





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Vegetable Gardens Coming Back

After the war, with its enforced vegetable growing as a war measure, vegetable gardening went into temporary eclipse and vegetable gardens which had dotted every small lot during the war days disappeared and gave place to flower gardens in a great majority of cases. The family gardening burden passing to the distaff side of the house.

The pendulum has now swung in the other direction and vegetable gardening is coming back to the place its importance normally deserves in the home grounds. In urban centers there is excellent reason for abandoning vegetable gardens. This is the fine variety of fresh vegetables carried by green grocers who are numerous, the combination of a fruit and vegetable store being a modern development.

With the movement toward the suburbs and the country, especially during the summer months, it is not so easy to telephone or step over to the store and make selections. The automobile has tended to make distance much less important than it was a few

years ago.

The vegetable garden becomes a real convenience, and once established it is a home utility that will not be dispensed with, as vegetables gathered at one's own back door, saves many steps, much gasoline, and considerable time. In addition there is the one unpurchasable factor of quality. No matter how well refrigerated and cared for, store vegetables cannot have the same fine qualities as those gathered a few minutes before they go into the kettle and to the table.

Then, too, the home garden offers a choice of varieties which the market does not give. Market gardeners are conservative, trusting to staples, and productiveness is more of a criterion in selecting seeds of varieties than quality. They are slow to discard an old reliable variety for an improvement. For variety and quality, vegetables must be grown at home.—The National Garden Bureau.
