GERMAN COAL INDEMNITIES TO BE HANDLED BY ALLIED REPARATION COMMISSION

BOULOGNE, July 28.—The Allied Premiers' conference in session here has agreed that the Reparations commission shall handle German coal indemnities. Germany will be allowed 40 marks gold for every ton of coal delivered secured by notes which will mature May 1, 1921. Lloyd-George today drafted a note to Russia saying that peace must be agreed upon first after which recognition of the Soviet government will be considered.

PARIS, July 28.—Dispatches reaching the foreign office today said the Polish army is retreating along the entire front. Feeble resistance is being put up at both extremities of the line.

SERIOUS COLLISION

AUTOS BADLY WRECKED AT JUNCTION OF BROADWAY AND S. F. ROADS

A serious collision of two autos occurred last evening about 6 o'clock at the junction of San Fernando and Broadway. L. B. Pierik of El Centro was driving south in a Dodge car and, wishing to go through the business portion of Glendale, turned to the left, to come in on Broadway, but, according to T. H. Swope of Burbank, who was driving north in a Dixie Flyer, failed to give any signal, and the cars came together with a crash, then climbed the bank at the roadside and stopped, a mass of wreckage. Mr. Pierik was badly cut about the face, so seriously, as one of the nurses at the Sanitarium hospital said, that he didn't seem to have any face left. Deep cuts on the left cheek and above the left eye extended 3 inches, his mouth was cut inside, chin bruised and the right eyeball, which was sightless, however, was punctured and almost torn from the socket. He and Mr. Swope, whose right hand was cut and his right leg hurt below the knee, were picked up by a truck that came along just after the collision and rushed to the Sanitarium. Mr. Swope left as soon as his slight cuts and bruises were dressed, but Mr. Pierik is still a patient there and will be for several days.

There were many cars passing along the San Fernando Road at the time of the accident, which made the turn at Broadway especially dangerous.

WIRELESS STATION

GLENN ROMINGER HAS COMPLETE OUTFIT FOR LONG DISTANCE SENDING

Glenn Rominger of 241 South Orange street, who has a well fitted up wireless station at his home, is now making some experiments with a bulb lighting system whereby interference from other operators or mixing of messages can be eliminated. Some of his friends are also working on the same idea. Mr. Rominger is a member of the Southern California Radio Club in Glendale, a non-commercial organization which is affiliated with other societies, and he expects soon to become a member of the American Radio Relay League, which handles all transcontinental messages. Other young men of Mr. Rominger's acquaintance who are members of the local organization are Charles and William Rich of 1022 Boynton; Harry Crawford of 800 South Central; Dan Campbell, Jr., of 1750 Highland avenue; Hubert Wood of 122 Milford; Lowry Truitt of 310 North Cedar; Oliver Garretson and Stanley Doer of Eagle Rock. E. S. Watkins of Alhambra is president of the club.

Mr. Rominger began his study of wireless communication about four years before the war, and last year studied the subject one term at the Polytechnic High in Los Angeles, keeping up his individual reading and study at all times. His outfit is being improved and added to from time to time. His receiving set consists of variable condensers, variometers, tuning instruments, and audion control cabinet using an audio iron bulb. The sending set consists of one glass plate condenser, one quarter kilowatt transformer, 24000 volt secondary, oscillation transformer, relay key and lamp bank.

Mr. Rominger and his friends are pursuing other studies merely for their own interest and pleasure and possibly for future use when traveling, as the salary of a wireless operator is not an attractive feature. He named several of his friends whose messages have been heard as far as Roswell, New Mexico; Vancouver, Washington; and Moscow, Idaho, which indicates that their transmitting sets are tuned up better than others and they are making use of the best theories and apparatus.

The alphabet used in wireless is the international, which is somewhat similar to the Morse alphabet used in telegraphy. More messages are sent at night than by day. It is not possible to send farther than 200 miles in the day time on account of the effect of the sun's rays which tend to ground the waves conducting the message.

Mr. Rominger's station, though fitted up for his own pleasure, presents quite an official appearance with his operator's and station licenses on the wall. The government conducts examinations for students of the radio school at the Y. M. C. A. in Los Angeles where Mr. Rominger took his test.

FINE HOME PLANNED

HOLLYWOOD MAN BUYS ACRE-AGE ON SIXTH ST.—WILL IMPROVE IT AT ONCE

The Pinneo five acres, just west of A. B. Clements' orange grove, on Sixth street, was sold yesterday to Mr. Rinehart of Hollywood, who will at once build a large garage and fit it up for housekeeping, then later build a fine residence and set the entire acreage, which is now vacant, to walnut trees. He aims to make of it an ideal country home with all city advantages. Mr. Clements, who gave this information to the Evening News, is very much pleased that he is to have so progressive a neighbor and an improvement that will add so much beauty to that section, which will undoubtedly soon be a part of the city of Glendale.

Both sides of Sixth street, between Pacific and Grand View avenues will undoubtedly ere long be lined with country homes such as this one now projected by Mr. Rinehart and such as Mrs. Cunningham has recently built up a little further west.

Permits have been taken out for the erection of two 5-room residences, with garages, at 505 and 511 South Louise, right in the middle of John Verdugo's fine sweet potato patch. Like some other contractors he was lured to Glendale by its unexampled building boom and then, he said, he wanted to try building small houses for a time, as a change. The price of each of the residences and its garage is given at \$3250.

NEED NOT FEAR

SEVERE EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS IMPOSSIBLE IN THIS SECTION

To relieve the fears of some people regarding the liability of earthquake shocks endangering life, in Southern California, the Evening News is glad to give publicity to the following scientific opinion given out by Dr. Ford Carpenter, eminent meteorologist, and others:

Although the quakes of 1920 were the most severe experienced in this vicinity for a quarter of a century, yet the total damage recorded does not equal that brought by an ordinary Mississippi Valley wind storm.

On "Ball Bearings"

The earthquake records run back for more than 100 years in this section, but no really damaging shock has ever occurred in Los Angeles county. This is believed to be due to the quake-proof formation of the earth's crust under the surface; as expressed by one scientist, the gravel formation makes the city practically "ball bearing."

Government investigations and surveys have established that, characteristic of a flood plain foundation, the earth's crust of the Los Angeles district is for a great depth made up of a gravel foundation, which has a tendency to absorb and greatly retard disturbances occasioned by the settling of strata in the earth's formation. While tremors of varying degree, such as visited Los Angeles and vicinity, may occasionally be felt, we have assurances that with our substrata formation, no fears should be entertained for any greatly damaging earthquake.

It is not possible to make any forecast or other prediction of earthquakes. There is no foundation whatever for such prognostications and nothing of such nature has ever emanated from reliable scientific sources.

Scientists the world over are in accord that the cause of earthquakes is some adjustment of deep under surfaces of the earth's crust. These come after centuries of strain, resulting in a trembling of the earth's outer surface, which is called an earthquake. Hence, it is obvious that if a locality has a flood plain foundation capable of absorbing adjustments of the earth's interior, it may safely be assumed that that locality will be free for all time from the danger of a disastrous quake.

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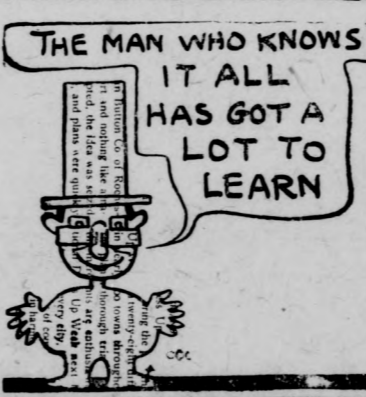
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
