

The maritime traffic of France is continually declining. The Chamber of Deputies, the French Geographical Society and numerous newspapers have been seeking for a remedy, but as yet have found none. The greater part of the French merchant fleet that figures in the Annuaire is not counted at all in Lloyths or other statistical publications because it is so insignificant. The Annuaire, for example, reported that the merchant slags in 1806 numbered 15,556, while outside of France that country was credited with only 1,507 steam and saling vessels in the merchant trade. The French, foreign and colonial Review has receastly explained this remarkable discrepancy in figures. It says that, omitting from the total of 15,536 vessels in the Annuaire 150 steamships, averaging 3,000 tons each, which represent the fleets of five large companies that receive subsidies for mail carrying, there are left 15,358 vessels, whose total capacity is 440,000 tons, or an average of a lite over twenty-eight tons to each vessel. 



MAKING THIMBLES.

MAKING THIMBLES.

A Detailed Description of the Process. The way thimbles are made in this country and England is simple enough. Dies of the different sizes are used in which the metal, whether gold, silver or steel, is pressed. The hole punching, inishing and polishing or tempering, are done afterward. Celluloid is motted. The best thimbles are made in France, where the process is more thorough. The French consider durability in their gold thimbles, as the first requisite. The first step in the making of a Paris gold thimble is, according to the New York Sun, the cutting into a disk of the desired size of a thin piece of sheet iron. This is heated to a red heat, placed over a graduated hole in an iron punch. This hole is the form of the thimble. The iron thus formed is removed from the hote, and the little indentations to keep the needle from slipping are made in it, and all the other finishing strokes of the thimble's form put on it. The iron is theamade into steel by a process peculiar to the French thimble maker, is tempered, polished and brought to a deep blue color.
