This two plane section flew up to Valencia to bomb and strafe the ravines southwest of the Valencia strip. All the bombs were placed directly in the ravines, which were possible dispersal areas. One tail gunner thought he saw some personnel moving about in one of the ravines. One truck was seen on the road near the target. Results were unobserved due to darkness. The a/c then returned to base.
