Sofia, Sept. 25.—Sensational rumors are edrrent here that Bulgaria has sent an ultimatum to Turkey announcing that unless satisfactory assurances are received before noon to-day that the Ottoman troops will be withdrawn inmediately from the frontier, Bulgaria will forthwith mobilize her whole army.

The reports, however, are categorically denied at the foreign office here, which declares that no such ultimatum has been sent. The officials state that the situation is unchanged.

ABLE ARGUMENT IN CANADA'S BEHALF

REPLY TO CONTENTIONS OF UNITED STATES

Attorney-General Finlay, after a recapitulation of the points of the argument, referred to the great importance of the subject, and concluded with saying "I trust the Canadian interests will not suffer by my presentation. I commit the question into the hands of the tribunal with full confidence in their judgment."

The attorney-general during his argument on the Portland canal produced a volume of Vanconver's charts obtained from the London tibrary. ed from the London fibrary. These he stated to be identical with the set which came from the parliamentary library at Ottawa. He then proceeded to discuss the argument of the United States, based on the Thalweg rule, which is to the effect that where national territories are divided by a river or stream having several channels, the middle of the deepest channel should be taken as the boundary. He contended that his rule applied only to rivers and streams, and not to an estuary such as the Portland channel.

Again referring to the United States' contention that Russia was not likely to have abandoned the only deep channel on the south. Sir Robert Finlay pointed on the south. Sir Robert Finlay pointed out that there was no question of abandonment, that the right of indocent passages would remain, and further, that the line was to run, not through any channels, but "le long de la passe."

He then touched on one view suggested by the United States, that the lower portions of the Portland canal and Observatory inlet were held by the negotiators to form one inlet. After pointing out the impossibility of this, he passed to the consideration of the third question, "What course should the line take from points of commencement to the entrance to the Portland channel?"

Dealing with this contention of the United States that this line should follow along the parallel of 54 degrees 40 montes, he showed that there was no warrant for this view, and the treaty explicitly declared the point of commencement to be the southerwost points on Prisce of Wales Island, and not the parallel of latitude, which was mentioned merely for the purpose of Identifica-

him, in which 54 degrees 40 minutes was fixed as the line separating the Russian and the United States sphere of influence, he made 80 reference to that latitude in his instructions to Bagot, but spoke of the southermost point of the island as the commencement. The Russians on their part steadily claimed 55 degrees as the line, and that was adopted, though as it cut Prince of Wates Island, it was modified as regards that island, so as to secure it entire fo Russian. 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
