#### PART II

#### NARRATIVE SUMMARY



- (S) The Battalien centinued to support III MAF operations in the I Corps Tactical Zone with the collection, processing and reporting of Signal Intelligence. The six task organized platoons provided immediate tactical support to Regimental and Division Headquarters. Second echelon reporting was provided by the Battalion Operations Control Platoon to III MAF in Danang. Direct Support Teams (DST) were active in Operation Dewey Canyon which ended on 18 March and Operation Purple Martin from 21 to 30 March. Operation Taylor Common was supported by the First Platoon until 8 March when it was terminated.
- (S) Transmission Security Monitoring in support of III MAF continued throughout the period with 194 violations noted in 118,920 messages that were monitored. Serious violations/compromises were spot reported direct to the unit involved. 860 man-hours were devoted to transmission security during this period. Lectures were presented by the Platoon Commanders as requested by the supported commander.
- (S) Short Range Direction Finding was utilized with a total of 159 fixes resulting from the nets. The VHF Direction Finding netted a total of 69 fixes during the same month. The primary source of Direction Finding continued to be the airborne platforms of the Army and Air Force working in conjunction with 1st Radio Battalion platoons and Army units on the ground. As a result of these efforts, a total of 4,040 fixes were passed to tactical commanders.

- 2. (U) Personnel and equipment casualties. None.
- 3. (U) Equipment and Logistics
- a. 1st Radio Battalion remained in a C-1 status in equipment and supplies on hand. 43 pieces of combat essential equipment was not on hand throughout the period.
- b. No GA cards were submitted during March as a result of reporting a C-1 status.
- c. The Battalion remained in a C-1 status. Deadlined equipment in NORM/NORS was:

d. No new items of equipment were received and no construction was started.

### 4. (U) Maintenance

- a. <u>Electronics</u>. A total of 20 work orders were submitted, 15 pieces of equipment were repaired and 2 were evacuated to higher echelon. There were 5 pieces awaiting repair parts.
- b. <u>Engineer</u>. There were 67 tactical equipment repair orders (TERO) submitted and 63 completed. 4 were evacuated to higher echelon. 30 of the TERO's were for general repairs and the remainder were for scheduled maintenance.

- 5. (U) Motor Transport. The Motor Transport section travelled 25,870 miles hauling 73 tons of cargo and 5,174 personnel. A total of 73 tactical equipment repair orders were submitted with 69 completed of which 31 were for general repairs. 2 were evacuated to higher echelon.
- 6. (U) Supply. A backorder reconciliation submitted to CG III MAF resulting in 530 requisitions that required AT follow-ups, 113 were cancelled and there were 595 that were still outstanding. A total of 654 requisitions were submitted and 176 were filled. Of the former, 52 were priority 02 and 22 were completed. There was 1 follow-up submitted.
- 7. (S) Communications. The CRITICOMM relay station (CRS) Danang, operated by 1st Radio Battalion, transmitted 3,634 locally originated messages totaling 1,110,142 groups. CRS Danang received 7,477 messages totaling 2,863,691 groups. The total manpower figure during this time was 64, including 18 personnel located at the platoons and 7 assigned to maintenance.
- 8. (C) Courier. A total of 145 courier runs were made to the 6 platoons of this Battalion in March by the S-2 Section.
