I should love to sit & have a good chat with you at this time, if other duties would allow of it; but as it is I must wish you much peace & prosperity, so my errand is off to other duties. When you left this Sem. you committed the settlement of your affairs to Robbins. After you wrote your first letter to him from New-Haven - he came to me & asked whether I preferred to pay him the half of what Ezr. Towner allowed us for our sacrifice in the room in the old building & so have it all credited to me, or let it all be credited to you & he pay the half (which was one dollar) to me. I preferred the latter to which he assented. But not receiving money enough to pay all your debts the first time, he deferred paying me to a future time - Towner mind him of the debt & enquired once or twice whether he had heard from you, he said no, untill just as the year was closing he came & said he had just heard from you & he had sent the dollar to me when he got the bill changed on some thing to that amount.
