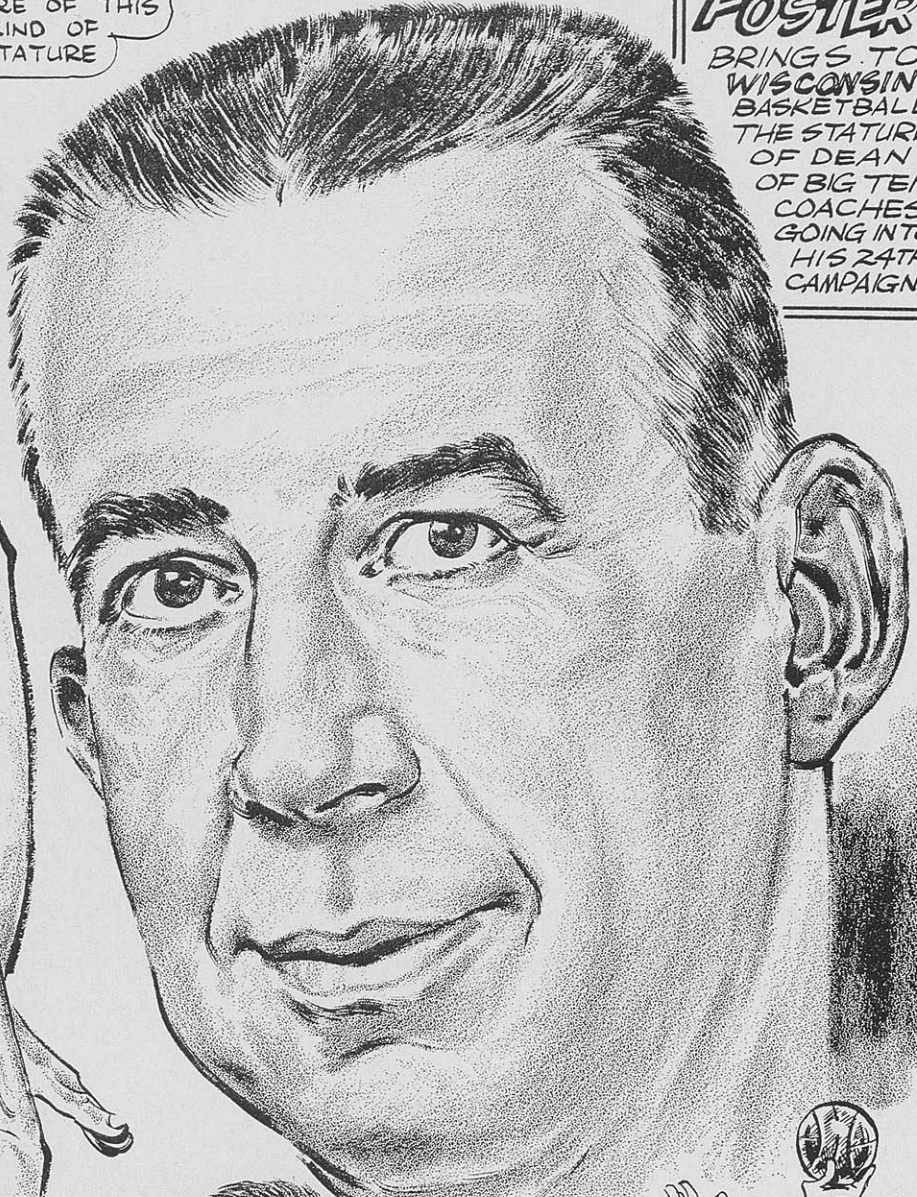

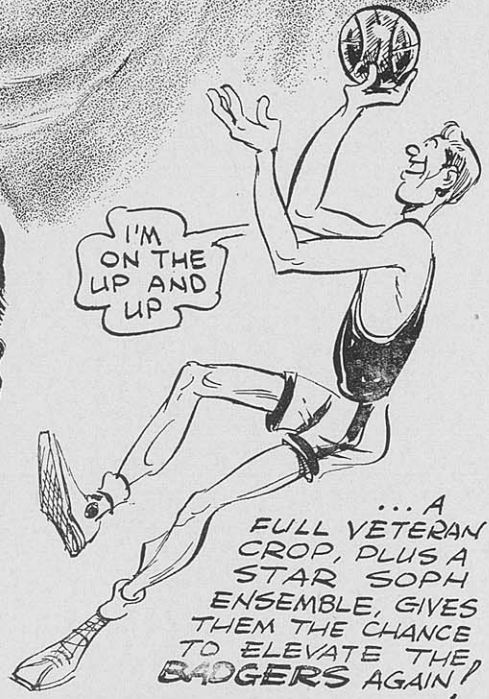

Badger Basketball Outlook Brighter

Eight returning lettermen, plus the nucleus of the best freshman squad at Wisconsin since 1948, makes the overall picture for the 1957-58 season brighter than it has been for some time. The Badgers finished 9th last season, pulling themselves up by their collective obotstraps, so to speak, to win their final two games of the season from Northwestern and Iowa, and escape a cellar finish in the Western Conference.

Bob Litzow, high scorer deluxe, and Glenn Borland are the letterman forwards returning, and whereas they were the only ones to come back a year ago, they are joined by letterman centers Ray Gross and Steve Radke, and letterman guards Walter "Bunk" Holt, Brian Kulas, Jim Rogneby, and Steve Stephens.

Litzow, the Badgers' leading scorer in 12 games in 1956-57, and who tallied 355 points in 22 games, including 239 in the Big Ten, returns for his third and final year of competition, and currently he ranks 9th on the all-time list of high scoring Badger basketball players. Borland, the smooth playing forward with the left-handed hook shot, improved rapidly as last season progressed, and was the team's second leading scorer with 257 points. Two sophomore stars last season, Brian Kulas, the long, lean guard, and Ray Gross, the 6-7 center, ranked third and fourth with point totals of 211 and 136 in scoring, and another guard, who was Wisconsin's best in the closing games on the schedule, Walter Holt, ranked 5th on the team's scoring list with 125 points.

To go with his eight returning lettermen, Coach Harold E. "Bud" Foster has some talented sophomores from a fine freshman squad who give promise of developing into top notch Big Ten performers.

The sophomores make themselves felt at each position, with good height and scoring ability characterizing their daily workouts and the early non-conference games.

At forwards, Bob Barneson, 6-4, 192 pounds, from Eau Claire; Fred Clow, 6-4, 180 pounds, Rockford (East), Illinois, and Sam Barnard, 6-6, 208 pounds, Oshkosh, are the most promising at the moment. Barnard made a most impressive collegiate debut, scoring 19 points against South Dakota, the highest number of points tallied by a sophomore player in his first game since the 1945-46 season when Bobby Cook, one of the Badgers' all-time greats, scored 21 points against Carroll College.

Barneson and Clow, while slow to add scoring punch to the Badgers' front line, have shown themselves to be strong rebounders, and with confidence, and experience, will become top-notchers.

The pivot position welcomes John Stack, a 6-7½ transfer from Northwestern University, and an Evanston, Illinois, high school product. John did not play in the season's opened against South Dakota, being slow to round into playing form while battling illness, but against Notre Dame, in a reserve role, came on and poured in 14 points, to clinch the starting position at center. Stack has a good hook shot, rebounds well, and is an excellent defender.

At guards, service returnee Bob Serbiak started strong, and won a regular berth for the first three games, then reverted to a reserve role, when he could not shake the challenge of junior guard Brian Kulas. Another sophomore of promise, Rick Murray, a 6-1 boy from Three Lakes, has developed fast, and will see action as the season progresses. Murray has the most speed of any Badger guard, possesses a good outside shot, and is a good defender.

Of the veterans, Bob Litzow appears to be the best bet to survive the influx of the sophomores, and retain a starting role. In the first five games, Litzow

averaged 410 from the field, and was Wisconsin's leading scorer with 73 points.

Letterman guards Walter Holt and Brian Kulas, senior and junior, respectively, give steadiness in the backcourt, with Holt ready to continue the fine play that marked a good second half-season performance last year. Against Rice Institute, Holt poured in 11 field goals to match his all-time collegiate high of 22 points set against Northwestern last season. Kulas performed well in reserve roles against Wisconsin's first three opponents, then turned in a strong showing, especially on the boards, to clinch a starter's role against Rice. His 6-6 frame gives Foster good overall height when paired with Stack, Barnard, Barneson, or Gross in the line-up.

Center Ray Gross, at 6-7, the second tallest player on the team, is a second semester junior letterman, and his experience will give the Badgers good depth at this vital position, though early-season injuries to sophomores Sam Barnard and John Stack may cause Foster to rely on him even more this season.

Three other lettermen are available, with center-forward Steve Radke and guards Jim Rogneby and Steve Stephens slated for reserve duty when the occasion demands. Stephens gave the Badgers a decided lift in the final two games last year, and the Badgers wound up the season with wins over Northwestern and Iowa. His 13 points against Northwestern was his best output of the season, though he tallied just 24 points all year.

Two junior varsity award winners are on the squad, John Pamperin, forward, and Keith Anderson, guard, with Anderson showing good improvement over last season's play. He has worked hard, and his height, 6-4½, is to his advantage.

Wisconsin's Head Basketball Coach

Dean of the Western Conference basketball coaches, Harold E. "Bud" Foster embarks on his 24th season in charge of Badger cage fortunes with official recognition nationally of his ranking as a top-rated coach.

Bud is a past president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches (1956) of the United States, and in August of 1955 was a member of a coaching clinic that toured Japan under the auspices of the Far East Army Command.

Born in Newton, Kansas, May 30, 1906, Bud had the distinction of being the heaviest baby ever born in that state; he tipped the scales at 13¾ pounds.

Because Newton did not offer any high school facilities, Bud prepped at Mason City, Iowa, high school, then went to Chicago. He entered Wisconsin in 1926, studying economics and playing basketball. He was all-conference center in the seasons of 1929 and 1930; also earned All-American honors in 1930.

Graduating in June, 1930, Foster played professional basketball with Chicago and Oshkosh (All-Stars) teams, selling seeds for an Oshkosh firm during the off-seasons. In 1933, he was named freshman coach at Wisconsin and stepped into the varsity coaching spot when Dr. Walter E. Meanwell resigned in 1934.

Foster's initial team tied for the conference crown in 1935, then spent the next five years in the conferent second division. But, in 1941, he welded together a fine group of players which, after a poor start, won their last 15 games to snare both Big Ten and NCAA championships. His last championship team was in 1946-47 and these cagers also finished third in the Eastern NCAA regional meet in 1947.

Included in the record of Foster-coached Wisconsin teams the past 23 years are second place finishes in 1942, 1944, and 1950. In overall play, Foster's teams have won 254 games, losing 234.

Assistant Basketball Coach — "Fritz" Wegner

Like Foster, Fred "Fritz" Wegner, assistant coach, is a graduate of Wisconsin and also played on the Oshkosh All-Star pro cage teams. Fred, who is regarded as one of the keenest scouts in collegiate basketball and an ideal assistant coach, played guard on the Wisconsin varsity teams of 1934-35-36; also was first baseman on the baseball teams of those same years. He starred in basketball, baseball and track at Oshkosh high school.

Fred came to Wisconsin as an assistant coach in basketball one year after his graduation, later on adding the baseball duties in 1938 as an assistant to Art Mansfield.

During the past 11 summers, Fred has been in charge of the boys' baseball association in Madison, with approximately 1,000 youngsters competing in the various age groups.
