Question of Carrying Out of Treaty Still Needs To Be Settled

French-British Difference of Opinion Regarding Occupation of Towns Composed But Germany's Honoring of Treaty Requires Attention.

Paris, April 13.—Although the diplomatic incident regarding the occupation of Frankfort by French forces is considered here to have been closed, it is pointed out that the main question under which the dispute arose—the carrying out of the Treaty of Versailles—remains open in its entirety.

Forecasts are that it will come up at the San Remo conference of the Allies. The probable occasion will be in connection with the consideration of Germany's request for further time to disarm and demobilize, it is understood in official circles.

VICTORIA THEATRES WILL BE DARKENED

R. Rowe Holland Informs Times Course Will Be Adopted

A dispatch from Vancouver a few days ago stated that if the Government increased the amusement tax to the extent defined by the Minister of Finance in his Budget speech, the amusement houses of Victoria would be closed. A Times representative yesterday approached R. Rowe Holland, of Vancouver, legal representative of the Amusement interests of the Province, with a view to ascertaining the accuracy of the report. "Unfortunately," Mr. Holland said, "the dispatch is correct. There is no bluff or threat in the announcement that the amusement houses will be closed in Victoria if the tax is imposed. It is simply a statement of consequences which must necessarily follow such development.

"What ahout the amusement houses in Vancouver?" queried The Times representative.

"There is a grave possibility that they, particularly the smaller ones, will be similarly affected," Mr. Holland replied. "The Government's proposal simply doubles the amusement tax and is an unfair burden upon amusement. I cannot see how it can be justified by the amount of financial benefit the Government will derive, since the closing of some of the houses will mean a loss of revenue, and I doubt if the additional levy will more than balance that loss; while a large proportion of the playgoing public of meagremeans will be denied their opportunity of enjoying this form of amusement.

"There is another aspect of this question which may have been overlooked." Mr. Holland continued, "and that is the effect of the increased tax upon what is known as the legitimate drama and musical productions which are undergoing a revival in the larger centres of the East. They are important factors in the spiritual and educational life of any community and it certainly will be impossible to arrange for such companies to come to places where so heavy a tax is levied upon them. It is difficult enough to get them to come here, particularly to Victoria, as it is, and this fresh obstacle is likely to prove unsuperable.

Guatemala City, April 13.—Troops supporting Carlos Herrera, proclaimed President of the republic of Guatemala after a swift revolution, are holding this city although it is closely besieged by President Estrada Cabrera's army. Shells fired by these troops have fallen in many parts of the town.

Herrera's forces hold the principal railroad and reports indicate the revolution has spread over most of the interior of the country.

A dispatch vesterday said many non-combatants had been killed in Guatemala City, which had been under shell fire of forces of Presi-dent Cabrera since Thursday even-

Before quitting his headquarters at Falkenstein, near Plauen, Hoelz, angered at the refusal of the Plauen business community to submit to his levy of half a million marks, had his raiders descend upon Plauen. They compelled a cafe and restaurant guests to give up their money, invaded residences of wealthy citizens and riffed a safe or two.

At Falkenstein the band looted local stores and set fire to five large villas. The inmates were given ten minutes to leave. The furniture and woodwork inside was then soaked with benzine and a torch applied. The buildings were destroyed.

The expectation of Hoelz that the working community would support him was dashed by a vote of the Vogtland workers. Their ballot was 44,000 to 26,000 against a strike.

Crowd Said to Number 20,000; Threatening Demonstrations; Building Guarded by Tanks and Soldiers; All Starving Prisoners Very Weak.

Dublin, April 13.-The general strike declared in Ireland in rotest over the treatment of the Sinn Fein prisoners who are on a hunger strike in Mount Joy prison here went into effect to-day amid tumultuous scenes in the vicinity of the prison.

The crowd which had assembled outside the prison edifice grew as the day wore on until it comprised 20,000 persons, among whom threatening demonstrations occurred. The authorities thought it necessary to augment the defences, and tanks and several armored cars, with a large force of police and military, were stationed about

ASK DOLLY VARDEN **ACT BE SET ASIDE**

Original Owners of Valuable Mine Start Suits in Court

Vancouver, April 13.-Litigation in the British Columbia courts to have the Dolly Varden Mines Railway Act of 1919 declared ultra vires and of no effect was launched within a few urs of publication of the Dominion Government's refusal to disallow the Act. Two writs were issued from the office of Burns & Walkem, local solicitors, on instructions from R. T. Elliott, K.C., legal adviser of the Dolly Varden Mines Company, original owner of the valuable mine came into the hands of the Taylor Engineering Company under the terms of the Provincial legisla-tion which it is now sought to have set aside.

One writ asks for a series of declarations setting aside the act and all proceedings taken under its provisions. The other writ asks for damages for alleged trespass and for payment to the plaintiff of all money realized from ores produced at the mine.

mine. Defendants.

The Taylor Engineering Company and the Taylor Mines Company are named as defendants in both actions. In the damage action the names of the incorporators of the Taylor Mines Company are added as defendants. These are: A. J. Taylor, H. C. Chine, John Anderson, C. M. Rolston, J. F. Tener and R. P. Butchart.

In the action which raises the constitutional question about the validity of the Legislature's Act, C. M. Rolston is the only personal defendant in addition to the two Taylor companies. The first declaration sought is that the Dolly Varden Act is ultravires of the Legislature and invalid and of no force and effect. The second declaration asked is the setting aside of all acts, documents and proceedings under the said act as invalid, unlawful and void, together with the delivery and registrations affecting the alleged rights, titles and claims of the plaintiff.

Setting aside of all proceedings before Justices Clement and Murphy under the Act is asked. Another order asked is that the defendants be required to execute and deliver to the plaintiff company all documents and writing necessary to reinstate the plaintiff company in the position it occupied before the passing of the Act.

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IN CHURCH SUIT

eral Wishes Place in Christian Science Litigation

Boston, April 12.—A petition for leave to intervene in the Christian Science Church litigation was filed in the Supreme Court here late yesterday by J. Weston Allen, Attorney-General of Massachusetts. He says that the First Church of Christ Scientist "is a public charitable trust devoted to the advancement of the religion of Christian Science for the benefit of its members and of the public generally," and is an unincorporated association.

He points out that the powers of the church directors have been limited by the report of the Master in the litigation between the directors and trustees of the Christian Science Publishing Society and that the binding force and effect of the directors acts have been questioned, if not denied, by that report.

Because of this, he says, the Attorney-General, as representing beneficiaries of this public charitable trust, is a necessary party to the litigation. He asks leave to intervene as a party defendant and to file an answer so that all questions regarding the validity and effect of the by-laws constituting the church manual and authority of the directors may be determined.

A Moscow dispatch of April 9, received Sunday, stated that Tchitcherin, the Bolshevik Foreign Minister, on Thursday sent a note to Poland saying that, in view of Poland's attitude in selecting Borisov as the place for peace negotiations the Soviet Government considered it to be its duty to address a communication to the Governments of Great Britain, France, Italy and the United States. AZERBAIJANS AND ARMENIANS FIGHT

Massachusetts Attorney-Gen- Georgia Is in Danger of Being Overrun By Bolsheviki Forces

Constantinople, April 12.— Via London, April 13.—Fighting between Azerbaijans and Armenians continues in the Karabagh region, and inter-Ailled observers report that 25,000 Armenians in Baku are in danger of being massacred.

Part of the Denikine fleet in the Caspian Sea has turned Bolshevik, moving northward to join the Red fleet, which is expected at the mouth of the Volga when the ice clears. The remainder of the Denikine vessels steamed south from Petrövsk and are reported proceeding to Persian ports.

At Batum, on the Black Sea side, British warships are sufficiently numerous to keep Batum quiet for the present, but the Georgian Government is so weak and so hard pressed by its own radical elements that there seems little hope of successful resistance by the Georgians to the Bolsheviki if they actually move against Georgia.

The Georgian situation is complicated by the flood of Cossack soldiers and civilians fleeing across the mountains ahead of the Bolsheviki.

Thirty thousand armed Cossacks moving south from Novorossisk and Tuapsie are concentrated at Sochi, with the Reds pursuing, the Georgians in their front, mountains on the one side and the sea on the other.

Berlin, April 12.-Via London, April 13.—Pandemonium reigned in the Stock Exchange here to-day in con sequence of the putting into effect of an order for compulsory transfer of foreign securities held in Germany, as provided by the peace treaty.

Quotations slumped; no business was possible; brokers yelled invectives against the Government; members of the Stock Exchange committee were bodily attacked, and despite an appeal from Director Mankiewicz, of the Deutsche Bank, the tumult rose to such a pitch that the Exchange was closed for the day.

REJECT PURTION OF SCHOOL BOARD APPROPRIATIONS

Council 'Makes Necessary Submission of Bylaw on \$27,000 Items

Three separate by-laws will have be submitted to the ratepayers in he course of the year, if expenditures

been submitted. The amount involved the aldermen claimed, was extraordinary expenditure, and really required a by-law.

Refusal to allow the item was advised by Alderman Sargent, Chairman of the Finance Committee, one of the aldermen appointed as a special committee to endeavor to reduce the estimates of various civic departments. His resolution on the subject was based on the following report, framed by City Solicitor Pringle and City Comptroller Raymur.

"The School Board, according to the letter of April 1, had reduced its estimates of ordinary expenditure for 1820 from \$423,148.75 to \$3384,384.75, being a total reduction of \$38,762. The Board has asked for \$27,975, as extraordinary exjenditure, being divided into three classes, namely; New school sites, new school buildings and furniture and equipment, all of which in our opinion comes within the proper classification. If this extraordinary expense should be submitted to the ratepayers, three separate by-laws would be required.

"Ths estimate of ordinary expenditure includes approximately \$5,000, which your Solicitor included in the extraordinary expense, but this we think should be left in the list of ordinary expense."

Alderman Andros could see no reason why the Council should pass a resolution rejecting the \$27,000 item. The better course would be to refuse to pay the money when the time came. The Council, after all, held the purse strings.

Alderman Sargent replied that, according to law, unless the Council objected to a School Board appropriation, the expenditure would be made automatically.

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

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



LABOR DISTRIBUTION **WILL BE EASIER IN SUMMER MONTHS**

Important Report Is Now Compiled on Employment Bureaux

Legislative Assembly some weeks ago, the Department has now completed a return on the work accomplished by the Government Employment Bureaux in the Province in the first three months of 1920.

These Bureaux, the first of which was started only a little over a year ago, may now be said to have established themselves completely, while their increasing utility is proved by the figures given in the present return. Whetrer in relation to the number of applications registered for turn. Whefrer in relation to the num-ber of applications registered for work, vacancies notified by em-ployers, or placements in employ-ment, these figures show a sub-stantial advance compared with last

Increases

The various offices in the Province last year operating for an average period of ten months, found work for a total of 35,594 applicants. For the three months of this year the number of applicants provided with work was 16,388. The increase may be attributed largely to the compulsory closing down in November last of the employment offices which were run on a commercial basis.

For the month of January the average was 1,070 per week; for February 1,178, and for March 1,459. Now that the Province is at the beginning of what is, industrially, the most active period of the year, there is every indication that these figures will be exceeded in the coming months.

Thus, there were required here fifty-nine laborers, ten fallers, fifty-four loggers, ten pulp-wood cutters, seventeen tie-makers, nipeteen miners, thirty-nine rail-road laborers and eighty-nine section men. The forty-two vacancies unfilled at Victoria included sixteen for rock-men and seventeen for laborers. There were twenty-one vacancies at New Westminster, (eleven for laborers, thirty-seven at Prince Rupert, (fifteen for shingle bolt cutters), five Government and the railway companies.

The applicants who were listed as "unplaced" on the latest date covered by the return include wage-earners of almost every class, especially in Vancouver and Victoria. In Vancouver there were 419 names on this list, largely made up of skilled workers; but clerks account for forty of the number, drivers thirty-eight, watchmen twenty-two and general laborers 122. The 292 unplaced men in Victoria were also a varied list, the largest individual figures being acreements forty-one, shipwrights twenty-six, laborers sixty. In New Westminster there were seventeen unplaced, in Prince Rupert seventy westminster there were seventeen unplaced, in Prince Rupert seventy five (thirty-four laborers), Nanaimo forty-one (twenty-seven, Nelson forty-one (twenty-seven laborers), and forty-five (thirty-four laborers) and laborers and eleven loggers), 103 at Vernon (fifty-cight log sawyers, thirty-three mill hands, ters and ten miners), and forty-fight at Fernie (bushmen).

Congestion in Cities It will be seen from the above fig-ures that any congestion of labor which may exist in the Province towhich may exist in the Province to-day is practically confined to the cities on the Coast. All the bureaux in these centres report more appli-cants for work than there is employ-ment in sight, with the exception of the Powell Street office in Vancou-ver, which is used mainly to meet the requirements of up-country indus-try.


