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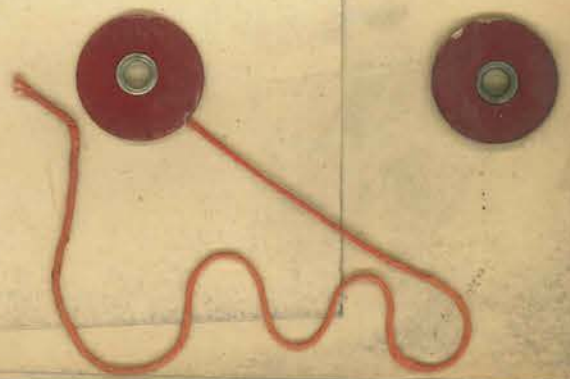
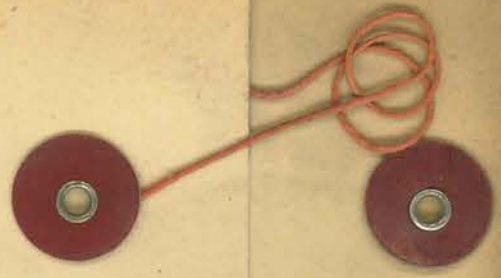

BE IT KNOWN THAT I, LINA PRAGER WEBER, a citizen of the United States, residing at the City of New York, Borough of Manhattan, County and State of New York, have invented and produced a new and original design for an Artificial Flower, of which the following is a specification:

My invention resides in the artificial flower having ~~as its essential features~~ the particular shape and configuration and its surface ornamentation as herein shown and described.

In the drawings forming part of this specification,

Figure 1 is a side elevation;

Figure 2 a plan view;

Figure 3 a side elevation of one of the petals detached to more clearly illustrate its shape and its surface ornamentation;

Figure 4 is a side elevation of the pistil; and

Figure 5 is an inner view of one half of the pistil.

In plan, the disposition of the petals as a whole is substantially within a circle, ~~subject however to variation as before stated.~~

At 1 is the stem, 2 the corolla, 3 the petals,

and 4 the pistil. The stem and corolla are of conventional form. The petals are in side elevation fan shaped, and slightly convex exteriorly, with a series of ribs 5 running up and down, each of the ribs having staggered angular projections 6, the furrows 7 between the ribs being slightly crimped. In plan the petal is circular, its top edge 8 being ^Ssinuous, fig. 2.

¶ The pistil, which projects above the petals, is like an attenuated oval, slightly convex exteriorly, with a projecting and longitudinal central rib 9. It is duplex, in two parts, the tips 10 of which are slightly convolute so that they overlap each other.

¶ The effect of this artificial production or flower is very pleasing, and it is not known to approximate any known flower in nature; the ~~essential~~ feature being the shape or configuration of the flower due to aggregation of petals formed substantially as shown; also, and as a separate feature, the surface ornamentation of the petals, and the shape and ornamentation of the pistil.

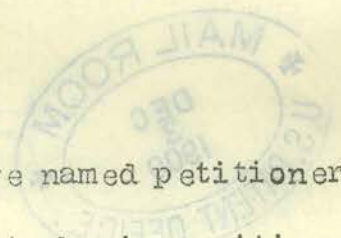

Figs. 3, 4 and 5 are without value in the case, the design being sufficiently shown in figs. 1 and 2. Figs. 3, 4 and 5 should therefore be canceled, being also fragmentary in character.

So much of the description as sets up how the petals may vary, lines 23 and 25 of page 1, should be eliminated. The description should be further revised to describe only the design illustrated in its aspect of shape, configuration and ornamentation. This revision should include the statement of essential feature.

When so amended further consideration will be given.

My invention resides in the artificial flower having the particular shape and configuration and its surface ornamentation as herein shown and described.
