### HISTORY OF AMARILLO AIR FIELD

One year after the start of its construction, Amarillo Army Air Field typifies the determination and energy of the Army Air Forces Training Command, with a completed building program and a steady production of graduate mechanics and technicians, guardians of the Flying Fortresses, realized even during the latter days of 1942.

Amarillo Army Air Field is located ten miles east of the City of Amarillo, deep in the heart of the Panhandle of Texas.

Since the field was built on a typical barren plain, great care has been taken to enhance its living conditions. More than 25,000 trees, shrubs and bulbs have been planted and carefully nurtured, and in addition a systematic program of soil-erosion prevention has been established and elimination of dust during the windy season has been accomplished by sowing the entire area with native grasses.

On April 1, 1942, Colonel Edward C. Black was relieved of his command at Sheppard Field, Texas, and ordered to activate an AC Technical School at Amarillo, Texas.

Colonel Black issued General Order No. I on April 20 and set up his headquarters in the Amarillo Building; the permanent party was housed in the Amarillo Hotel. Field construction was started at the same time. On May 26, the War Department designated the new installation as Amarillo Field.

The first large contingent of permanent party men arrived on the field on September 2 and the first group of potential students arrived the following day. Headquarters offices were moved to the field on September 6 and the first class of students entered upon their course of studies on September 7, under direction of Lieutenant Colonel Paul T. Hanley.

On October 22, Brigadier General Julian B. Haddon assumed command. Lieutenant Colonel Benjamin E. Cheney, the Executive Officer, soon followed the Colonel, who had been transferred to Grand Rapids, Mich. Colonel Cheney was

succeeded as Executive Officer by Colonel Edgar T. Selzer, who had just returned from foreign service. Major N. C. Voshel, the Adjutant, was one of the first officers to arrive after headquarters were established.

The field was so near completion by Armistice Day, November 11, that General Haddon opened it on that day to the public, and a crowd of Panhandle citizens, estimated to number 40,000, visited the technical school to view some of the results of their outlay for war expenditures.

The official name of the field was changed on December 2 to Amarillo Army Air Field.

On December 23, the first class of graduating students were complimented upon the successful completion of their studies at the technical school by Major General Jacob E. Fickel, commanding the Third District, AAF Technical Training Command, Tulsa, Okla.

On March 6, General Haddon was ordered to Washington, D. C., for temporary duty. He was succeeded on March 18 by Colonel Edward W. Raley, with Colonel Selzer serving as Commanding Officer in the interim.

On April 19, Brigadier General H. S. Burwell brought the benefits of many years of distinguished leadership to Amarillo Army Air Field. He continued to stress the primary function of this technical school: The training of expert mechanics and technicians to service Flying Fortresses and keep them flying around the globe to assure an Allied victory.


Late in May a new activity was added to the Field with the assumption of basic training. This branch of training has grown to be one of the major activities of the Field and has as its mission the education of Army Air Forces personnel in the fundamentals of soldiering.

On July 19, Colonel John K. Gowen, Jr., assumed command, becoming the Field's sixth Commanding Officer. He succeeded Brigadier General Burwell.








### Maintenance



Probably no course of study could be more thorough than that given students at the schools of the Amerillo Army Air Field. The new student spends no few hours in the beginning getting acquainted with the tools and machines he will use. The majority of the students have had no mechanical training whatever, and the techniques he develops in the use of

tools and machines will greatly influence his ultimate ability as an air-

In the great building labeled "Mechanics' Tools" are numerous rooms which accommodate from 12 to 25 students in each class, and the classes are in session around the clock! There is not one hour in any twenty-four during which students are not in classes, at drill, at rest, or sleeping.


During this familiarizing period students are shown motion pictures of various processes, take part in chalk-talks, and are under the constant supervision of instructors, both civilian and military. It is during these classes that they "get the feel" of hacksaws, files, vicos, drills, threading machines, aircraft plumbing tools, riveting tools, soldering, wrenches, and many special tools for various makes and designs of aircraft engines.

#### AIRPLANE STRUCTURES

This is the third branch in the school system, and deals with the structural units of an airplane. Students have, up to this point, dealt with the various parts of aircraft. In "Structures" they begin to work on airplanes as a whole, starting from the bottom on wheel assemblies and nomenclature of all parts, and working through to sheet metal and flight controls. Here is their first contact with empinnage, the tall assembly, and other large assemblies which up to now have been studied in mock-ups. "Structures" is something of a milestone in the lives of students for it is here that they begin to "roam" all over a Flying Fortress and really discover what makes it tick. It is said that this branch of training is so thorough that more than one experienced pilot who has come in for a looksee has lingered to discover parts he had never seen before.

One complete cutaway of an entire 8-17 is the source of never-ending interest for even the most advanced students. Another Fortress which is more often than not the center of interest is one that is made from at least five other airplanes of the same make and design that have been scrapped or wrecked!

There is usually a faraway look in the eyes of students when they examine a Flying Fortress from stem to stern for the first time!

### Fundamentals


It is here that the student begins to really get his teeth into the enormous task of maintaining an airplane. He is finished with taking some part of an engine apart in the daylight and putting it back together again in total darkness to gain confidence in handling his tools. It now becomes his job to learn cable maintenance, electrical contacts, splicing, fundamentals of electricity, induction and electro magnets, parellel circuits and magnatism, trouble shooting such as finding direct and cross short circuits, tracing circuits, turnbuckles and lock-washers.


Safety in all its many ramifications is stressed in "Fundamentals." Instructors begin here the most important task of impressing upon the students the responsibility that is theirs, Pilots, gunners, bombardiers, navigators—whole crews will have to rely on the safety-mindedness of today's student and tomorrow's expert mechanic.

While in "Fundamentals" the student is also introduced to "Technical Orders." Reams and reams of information and instruction are on file in the library of this department, and the student must familiarize himself with their contents. Supply forms, correct procedures and many others are kept religiously and up to date. Every airplane has a maintenance sheet that tells its whole life history at a glance. Not even a rivet may be removed without the fact being noted. An accurate record of every airplane that leaves the factory for duty with the armed forces is kept from this time to the day its junked parts are disposed of. Even pilots relieving one another while in the clouds must note these reliefs-so that every hour of life in any airplane is recorded as to not only how many hours it flies, but who is piloting it! Besides, every last nut and bolt has its own history. There is probably no machine on earth, the intimate details of which are more fully known, than a military airplane!

The now world-famous 8-17, the "Flying Fortress," is the special concern of Amerillo Army Air Field Training Schools, Many others are studied and handled with the same precision, patience and thoroughness, but the Fortress is THE airplane as far as students are concerned!



Mockup, Arrangement of Lighting, Ground, Relay, etc., to Show How to Trace Circuits.











Mockup, Pilot Static System.













### Instruments




Aircraft instruments constitute one of the most popular parts of student training. They are many and varied, and always a challenge to students with a mind for real precision work. Autosyn instruments and mechanisms, gauges for oil, manifold, de-icing, landing gear, thermometers, tachimeters, fuel level gauges, aircraft gyro instruments and systems, altimeter, rate of climb, air speed—all these and many more, some secret in nature, occupy the study and work periods of students in "Instruments."

## Hydraulic Systems

Virtually all transmission of power in a Flying Fortress is accomplished by means of hydraulic systems. Students who have been home auto mechanics find here vaguely familiar parts, except that they are on a grand scale. He is fascinated by the suremoving, and many arms, of the air vents around a giant radial engine; he is pleased to discover that the brakes, although many, many times larger than his automobile brakes, work on the same principle; he ponders over the great parts and mechanisms that respond to the pressure of a comparatively small hydraulic cylinder; he gazes in admiration at a giant mockup of a whole B-17 hydraulic system which has been built so that he may see and understand the whole principle of transmission of power by means of hydraulics! Why, this subject is so wide and varied that a fellow might specialize in it!






Paralleling of B-17 Engine Generator System.

#### AIRCRAFT ENGINES

Breathes there a man with soul so dead—that he would not like to tinker with an engine—any engine? It is probably safe to state that a student who completes "Aircraft Engines" successfully will be a match for any kind of internal combustion engine thereafter. For in this department, through the medium of the ever-present instructor, motion pictures, slides, books and technical orders, the student learns the principles of aircraft engine construction—disassembly, assembly, pistons, cylinders, nose section accessories, lubrication, induction and exhaust systems, timing, clearance, firing and ignition, and hundreds of other parts of the power plants that keep them up there. As in the other departments, inspection and maintenance procedures are studied intensively and at the close of this course of study he is ready for the intricacies of any type aircraft.







### Juel Systems

The carburetor is said to be the heart of any gas engine, and it is with this thought that students assemble, disassemble, over and over, to the end that they know they will not be outwitted in the battle area by a carburetor that refuses to carburate until an expert gets to work on it. There are many kinds and types of carburation, and upon graduation the technical student knows all the answers.

Probably every student has fixed some kind of electrical gadget during his civilian life, and in "Electrical Systems," he is in his glory. There is no end to "things to fix," but the great difference here is precision, no margin for error, and safety.

The student first learns electrical system symbols, and then proceeds to aircraft storage batteries and lighting systems. Giant models, and cut-aways of the real thing, give him every opportunity to delve indefinitely into the mysteries of electricity. This department probably calls for more blueprint reading than any other, a condition which like many others, teaches a student not only the work at hand, but innumerable other crafts and sciences.

During his class periods in "Electrical Systems" the student studies, besides those mentioned, fluorescent lighting, condenser testing, starter systems, operating details, portable power plant maintenance, magnetos, construction, timing, ignition, spark plug. boosters, harness testing, switches, generators, methods of regulation, wiring-and trouble-shooting in all branches.
















INSPECTION NO. 2

The 25-hour inspection is "visible," but the "50" is as thorough as any could be. Students are now reaching that point where they begin to go about their inspection and repair like oldtimers. Just routine, Bud!

### Engine Operation

Amarillo Army Air Field has the only twin-engine setup for student instruction in the whole Training Command. "Trouble" is the most important word in this department, meaning that here students check airplane engines mounted on test blocks by running them wide open—with test clubs (short, wide propeller blades) to put a more than ordinary load on them, and also to keep them cool. Here again, students study various inspection forms, but it is under the heading, "General Operating Trouble," that they work and study. They are here to learn actual operation of airplane engines. Most students note that "Engine Operation" is also the noisiest school in the system!

#### INSPECTION NO. 1—PRE-FLIGHT AND DAILY

"Pre-Flight and Daily," as the title implies, is the final test of all parts of an airplane before it might safely be taken off the ground, and the daily inspection thereafter. The study here is not unlike a combination of other branches, except that, if possible, it is more rigid. It is at this point of repair and maintenance that there must be no guesswork, for it is the final test before actual flight; it must be right!



### Propellers GRADUATION

Many have been the inventions for flying an airplane without the standard propellers as we know them, but none have approached the power and drive of the modern "blade." The Flying Fortress, with twelve of them cutting into the air, be it normal or rarified, is probably the queen of them all.

Students learn the hydromatic and Curtis electric systems, removal and installation, construction and operation, and why the propeller is shaped the way it is.








#### Field Test

Finis! Shops are left behind, and students who have successfully reached Field Test are on the last lap before graduation! Sandwiched in between the many classes of the past weeks has been an almost daily routine of military drill, calistrenics (Amarillo Army Air Field has been judged to have the best physical fitness program in the entire dis-trict), medical exeminations, shots in the arm, dental examination, and the many other routines in the life of any soldier. Now, even barracks are left behind, and the students move into the Field Test Area -an area of regulation tents, pup tents, dugouts, and camouflaged hangars! Here is the atmosphere of the battle area! Our student now lives, works and plays as he would under actual battle conditions. He walks his post during his trick at guard duty with the thought that an enemy may be lurking just over the hill; he repairs and overhauls B-17's, clad always in helmet and gas mask! An enemy observer MIGHT discover his skillfully camouflaged field hangar!

All his studying of the past is now put to test in the field, and the chances are that, having made the grade to this point, he will graduate. Graduation is also in field-in front of a dugout! The grind is over. It has not been easy at any time, and tough many times. There has been little liberty; few trips to town; the individual student has been one of thousands; he's virtually lived in fatigue clothes; he has worked at one time or other on all three shifts, which go around the clock! Yes, it was a grind. But now-on Graduation Day-will any student say the result is not worth it? Probably not, for the student, now an expert airplane mechanic, has been privileged to learn, at first hand, the mightiest weapon of war-the airplanel And, when peace finally comes to the United States, and millions of soldiers return to civilian life, the one who has been a successful student of the School will hold an enviable position in a world that will undoubtedly have many opportunities for a man with his particular talents and technical

Colonel Gowen has been stationed at Amarillo Army Air Field since

March, 1943, and until his appointment as Commanding Officer he was Director of Operations and Training.

Prior to coming here, upon his return from the Southwest Pacific area, he was Executive Officer of the Southeast Flying Training Center, stationed at Maxwell Field, Alabama, and later Director of College Training for the Southeast Section of the United States.

Colonel Gowen was a newspaper reporter in New Jersey, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, and South Carolina until 1914. Successive newspaper positions later included: telegraph editor of the Brockton, Mass. Times until 1916; managing editor of the Arleston, S. C., American until 1917; sub-aditor of the Boston American until 1922; make-up editor of the Boston Dally Advertiser until 1924; managing editor of the Boston Sunday Advertiser until 1931; associate Sunday actior of the New York American until 1931 editor and publisher of Now, monthly magazine, a year; and publisher of The Microphone until 1938.

Colonel Gowen returned to active service as a Major on February 4, 1941, and until he went overseas in September of 1941 was stationed in Washington, D. C., with Headquarters Army Air Forces.
