DREADFUL EARTHQUAKE IN (HILL) From the N. Y. Commercial DREADFUL EARTHQUAKE IN (HILL Distruction of the city of Conception, and its port Talcabunan—By the arrival of the ship Corat, at New Bedford, from Tacabuna, intelligence has been acceived of the entire destruction of that nort, the city of Conception and more than thirty villages lying between the Pacific and the Ander, by a succession of earthounkes, the first of which occurred on the 20th February. The number of tives lost had not been ascertained when the Coral sailed. There were but two other American ships in the harbor at the time, namely, h. Milton and the Ni's. A small schooner was driven from her anchorage, and drifted over the town, the sea to lingupon the land in great waves, after the first shock, rising 2 or 30 feet, and awceping away the rains. Many lives were aved by the netive exection of the crews of the three American ships. The Coral sailed on the 6th of March, up to which time, the shocks continued every day, but with diminished violence. From four to five hundred persons were believed to have perished in the villages.

The following letter, written by a gentleman at Talcahuana, to his friend in New Bedford, is copied from the Gazette of that place:

Talcahnans, March I, 1835.

On the morning of Friday, the 20th of F. bruary, 1835 shout twenty minutes past eleven o'clock we were vicited by one of the most awful earthquakes ever experienced by the inhabitants of this place. The first shock lasted shoutour mutes and a half, canning the mountains and valley-to roll like the area, during the severity of the first shock which was no great that a person could scarcely ke p upright) I looked around for a moment to meet my fate, but an spared to be thankful, and may consider myself one of the ortunate in making my escape from the falling, but now prostrate runes. Conception, a city containing about twenty five thousand inhabitants, is one heap of ruins; being huilt principally of brick, there is not even one habitable dwelling left standing within the limits of the city, and for league-around. The shock came in a S. E. course, prostrating every thing in its way. A number of emall towns have been heard from in its course; Chillien, Talen, Arredan, Congas, Erras, Peural, St Carlie, Vallega, and Angles, have all methes same fate. Talcahuans, the port of Conception, is completely demolythed. It was not only shaken down, but the fragments of houses, stores, dec., were afterwards swept away by the sea, which retried about fifteen minutes after the shorek, leaving the shipping then lying at anchor in the harboar entire y dry. It camein then you a height of twenty live feet above the level, overwhelening the whole place.—Men, women and children fied to the amountains, but many were overtaken and ewept to the ocean by the resuming waves, which completed the destruction of the town, depriving hundreds of femilies of a second garment, many of whom wire in good circumstances, but are now destitute. Furniture of all kind were swept with the houses, not leaving even a vestige to inform the owner of the situation of his former habitation; and it would require an eye witness to be canwinced of the immense devastation it has caused.*
