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A very destructive fire occurred last evening on Poydras street, in the block immediately below Canal street, and adjoining the Customhouse. The fire originated in the store of Kennedy and Street, but from what cause we have not ascertained. It commenced about 7 o'clock, and continued till about half past 10, although within a stone's cast of the Mississippi. The stores of Messrs Kennedy and Street, of Mr. H. H. McKee, Messrs Kennedy and Duffalo, and Mr. Allen were entirely consumed; but most of the contents had been previously removed. The houses belonging to Mr. H. H. McKee, and were insured. The amount of property destroyed it is impossible to estimate; nor is it easy to ascertain the value of the goods sequestered by depositors in consequence of the combustible nature of the stores. No lives were lost, but from the crowd gathered occasioned by the explosion of gunpowder, Mr. Ferdinand Ferry, had his leg seriously injured, and a person in seeing a child was injured himself from a window, was also hurt. It is said that the fire in the store of Kennedy and Street was the fire so destructive; and that it was more easily communicated to the other stores on account of the combustible materials in the neighborhood.

As a season construction, we have been mistaken in supposing that the second division of the Barratans and Terra-hor-line canal navigation is completed. But though on national subjects we freely admit the propriety of parties, we do not perceive their utility in the election of a state governor, whose executive duties come not within the scope of the peculiar policy of the national party. The policy of Louisiana with regard to her improvement is not legitimately within the jurisdiction of such parties; nor indeed are the local policies of any state embraced in the general policies of the Union—although by party discipline they are too often carried into that unnatural condition. If we are to be divided into parties, we are to be divided into parties of Louisiana better or worse for her. We are to be divided into parties to discern; but we do believe that a candidate was selected on account of his personal qualifications, not party pretensions, the real welfare of the state would be better promoted.

However if we are inferior in opinion, that error is not to control our course of action; for as we stated before, if the democratic party in convention assembled shall nominate a candidate for governor, we shall abide by that nomination.
