Maggie Faulkner last week.

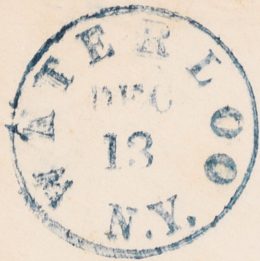
It was the funniest affair I have
