Address Delivered by the Local Candidate, J. C. Watters.

THE ADVANCEMENT OF ANGLICAN MISSIONS

Energetic Organizing Secretary is Now in the City - Meeting Columbia Diocese Delegates.

Rev. Dr. L. Norman Tucker, organizing and general secretary of the Home and Foreign Missionary Society of the Anglican church in Canada, and formerly rector of Christ church in Vancouver, arrived in this city on Friday evening. He came over from the Mainland with Rev. Canon Beauland.

In an interview Rev. Dr. Tucker stated that the missionary society work was progressing splendidly. Ten months ago, when he was appointed secretary, they had set out to raise \$75,000 this year, \$50,000 for home missions and \$25,000 for the foreign field. It was then thought that this was almost impossible of accomplishment, but the executive had decided to try and achieve it, and said Mr. Tucker, "we will have raised that sum before the year terminates."

Rev. Dr. Tucker has come West to lay the work of the General Missionary Society before the clergy and leading laymen of the diocese of New Westminster and Columbia. With the holding of these meetings Rev. Dr. Tucker will have completed an itinerary extending over practically every diocese and diocesan in the Dominion. On his present trip he has come through from Halifax, where he held a series of meetings, stopping off in the interests of the work at Winnipeg, Regina (where he met Rev. M. L. Roy en route to Toronto), Calgary and Edmonton, everywhere he has been in the East the response to the appeal for aid for the missionary work has been most generous. The enthusiasm at some of the meetings was so great as to almost equal that usually

aroused at meetings during a political campaign. In mapping out the work, the \$75,000 apportioned and been apportioned to the various dioceses according to their population and influence, some being put down for \$10,000 and others for less amounts. Already several districts had paid in their full share, including Quebec, Winnipeg and the Algoma diocese. Toronto had responded generously, the Cathedral had raised \$1,000, St. Paul's a like sum, and other churches in the city equally handsome contributions.

As the work of the missionaries lay in the West, the only share the East had in it was in contributing towards their support and maintenance and in this it had responded nobly. The people of the East are most enthusiastic about anything in the West; they realize the greater possibilities of the vast domain that lies between them and the shores of the Pacific, the sunset gateway of the Dominion, and are giving liberally towards its development, both material and spiritual. "And," remarked Rev. Dr. Tucker, "the West is worthy of their interest; it is marvellous how the country is filling up. Everywhere you go new settlers are seen coming in; they are passing through North Bay and Winnipeg at the rate of a thousand a day. All along the line and up between Calgary and Edmonton, the land is being thickly settled, while to the South, between the main line and the boundary, they are so numerous that it would almost make one believe that it was an American colony on Canadian soil. These settlers all appear to be a good class of people, and are settling down most contentedly and industriously. A wave of immigration seems to have spread over the West, and one can hardly speak too enthusiastically on the subject."

This afternoon Rev. Dr. Tucker is meeting delegates of the Columbia diocese in connection with the work he is so energetically advancing, and this evening he will deliver an address to the congregation in the Christ church school room. He will leave on his return trip to-night. While in the city he is the guest of Rev. W. D. Barber.

PROVINCIAL NEWS.

CHILLIWACK. Plim rot has reduced to a minimum this season the local yield and shipment of plums and prunes.

KAMOOOPS. Rev. Mr. Weatherdon, who has for some time acted as locum tenens for the Rev. Mr. Akhurst, who has now returned from a visit to England, has left for Mission, there to take charge of the Anglican Mission district.

NELSON. Fire on Friday night destroyed the big boarding house at the Venus mine, in which 30 men were sleeping. All escaped from the building, although with the loss of what money they had and most of their wearing apparel. The building was utterly destroyed. The fire is supposed to have originated through a candle having been left burning in the room where the men dry their clothes. It probably upset and set fire to some dry clothing. The mine is situated nearly at the top of Morning Mountain, 3,000 feet above the city, and the spectacle from Nelson, while the fire was at its height, was grand in the extreme.

ROSSLAND. The license commissioners of Rossland have declined to entertain the request of the local liquor men to limit the number of licenses to a number much below the maximum allowed by the present law. The commissioners recommend no change in it.

GRAND FORKS. The Hesperus group, on Hardy Mountain, has joined the ranks of the shipwrecked. The granby smelter is now treating considerable quantities of iron. The smelter returns gave values principally in copper of \$16 per ton. The properties, which are located four miles from Grand Forks, were acquired last spring by the Hesperus Gold & Copper Mine, Limited, a Chicago corporation, of which Charles Macree is president. The development work is in charge of Bert Rice, formerly of Rossland.

VANCOUVER. Chief Justice Hunter left on Friday for the interior on circuit. He will be away several weeks, but will come down for a few days to attend a session of the Fall court. The city council has been appealed to for funds for the purpose of entertaining the 100 members of the Manufacturers' Association, who will arrive here shortly. On Thursday evening the sergeants' mess of the 6th Regiment, D.C.O. Rifles, held a most enjoyable social in their mess rooms at the drill hall. Two very pleasant features specially marked the evening, the welcoming back of the officers and men who so ably upheld the honor of the regiment at the recent Ottawa rifle meeting, and the presentation to Col. Worsnop of a gold-mounted walking stick by the sergeants' mess as a token of their high esteem of their late superior officer. The steamer Meermald on Saturday brought down a logger named John Cary, who had been seriously injured at Haslam's camp at Vancouver Bay, Jervis Inlet. On Thursday last he was struck by the haul-back rope. A part of the donkey engine equipment, and an arm was broken, a couple of ribs smashed in and his right hip dislocated. About 3 o'clock Saturday morning Patrolman D. D. McIntosh was attracted by the suspicious behavior of a man on Westminster avenue. Keeping close watch, he observed him turn in toward the back of Woodward's store. The officer followed, and found the man skulking near the rear windows. He was arrested and gave the name of D. Irvine. The magistrate ordered that the accused be incarcerated for 30 days.

THE FAMOUS RIO TINTO. Chat With General Manager Carlyle. Respecting This Copper Producer. "Some day I may return to Canada to live, but just at present Spain is plenty good enough for me," said Mr. W. A. Carlyle, general manager of the Rio Tinto mine, who, accompanied by his wife and little daughter, is paying a short visit to Ontario after an absence of four years. When Mr. Carlyle's appointment to the management of the Rio Tinto was announced some four years ago it was hailed with delight by Canadians as something in the nature of a national triumph. Mr. Carlyle was at that time manager of the great Le Roi mine at Rossland.

The Rio Tinto mine is the largest in the world. It is controlled by an English syndicate, and is situated in the south of Spain, the seaport of the company being at Huelva, the port from which Columbus sailed on his voyage to discover America. The mine is sixty miles inland, and is reached by railway. There are 41,000 men on the payroll of the Rio Tinto, comprising 75 Englishmen on the staff in charge of departments. Mr. Carlyle says he has found the Spaniards excellent workmen. They receive their pay daily, a plan which is found to work well, as it tends to keep the men out of debt. The output of the Rio Tinto is about two million tons of ore a year, half of which is shipped to Europe and America and sold for copper and sulphur values. About five per cent. of the ore is treated by smelting to blister copper in the latest type of American smelting plant. The balance is treated locally by leaching with water, a method distinctive to a few mines in the south of Spain, and in no other part of the world. Every 24 hours seven million gallons of copper liquor from these leaches and run into canals filled with pig iron and metallic copper is precipitated, known as cement copper, which, with blister copper, is sent to the company's refining plant in Wales.
