"What Are the Potential Sources of Financial Support for a Private
Institute of Technology", the first report from the new Institute Long

The report is authored by Dr. Edward S. Todd, vice president for
Instructional Development and Planning; Dr. Leo F. Smith, executive
assistant to the president; and Dr. Eugene Fram of the College of
Business. It reviews the financial problems of RIT and of higher educa-
tion and presents alternative methods of support.

DR. CARROLL ACCORDED HONORARY MEMBERSHIP IN PHOTO SCIENCE SOCIETY

Dr. Burt Carroll, professor and chairman of graduate studies in the School of Photographic Arts and Sciences, has been made an Honorary Member of the Society of Photographic Scientists and Engineers. The membership was awarded by the SPSE Honors Committee and presented at the society's recent annual conference in Chicago.

Dr. Carroll, who celebrated his 75th birthday in March, has had a career in photographic science of over 50 years. He retired from the Eastman Kodak Research Laboratories in 1962, after 30 years with the company, and joined RIT the following year.

SUMMER ELECTROMECHANICAL WORKSHOP SCHEDULED

Under the provisions of a New York State Education Department grant, the College of Continuing Education will conduct a Summer Workshop in Electromechanical Technology from August 2-6, at the Metropolitan Center.
