, Lady Grizel, fifter of Thomas, Earl of Haddington, by whom he had iffue, Philip, Lord Vifcount Mahon, who died june 6, 1763, at Geneva, and the hon. This Lady dying on June 7, 1756, his Lordfhip, July 3, 1757, married Frances, daughter of the Hon. Judice Noel, by whom he has a daughter, born April 13, 1759. His Lordship has a brother and three fifters, viz. the hon, and rev. Philip Sherard, parfon of Tighe in Rutlandshire; Lady Dorothy, who married the rev. THOMAS PARKER, Earl of MACCLESFIELD Viscount Farker, and Baron of Macclesfield, F. R. S LL. D. fucceeded George, the late Earl, his father on March 17, 1764, having married, on Dec. 1, 1749 his coulin Mary, eldest daughter of Sir William Heathcote, of Hursley in Hampshire, Bart. by whon he has iffue a fon and two daughters, viz. George Lord Viscount Parker, and the Ladies Elizabeth and Mary. His Lordship was born on Oct. 12, 1723, and has one brother, the hon. George Lane Parker, born Sept. 6, 1724, captain of a company in the footguards, with the rank of colonel. This noble Earl is deicended from Thomas Parker, who flourished in the reign of King Edward III. and then possessed the manor of Lees, near Norton, in the county of Derby, which still retains the name of Norton-Lees. Thomas, Earl of Macclesfield, grandfather of the prefent Earl, was eminent in the profession of the law, and appointed one of Queen Anne's council; on June 8, 1705, he was called to the degree of ferjeant at law, and gave as the motto to the rings he delivered to Queen Anne and the Prince of Denmark, on that occasion, Moribus, Armis, Legibus. He was appointed Queen's ferjeant the same day, and had the honour [103]

nour of Knighthood conferred on him. He ferved parliament for Derby, from the year 1705 to the year 1708. In 1709-10, he was constituted lord chief ice of the Queen's-bench; and, on the decease of m tieen Anne, was one of the lords justices till the ival of George I. from Hanover, who, on March , 1715 16, created him Baron of Macclesfield, in county of Cheiter. His Majesty was pleased to liver the great feal to his Lordship, and to declare n high chancellor of Great Britain, May 12, 1718, it he enjoyed that high office only till Jan. 4, 1724-5. was one of the lords justices whilst George I. was Hanover in 1719, and that year was appointed flos rotulorum of Warwickshire, and custos roturum of Worcestershire. In 1721 he was created a iscount and Earl, in tail male, remainder to hold e dignities of Lady Parker, Baroness of Maccleseld, Viscountess Parker of Eweline, and Countess of lacclesfield, to Elizabeth his daughter, wife of Wilam Heathcoate, Efq; and to the heirs male of her ody. His only fon, George, late Earl of Maccleseld, was a learned and most accomplished Nobleaan, and had the greatest share in framing and conacting the act of parliament for the alteration of he style, and his speech in the House of Peers, at the econd reading of the bill, was printed, and greatly dmired. He was a member of several foreign acalemies, and succeeded the learned Martin Folkes, ifg; as prefident of the royal fociety. His Countefs, Mary, eldest of the two daughters and coheirs of Ralph Lane, Esq; an eminent Turkey merchant, was one of the worthiest women of this age. His Grace has a brother, Lord Robert Ker, and two fisters, Lady Esfex, and Lady Mary. His Grace is descended from the noble family of Drummond, formerly called Drumen, which

His Lordship was born on Apr 28, 1718, and in 1751 married Lady Elizabeth, fift daughter of John, late Earl Gower, and by her he three fons, George, Viscount Chewton, William, an , born Oct 7, 1761, and two daughters. Th. noble Earl is descended from John de Waldegrave who was sheriff of London in the year 1205, in th seventh year of King John. But this family is parti cularly eminent for the services of Sir Edward Walde grave, who served in parliament for Sudbury, 27 Eliz and was knighted at Greenwich, on July 19, 1607 And, though upwards of feventy years of age, at th breaking out of the civil war between Charles I. and his parliament, he took up arms on the King's fide and, having the command of a regiment of horse, be haved fo bravely, that the King conferred on him the dignity of a Baronet, on Aug. 1, 1643. R. S. is descended of a noble and llustrious family in the fouth of France, the repreentative of which (his Lordship's eldest brother) the toble Abel Ligonier, is now pessessed of the lordhips of Aillot, &c. &c. in Provence. The family had title to the first posts of the state; but, being protelants, were obliged to relinquish such flattering profcts. His Lordship and two of his brothers were prought over to England very young, by their excelent mother, who preferred a foreign country, where L 4

liberty of conscience was allowed, to her native at milder climate. The two latter, after well remembere faithful and honourable fervices to the nation, die one a major and the other colonel of a regimen The col. left iffue one fon, col. Ed. Called blawyers, Magnus Angliæ Seneschallus, is the great officer of the crown, being, as it were King's lord lieutenant, whose power was so that it was, at length, thought fit to trust longer in the hands of a subject. Lord President.] His office is to attend the King, propose business at the council table, and to report the King the several transactions there, when his

Lord Privy Seal.] He is an officer of great trust; r all charters and grants of the King, all pardons, and all matters of smaller concern, which not pass the great seal, pass through his hands; the fifth they must pass the signet, in the secretary's sice, which, being directed to the lord privy al, is his warrant for affixing the privy seal to the ant, and the privy seal is an authority to the lord ancellor or lord keeper, to pass the great seal,

Lord Great Chamberlain of England. He claims, the coronation of every King or Queen, 40 el's of mson velvet for his own robes; and on the corotion day, before the King rises, he brings his shirt, if and wearing cleaths; and after the King is affed by him, he claims his bed, with the furnite of his bed-chamber, and all the King's night parel for his fees. Lord High Conflable of England.] His power: jurisdiction was anciently so extravagant, that si the death of Edward Stafford, duke of Buckinghin 1551, there has been no such office, except coronation, when a lord high constable is created

Earl Marshal of England.] The earl marshal to cognizance of all matters of war and arms, whe he is commonly guided by the civil law. With kings at arms, and heralds, he marshals and or all proclamations and coronations of our kings queens; their marriages, funerals, cavalcades, re

interviews, feasts, &c. and also when peace or war is proclaimed. He keeps a court of chivalry, in the common hall of the college of arms, London, where the kings of arms, heralds, &c. sit as his council or assistants in their coats of arms, and he is judge to determine all disputes concerning descents, pedigrees, eleutcheons, &c. At a coronation he appears in his robes, with his coronet and staff in his hand, which latter is of gold, enamelled black at both ends, with the king's arms at the upper end, and his own at the lower. This office is hereditary in the dukes of Norsolk; but the present being a Roman Catholic, the office

s executed by deputy.

Lord High Admiral of England.] He has the nanagement of all maritime affairs, and the government of the royal navy, with power to decide all naritime cases both civil and criminal. He judges Il things done upon or beyond the feas, in any art of the world, upon the fea coasts, in all ports nd havens, and upon all rivers beyond the first ridge from the fea. By him admirals, vice and rear dmirals, and all fea captains are commissioned, all eputies for particular coasts, and coroners to view lead bodies found on the coasts, or at sea. He also ppoints judges of the courts of admiralty, and to im belong, by law and cuftom, all penalties and anerciaments of all transgressors at sea, &c. &c. the oods of all pirates and felons condemned, fea recks, &c. and a share of all lawful prizes. Also ll great fishes, as sea-hogs, and all other of extrardinary bigness, commonly called royal fishes, exept whales and sturgeons. It has been long in comnission, and the seven commissioners have 1000 l. er annum each.

Secretaries of State.] They are two, one for the orthern province, and the other for the fouthern rovince, into which Europe is divided. They fend irections to, and receive advices from all ministers proad, in their several provinces; and direct every M 2

thing at home, for the church, crown, army, militia, private grants, pardons, dispensations, &c. and petitions to the sovereign, memorials from foreign ministers, are by them received, answered and dispatched, according to the king's command. They have also the custody of the signet. The paper office also depends on them, containing all public papers, council letters, and of ministers abroad; and generally all papers and dispatches which pass throw the fecretaries office, which are disposed into a library, and a keeper has the immediate care of them.

Steward of the King's Houshold He rules and guides the king's court and houshold, and has authority over all the officers and fervants thereof, except those of the king's chapel, chamber and stables at the beginning of parliaments he attends the king and administers the oaths of allegiance and supremacy to all the members of the house of commons and at the end of parliaments, he adjusts all parliamentary expences, &c. He judges all offences as treasons, murders, felonies and bloodsheds, committed within the court, or the verge thereof. At the death of the sovereign, he breaks his staff office over the hearse, wherein the royal corpse deposited, and thereby discharges all the officers under his jurisdiction.

Lord Chamber Lin of the Houshold.] He has the overlight and government of all the king's office and fervants above stairs (except the precinct of the bedchamber, which is wholly under the groom of thole) who are all sworn by him, or by his warrar to the king. He leads the queen when she goes broad, inspects all the officers of the wardrobe, all the king's houses, and of the removing war robes, or of beds, tents, revels, music, comedian hunting, messengers, &c. &c. retained in his Mijesty's service. He has also the superintendance the series at arms, physicians, surgeons, apoth

caties, bathers, &c. and finally of his Majesty's chaplains. Also of the charges of funerals, coronations, marriages, entries, cavalcades, and of all furniture in the parliament, and in the rooms of address to the king. He carries a white staff in his hand, as a badge of his office, and wears a gold key, tied with a blue ribbon above his pocket.

Treasurer of the Chamber.] He pays all the king's family above stairs, the chapel, the yeomen of the guard, the messengers and all travelling charges. He receives the money from the exchequer, by warrant

from the lords of the treasury.

Treasurer of the Houshold.] He is a white staff officer; and in the absence of the lord steward, hath power, with the other officers of the green-cloth (an office so called from the green-cloth, where they sit) and with the steward of the Marshalsea, to hear and determine all offences committed in the king's palace.

Comptroller of the Household.] He keeps a roll of all other officers of the green-cloth's accompts and reckonings, relating to the household, and fits at

trials, as the treasurer doth.

Gentlemen of the Bed chamber.] They are frequently called lords of the bed chamber, whereof the first is groom of the stole, i. e. of the long robe or vestment; he having the office of presenting and putting on his Majesty's sirst garment, or shirt, every morning, and to order every thing relative to the bed-chamber. The other lords of the bed chamber are generally of the prime nobility, who wait a week, in their turns, in the king's ted-chamber, there to lie by him, on a pallet bed, each night; and in the absence of the groom of the sole to supply his place; they also wait upon the king when he eats in private; for then the cup-bearers, carvers and sewers do not attend.

Cofferer of the Household.] He is a white staff officer, and hath a special charge over the other offi-

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of feveral of his fervants, above and below stairs, a also for provisions, by the direction and allowance of the green-cloth: He likewise sits on trials and judgments, with the lord steward, as the treasurer and

comptroller do. Master of the Horse to the King.] He has the charge of ordering and disposing all matters relating to th king's stables, races, breed of horses, &c. He hatl the power of commanding the equerries, pages footmen, grooms, riders of the great horse, coach men, farriers, fmiths, fadlers, and all other officer and tradefinen employed in the king's stables, to al whom he gives (or by his warrant to the avener) th oath of allegiance, &c. for the true and faithfu discharge of their duty. He has the charge of al lands and revenues appointed for the king's breed c horses, for charge of the stable, and for litters coaches, fumpter horses, &c. and hath the privilege which no other fervant of the crown hath, of mak ing use of the king's equipages, horses, pages c footmen. At any folemn cavalcade, he has the honor to ride next behind the king, and leads a horse (state.

Master or Keeper of the Great Wardrobe.] The great office is an incorporation or body politic sever, established so by James I. Belonging thereto are divers tradesmen, artiscers and others, to the number of fixty, who furnish every thing from them for coronations, marriages and sunerals of the royal family; furnish the court with beds, hanging cloths of state, carpets and other necessaries; house for ambassadors at their first arrival; presents so foreign princes and ambassadors, cloths of estate and other furniture for the lord lieutenant of Ireland, and all his majesty's ambassadors abroad, robe for the president of Wales, and foreign knights of the garter, also for those at home, and all the officers of the garter; coats for kings, heralds, and put

pursuivants at arms; robes for the lord treasurer, under treasurer and chancellor of the exchequer; livery for the lord chamberlain, grooms of the privy chamber, officers of robes, and several other of the king's servants. Rich liveries for the two lords chief justices, all the barons of the exchequer, divers officers in those courts, and all liveries for his Majesty's servants. Furniture for the yatchts and barges.

Auditor of the Exchequer.] He files the bills of all the tellers, whereby they charge themselves with all money received, and draws all orders to be signed by the lord treasurer (having first a warrant from him) for issuing out all monies, by virtue of privy seals, which are recorded by the clerk of the pells, and entered and lodged in the said auditor's office. He makes debentures to the several persons who have sees, annuities, or pensions, by letters patent from the king, out of the exchequer, and directs them for payment to the tellers. He receives every day the state of the account of each teller, and weekly certifies the whole to the lords of the treasury, who immediately present the estimate or balance to the sovereign.

Tellers of the Exchequer.] They receive all monies due to the king, and thereupon throw down a bill through a pipe into the tally-court, where it is received by the auditor's clerk, who there attends to write the words of the faid bill upon a tally, and then deliver the fame, to be entered by the clerk of the pells, or his clerk; which tally is then cloven by the two deputy chamberlains, who have their feals, and whilft the fenior deputy reads the one part, the junior examines the other. There are

four tellers.

Treasurer of the Navy.] He receives out of the exchequer, by warrant of the commissioners of the treasury, all monies for paying the charges of the navy, by warrant from the principal officers thereof.

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Constable of the Tower.] Is usually a person of the sirst quality, and under him there are a governor, deputy governor, a major, gentleman-porter, two master gunners, &c. a chaplain, physician, surgeon, apothecary, 40 warders and a number of other officers. The matters he has in charge, are too well known to be here enumerated.

Of the KNIGHTS of the GARTER.

This most noble and illustrious order (if we consider either its antiquity, or the nobleness of the perfonages that have been enrolled therein) excels and cutvies all other institutions of honour in the whole world, and owes its original to the great hero of that age, Edward III. who conquered France and Scotland, and brought their Kings prisoners to England.

It began in 1350, the 24th of his reign, viz. 119 years before the foundation of the order of St. Michael, by Lewis XI. King of France, 1469; 80 years before the inflitution of the order of the Golden Fleece by Philip II. the fecond duke of Burgundy, 1430 and 190 before King James V. of Scotland reflored the Order of St. Andrew, or the Thiftle; and 200 years before the Order of the Elephant was inflituted in Denmark.

King Edward, upon a view of recovering France (which descended to him by right of his mother made it his business to draw the best soldiers of Europe into his interest, and thereupon projecting and setting up King Arthur's round table, he proclaimed a solemn tilting, to invite foreigners of quality and

courage to the exercise.

The place for the folemnity being fixed at Windfor, he upon new-year's day, in 1344, published his royal letters of protection for the fafe coming and return of such foreign Knights as had a mind to venture their reputation at those justs and tournaments, which were to be held on the 19th of January enfuing.

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Moreover, he provided a great supper, to begin the solemnity; and then ordaining this feast to be annually kept at Whitsontide, he for that purpose crested a particular building in the castle, wherein he placed a round table of 200 feet diameter, in imitation of King Arthur's at Winchester; and thereat entertained the Knights, at his own expense of

100 l. per week. This mighty and invincible prince Edward, being endowed with great piety, commended himself and his companions to the protection of St. George of Cappadocia; whose parents being Christians, afforded him the advantage of being educated in that religion; and he taking upon him the profession of a foldier, was made a tribune or colonel (in Palestine, his mother's country) in which post he behaving himfelf with great courage and conduct, he was preferred to higher stations in the army, by the emperor Dioclesian; but the said St. George afterwards complaining of the faid emperor for his feverities against the Christians, and arguing in their defence, he was thereupon imprisoned and cruelly treated; and the emperor perceiving his constancy to the Christians was not to be shaken, he was, on the 23d of April anno 290, drawn through the city and beheaded; and thus he received the crown of martyrdom, And that his memory might be still continued, King Edward gave his companions, for part of their daily habit, the image of the faid fain, (fitting on horseback, encountering the dragon with a tilting spear) appendant to a blue ribband, continually to be worn about their necks.

In 1347, the faid king issuing out his garter for the fignal of a battle that was crowned with success (which is supposed to be the battle of Cressy) where he took John the French king prisoner, and brought him to England; at which time he had also prisoner, David king of Scots, as before-mentioned; and Edward his son, the Black prince, expelling the rebels

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of Castile, and enthroning Don Pedro, their lawful king; he, upon these mighty and glorious exploits, instituted this order, giving the garter preheminence amongst its ensigns, whence the select number, whom he incorporated into a fraternity, were stiled, Equites Aureæ Periscelidis, viz. Knights of the golden garter.

Of the KNIGHTS of the BATH.

The order of the Bath, so called from their bathing used before they were created, was first instituted at the coronation of king Henry IV. Anno 1399, when he made forty-fix that were bathed in the tower; and since that time it has been customary for kings and queens to create knights at their coronation.

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tion, marriages, births of princes, or any other time of public rejoicing. Therefore his Majesty king George I. was pleafed to re-establish the same, and erect it into a regular military order for ever, as follows:

The person, whilst receiving this honour, kneels before the king, who, after knighting him, puts a red ribband over his right shoulder, and so athwart his breast and back, under his left arm, appendant thereto is the badge or fymbol of the order, (being a scepter, rose, thistle, and three imperial crowns, conjoined within a circle, all of pure gold, and upon the circle this Motto, Tria juncta in uno, and are daily worn by each knight companion) and while the faid knight is kneeling, garter king of arms administers the oath.
